



IT'S ALL OVER

It is with true regret to report that the Heacham Old Friends' Club closed finally on 30th June 2011, after having held weekly meetings for the over 60s since 1st February 1956, joining the list of local groups sadly ending their activities.

The Club had enjoyed immediate popularity and over this 55 year period brought over 60s together for social events of all kinds. Activities included bingo, day trips and even week-long holidays, theatre/market visits, all of which were widely supported, and there were lively parties at Christmas, Easter, strawberry festival time, harvest and other occasions. The monthly lunch innovation was also very popular. In the 1990s there was a waiting list of people to become members. All activities continued to be well supported, including much in-house entertainment which was often of a very high standard. The Club was granted charitable status in February 1993.

However, over the last 5 to 6 years, despite all efforts to encourage a revival, attendance has declined sharply with advancing age taking its toll, coincidental with the seeming decline of community spirit and village participation. As a consequence, with decreasing numbers, activities contracted to such a degree that it became impractical to continue.

The premises were built by public subscription, and one good thing to arise from the Club's demise is that the hall has been gifted to the Parish Council who will continue to operate it for the benefit of the community.







"Beauty from brokenness"

In May, during our holiday, Alison and I visited part of Hadrian's Wall. Not much of it still remains although pieces of the wall can be found in local buildings for miles around for much of the stone was reused by the local people when the Romans left. Recycling is not a new idea; throwing things away without regard for the waste is modern.

Where I lived in a part of Africa it was not unusual to see rubber footwear made from old tyres. Resources were scarce: as much as possible was used and reused – in often inventive ways.

The Church 'flower' festival in June showcased many displays all made from 'rubbish', bits and pieces that would normally be discarded. Many who came saw beauty and commented on the creativity as Bible and children's stories were depicted. For me and many others the inspiration is the stories that God told and continues to tell.




Jesus often told stories by looking around and seeing what was in front of him. The biggest story of all was lived out in front of the people and in the end they threw Jesus away on a cross. But God is not into throwing away.

As God looks on us he offers his creativity; he desires to bring out the beauty of our lives. God is not into throwing away. One of my favourite songwriters uses the following lines:

"So look in the mirror and pray for the grace To tear off the mask, see the art of your face."

We are God's workmanship; there is an artistry in each one of us that finds its fullest beauty when we let God work in us. The story started in a garden long ago continues to be told as God seeks to bring beauty from brokenness.



Do you watch programmes like Time Team? Are you interested in local history and archaeology?

This year will be the sixteenth that the Sedgeford Historical and Archaeological Research Project (SHARP) has been in operation. It is a long term archaeological and historical look into the past of Sedgeford, recording the story of the village since man first came to live there, and it is on your doorstep!

The 'dig' season is from Sunday July 3rd to Friday August 12th, and visitors are very welcome, free of charge, from Sunday to Friday between 11am and 4pm. 



Once again the Norton Hill Light Railway, at Hall Farm in Snettisham, will be raising steam and money for charity on several days in July and August. Come along for a great family afternoon out. THE POTTING SHED

GARDENING ORGANICALLY

The size of a garden has very little to do with it's merit. It is the size of its owners heart and brain and goodwill that will make his garden either delightful or dull.

Well, we did get a little rain, about 10mm. But it was amazing the difference it made to my vegetable plot (oh yes to the flowers as well but one can't eat the flowers, they just sit there looking pretty and enticing bees). We went away to Wales for the weekend of 27th to 30th May and things were looking rather sad when we went. We arrived home to real, proper rain and by the following Wednesday the difference was amazing. The broad beans stood up straight, I'm sure the potato haulms doubled in size and the onions likewise. We really could do with a lot more of the wet stuff. I got up this morning, determined to make a start on this masterpiece and the road was dampish. It drizzled for about another half hour and that seems to be it.

I dug our first root of potatoes on Wednesday, a variety I've not grown before called Lady Christl. Oh yum, they were lovely. I suspect that some of the yumminess was due to the fact that they were being scoffed within an hour of being lifted but I was still very impressed. So yesterday, Saturday, I lifted a root of Maxine, another new variety to me and they also were very good. It does drive home the fact that fresh veg - or fruit - eaten soon after harvesting has a flavour that just can't be beaten. I'm always banging on about growing your own even in tiny plots. Go on, give it a go, there is loads of information out there on the internet. Be warned though, gardening can become a bit addictive, especially when you taste the fruits of your labours. I am now waiting impatiently for the first broad beans and snap peas. Being a lazy sort of person, I find shelling peas boring but the snap peas I have grown for the last three years are lovely, a variety called Cascadia from Thompson and Morgan (and no, they don't pay me to advertise their products!) I froze some last year as I liked them so much. I thawed them not so long ago and they were rubbish, so another vegetable that has to be eaten fresh.

The French climbing beans and runner beans are struggling up their canes and the dwarf beans are growing nicely. I have a bit of a wait though as I was late putting them in. The results will be worth it though. It's raining again, not very hard but it should refresh the soil again. What is it about rain that makes things grow better than water from a rainwater butt? Some magical

ingredient picked up on its passage through the air perhaps? Maybe there is a clever person out there who can tell me. OK, I'm being all mystical perhaps but I do wonder about these things over my G&T. Maybe I should cut down a bit!

I have some hopes that my new herb garden, created in an area of the veg patch which has the roots of a balsam Poplar running through it, will come good. Herbs like poor soil and with the tree roots sucking out most of the nutrients available, they should do well. It's early days yet as they have only been planted out for about a fortnight but they haven't failed yet. You will hear more next time as to how they are progressing. In the same area are two minaret plum trees and a bavarian fig which has three figs swelling. If the blackbirds don't get there before me, I just may get figs for breakfast but I'm not holding my breath. The advantage of Bavarian figs is that they do not need to have their roots restricted. They also need feeding occasionally and if you can keep the blackbirds away, they taste very good, equal to Black Turkey.

I've measured the rainfall received today and it came to just over 2mm In contrast, Marham got 14mm. I think Heacham can truly claim to be the desert of East Anglia. I blame the government! Our masters seem to think they know everything so why can't they produce rain for us? And that is supposed to be a joke.

VEGETABLES AND THEIR CULTIVATION

By T.W. Saunders

Just a bit more on manures.

"Dried blood. This is a rich and valuable nitrogenous manure containing from 12-16% of ammonia and a very small percentage of phosphates, potash and lime..... A splendid fertiliser for turnips and is largely imported from South America." Now of course we tend to use blood, fish and bone which supplies the phosphates and potassium. I remember when I was a technician (now Biomedical scientist) in the Pathology laboratory at Lynn, I was always being asked if we had any expired blood, by one of the consultants who was a keen gardener. He used it on his marrows and tomatoes. I suspect one would get into serious trouble now, from the food police!

"Green manure. This consists of white mustard, rape, vetches or clover, sown on vacant land and allowed to almost reach maturity before being dug in. White mustard is obnoxious to wireworms. It is rich in potash, phosphoric acid and nitrogen and takes the place of farmyard manure" All of that information still applies today.

"Horse manure. Well known for its highly nitrogenous properties. Not well adapted for light or sandy soils as it has a tendency to lighten soils. In a loose pile, it heats rapidly and the

ammonia escapes. Gypsum (calcium sulphate) should be sprinkled over the heap to fix the ammonia. The heap should also be covered." Now all that is interesting. I have, as I continuously keep wailing, been putting tonnes of horse manure on my garden. My soil is light and sandy. No wonder the stuff vanishes quickly. Now I intend to aquire some gypsum and I also intend to cover my heap. I have, so far, collected about 1½ tonnes of horse manure from Mount Pleasant equestrian centre, building up a large stock to put down in the autumn. As supplies of pig and ox manure are not easily obtainable locally, I shall continue to use horse. There is a huge supply and I'm very sure that it's much better than nothing.

"Lime. A valuable substance for mechanically and chemically improving the condition of soils. Mechanically, it renders clay more pliable and less plastic and in the case of light soils, helps to bind the particles together and render them less susceptible to drought. Chemically, lime sweetens sour soils or those that have been heavily manured for generations. It unlocks the fertility of the soil and frees potash. It acts on vegetable acids (?) and liberates ammonia, encouraging the formation of nitrates. In its caustic condition (Quicklime) it destroys various insect and fungoid pests. For general purposes, ground lime is better than the caustic form and should be applied little and often." NB. Do not mix with manure and do not use on potatoes.

"Liquid manure. To form liquid manures, put a peck (approx 7Kg/16lbs) or so of horse droppings into a 36 gallon cask together with a peck of soot enclosed in a bag. Fill the cask with water and well stir the contents for a week. Then use the liquid undiluted for vegetables." Well, my comfrey juice smells pretty dreadful and that is diluted about 1:10. So try it if you dare! You probably don't need 36 gallons though.

"Night soil. A rich fertiliser abounding in nitrogen, phosphates and alkalies. The leading fertiliser used by the Chinese and has also long been employed on the continent. The Chinese mix it with meal and form it into cakes in which form it is kept until required when it is dissolved in water. They also put it into pits, lined with plaster along with garden refuse. Water is added and the pit covered with straw until decomposition is effected. The manure is then removed and used in the garden." OK a pongy process but they did this for four thousand years at least until Agribiz came along and introduced them to the joys of expensive artificial fertilisers. Remember all this useful information folks 'cos the oil will run out and we will need a substitute.

OK that's quite enough about manures. There is much more but I think you have quite enough to think about and discuss over supper - I dare you! Next time I'm going to delve into cropping and planting. Tell me if you find it boring please.



I have to finish with my thoughts on the problems besetting the Germans and E.coli infection - cause unknown at the time of writing. I and many others, have long believed that we have so sterilised our environment that we are losing our immunity to the bacteria that surround us. Every evening we are bombarded with adverts for disinfectants to remove the "danger" of MRSA bacteria, E.coli and other bacteria, most of which live quite happily on our skin and in our bodies. Sadly, because we now feed our domestic animals antibiotics routinely, not to cure disease but because some bright spark found that antibiotics are a growth promoter, we now have lots of bacteria around that are resistant to many of the antibiotics we used to use to cure disease. So now we spray work surfaces with disinfectants to prevent infection. We also have all these "sell by" dates stuck on our foodstuffs. I, thankfully, grew up at a time when you got rid of foods when they started to smell funny or grew mould. My generation pulled carrots from the ground, wiped most of the dirt of them and ate them. As a result, we were constantly exposed to bugs. I still scrape the mould off cheese, cheese is supposed to grow mould, look at Stilton or Binham blue, it's full of the stuff and tastes wonderful. The Human race has lived with these bugs for thousands of years and has generally developed immunity to most of them. I fully accept that in the never ending war between us and the microbiological world, we are going to occasionally get clobbered by a new variant of bacterium.

My point is that if we continue to live in a sterile environment, any new bug is going to be able to infect us and we won't be able to resist it. And that paragraph may set some tongues wagging!

INCINERATOR OBSTACLES

All Norfolk's MPs signed a letter requesting incinerator funding be withdrawn, arguing democracy should not be undermined in West Norfolk. DEFRA responded telling Norfolk County Council (NCC) to demonstrate broad support if they want funding. This development makes it harder for NCC to proceed, their timetable is slipping while more obstacles block their path. Months ago NCC's leader offered a false challenge, apparently prepared to consider incineration alternatives. When costed alternatives were put before cabinet they were dismissed without any consideration. NCC's leader and 3 officers should now be replaced - it is time to stop pretending the only choice is to burn or bury our waste. For more information on viable alternatives look on www.farmerscampaign.org.

The Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk is committed to oppose planning if NCC continue. NCC face another obstacle - their procurement decision is now subject to a legal challenge initiated by campaigners. It makes economic sense to abandon incineration now before NCC sign a contract giving away compensation when it fails. If this first legal challenge defeats the project, a great deal of money could be saved instead of a lingering death at a later stage.

At the time of writing this article NCC's leader was still determined to proceed with incineration. The law firm challenging the incinerator is not cheap and because of this emails were sent out asking for help. If all 65,516 who voted NO in the referendum made a contribution funding would be secure. It is too early to gauge response. At the time of writing a small number had responded with donations. The legal challenge hangs on everyone's willingness to chip-in, the generosity of a few started the process but much more is needed to succeed with Judicial Review. For everyone who has already helped, thank you for sharing this burden.

If BCKLWN are fighting the incinerator why do we need to raise funding?

It's a valid question. Currently the Borough Council are better placed to mount a challenge to planning than procurement. In other similar cases sometimes the borough council wins and others it loses.

Campaigners already have a strong procurement case which can be mounted without waiting for the planning stage. If it can be stopped at procurement it has advantages, we are not having to fight the well funded Cory Wheelabrator (CW) legal team. We



have more than one chance of defeating it rather than putting all our eggs in one basket at the planning stage. If we wait until planning the contract will have been signed making NCC liable for compensation to CW and have to pay the cost of the appeal to the High Court. Unfortunately the Borough Council cannot simply hand over a cheque to a 3rd party to pay for legal action. If we want to mount the procurement challenge open to us we have no choice but to initially raise funds ourselves. When it is up and running the BC may support the action if the case is shown to be strong. The rules require action to be brought promptly so we had no choice but to start now.

Incinerator Planning Application

On June 10th Cory Wheelabrator submitted their planning application for the incinerator despite the overwhelming rejection of it in the West Norfolk Referendum. Anyone who opposes the incinerator is urged to visit WWW.KLWIN.COM or WWW.FARMERSCAMPAIGN.ORG information on how to make planning objections effective is going to be posted. Although NCC are expected to ignore all objections, it is still worth making them. Registering objections can help for later on when the High Court is asked to quash NCC's decision.

By the time you read this the consultation period will have started. It will run through most of July so there will be a reasonable amount of time for you to register your objections. Also you should be able to access the application and plans at the Borough Council's website. A copy of the application will also be available for perusal at the Borough and Parish Council offices within North West Norfolk.

HEACHAM PARISH COUNCIL NOTICEBOARD

Parish Council Meetings in brief

Age Concern: The Parish Council expressed their disappointment that Age Concern West Norfolk had, with very little notice, closed the Heacham Office.

Queen's Cottage Almshouse Trustee: The Council discussed the appointment of a trustee, Mrs Smeaton and Mrs Carr outlined the work involved.

Tree Warden: The Council were pleased to note that the Borough Council had reinstated the coordinator post. It was agreed that adverts would go into the Newsletter, it was further agreed that several people could be appointed if there was sufficient interest.

Finance: The Council approved the Annual Return ending 31 March 2011. The return would now be forwarded onto the Auditors. The Chairman thanked Mr Barge for his work as the Parish Council internal auditor. The return and accounts would be available for inspection, by appointment, at the Parish Council Office from 27 June until 22 July.

Dairy: Mrs Carr asked if it was known what would happen to the Dairy site following its closure, as she considered the site should be retained for commercial use.

Disabled Bay: The Council noted that 3 months after the request had been made, the disabled bay had been repainted outside the Coop, only to be obscured a few days later by the resurfacing works.
