



By the time you are reading this, it will be Autumn and our thoughts will be turning to casseroles and stews and hearty winter warming dishes.

Members at Heacham have been enjoying good weight losses with some members even coming back from holidays with a weight loss!

Last month, we had our Woman of the Year Competition and the members at Heacham voted overwhelmingly for Dendre Bavastock. Dendre has been a member for some time and although she still has a way to go to her target weight, she has already come down 7 dress sizes! Dendre is a committed member of Heacham Group and part of the Social Team, responsible for helping me run such a friendly and fun group.

I am extremely proud of Dendre as she does have health problems which she struggles with but rain or shine she is in group every week and because of that she inspires and motivates other members to keep losing weight.

My recipe this month is for a hearty warming pot roast.

Spicy Lamb Pot Roast

This will serve 6 people

Ingredients

31bs/l.36kg leg of lamb

1/2 "/ lcm piece of fresh root ginger

4 garlic cloves

2 tsp garam masala

2 tsp cumin seeds

A pinch of ground cloves

1 tsp chilli powder

3 tbsp lemon juice

Salt and Pepper

Fry Light

1 Onion

3 1/2 ozs/100g very low fat natural yoghurt

Juice of 1 lemon

A few coriander sprigs to garnish

Method

Remove all visible fat from the lamb. Open it out, cutting as necessary, to make a flat piece of meat. Prick all over with a fork.

Grate the ginger and crush the garlic. Mix with the spices, lemon juice and seasoning and rub into the lamb.

Heat a deep pan sprayed with Frylight until hot. Add the lamb and cook for 5 minutes to seal. Turn lamb over and cook for a further 5 minutes.

Add enough water to the pan to cover, quarter the onion and add to the pan. Bring to the boil, reduce the heat and simmer gently for about 3 hours, turning the lamb over every 30 minutes, until the liquid is thick. Cover and continue cooking for a further hour until the lamb is very tender.

Slice the lamb and serve drizzled with yoghurt and lemon juice and garnished with a little coriander.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM

Greetings from the manse,

Æthelred the Unready was someone we learned about at school who served as a reminder either to be on your toes or be prepared or more accurately and nearer to the old English ræd, meaning counsel, advice, to which the name refers, to give more thought to the consequences of your actions. In the case of Æbelræd Unræd, he is nick-named literally the "ill advised" or badly counselled, a pun on the meaning of his name in old English, æðele- ræd meaning "noble-advice". His policies and actions were none too successful. The history books tell the tale that Æthelred paid money to the Danes, who were raiding and settling England in the 10th century, to keep them quiet, a payment recorded as danegeld. Alas this only served to make matters worse. Poor old Æthelred could have done with a better publicist, or better still to have lived up to his name and listened to better counsel and acted more wisely.

In my daily life I am conscious of the name that I am privileged to carry as a Christian, the name of Christ. This makes me conscious of a number of things. I am conscious that in Jesus, God makes available to me all that is needed for salvation without me having to do anything beyond believing and accepting this precious gift. I am also aware that in company with Jesus in a daily relationship there is made available to me a life of peace and love. It's not that I have got all the answers or that I'm better than anyone else. Not a bit of it. That really would be poor advice and bad counsel. No, from personal experience over many years, I have concluded that the Christian way and life may not be the only way but it is the best life and Christ is the best way, the way of self giving love. Equally to my shame I am all too aware of the times when I do not live up to the name and the honour of the one who calls men and women to follow him. Though we may fail and fall and turn our back on him, he never gives up on us and in trust I believe that the power of the love of the crucified and risen one is stronger than sin and death.

If you want some "æðele- ræd", ask him into your life!

Bamboozled by barnacles? Mystified by mussels?

Norfolk Wildlife Trust invites you to explore the wealth of marine wildlife this county has to offer. The following adult workshop has been designed to help you develop your wildlife identification skills and be inspired by our amazing coast.

The workshop begins with an informative presentation by Rob Spray from Seasearch on Norfolk's coastal wildlife, followed by an afternoon on the coast looking for wildlife and learning how to complete a simple coastal survey.

Sunday 7 November, 10am to 4pm, Heacham. The huge beach of Heacham is a fantastic place to look for marine wildlife. Using push-netting and digging we discover the animals which inhabit the intertidal sea and shore of the Wash.

FILMING AT THE FOX BREWERY

One sunny morning in August a large car drew up outside the Fox and Hounds. After a few moments the doors opened, several people got out and started to unload cameras and sound equipment. It was the arrival of a film crew from the production company Optomen and they were getting ready to shoot some brewery sequences for the Norfolk episode of a new television series "Bill Granger's Weekends", which is planned to be broadcast in November by UKTV on satellite.

Bill Granger arrived close behind and planned the morning's filming with the crew. Mugs of coffee supplied by Marie were, of course, essential to this process. The plan was to film the process of brewing Nelson's Blood Bitter from start to finish.

Landlord and Brewer Mark Bristow gave Bill and the crew a quick tour of the brewery so that they could work out the best angles for the shots and plan the sequences and then filming commenced.

Shots were taken of Bill arriving at the brewery, being greeted by Mark at the entrance and then being shown inside. Mark gave a very brief history of the Fox brewery, from the brewing of the first pints of Heacham Gold some eight years ago (a light, modest strength beer with a simple recipe), through to the wide range brewed today, including Nelson's Blood - "A tricky brew with loads of ingredients" said Mark.

The first stage of the process was the addition of sacks of several different malts to the mash tun (brewing vessel). Bill did this under instruction from Mark while they discussed the brewing process. This was then stirred well with hot water and allowed to soak, after which the mixture was "sparged" - hot water was sprayed on to the porridge-like mix to assist in leeching out all the sugars and flavours from the malt. To see four men - Bill, Mark, the cameraman and the sound man - all crowded round the mash tun in such a small space on the top floor of the brewhouse was, to say the least, amusing for the onlookers below who were not having to suffer the heat and steam and the dust from the malt.

While sparging was in progress, the cameraman went outside to give the now very dusty camera a good clean before the next stage got underway. This was the careful weighing out of the four different types of hops used in this brew "I told you it was a complex recipe" said Mark. Bill saw this as a strong parallel to the way ingredients are used in cooking.

After an hour or so the contents of the mash tun was ready to be drained into the kettle on the ground floor where Bill then gradually added the hops - in a specific order and with a pause between each addition to allow the flavours to be absorbed in the right order.

At a later stage various herbs and spices are added. The very last ingredient is 150ml of Nelson's Blood old navy rum per 9 gallons, after the brew has been allowed to ferment for a week.

The final task for Bill and the film crew was to load several cases of Nelson's Blood Bitter ("here are some we prepared earlier") and set off to the Lord Nelson at Burnham Thorpe.

Earlier in the week they had filmed the Red Poll cattle at Sandringham, the landing of fish at Wells-next-the-Sea and had visited other food related locations.

Note: Bill Granger, who is a self-taught master of the culinary arts, hails from Australia. He has made many programmes about food which have been screened in many countries. He also has several books on cookery to his credit. His focus is on good quality ingredients prepared simply to get the very best of flavour from the food.



Knit This Teddy Bear Hand Puppet To Go In Your Shoebox



You will need:

Double knitting yarn, No 8's or 4mm needles

Knit in garter stitch throughout.

Cast on 18 stitches and knit 4 inches.

Next Row: cast on 10 stitches & knit to the end (28 sts)

Next Row: cast on 10 stitches & knit to the end (38 sts)

Continue knitting for 1 inch.

Next Row: cast off (loosely) 10 stitches & knit (28 sts) to end of row. Next Row: cast off (loosely) 10 stitches & knit (18 sts) to end of row. Continue knitting 18 sts for $2\frac{1}{2}$ ins.

Cast off loosely leaving about 18 ins of yarn for sewing up.

Knit 2 pieces the same and sew together leaving the bottom open. Turn right side out.

Face: Stitch 2 ears by 'pinching in' the 2 top corners. Sew 2 shirt buttons for eyes or rounds of black feet. With contrasting yarn stitch a nose and 'smile'. Thread a ribbon through the neck and tie a bow.

Thank yo so much for knitting a toy and a 'friend' for a child who may be lonely. Perhaps you could knit 2 to make a pair so that they double up as mitts.

HEACHAM THEN AND NOW

The postcard on the right was kindly loaned to us by John Davis. It shows Heacham High Street looking south in 1905. The shop on the right is Evans Newsagents. It was the source of the postcard which has the caption "Published by A.C. Evans" on it. If you look closely you will see a man standing outside the newsagent's - is it Mr Evans himself? The shop in the distance behind it is Moulam - Grocer. Notice that there is an absence of pavements and wires on poles.





Later, the grocer's became International Stores, and today is Suttons Estate Agents (see photo on the left, taken in September 2010). You will also see that A.C. Evans is now Special Petals, and that the shops on the extreme right have appeared since 1905.

Rod's Fish shop and A.E. Wallis have also appeared in the middle distance on the left replacing a row of cottages. They are set back from the road giving a wider pavement.

On the extreme left is the Staypressed shop - another "newcomer" since 1905.

POLISH FORCES IN HEACHAM 1940-1943

Following on from last month's article about the wartime armoured train in Norfolk, manned by Polish troops, we have received these two photographs from a Newsletter reader. They show Polish soldiers at the High House in Heacham.

We know nothing more about these photographs except that both had "Polish soldiers High House 1941" written on the back.

Mr Cedric Bales of Hunstanton was able to add a little more to the story of the Polish troops:

"I refer to last month's Newsletter, as there were memories of the Polish Officers in Heacham At the tender age of 14 I worked for Thomas Peatling & Son. My own first memories of the Polish Officers were in 1943/4. I was sent on my trade bike one Monday afternoon with a box of 12 bottles of drinks to the 'High House'. I was told to go through to the kitchen where I met Joseph who was frying spring onions. I had never seen spring onions fried before!

"Joseph was one of the chefs for the Polish Officers. During this time the Officers started to learn to drive Bren gun carriers and a few garden walls were knocked down! Later on, I was with my father in the harvest field at Heacham Bottom farm. This field was the one next to the Search Light Field opposite Teapot Corner, where there was a cafe. The men had been 'shockun' (setting up the 'shoofs' (Norfolk slang for sheaves)) for carting. An officer arrived with the Bren gun carriers and could not steer round the 'shoofs' and so knocked some down. Needless to say, they were very impolitely told to quickly go!!

"I cannot remember the Officers being in the Public Hall as I thought they were in 'High House'. I can remember the armoured train being in Heacham and believe it left at the end of the war in 1945. I can remember British Troops being in the Public Hall as we used to watch the parade to the church every Sunday morning. They were the 'King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry'."

Thank you very much, Mr Bales. That ties in nicely with the photographs, one of which shows the vehicle you mentioned in your letter.

Autumn in the Garden -Spiders

Here we are - its Autumn again, the "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness". Hallowe'en is at the end of the month so what better time to take a look at one of our largest and most common British spiders.

The Garden Spider (Araneus diadematus) dialy spins its web in our gardens and hedgerows. At this time of year a heavy dew or a misty dawn rewards us with the sight of the webs glistening with tiny beads of water in the morning sun. A new day, a new web. Apparently the Garden Spider spins a new web each morning, having reabsorbed the previous day's web, including any tiny insect which may have been trapped, at sunset.

If you look carefully at the back of a Garden Spider you will see a cross-shape of light coloured marks on its back. This is the source of the alternative names of 'Diadem Spider' and 'Cross Spider'. Hence the second part of its Latin name 'diadematus'.



Adult females can have a body length of as much as 15mm (3/5 of an inch in old money), and the males grow up to 9mm. Male and female look very similar apart from size. Colour can vary from a light brown to almost black. Have a look round your garden or the hedgerows. You should very soon spot many of these minibeasts sitting in the middle of their large round webs waiting for a snack to land. They will be around until November when they will die in the first frosts.

If you miss them this year you will have to wait until May or June next year before they start to appear again in appreciable numbers. They can also be found in mainland Europe, much of Asia and parts of Japan and North America.

Are You Lacking Motivation?

I see people for a variety of different issues but the subject of motivation always comes up. Virtually every issue I work with will require the individuals to make some changes or take action of some kind. Inevitably this requires motivation. This level of motivation can determine how successful the person will be.


One important function of our subconscious mind is to protect us. It sounds weird to talk about our mind as having two personalities but it's not a bad analogy. One example could be through fear of failure. Our conscious mind is saying "I want to lose weight." "I want to be slim and healthier and feel better about myself." The more powerful subconscious however could be arguing; "Remember how bad you felt last time you tried and failed, you actually gained weight in the end, remember how hard it was and how everyone at the gym laughed at you..." Our subconscious is trying to protect us from this "threat" by driving the "putting things off" behaviour. On face value it seems that we are just lazy or will get round to it someday. There can be more to it than that. If you find yourselves putting things off or not getting round to something you need to do then consider the possibility that your subconscious could be trying to protect you from something. Maybe you fear failure? Maybe you fear success? Maybe you just perceive the task as too hard?

Sometimes I see clients who lack motivation because deep down they really don't want to do whatever it is they are putting off. Maybe someone is nagging them to do it (common in smoking or weight loss) and their natural reaction is to resent being told what to do and to resist. Maybe it's the expectations of others that are a problem. Consider the son of a builder. His father wants him to take over the family business and he loves his father so doesn't want to disappoint him but also he really wants to be an artist. He is at construction college but is failing his exams and lacks motivation to study. The builder's son may simply have to make some difficult decisions in following the path that is right for him. The smoker who is resisting all of the nagging is in a different situation. Smoking is going to make them ill and is ultimately likely to kill them. They NEED to find motivation. They would need to look at all of the negative aspects of smoking on one hand and look at what they will gain as a result of quitting smoking on the other. This should help them to see quitting as something that is best for them, not just what the doctor ordered!

THE POTTING SHED

GARDENING ORGANICALLY

Gardening is a very calming, non-threatening type of activity. Plants don't discriminate and they don't care if a person is twenty-five or eighty-five, in a wheelchair or standing.

My Jill is an example of the above. As many of you know, Jill can no longer get about on her own but she loves to be in the garden. So I cart her out there, plonk her down on an old sleeping mat from our camping days, together with her bucket of tools and a couple of waste buckets and she is happy as Larry. I find it amazing how much ground she covers in a couple of hours. The only problem is getting her to stop for lunch or tea. "Just another ten minutes" she says and half an hour later she is still at it. An amazing woman. Of course the chickens are in close attendance, almost climbing over her hands to get at the worms and beasties she uncovers. And chatter! they cluck and murmur continually, demanding she uncovers more goodies for them. Good fun.

So the year has turned once more. I suppose it must be something to do with ageing but the weeks and months seem to pass much quicker than they used to. And, despite the panic, things have not gone too badly, at least crop-wise. As I've already said, the carrots have done very well in their penthouse. We shall know later how effective it's been when I crop them. As usual I have no walnuts or cobnuts, thanks to the squirrel which, so far, I have been unable to target. It's now started on the damsons so I must get picking soon.

As I was a bit half-heartedly dragging a rake through my deep beds this morning ready to cover with horse muck for the winter, I realised that one side was missing. Actually it had disintegrated. Well I knew it was in rough shape but being a fairly idle sort of chap, I pretended it was OK. Now I need to replace it. Ideally I would like some old(ish) scaffold planks but I still have a number of useful ten foot timbers salvaged from

when next door was built. So having given it some serious thought, I had lunch and a snooze then decided tomorrow will be plenty early enough and this article is getting important - as usual I have 2 1/2 days to get it done. The rake I mentioned at the beginning of this paragraph is a bit of kit I brought back from France with long curving tines. I believe it's called a "Chrome" and its super for churning up the soil. I also brought a sort of mattock on a long handle which is very good for furrowing and general digging without doing one's back.

I have had the most amazing crop of fungi this year, not only giant puffballs - delicious - but also about twenty field mushrooms. The first of these was discussed at length with Brian, my neighbour who knows about these things before I ate it but since then I've been scoffing them merrily and feel quite well. I had mushrooms on toast last evening and am planning an "omelette aux champignons" for supper this evening. I suppose it's the large quantities of leaf-mould and horse muck I have put on the land over the last 40 years but mushrooms are springing up in all sorts of odd places.

Jill and I had a wander round the Walsingham farmers market on the Norfolk lavender site this weekend. I have to say, I was quite impressed with both the range and quality of food on offer. As usual because we had my son, his wife and our only grandson with us, I bought some cheese - too much cheese - and we also bought a delicious venison pie. I've had these things in the past and they have been nothing to shout about but this one was super if a bit pricey. I shall return.

I saw in the Soil association magazine that drinking milk with high levels of conjugated linoleic acids, protects against heart attack. Organic milk has much increased amounts of CLA's compared with the bog standard stuff.

Apparently since many schools improved their nutritional standards and started using organic and wholefoods, the levels of misbehaviour have decreased and children are more attentive. I only hope that with the current attitude to spending and the tough decisions councils are having to take, that the school dinner menu's will not suffer. It's up to parents to see that they don't.

BOTANY FOR BEGINNERS CHAPTER 9

For the next couple of articles, I hope to discuss how plants adapt to their environment.

To the best of our knowledge, life started in the primordial seas. which would have been much less salty than they are today. For instance the concentration of salt (Sodium Chloride) in our bodies (and in most plants and animals including sea fish) is approximately 0.9g/100ml whereas the sea has on average

3.5g/100ml. A possible explanation for this is that we evolved from the primordial seas and thus still have that concentration of salt in our bodies.

The very earliest "plants" to evolve were blue green algae and it is postulated that it was the oxygen produced by these simple creatures that enabled the evolution of all subsequent living things. All of this happened some 3 billion years ago and from the algae evolved seaweeds, mosses, fungi etc. Vascular plants such as horsetails evolved from green algae about 400 million years ago. Ferns and gymnosperms (coniferous) followed and finally angiosperms (flowering plants) evolved. Now some 1/4 million species of flowering plants occupy just about every ecological niche on the planet except in the harshest climates.

Animals can move about the surface of the earth seeking the most favourable places to live and breed. Plants however are fixed in their habitat and have evolved various strategies to enable them to cope with changing situations. Charles Darwin in his seminal work "On the origin of species" postulated that in any given population, whether of animals or plants, those that could cope with changing conditions would become the progenitors of future generations (the survival of the fittest).

Natural selection has led to ways by which plants can survive almost any threat to their existence. Cold winters, periods of drought, attacks by predators whether animals that may eat them or insects that may bore into and weaken or kill them, competition for living space and nutrients have all made plants evolve strategies to cope. Cacti for example have fleshy bodies which can store water and nutrients and have evolved spiny leaves for protection against predators. Plants have even evolved that can capture and digest insects and even small mammals to survive in areas such as peat bogs which are very nutrient poor.

Other plants have evolved natural pesticides in the form of toxic substances which can deter or even kill predators unwise enough to eat them. Ragwort is a good example in this country and even when accidentally dried in hay making, can kill cattle and horses.

Although unable to move, plants can move to new locations through the dissemination of spores and seeds. Seeds can be moved long distances in the gut of animals and birds and when excreted in a different location usually have a small deposit of fertiliser to help them make a good start. Seeds can also be carried great distances by the wind (e.g. dandelions) or water.

Sexual reproduction between plants will often result in offspring with enhanced abilities to resist, say drought or cold. Occasionally two dissimilar parents will inadvertently produce a new hybrid offspring able to combat adverse conditions better than either parent.

Mutation, a changing of the DNA of a plants genes caused by exposure to ultraviolet light will often be fatal to the plant but occasionally a new mutated plant will be produced with enhanced survival skills.

Evolution in undirected and is caused by random chromosomal events whether by hybridisation or mutation. These events have produced the astonishing variety of plants that we see all around

Next month I will attempt to explain how plants specifically adapt to changes in their environment and how the gardener drives some of these changes via breeding and manipulation of environmental factors. It's all heavy stuff isn't it!

Parish Council Meetings for September in Brief

Heacham in Bloom: The Chairman congratulated everyone who contributed the success of the Heacham In Bloom 2010.

Saltings: The Council thanked CITB for carrying out work to create a new dyke through the reed bed at the Saltings.

Flood Sirens: The Emergency Planning Officer had informed the Council that it had been finally decided that the Flood Sirens would no longer be used as part of the flood warning system. A campaign to encourage households in vulnerable areas to sign on for the Precautionary Evacuation Notices would be launched.

Tescos: The Planning Authority confirmed that it had issued a planning enforcement notice regarding deliveries to the Tesco Express. Delivery Lorries were limited to a certain size and agreed delivery procedure. The notice had been served as the procedures had not been adhered to by some of Tescos' suppliers, causing the junction to become dangerous.

Vacancy: The Council noted that it was unlikely that a by-election would be called, therefore the vacancy would be filled by cooption at the next meeting. The Clerk informed Council that 2 residents had already expressed an interest in the vacancy.

No Cold Callings Zones: The Council listened to a presentation about the implementation of no cold calling zones.

Elections: The Chairman and Clerk would attend a briefing run by the Norfolk Association of Local Councils about the Elections in preparation for Local Government Elections next year.

Drainage Meeting: The Chairman reported that the meeting had been very useful and he was pleased that work would begin in Staithe Road. The regular flooding of Station Road had also been discussed. The Chairman stated that this was under investigation and the County did intend to resolve the matter, however the resolution of the problem was more complicated.

Cycle Race: The Chairman reported that the race had proved very popular and as well as around 250 school children, hundreds of residents had turned out to watch the race on the A149. The Chairman said that the provision of security barriers had been a good decision and as well as thanking staff, he thanked a resident for stopping to help set up on the Thursday morning.

Rail Link: The County Councillor asked members for their view as he was keen to see what could be done to encourage the reinstatement of the rail link between Hunstanton and King's Lynn. Various members said that they would welcome the debate and supported the idea.

Next Meeting: The next full Council meeting would take place on Tuesday 19 October at 7.30pm at the Parish Council Office.

Drainage Scheme - Staithe Road

Work to upgrade the drainage system in Staithe Road by County Highways will begin on 4 October 2010. This will be an extensive project lasting over 4 months. The work comprises of 5 phases and each phase will result in either temporary traffic lights or road closure. Please take note of the following and plan your journey accordingly.

Phase 1(Cheney Hill) - Works starts on the 4 October 2010 to 22 October 2010,2 way temporary traffic signals will be in operation.

Phase 2 (Cheney Hill), Phase 3 (Staithe Road from Rebecca Court to Collins Lane Junction) and Phase 4 (Staithe Road, junction with Collins Lane) will require the road to be closed and work is scheduled to start on 25 October 2010 to 23 December 2010, with a break in works to start again on the 3 January 2011 to 7 January 2011.

Phase 5 (Staithe Road: Cauis Close layby to Brays Pit) will require 3 way temporary traffic signals and start on the 10 January 2011 to 14 January 2011.
