

Church Wall

In response to John Taylor's letter in the last issue we would like to thank him for such a generous offer in respect of repairs to the church wall, with which we will start a wall fund. We are aware of the issues regarding the wall especially the fact that it is not the best view if photographing the church or surrounding views.

Maintaining our village church, churchyard and its walls is very costly and St Mary's Church does not have the financial reserves that it can call on to deal with all of the repairs that are needed, including the wall, so it is a matter of dealing with repairs in order of priorities.

We are planning to start work soon on clearing the heap of rubble and temporarily cap the existing wall until we have money to do the full repair. To give you some idea of the costs of replacing just this one section of the wall - it is of the order of £12,000 and we have also to consult a number of agencies regarding design and final appearance of the wall which can take some time.

If anybody else would like to contribute towards funding the repairs for the wall, or help with the clearing of the rubble, or would be willing to help with raising funds for the wall please contact either of the church wardens, or the vicar

"A RARE DUCK. - The duck shot recently on the Heacham bank by Mr. B.G. Massingham and which, apparently, belonged to a species unknown to local sportsmen and naturalists, has been forwarded to the British Museum (Natural History Section) for inspection. The authorities there state that the bird is an Australasian wild duck (Anas Supercilious) which is common to the Great and Lesser Sunda Islands, New Guinea, Polynesia, Pelew Islands, Australia and New Zealand." (Lynn Advertiser, 27th February 1914).

Is that where our village began its attempts to exterminate ducks?



CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM

It is with great delight that my family and I join you here in Heacham to work alongside Rev'd Veronica Wilson as your Curate.

We come to Norfolk, as outsiders and with very little knowledge of this part of the country which, in itself, is quite amazing since we have lived in most areas from Cornwall to Scotland over the years. I had been informed by a colleague of mine, who I trained with at Theological College in Bristol, that Norfolk is a hidden gem! As he was born and bred in Norfolk, I took little notice of his insight – that was until we arrived! What a very beautiful part of God's land this is! I have spent many years working in zoology and conservation in various places of beauty across the world. Yet, being here, I feel completely spoilt to be surrounded by a mixture of coastal and rural scenery in which God has called me to minister. However, the more pressing feeling I have is that God has called me here, not only to be a part of the ministry team within the church, but also within the care of His creation in this area. The Rev'd Dr. Rob Frost, states that: our stewardship of the planet will one day be judged. That means a change of perspective – a new look at how we live and a new commitment to working with the Lord in renewing the planet. Psalm 24:1 declares that 'The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world and all who live in it'.

Many of you will have experienced far more than I of the wonders of this corner of England; of times where you have seen wading birds flock upon the beaches, or sighted seals bobbing in the seas. Or perhaps, deer and other wildlife as you have travelled from place to place. Even early morning dog walks and jaunts to the shops can surprise us with something of the beauty from within creation, such as wildflowers, butterflies and birdsong. I don't know about you, but I for one, can at times forget the beauty of such things and take for granted my surroundings. Life can be difficult and at times can drag us down. Yet, it is often in such times that I am awoken again to the splendour of our marvellous world and of the God who made it and who loves us. If what the Psalmist says is true, then we can take comfort in the fact that God is with us always – even when all seems lost! So as we ponder our surroundings in our daily living, may we too take our responsibility to be good stewards seriously, so that future children and grandchildren will also be uplifted during their own hard times, by the beauty of their surroundings and in the knowledge that the God who loves and who created it all, is working with them, and will never leave them!

'Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? (Matthew 6:26).

REGULAR ACTIVITIES AT ST. MARY'S CHURCH

Looking at the above information you might think that St. Mary's is only open on Sundays, but it is a busy church with things going on throughout each week. The Sunday services act as a focal point when all meet together for worship, for fellowship, for support, learning, encouragement, challenge and growing. And on Sundays there are, of course, activities for children. Also for children, usually on the last Saturday of each month, there is MESSY CHURCH with crafts, games, singing, Bible stories and lunch.

The Kitchen Gardener



August - late summer. Time for dinner? Preserving some of the season's bounty? Questions to which the answer is no....maybe.

When is lunch? and when is dinner? are the sort of questions that I observe meandering through my mind as I weed the plot. Good old Collins concise gave me some help. Lunch is a meal eaten during the middle of the day. Dinner is a meal taken in the evening/ at midday/ a formal meal or banquet.

The word dinner derives from old French and Latin broadly meaning not + to fast. Lunch is a short form of luncheon which comes from a variation of the middle English nuncheon noon + drink a word used for a snack taken at any time. Incidentally, nuncheon is still in use in the Scrabble dictionary.

These days lunch always means lunch but dinner is a bit of a moveable feast, so to speak. When I was at school we had lunch supervised by dinner ladies.

During the Georgian period (1740–1830) the times that people ate their meals began to shift. Upper and middle classes would breakfast at 9am–10am. It was a large meal with hot and cold dishes laid out, some over small heaters, and members of the household would eat after an element of their work of the day was done.

Dinner among the wealthy was served around 3pm in the early decades and at 6pm–7pm towards the 1800s. In the Middle Ages meal times and work patterns were governed by available light and when it was dark you went to bed.

By Georgian times, if you could afford artificial light in the form of lots of candles, you could eat later. Poor people continued to eat dinner at midday after an early work start and supper would be eaten just before bed. People eating dinner in the evenings had a gap to fill so luncheon – defined as 'as much food as one's hand can hold' became more common.

There were rules aplenty for diners among the rich and powerful. No spitting, scratching or picking of teeth, and it was deemed vulgar to smell the meat on your plate or fork because you would be implying you think the meat might be tainted.

I have a fail safe way of knowing when it is lunchtime. The telephone rings and yet another pesky caller tries to sell me PPI or insulation. Should these interruptions cause me to end up with an unused bread roll, Bread Jelly is a very old recipe for a bit of kitchen recycle. It is made by removing the crusts, thinly slicing then toasting the bread. The toast is crumbed then added to a quart of water flavoured with cinnamon or lemon rind and boiled gently until it becomes almost clear and will set on a cold plate. It is served with cream. The jelly can be reheated with milk or wine to make a drink.

Waste not want not and in the garden it is a season of plenty and plenty to do. The sowing, planting, hoeing and growing are just the start. There's an equal amount of work involved in harvesting and using up the produce including some preservation for the winter store cupboard.

The courgettes march energetically onwards and I have standing orders from several friends and family for jars of pickled courgettes. Cut 1lb courgettes in half lengthways and then, if they are a bit fat, into quarters. Slice two onions into thin rings. Put 10fl oz of vinegar of your choice into a saucepan with 1 teaspoon of turmeric and 1 of salt and 2 of mustard seeds (fennel seeds are a nice alternative) together with 2 or 3 cloves if you like them and 2oz sugar.

Bring to the boil making sure the sugar is dissolved, then add the courgettes and onions and bring back to simmering point. Pack the vegetables into hot sterilised jars, cover with the vinegar and seal. The turmeric tends to sink to the bottom of the jar over time. Once enough pickles have been eaten I often swirl a spoon in the jar then collect some of the vinegar to put onto very ripe tomatoes together with some of the pickled courgettes which I dice. These pickles are also lovely served with a potato salad

The mangetout peas can be a bit over exuberant at this time of the year and, although I never tire of them hot or cold, I have a handy recipe for using them with some of their garden companions. A bunch of roughly 8 spring onions are sliced and softened in a pan with butter or oil. 1 lb of topped and tailed mangetouts are added with ½ pint of chicken stock and salt to taste. The pan is brought to the boil then the heat is lowered and the veg simmered until tender.

1 tablespoon of cornflour is blended with two of water and stirred into the pan which is brought back to the boil while stirring constantly. Lower the heat and simmer for 2 minutes





then add 1 well washed firm lettuce cut into 8 wedges and 3 or 4 tablespoons cream or milk. Heat through gently for a minute or two before serving. This is a dish that can be frozen. Thaw at room temperature then transfer to a pan and reheat gently. Check seasoning before serving.

This month I'll be sowing the last of the outdoor lettuce, the spring cabbages and the first of the overwinter salading to eventually be transplanted into the polytunnel. I will remove all the straw from around the strawberries and cut back to healthy young leaves removing the runners as I don't need new plants this year. The soil is gently loosened between the rows, lightly fed with Growmore and given a good drink.

Is this the best tasting strawberry ever? The seed merchant referred to the Marshmello strawberry which I planted last year in the new bed along with Cambridge Favourite. I remember reading an amusing column by a rival newspaper which listed the other tabloid's headlines which were often posed as questions. The essential point boiled down to 'Joe Blogg's headlines to which the answer is no'.

And no is my answer on the strawberry front. I conducted a proper tasting between Marshmello and Cambridge Favourite and the old variety won by a country mile. I really want my strawberries to be perfumed and while Marshmello had no scent at all Cambridge was strongly scented and there was an equal difference in strength and depth of flavour. And yet some days later and crop over, I discovered an overlooked Marshmello. A bit withered and dried out it certainly tasted better than the main crop. I'd go so far as to say it was the best tasting of the new types I've tried. Still not a patch on the old varieties though.





Heacham at Night

August, the month of the Perseids, likely the best meteor shower you might see. This shower is long lived, starting in the middle of July and finishing around the end of August. The peak is on the night of August 13th / 14th and the Moon will be a waxing sliver. So hope for a clear night and get the deck chairs out. If you can travel to somewhere with less light pollution (over the A149 and anywhere at the back of the North Norfolk coast) do so – you might see 80+ meteors /hour.

The Perseids are debris from Comet Swift-Tuttle, the Great Comet of 1862. Mr Swift and Mr Tuttle 'discovered' the comet in that year though it has been winging close to the earth every 133 years and Chinese records show it was observed at least 2000 years ago. It will be particularly close in 2126AD and very close in 4479AD. After that, things are not very clear as the comet gets perturbed, shifted a little, every orbit. It is the comet most likely (though the odds are very low) to smack into the Earth sometime after the next 5000 years.

Anyway, did you observe any of the phenomena I identified in the last issue? The two pictures below show the conjunction of



the Moon and Saturn on the 28th June. The first picture had an exposure of 2 seconds, ISO 800. This relatively long exposure shows Saturn as a bright dot. The thin cloud helped to mask the over exposed Moon.



The second picture had an exposure time of just one quarter of a second and, though Saturn is a dim dot, the phase of the Moon, waxing gibbous, is clear.

Saturn is the only planet easily visible in the evening sky this month. Look SW between twilight and about 11pm. It is distinct from a star and looks a little vellow.

A conjunction is when two or more objects in space appear to be close together when observed. In reality the Moon is about a quarter of a million miles away whilst Saturn, in the last picture is about 852 million miles distant. That is why Saturn, with an actual diameter 33X that of the Moon, looks so small.

The Moon and all planets are only seen because they reflect light which falls on them from the Sun. The Moon and inner planets, Mercury and Venus, show a full range of phases (crescent, quarter, half, gibbous, full) depending upon where they are in their orbits when observed. If the phase of an object is waxing then it is getting bigger over time, if waning, smaller.

On the 30th June I suggested you looked for the close conjunction of Venus and Jupiter and advised either of the Heacham Beaches as a good viewpoint. Well I was there about 10pm but the only people I met were some walkers and collectors of small crabs for sea fishing bait. They crawled around the foreshore with head torches on and looked more bizarre than me.



This picture had an exposure of 1/125 second at an ISO of 1600. Venus is the lower, brighter object. It can be seen, it is not full but gibbous, like the Moon in the earlier picture. Jupiter has 12 X the diameter of Venus but, in this picture, is 600 million miles away whilst Venus is around 40 million. Venus looks bigger because it is closer to us but also because its white acid clouds reflect the Sun's light very well and make it bright

enough to cause moisture in the Earth's atmosphere to glow and fuzz the image (like a torch in fog). This is the same effect as in the earlier Moon photos.

Now for Pluto; as I write this, New Horizons is on the way into the Kuiper Belt having survived its close and lonely encounter with the planet and its largest moon, Charon. This mission has been faultless and is a tremendous technological and scientific achievement. Information released so far reveals Pluto is a bit bigger than expected and is now the largest known Kuiper Belt object. It has a nitrogen atmosphere and (possible) nitrogen snow on its surface. There are no obvious impact craters and high ice mountains. Charon has a deep chasm across it. National news is actually following this story closely but it remains to be seen if it will do so for 18 months – the time it will take to download all the pictures and data.

Pluto was discovered in 1930 by Clyde Tombaugh at Flagstaff observatory, Arizona. Some of his ashes were placed in this container on the side of New Horizons.




Complementary studies of Pluto still continue on Earth. On the 29th June, a modified Boeing airliner carrying a 2.5 metre telescope, flew out over the Southern Ocean to catch the 90 seconds when far distant Pluto eclipsed a star – the light from the star dimmed a little as it went through Pluto's

atmosphere; analysis determined the properties of layers within it. All this happened high in the sky in an aeroplane travelling at hundreds of miles an hour chasing the precise point where the observation could be made.



This picture shows what being out in the dark and occasionally looking down might reveal. However, if you look up on a clear dark night this month you might make out the Milky Way running from NE to SW. You will be looking into our galaxy and seeing a glimpse of the wash of light which emanates from the millions of stars that it consists of. Above your head will be the bright star Vega. Below it, to the right is Altair and to the left Deneb. Join the three up and you have the Summer Triangle, Patrick Moore's asterism (pattern).



Join Vega to Deneb and carry the line far down. If you see a misty patch (binoculars will help) then it will be The Great Galaxy in Andromeda, a collection of stars bigger than our Milky Way and just one of the millions and millions of galaxies which exist. New Horizons has gone a long way but it is nothing to the distance it will travel over the millennia which follow.

Dark skies are coming!

THE SONG REMAINS THE SAME Monthly musings on music by Frank Edmonds

A-wop-bop-a-loo-bop-a-lop-bam-boom!


Rock, rock! This month we're travelling back to one year – 1957 – for three singles which reshaped the face of popular music ...

• TUTTI FRUTTI Little Richard (London, HLO 8366, 1957, No 29)

"I got a girl named Daisy / She almost drives me crazy / She knows how to love me, yes indeed / Boy you don't know what she do to me"

Hands up who would have thought a song with a title in Italian, and the fairly uninspiring meaning of "all fruits," would have become one of the all-time classics of rock and roll.

Oh, you would, would you? All right, smarty-pants — so what does the most famously meaningless lyric of all time — "A-wopbom-a-loo-mop-a-lomp-bom-bom!" mean, then? What do you mean, nothing?! Actually, no — it was singer/songwriter Little Richard's vocalisation of a drum pattern!



Now, here's a strange thing. Did you just read that lyric, and think: "Hang on, I always thought it was: 'A-wop-BOP-a-loo-BOP-a-LOP-BAM-BOOM'"??" Well, you'd be right ... and wrong, too!

If you listen carefully to the Little Richard original, you'll find he DOES sing "loo-mop" (don't ask!) and "a-lomp-bom-bom" – the "bom-bom" and not "bam-boom" is particularly noticeable.

Yet it's the "bam-boom" version that's passed into popular consciousness. Rock writer Nik Cohn even wrote a book about the history of rock and roll, and famously called it Awopbopaloobop Alopbamboom.

I blame Elvis. Seriously. The year after Tutti Frutti was a big US hit, Presley covered the song on his first album – and HE



sang it "A-wop-bop-a-loo-bop-a-lop-bam-boom" (perhaps The King didn't like the idea of a loo-mop, either!). And somehow that's the version that stuck in people's minds — even though Little Richard is the singer unquestionably associated with the song.

In 2012, Rolling Stone magazine declared that famous line "the most inspired rock lyric ever recorded." And in 2007, a Mojo magazine panel of recording artists voted it No 1 in their Top 100 Records That Changed The World. Bam boom!

Tutti Frutti was another case (like Rock Around The Clock, for example) of an originally far ruder song which was cleaned up for the delicate ears of Fifties audiences. Richard's original version went: "Tutti Frutti, good booty" ... before going on in a style quite unsuitable for a family village newsletter!

Producer Robert "Bumps" Blackwell got local songwriter Dorothy LaBostrie to rewrite the lyrics to a vaguer: "Tutti Frutti, aw rooty," etc. She must have done a good job. Dorothy was still receiving royalty cheques to the tune of \$5,000 every three to six months, well into the 1980s.

• GREAT BALLS OF FIRE Jerry Lee Lewis (London, HLS 8529, 1957, No 1)

"You shake my nerves and you rattle my brain / Too much love drives a man insane / You broke my will, oh what a thrill / Goodness gracious, great balls of fire"

And then there was The Killer. Jerry Lee Lewis had already taken the world of rock and roll by storm in 1957 with Whole Lot Of Shakin' Going On. And then he goes and tops that classic with this absolute monster.

Described by the Guinness Book Of Number One Hits as "one of the wildest rock records ever to top the British charts," Great Balls Of Fire epitomised Jerry Lee's astonishing performance

style, which wasn't so much to play the piano as to batter it relentlessly in an all-out attack, pounding the keys with his fingers, hands, elbows and even feet.




For a Fifties audience used to gently-crooned ballads and lushly-orchestrated pretty melodies, one can only imagine the effect this Louisiana wild man had on young impressionable minds.

Speaking of which, Lewis' career was to come crashing down around him the very next year, when news became public that the 22-year-old star's third wife was his first cousin once removed – who was only 13 when they wed. This caused such a scandal that his tour had to be cancelled after only three concerts.

Suddenly the great entertainer, who had commanded fees of \$10,000 a concert, was playing small clubs for \$250 a night. But Lewis soldiered on. In 1964 he recorded a concert album, Live At The Star Club, Hamburg, which is considered to be one of the greatest live rock and roll albums of all time. And his career would go on to encompass rockabilly, country, blues, rhythm and blues and gospel styles.

Great Balls Of Fire – penned with Otis Blackwell, who also co-wrote Don't Be Cruel and All Shook Up for Elvis – sold one million copies in its first ten days of release in the US, and is one of the best-selling singles of all time. It remains a testament to its performer, of a life lived on the edge ... of self-destruction.


• THAT'LL BE THE DAY The Crickets (Coral, Q 72279, 1957, No 1)

"Well, you give me all your lovin' and your turtle dovin' / All your hugs and kisses and your money too / Well, you know you love me baby / Until you tell me maybe / That some day, well, I'll be through"

What does John Wayne have in common with Buddy Holly? OK, here's a clue: what does John Wayne also have in common with Needles And Pins hitmakers, The Searchers? Ah ... wasn't The Searchers the title of one of The Duke's classic Westerns? Why, yes it was! That's where they got their name! And what was John Wayne's character's favourite phrase in that movie? "That'll be the day!"

A group of high school friends from Lubbock, Texas, also saw the film, and the catchphrase stuck in their minds. Singer and guitarist Charles "Buddy" Holley (he later dropped the E from his surname), and drummer Jerry Allison wrote a song around it, and recorded it for Decca – but it was a flop.

So they took it to producer Norman Petty's studio, in Clovis,



New Mexico, where it was rerecorded in quite a different style. The rest, as they say, is history ...

It was to get round the fact that Holly had signed a recording contract with Decca – as a soloist – that some of his songs, like this one (and Oh Boy, Maybe Baby, and Think It Over), were credited to The Crickets, while others (like Peggy Sue, Everyday, and Rave On) were attributed just to Buddy Holly.

It's difficult to think of another artist who wrote so many all-time classics in such a short space of time. Because just two years after That'll Be The Day became his first hit the world was robbed of this stellar talent, in a plane crash which also claimed the lives of Ritchie Valens and The Big Bopper. But Holly had been so prolific that Coral Records were able to release "new" recordings for the next ten years.

Holly's induction to the Rock And Roll Hall Of Fame in 1986 praised his "major and lasting impact on popular music," adding that he and The Crickets pioneered the now-standard format of two guitars, bass and drums, used by so many rock bands.

One such band were inspired by the insect name of The Crickets to change their own name from The Quarrymen to ... The Beatles. And during their first-ever recording session in 1958, The Quarrymen recorded a version of ... That'll Be The Day.



This popular event is run by local volunteers with stallholders contributing 10 per cent of their takings to local good causes.



Campaign to reduce pressure on A&E

this summer

Holidaymakers and tourists will be encouraged to 'Choose Me Not A&E' as part of a campaign to help people find the right NHS service for them this summer.

The Choose Me Not A&E campaign aims to provide people with vital information about which health care service is right for the symptoms they have.

Dozens of people every month attend A&E at King's Lynn's Queen Elizabeth Hospital (QEH) but are sent home requiring no treatment. Others who wait for hours could receive more appropriate treatment closer to home, at pharmacies, local GP surgeries, or via the 111 service.

The campaign is being led by West Norfolk Clinical Commissioning Group (WNCCG) and Wisbech Local Commissioning Group, in collaboration with the QEH. Dr Sue Crossman, Chief Officer of WNCCG, said: "During the summer months visitors flock to this area to enjoy the coastal resorts and beautiful countryside. To ensure that both locals and visitors can always access the NHS services they need, we want to encourage everyone to stop and think before going to A&E.

"A&E is there for life-threatening emergencies such as loss of consciousness, suspected heart attacks, breathing difficulties, or severe bleeding that cannot be stopped. If it is not a serious medical emergency, A&E is not the right choice."

Clive Walsh, Chief Operating Officer at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, said: "People attending A&E who could obtain care elsewhere, put undue pressure on both the department and the hospital as a whole. On many occasions it would have been better for the patient and the hospital if they sought treatment from a more appropriate service. We want our staff to concentrate on those staff who really need their specialist expertise."

Terry Hicks, West Norfolk senior locality manager for the East of England Ambulance Service (EEAST), said: "In Norfolk our 111 service can provide help and advice on a wide range of health conditions. Please only use 999 or A&E in an emergency - such if someone has collapsed and isn't breathing – as if you arrive at A&E by ambulance you will still have to wait unless your condition is urgent. Make use of the great support out there from 111, GPs and pharmacists; they will get you the help you need and save you time."

Choose Me Not A&E launched across West Norfolk and Wisbech on Monday, June 15 and will run until the end of August.


Local people, as well as holidaymakers and tourists will be given information about summer health issues and where to go for help in the area.

The message will be plain for all to see and hear, with advertising at train stations and bus stops, a billboard in West Street, Wisbech, and adverts on local radio station KL.FM. NHS staff will also be out and about in King's Lynn to help spread the message.

Choose Me Not A&E leaflets providing advice about summer health issues and where to go for help in the area will be readily available, and posters promoting the NHS 111 service and pharmacies will be displayed in GP surgeries, pharmacies and local groups and organisations.

Tourists staying at local holiday parks will be able to pick up a pamphlet containing summer health advice and details of local services and useful numbers.

Home Fire Safety Community Volunteer

Role Description:-

Purpose of Role:

Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service is wholly committed in its work to ensure that Norfolk is a safe place to live. Home Fire Safety Checks play a pivotal role in protecting people from the risk of fire in their homes. The aim of this role is to carry out home fire safety check visits and fit smoke alarms for older and vulnerable members of local community. Necessary equipment and reasonable travel expenses will be provided.

Key Activities:

- To visit households as requested by NFRS to carry out home fire safety visits with the occupier, including indentifying fire hazards and inspection/fitting smoke alarms.
- To liaise regularly with the nominated person to receive details of visits to be carried out.
- To collect necessary equipment from a specified fire station as requested.
- To complete the relevant paperwork and return to the Service in the agreed timeframe.
- To attend volunteer group information, training and review update sessions arranged at mutually convenient times
- To undertake the induction process for volunteering and any necessary training to enable you to carry out your role effectively.
- To follow the Service's procedures and standards at all times.

Experience and skills required for this role:

- Good interpersonal skills and confidence when talking to the public.
- Practical skills, including use of stepladders and small tools.
- Access to transport as the role will require travel within a defined area.
- Reliability and regular commitment to volunteering.
- Friendly and approachable manner.
- Ability to acquire and develop (with training) a good understanding of community safety issues.
- Good written skills and ability to complete the required paperwork to record the visit and actions taken.
- Experience of working or volunteering with diverse members of the community.

Benefits for the volunteer:

Volunteering with us is rewarding and provides the opportunity to:

- Become involved in delivering a valuable service to the community.
- Meet new people and undertake new challenges and experiences.
- Increase confidence and gain new knowledge and skills.
- Make real contribution to the safety of the communities in Norfolk.

Support and Training given:

All Volunteers receive an induction into the volunteer programme and then continuous relevant training to support their activities undertaken as a volunteer. NFRS staff will take regular observation of visits to help ensure volunteers feel able to carry out their role. Training updates will be given as necessary and as refreshers. volunteers undertake any necessary checks at the appropriate level for their duties.

Location:

Primarily within your local area although it is hoped that Volunteers would be willing to travel further if necessary.

Specific times and days are flexible and to be agreed with the Volunteer Co-ordinator. We ask you to commit to doing at least four hours a month for at least six months, so that we may create a long-lasting and meaningful role for you.

Age:

Volunteers have to be over the age of 18 for insurance purposes and are expected to conduct themselves to the same high standards of behaviour expected of all NFRS staff.



The Summer Budget 2015: Top 10 Highlights

George Osborne delivered his 2015 Summer Budget on 8 July 2015. The Chancellor was keen to stress that this was a Budget for working people – to increase employment, make work pay and reduce the welfare bill. Being at the start of a new parliament Mr Osborne had an opportunity to set out his stall for 5 years and did so by presenting a landmark Budget, one of the most complicated that I remember.

I set out below 10 of the key announcements that may impact upon your business and personal tax affairs:

1: Big changes to the taxation of dividends will be introduced from April 2016.

Company dividends currently carry a tax credit of 10% but from 6 April 2016 this tax credit is to be abolished and the first £5000 of dividend income will be tax free in the hands of the shareholder. (Note that the £5000 dividend allowance is separate to the £1000 allowance for "savings" income, which was announced previously and is also due to start in April 2016.) Above that, the rates of tax will be:

As a result, where someone receives significant amounts of dividends above the new £5000 allowance, their tax burden will increase in 2016/17, compared with the position this year.

Regulated for a range of investment business activities by The Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales This measure will clearly affect those owner managed businesses where dividends have been used as part of their remuneration planning. Although a rapid assessment of the 'old' dividend versus salary calculation tells us that dividends are still better than salary, and the difference is still worth having, consideration will now need to be given to the structure of owners' profit extraction strategies, especially before the changes come in April next year.

2: New rules will be phased in which will restrict tax relief for finance costs for higher rate taxpayers who use a mortgage or loan to finance Buy-to-let properties.

The restriction is to be phased in over 4 years, starting in April 2017 and relief will be restricted to Basic Rate (20%) only by April 2020, whereas currently individual landlords receive Income Tax relief at their highest rate of tax.

This rule will not apply where the property meets the HMRC criteria of a "Furnished Holiday Letting", nor does it appear to apply to corporate landlords, just individuals.

Additionally, in April 2016, landlords who let out furnished property will lose the 10% Wear & Tear Allowance, which will be replaced by a new system that will only allow them to get tax relief when they actually replace furnishings. (This seems like a backward step as the 10% allowance was originally introduced in order to reduce the administrative burden for landlords.)

Capital Allowances will continue to be available for landlords of qualifying "Furnished Holiday Lets".

Finally on the property front, one pleasing change is that **Renta-Room relief** for those who rent out a room in their own home will increase to £7500 in April next year, from the current limit of £4250. (Frozen at this level for the past 18 years!)

- 1.3: The Pensions Lifetime Allowance is to be reduced from £1.25m to £1m from 6 April 2016, rising only with inflation from 6 April 2018. The Annual Allowance remains at £40k but will be subject to a tapered reduction from April next year for taxpayers with 'adjusted income' (e.g. including salary sacrifice funded contributions) in excess of £150k, meaning the Annual Allowance is reduced to the minimum of £10k once earnings reach £210,000.
- 2.4: For most people, the largest asset still held at death is the family home. As house prices keep rising, more estates are predicted to come within the Inheritance Tax (IHT) net. The government had already made a manifesto pledge that it would introduce a new IHT relief (now described in the Budget documents as the "Main Residence NIL Rate Band") of up to £175k where parents leave the family home to children or grandchildren. The relief will be welcome but it is certainly not tax simplification! It will be phased in over 4 years from April



2017, although it will be tapered where an Estate is worth in excess of £2m. The existing NIL Rate Band was previously frozen at £325k until April 2018. It will now remain fixed at £325k until 2020/21.

The relief will also be available where a person has sold a main residence in order to downsize, or to realise a capital sum, for example to pay for care home fees. The "Main Residence NIL Rate Band" can be used against assets in the Estate of an equivalent value to the home which was sold. **The existing NIL Rate Band** was previously frozen at £325k until April 2018. It will now remain fixed at £325k until 2020/21.

- 3.5: To incentivise business, the Annual Investment Allowance, which gives immediate tax relief to business for qualifying capital expenditure, and which was previously increased temporarily to the current rate of £500k, will be set permanently at £200k with effect from January 2016 (it had been due to fall back to £25k). This will, at least, give some stability for the next 4 years and avoid the complexities that have been suffered in the past few years with constantly changing limits.
- 4.6: A surprise measure was the cut in the Corporation Tax Rate from 20% to 19% from April 2017, and again to 18% from 2020. This will be welcome news for profitable companies
- **5.7:** The National Insurance Contributions **Employment Allowance** for small firms will be increased by 50% to **£3000 from April 2016**. This allowance provides relief from Employers Class 1 NIC. New anti-avoidance rules will be introduced to prevent abuse by companies where a sole director is the only employee.
- 8: A new National Living Wage (NLW) is to be introduced for workers aged 25 and above. From April 2016 the new NLW will be set at £7.20 per hour, being a rise of 70 pence relative to the current National Minimum Wage (NMW) rate, and 50p above the NMW increase coming into effect in October this year. The wages of younger workers will continue to be underpinned by the NMW.
- **9:** One of the few main taxes to remain relatively unchanged was **Capital Gains Tax** (CGT). **No changes** have been made to the rates of CGT or the annual exemption. Entrepreneurs Relief remains at a rate of just 10% with a lifetime allowance of £10m.
- 10: A new Vehicle Excise Duty (VED) banding system will be introduced for cars registered on or after 1 April 2017. It is expected that 95% of car owners will pay the Flat Standard Rate of £140 p.a. The VED will be used to pay for a new road building and maintenance programme. Cars with a list price of

over £40k when new will pay a supplement of £310 p.a. on top of the Standard Rate, for 5 years.

N.B. The Budget proposals may be subject to amendment in the Finance Act and some matters will not be implemented until later. You should therefore keep your affairs under constant review and always take advice before taking any action as a result of the contents of the above summary.




