To Lidl or not to Lidl

At the time of writing many in the village seem excited about a Lidl store possibly opening on the Stainsby's site. Not any old Lidl but a big Lidl. By the time of reading this you may have attended Lidl's public consultation (a normal event for any significant development as developers have to tick a box). Assuming Lidl is still committed, then a planning application will soon be forthcoming and there will be an opportunity to comment to the planning department of KLWNBC. You could also make the Parish Council aware of your views. When considering your comments please think about these observations: Lidl will be intent on selling as much produce as they can so there will be a significant traffic flow into and out of their proposed car park (around 120 places), off the A149, for (say) 12 hours each day (possibly including Sunday given likely changes to Sunday trading laws); the 40 or so local jobs promised will likely be offset by a reduction in staffing in other local shops (they will have less custom), some small shops might close altogether; increase in traffic on the A149 has been a significant argument against large scale housing development in the area and the lack of a (very) close major food retailer has been another, the presence of Lidl will make it more likely that excessive house building will occur sooner rather than later; many of the less familiar brands sold in Lidl are not UK sourced, every item bought from Europe means less productive work in the UK.

You may feel that a modern store offering food at competitive prices offsets the observations above, just think about them and add your own

HEACHAM AND A BLUE PLAQUE

Many people in Heacham will remember a blue plaque that was on the Station Road wall of No 1 Wilton Road. It mysteriously went missing some years ago and no one has ever confessed to removing it.

It read:

Patrick Hadley 1899-1973 Composer and Professor of Music At Cambridge University Lived here Borough Council of King's Lynn, Norfolk.



Patrick Hadley was most frequently referred to (affectionately) as Paddy. He left school to join the army and was wounded in October 1918. His right leg was amputated below the knee and he became what I believe was one of three men with "peg legs" in Heacham.

He was elected as a Fellow of Caius College in 1938. Heacham has had many connections with Caius, both in Lodge Road and the land between Lodge Road and Station Road. Paddy was a greatly admired composer and musicians came to visit him at Shallcross.

Now enthusiasm is needed to get a replacement plaque. Hunstanton has a Civic Society which acts as a pressure group. We now have a Historical Society that could be encouraged to find ways of replacing the plaque.

The attached drawing was by Edmond Xavier Kapp 1890-1978. The photographer was Edward Leigh FIBPS of 19 King's Parade, Cambridge.



The picture of the house and garden shows them in the early 20th Century, with a window to the room which Paddy subsequently used as his study. The lady in a long dress was probably his mother, Edith Jane Hadley, who signed the postcard and posted it in 1920.



The Kitchen Gardener

September – early autumn. I'm sure I garden on the edge of a chalk pit. Raspberry woes. A spiffing cake helps to make space in the store cupboard for the new season preserves and

what came first - the flower or the colour?

The soil in my previous garden was a true clay and I'd have to wait three to four days after rain before it could be worked. In summer it would dry to a concrete like hardness and then develop fissures.

I remind myself of all this when feeling irked by my chalky, stony and very fast draining soil which has a colour akin to porridge.

Chalk soil is warmer than clay soil and easier to work. Generally it is the better of the two extremes for the fruit and vegetable grower and there's practically no possibility of having an acidic soil with the need for constant liming.

Limestone, which technically includes chalk, was laid down in tropical seas and lakes 100 million to 200 million years ago and is the residue of billions of algae which sank to the seabed. An electron micrograph of chalk shows minuscule sea anemones and snails. Limestone, the older of the two, is approx. 50% calcium carbonate while the later chalk is almost 98% calcium carbonate.

Chalk soils are found on the Salisbury Plain south-west to Dorset and north-east to Norfolk, Lincolnshire and Yorkshire. They are found on the North and South Downs and from Kent to northern France, Germany and beyond.



All limestone is porous and chalk the most porous of all. Water is sucked into chalk by capillary action and this allows trees and shrubs to survive in times of drought as it never completely dries out. I've done the Cresta Run on my behind down our chalky unmade road more than once on a frosty morning as the moisture in the chalk laying on the surface of the road develops a sheen of ice.

Some plants fare badly on lime soil because essential nutrients, especially iron and phosphorus, become unavailable to plants due to the alkalinity of the soil. The results can show in leaf yellowing, veining and scorching, small new foliage and the death of leaves and small branches. Plants showing these symptoms have chlorosis.

This is exactly the problem I face with my raspberries; of all the fruit, raspberries like alkaline soils the least except perhaps blueberries. Every spring and early summer I give them a good dressing of iron, but as chalk is constantly dissolving, applied dressings have only a temporary effect before the iron gets locked away again.

The best advice seems to be to improve the general health and fertility of soil by building up humus through manuring and composting. Well looked after soil is more able to support a wide range of plants and gives the lime averse plants a better change of thriving. It sometimes seems to me that the heavy surface dressings of compost that I add to the soil around plants soon disappears but it promotes earthworm activity and boosts the partnership between soil, mycorrhizal fungi and plants and increases moisture retention.

Some growers say that chalky soil produces the sweetest root vegetables and that the stones and chalk aid drainage and help stop the soil from drying out in the vegetable plot.

I've been spending some time planning ahead for next year and seeking plants who will not object to the alkaline soil in the hardy perennial bed. I was delighted to discover that pinks will fit the bill. I'd already decided to treat myself to one or two of the old fashioned varieties for the sheer delight of their individuality. Now I have a good excuse to get a few more.

I have a scattering of modern double pinks and they flower for longer but without the character and the hauntingly lovely perfume of the old varieties. Pinks like full sun, an alkaline soil and do well at the front of the border. That's a perfect fit for my requirements.

Another advantage of an alkaline soil is that many herbs do well on dry impoverished ground – better than when pampered. It is the struggle that gives them their flavour. A bit like life then.

There's a crown of rhubarb that it is time to say goodbye to. The mass of the crown is very large but it is producing thin weak sticks. The flavour has never been great so I'll dig it out and compost it. In the winter I'll split the crown of the rhubarb I like best and replant to increase the yield.

The raspberry canes that provided this summer's fruit will be cut back to ground level as soon as they have finished fruiting. How casual I become with the raspberries when they are in their pomp. Eating two ways – fresh and fresh with a raspberry coulis on top, freezing, jamming, adding to cake mixtures ... then all of a sudden they are over and the one or two hidden ones discovered when doing the autumn work are carried tenderly down the garden - a precious crown jewel like cargo.

Freshly made jam has the deepest flavour and the jam in the store cupboard from last year needs using up. It will keep longer than a year if the sugar concentration is correct but it slowly begins to loose quality and flavour. A good way of using up a jar of jam is to make jam tarts and top them with some seasonal fresh fruit. Another handy little number is to add a jar of jam to a cake mix.

A Little Treasure from the Store Cupboard Cake.

Cream 60z / 175 g sugar with 60z / 175 g margarine or butter. Add half a 12 oz / 340 g jar of jam, lemon curd or marmalade and stir into the creamed mixture. Beat in 3 eggs one at a time. Fold in 80z / 225 g self-raising flour. Turn the mixture into a prepared 8 inch / 20 cm cake tin and drop spoonfuls of the remaining preserve over the top of the cake.

Bake for 35 - 40 minutes at 190 C / 375 F / Gas 5 then leave to cool in the tin. Turn out and dust with icing sugar if you like.

This goes nicely with a cup of proper coffee or served just warm with cream as pudding.

If you have a spare jar of raspberry or blackcurrant jam consider a chocolate based cake. Replace 2 oz / 50 g of the flour in the above recipe with 2 oz / 50 g of cocoa powder and use a sieve when adding them to the mixture.

When I was researching the varieties of pinks for next year's flower bed, it surprised and pleased me to learn that it seems that pink the flower came before pink the colour. The word pink comes from the frilly or jagged edges of the flowers and the verb 'to pink' (decorated edges) appeared in the 14th century. It was probably around the 17th century that the word was used as a colour; before that pink was described as rosy. We still use the verb 'to pink' when among other things we use pinking shears.

Heacham at Night

I hope you took the trouble to look out for the Perseids in the middle of August because the clouds cleared and they were a fine sight albeit visible in directions you may not have been facing.

I was at Wiveton, back of Blakeney, from early evening until midnight for the annual North Norfolk Astronomy Association Perseid barbecue. Meteors started appearing from around 9.30 and some were very bright like bonfire night rockets. I only saw 18 but there were far more than that – some of my peers were looking in different directions. We also saw four satellites travelling far overhead (clear dots of light moving fast) and the International Space Station (a rather lumpy blob, very bright, also moving fast). Between 1am and 2.30am I was in my garden at Heacham and an hour's observing was rewarded with another 35 meteors (the missing half hour involved a cup of tea and two hungry hedgehogs).

Anyway, if you tried to see them but didn't stay out long enough, keep having a glance up on a clear night; random meteors appear most nights and there are other showers albeit mostly not as dependable or prolific as the Perseids.

Now for September: the 23rd is the Autumn Equinox. Simplistically this is the day when day and night are of approximately equal length and following which 'the nights draw in' – it gets progressively darker earlier until about Christmas. Technically it is the day when the Sun crosses the celestial equator moving south and this happens at 9.20am BST.

As the Earth's axis is tilted (at 23.5°) to the celestial equator, for half the year the Sun appears above it (spring, summer) and for half a year below it (autumn, winter). So, astronomical autumn starts immediately after 9.20am on the 23rd. Meteorological (weather forecasts) autumn starts on the 1st September.



In the early hours of September 28th the Moon will pass through the shadow cast by Earth through space – Sun, Earth and Moon will be in a direct line in that order. Passage through the shadow takes time so an observer will see the Moon gradually ate away until it 'almost' disappears. The observation is actually more subtle because the Moon passes through a half shadow first (Earth's penumbra) before entering the full shadow of Earth's umbra. In addition, within this full shadow, red light from the Sun refracted (bent) by Earth's atmosphere still manages to reach the Moon 's surface which reflects it back to the Earth making the Moon appear red.

I have saved the time all this occurs until last. The eclipse starts at 1.12am; totality begins at 3.11am; totality ends at 4.43am, and the eclipse ends at 5.27am. If it is a clear night perhaps I should arrange for the church bells to ring at about 2.45am?

If you are a morning person, then from the middle to the end of September look low down in the east at about 6.00am and you have a good chance of seeing three planets, Venus very bright, Jupiter low down and obvious but not bright and a reddish dot which is Mars somewhere between them. Binoculars will give a good view. Between the 10th and 11th the crescent Moon is close to Venus.



On the 25th, Mars is very close to a very bright star, R e g u l u s which is part of a 4 star s y s t e m




consisting of two binaries (stars which orbit each other). The main star is blue white and significantly bigger than our Sun. It is 79 light years distant (the light from it I see now started off a few years before I was born)



Returning to the evening: On the 19th look low in the SW at around 8pm and you have another chance of seeing Saturn a couple of hand widths away from the crescent Moon. A similar distance below the Moon will be the bright star Antares. This is a red giant which would extend past the orbit of Mars if placed where our sun is. It is 470 light years away (light from it seen now started off about a hundred years before John Rolfe married Pocohontas).

Giant red stars collapse into white dwarf stars with an illuminated gaseous nebulae around them. Some of these can be seen quite easily through binoculars or small telescopes. The one illustrated below is the Dumbbell Nebulae, Messier 27. The image is of false colour revealing the range in temperature of the gas cloud which is one light year across. M27 is 1,360 light years away and came into existence around 10,000 years ago. I include it because it is the first decent image I have got from my use of the Bradford University robotic telescope based in the Canaries. Access to this was a birthday present from my son.



In mid-September I am camping at Kelling Heath for a couple of nights. It is the annual star party which attracts hundreds of people with telescopes. If you want to buy one (a telescope) this is the best way of looking first. There will be a few suppliers selling their wares too. This year I have a tent I can walk, rather than slide, into. I will report on the event next month under the heading, 'Tales from the Camp Red Light,' (anything brighter has dire consequences).

A phrase worth repeating, 'nights start drawing in after the 23rd.'

It was the year The Sound Of Music first came out, My Fair Lady won eight Oscars, and Mary Poppins five. It was the year Stanley Matthews played his last First Division game of football, aged 50 (Steven Gerrard – what was the problem?!). And it was the year one or two decent singles came out, too.

Welcome ... to 1965!


• CALIFORNIA GIRLS The Beach Boys (Capitol, CL 15409, No 26)

"I've been all around this great big world / And I've seen all kinds of girls / But I can't wait to get back to the States / Back to the cutest girls in the world"

I'm not sure it's even legal to say that any more – I think today's PC Police might claim it's both sexist and racist at the same time!

But co-writer and chief Beach Boy Brian Wilson has said he wrote the song: "because I love girls. I mean, everybody loves girls." And I think you might find that's as true today as it was in 1965.

It certainly prompted Paul McCartney to include a "Russian



version" of the lyrical theme in The Beatles' song, Back In The USSR. This came about while he was studying transcendental meditation in India, along with Beach Boy Mike Love, who co-wrote California Girls.

Love says: "Paul came down to breakfast one morning, saying: 'Hey Mike, listen to this,' and he starts strumming and singing Back In The USSR. And I said: 'Well Paul, what you ought to do is talk about the girls around Russia – Ukraine girls, Georgia on my mind – that kind of thing.' Which he did."

Composer Wilson hits you with a double-whammy. First, there's that gorgeous, almost classical, instrumental intro (which he's said to be especially proud of). But then that disappears, never to be heard again, to make way for the insanely catchy main tune.

Wilson has admitted he was actually thinking of the music from cowboy movies when he wrote it – hence that memorable "bum-buhdeeda, bum-buhdeeda" rhythm. And there's also a bit of Bach thrown in, because he told one interviewer that the song's shuffle beat was also inspired by Jesu, Joy Of Man's Desiring!

Interestingly, although each of the Beach Boys helps to provide their trademark harmonies on the song, session musicians were used for the music – including pianist Leon Russell, and members of the crack Los Angeles "Wrecking Crew," such as drummer Hal Blaine and bassist Carol Kaye.

And yes, a highest chart placing of No 26 is a wretched return for an all-time classic, by one of America's greatest ever bands. But the song did get to No 3 in America. And with US radio plays now totalling between four and five million, it's actually the biggest royalty earner in the band's entire catalogue.

• IT'S NOT UNUSUAL Tom Jones (Decca, F 12062, No 1)

"It happens every day, no matter what you say / You find it happens all the time / Love will never do what you want it to / Why can't this crazy love be mine?"

And then along came Jones – as the title of his debut album said. What a single to announce yourself to the world with! This tune's got more swing than your average playground, enough brass to start a colliery band ... and oh my word, that voice! Have you ever heard anything like it, before or since?





Thomas Woodward was singing in dance halls and working men's clubs in his native Wales with Tommy Scott And The Senators, when he was spotted by Gordon Mills, who offered to become his manager. Mills suggested the name change to Tom Jones, to take advantage of the Oscar-winning Albert Finney film of the same name.

Ever heard Tom's first single, Chills And Fever? Me neither. But its follow-up, It's Not Unusual, penned by Mills and composer Les Reed, was taken up by pirate station Radio Caroline, and swiftly became a hit on both sides of the Atlantic. Jones The Voice was born. Not bad for a miner's son from Treforest, near Pontypridd.



At the time of recording the song, Jones' regular band, The Squires, were missing their keyboard player. So drummer Chris Slade – perhaps now better known for playing with AC/DC ran across the road to a coffee house, and found Reg Dwight, to sit in for the day. Reg, of course, would one day

become ... Elton John!

Oh, and, let's not forget, this was the song that gave us hoary old joke: "Doctor, doctor! I think I've got Tom Jones Syndrome! Is it common?" "Oh, it's not unusual ..."



• MY GENERATION The Who (Brunswick 05944, No 2)

"People try to put us d-down / Just because we get around / Things they do look awful c-c-cold / Hope I die before I get old"

Pete Townshend was 20 when he wrote those words – and it's testament to the iconic status the song continues to enjoy that "hope I die before I get old" has never really come back to haunt him. No, not even when the guitarist, now aged 70, performed the song with The Who at Glastonbury this year – to an audience which included as many youngsters as it did ageing rock fans.

I guess some things are truly timeless – the generation gap being one of them!

With its full-on assault, and stop-start riffing, the magic of this wonderful rock song simply doesn't diminish. And let's not forget The Best Bass Solo In A Chart Hit Ever, courtesy of the nimble-fingered, underrated and late-lamented John "Thunderfingers" Entwistle.

It's interesting that in 1965 The Who were able to effectively get away with taking the mickey out of stuttering, in a top chart hit. Or were they? Was it just articulating the frustration of youth? Oh, come on! Some say it was inspired by John Lee Hooker's Stuttering Blues. Okaaaay ... Others that it was a way at hinting at something naughty with the line: "Why don't you all f-f-fade away!" Maybe. Or that it was imitating Mods who took the drug speed. Hmmm ...

But Shel Talmy, who was the producer, has said it was "just one of those happy accidents" that he decided they should keep. Yes ... that sounds more like it!

This was The Who's joint highest-placed single – along with I'm A Boy, oddly enough (and a song about a boy who's mum dressed him as a girl was pretty odd, even for 1965).

Yes, higher even than Pinball Wizard. And, much to Townshend's chagrin, higher than I Can See For Miles, which he was convinced would be their biggest ever hit, although that only got to No 10. I'm with you on that one though, Pete.

Footnote: Wonderful though the bass solo in My Generation is, it still isn't The Best Bass Solo In The World Ever. Oh no. That honour must go to the now also late-lamented Andy Fraser, of Free, for Mr Big, from the Free Live! album. Just saying!

Members of the public are being warned about a potential cold call scam from someone claiming to be from the

Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk. The bogus calls are focussed on 'investigating an accident' and the caller is attempting to obtain personal details which they would then use to commit fraud offences. These calls are not from the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk and the advice is not to provide any personal details over the phone. Lorraine Gore, Chief Financial Officer at the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk, said: "The rise in the number of scam callers is worrying and they are becoming ever more creative in their attempts to get personal information from their victims. This particular scam has evolved to show our number on the caller ID and in some cases it would appear that the perpetrators have also acquired medical details which they use to try to make the call seem authentic."

"Our number usually appears as withheld, so if it appears on the caller ID or via 1471 missed call facility, please be very wary.

"We would like to reassure people that we would not call to ask for personal details and that if anyone wants to check if a call from the council is bonafide, they should ask the caller for their name and department and then contact the Customer Information Centre on 01553 616200 and ask to speak with them, as this will confirm their identity."

The Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk are asking the public to be vigilant against this scam and to report any suspicious calls using the action fraud, report and support online form. Alternatively, people can contact the helpline on 0300 123 2040.

If anyone has been a victim of any scams or identity theft, it can lead to fraud that can have a direct impact on personal finances. Check bills or invoices and letters to identify any suspicious activity. 

Lidl Store for Heacham?

During the afternoon and early evening of Tuesday 25th August 2015 at Heacham Public Hall, an exhibition was held of a proposed Lidl store to be built on the former Stainsby's Garage site, 43 Lynn Road, Heacham A149.

Residents of Heacham were invited to attend; to view and discuss the proposed plans with representatives of the company's development team.

The meeting was well attended with people from as far as Docking and Dersingham. By 4.30pm they had run out of the feedback forms for people's comments.

Having spoken to Simon Blowman Construction Manger and Mike Devine Acquisition Manger, they reported that the main concern was for the traffic on the A149 Lynn Road. Other issues ie mother and child and disability spaces were easily rectified.

The proposed plans detail 129 free car parking spaces, 6 disability and 3 parent and child spaces as part of the store, and it is expected that it would bring up to 40 full and part-time jobs to the area.

At the time of the exhibition no planning application had been submitted.



Norfolk recycling centres ready for hazardous waste amnesties

Norfolk's residents are being urged to check their cupboards, sheds and garages for toxic

household chemicals that they don't want any more, so they can take them to be disposed of safely and securely at a series of household hazardous waste amnesties taking place at seven of Norfolk County Council's recycling centres across the county during September.

Wood preservatives, bug and weed killers, paint, thinners, varnishes and special cleaning products are among the wide range of household chemicals that will be accepted – for free – at the weekend-long events. These are products that are too dangerous to be tipped down drains or sent to landfill without damaging the environment.

The events will be taking place between 9am and 6pm at the following site and dates:-

Saturday 26th & Sunday 27th September 2015

King's Lynn, Willows Business Park, Saddlebow, PE34 3RD. Toby Coke, Chairman of Norfolk County Council's Environment Development and Transport Committee welcomed the news of the events saying: "We all have to use chemicals for DIY jobs and chores around the house and garden. But getting rid of the leftovers legally and responsibly can be expensive because specialist disposal processes have to be used to make sure they don't damage the environment.

"We commission specialist hazardous waste disposal chemists to run these events at our recycling centres to help residents avoid these costs.

"This is the twelfth year that we've run them and they are



incredibly popular. Over that time, Norfolk householders have brought more than 348 tonnes of dangerous chemicals to our sites and made sure they are disposed of safely and securely.

"I'd encourage everyone who needs to get rid of this type of waste that they've got hanging around the house to take advantage of the opportunity to get rid of it by coming along to their nearest event if they possibly can."

Rachel Stewart, Waste Reduction Officer at Norfolk County Council added: "We put these events on as a convenient way for residents to get rid of household chemicals, but most of us can do more to try to reduce the amount we end up with.

"Most of the type of chemical products we use around the house and garden give good information about the amount of coverage or application we can expect to get out of them. If we spend a bit more time working out how much we actually need to buy for a specific job, we would reduce the likelihood of ending up having to store the leftovers. That would mean all of us are winners. Residents can save money by not over-buying and it could also help to push down the cost to council taxpayers of having to deal with the waste."

People can find out how to get to their nearest event by visiting <u>www.norfolk.gov.uk/recyclingcentres</u> or calling 0344 800 8020.

The County Council recommends that if people are planning to bring hazardous products to an amnesty event they should:

- Keep all products in their original containers and not mix them together;
- Keep containers clearly labelled where possible;
- Make sure that the products are properly sealed to avoid leakage.

Love Norfolk Youth Social Action Fund - Grants of up to £5,000 are available to support projects in Norfolk that engage young people in volunteering and other activities that both benefit their communities and develop their skills. The deadline for applications is 11th September.

Lovewell Blake Fund – This fund supports community and voluntary activity in Norfolk and the areas of Suffolk surrounding Lowestoft and Halesworth. Grants of up to $\pounds 2,000$ are available. The Fund aims to benefit smaller, often lesser known organisations where such grants would make a real difference to a particular project. Applicants from Suffolk should apply via the Suffolk Community Foundation. The deadline for applications is 25th September.

Victory Housing Trust Community Fund (North Norfolk and Victory Housing Trust areas of operation) - Grants of up to £5,000 are available to support a range of community activity within the Trust's area of operation which includes the North Norfolk District Council area as well as certain parishes in Broadland and West Norfolk. Preference is given to projects involving, or having the potential to benefit tenants of Victory Housing Trust. The deadline for applications is 28th September.

All applications must come from at least two organisations that have joined forces to deliver an innovative project. The lead organisation must be a registered charity. The other organisations can be another charity, a voluntary group or a community interest company. The opening date for applications will be 17th August, and the deadline is 22nd September

Idlewild Trust

The Idlewild Trust support charities who encourage the performance of fine arts and crafts, the promotion of education within the arts and the preservation of land, buildings and objects of beauty and/or historic interest. Grants of up to £5,000 are available. The deadline for applications is 23rd September.

Celebrating Participation in Healthcare Community GrantsNHS England is welcoming applications from not-forprofit organisations that can tell the story of their patient and citizen engagement work in a creative and interesting way. Partnership working is encouraged; partners can be other voluntary sector organisations, private companies, or others.



However, the lead partner must be a not-for-profit organisation. The maximum grant amount is $\pounds 1,000$. The deadline for applications is 28th September.

Feminist Review Trust

The Feminist Review gives grants of up to £15,000 to projects that support women. Priorities will be projects that are:

- hard to fund or have no other obvious sources of funding
 carrying out activities that start a project, with the hope it
- will then secure sufficient funds to continue
 Carrying out Intervention work with feminist values
- Offering training and development
- Holding one off events
- Disseminating relevant materials

• In need of core funding, and struggle to raise it elsewhere The deadline for applications is 30th September.

War Memorials Trust

Grants of up to £30,000 are available to cover up to 75% of eligible costs for free standing war memorials with no other functional purpose. Works can include:

- Urgent and necessary repairs and structural stabilisationCleaning
- Reinstatement of lost elements

The deadline for applications is 30th September.

Neighbourhood Planning Grants

Grants from the Department for Communities and Local Government's Neighbourhood Planning and Community Right to Build support programme are available to those writing a Neighbourhood Plan or Neighbourhood Development Order to prepare Neighbourhood Plans. Grants of up to £8,000 are available to pay for:

- Events
- Printing and materials
- Specialist planning expertise

Groups with more complex needs can apply for specific packages of technical support and might be eligible for a further \pounds 6,000. There is a rolling deadline for applications.

Rural Community Energy Fund

This fund supports rural communities to develop renewable energy projects which benefit the community. The funding is provided in two stages:

• Stage 1 - grants of up to £20,000 to pay for investigation into the feasibility of a renewable energy project.

• Stage 2 – unsecured loan of up to £130,000 to support planning applications and develop a business case to attract further investment.

Applications are reviewed monthly and there is no set deadline.

European Growth Programme

European Structural and Investment Funds (ESIF) are designed to improve economic growth, business competitiveness and employment opportunities and social well-being across Member States of the EU. New Anglia has secured £94m for investment in Suffolk and Norfolk from the European Structural and Investment Funds for investment into projects from 2015 onwards. The funds are divided into a number of programmes -European Regional Development Fund (ERDF); European Social Fund (ESF) and the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development (EAFRD).

Most funding is delivered through 'calls' that invite applications to address specified priorities. As an example there is currently a live call within the EAFRD programme.

European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development (EAFRD) – This is for micro, small and medium-sized businesses seeking to invest in processing, marketing and

development of agricultural products. Projects can bid for grants of $\pounds 35,000 - \pounds 250,000$. The specification includes further information on the nature of the call, how to apply and contacts for further information and support.

LEADER Funding

Funding is also delivered through a 'bottom up' local approach called LEADER. You can find out more about LEADER opportunities in your area and make an application on this site. LEADER is likely to be the best opportunity for smaller VCSE organisations or SME businesses working to improve their local area.





THE PRINCIPLES OF REIKI
