As we walked up to the church doors the sky was as blue as blue behind this wonderful building and in the porch was the start of something spectacular. An arrangement of flowers with the old sweep brush, sticking out of the top. You could almost hear the little soot smudged chap saying "Good luck m'lady" as he planted a lucky kiss on the blushing bride's somewhat rosy cheek".



Into the church we go. Well, you had to see it to believe it - the whole church looked jaw dropping astounding! As a vintage wedding dress collector, I now felt like a little girl in a sweet shop. I didn't know which way to turn.

I loved Barbara Grange's Pony and Trap creation, and next to it was the old vintage car, shining like it had never shone before with the Rev Veronica's wedding dress carefully displayed. I was attracted to the 1941 war bride, a gown of beautiful silk (parachute silk?). The way these gowns clung to the brides' bodies and trailed behind them in folds of silk.



I spied a gorgeous baby pink wedding gown, with matching net puff sleeves. It was good to see this again. Rosemary Lee lent this dress to Margaret Burns and me when we staged a charity Vintage Wedding Dress Fashion Show, 10 years ago.

There was Jenny Ives' (nee Cawthorne) tiny waist, knee length flared wedding dress with her photograph displayed beneath it of her and her new husband David. What? 1964? I can remember that day. I worked for workaholic David at Hunstanton International Stores (Now Hughes) a year later. He was my manager. He always told us that he married on a Thursday afternoon because it was half day closing in the store. Maybe this is true, or was he just pulling our leg? . . .

Also taking my eye, as a miniaturist, I smiled at Nancy Robinson's 12th scale Wedding Feast with the tiny church mice dressed in their wedding finery enjoying their very own wedding celebrations.

Every single flower, dress, veil had been presented so well, Congratulations to all who must have spent hours on this 3 day event. Also, the tea and cake ladies (and gents). BUT the one display I was drawn to was Eve Rayner's mother's wedding dress, which was near on 120 years old! Simply stunning! The tiny bugle beads, all sewn on by hand (no magic glue gun in those days) the tainted lace, the fragile veil and the beautiful

tiara made of wax, plus the wedding cake topper also made of wax, sealed in its own glass dome. Oh how I would love this piece in my vintage collection.

What a splendid display! You all must be feeling very proud - thank you very much!

Supporting my little sister

To anyone who knows me, I love my hair and anything to do with hair, so to sit across a table and to hear these 8 words "You will lose all your hair within 3 weeks" would be devastating.

Because of extensive breast cancer treatment, this is what my sister Jayne was told. To be told that you have Breast Cancer is simply awful, awful, awful. I felt that I had to help - but how? Normally as a sister you cannot advise what you would usually advise when she is feeling so ill? Like 'take a couple of aspirin, you will feel better'? 'Put a plaster on it. It will heal'? 'Go lay down, the rest will cure you'? 'Have a nice holiday, a change of scenery is what you need'?

So, the only way I can show my support for Jayne, is to have my hair shaved off at 2.15 pm on July 31st by Annette at 'Images Hair & Beauty', King's Lynn.

I would like to raise £1,000 for the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, King's Lynn Chemotherapy Suite, where Jayne is undergoing her intensive treatments. Here, Jayne tells me that the staff and volunteers cannot do enough to care for her and the other cancer patients, when she has her 4 hourly intravenous drip treatments every 21 days.

'Head Shave' - I must admit, I do keep having second thoughts but, unlike Jayne, she does not have the option of 'a second thought'.

Yes, I love my hair but I also love my little sister.

More News from Heacham Fire Station



On the 22nd May, we were joined by the Hunstanton fire crew for an exercise at the former Dairy Crest depot in Pound Lane.

The site will be home to Heacham's new community

building in the future but, in the meantime, the Parish Council have very kindly allowed us to use it for training purposes. Empty buildings such as the old dairy can be great for us to use because they provide us with both realistic and unfamiliar



environments as an alternative to the breathing apparatus (BA) chamber at King's Lynn North Fire Station, which we get to know quite well over the years. There are various sites around King's Lynn which

we have used and we also take part in training at well known venues such as Sandringham House, but it is a real bonus to have somewhere right on our doorstep.

For the purposes of our exercise, the dairy became a garage which was on fire with two persons trapped inside. A BA team



from each crew entered the building and I'm pleased to successfully sav rescued the casualties, in this case training dummies. There are lot control measures and procedures

involved in making sure this happens as safely as possible at real incidents and we try to replicate these when we practise. A crew of four or five people doesn't stretch very far when faced with a serious building fire.

There was also a chance to pitch some ladders which was useful training for those crew members not yet qualified to wear BA.

The exercise was well received by those who participated and I think we all benefited from it in some way which is what these events are all about.

And if the person who took my L.E.D. light from the main gate during setting up would like to return it to the fire station, that would be the icing on the cake!



Greetings from a very sunny Heacham Tesco Express!

Firstly, I would like to pass on our apologies to everyone who were victims of card fraud as a result of using the ATM situated outside our store. Many staff as well as customers were also targeted so we completely understand the level of frustration and anger many of you feel and indeed have directed at us. The first I was aware was when a colleague told me he had been targeted. Immediately, engineers were called along with the police. The machine has been checked and given the all clear. However, I am aware that people's details, including my own, were seemingly stored by the fraudsters and used after this. Again, all I can do is apologise and ask that people keep checking their bank accounts, remain vigilant around the ATM and report any suspicions to the police. I'd also like to point out that the village Post office is a great place to withdraw money and have been most helpful at this time, as always.

On a more positive note, we have had the pleasure of donating items to many fundraisers around the village as well as supporting the monthly village coffee morning. We can still help, so keep those requests coming!

HEACHAM HISTORY GROUP PATRICK ARTHUR SHELDON HADLEY COMPOSER & PROFESSOR OF THIS PARISH PART 4

During his sabbatical year, he travelled in Ireland and as always visiting his mother's birth place Connemara. He also set about writing his will and writing to friends and talking about "taking a walk" but not just yet. On May 23rd 1962 he returned to Heacham more drunk than usual, refused to go to bed and stayed up drinking and when Myra came in the next morning she found him lying in a pool of blood.

Apparently Shallcross was undergoing a major refurbishment and in his drunken state he couldn't find the light switch and overbalanced at the top of the stairs. He was admitted to Addenbrooks on 28th May. The hospital had transferred to its present location the year before and Paddy managed to be admitted on the day of the official opening by the Queen.

He retired in the summer of 1962 and a tribute by one of his pupils who became a friend in the Caian, a college magazine ends with this tribute:-


"Paddy feels music with his heart, and it is with all our hearts we thank him for the pleasure he has given us. In wishing him a joyous retirement at Heacham, we trust he will be lured back to Cambridge from time to time."

He also no longer taught at the RCM but still did some examining. Later in 1962 when on holiday in Ireland, his walking was giving him problems and he wrote to Myra asking if Leslie (her husband) was arranging any tennis matches because "I doubt I'll be able to play this year: I'm finding myself living rather easily". It was also at this time he wrote his final

piece "Lenten Cantata" which was performed in Carlisle Cathedral on 5th April 1963.

He did not rest when retired, he was off visiting churches and cathedrals around the country, holidaying in Ireland. On his many excursions around the country he sent many letters and cards indicating that his health and mobility were giving cause for concern and gave details of car journeys rather than his walks

The car he drove at the time was a gift from his mother a year before she died in August 1940 and he didn't want to part with it but travelling in Ireland in 1968 it gave up on him, so it was at least 28 years old. He had to leave it in Ireland. However, he went back the following year to collect it once it had been repaired. He also had a second-hand Wolsey, but he couldn't part with his mother's gift.



In 1971 aged 72 he set off for what is thought to be his last visit to Ireland; by the end of the visit he was feeling "below" par and looking forward to his own bed. His housekeeper noticed hoarseness to his voice and it took her some time to get him to

see a doctor and the diagnosis was throat cancer, the treatment leaving him mostly unable to talk.

In May 1972, he attempted a driving holiday in the Midlands but had to be driven home. Correspondence with his friend Cecily showed how ill he was but he still kept in touch with his music friends by letter.

One night whilst he was sick he called Myra at 4am and asked her to come immediately. When they arrived, his bedroom was full of smoke. As they moved him from the bedroom his mattress caught fire and was thrown out of the window, he had had a mild stroke.

One of his last outings was to the King's Lynn Festival; Lady Fermoy knowing that he was very ill had arranged for the Halle Orchestra to play his composition "One Morning in Spring". After this he went into a state of despair and it was arranged for his friend Sir Alan Lubbock to come and stay for a few days, and also arranged with Earl Baldwin of Bewdley, Stanley Baldwin's son, to keep in contact and talk about their mutual interest – railways.

He died 17th December 1973; his funeral was 21st December at Heacham church. There was a request for no flowers but donations to the Snettisham Church Memorial Fund where he used to go to admire the spire. A memorial service was held in the chapel of Gonville and Caius on Saturday 16th February which was attended by his former pupil Ursula Watson (nee Grotrian) for whom he had written "My Beloved Spake" which was also played at his memorial service. My Beloved Spake was played on the BBC Radio 3 programme "Essential Classics" on 10th January this year, 2017.

An obituary in the Musical Times February 1974 talks about his work and appointments but summed up with:-

"His output was small and he might well have acquired greater fluency and produced more had his circumstances been different. For he fell with the greatest of ease into the leisurely life of the moneyed academic, one which demands of a man of a creative cast of mind a capacity for stringent self-discipline. He was deeply committed to everything he wrote but the responsibilities and distractions of his Cambridge professorship tended to sap energies which should have been channelled exclusively into composing. Those who experienced him as a conductor speak of an outstanding talent. He was a mine of ready information on friends and contempories, and with is death another of the remaining links with the world of the English Romantics is severed."

Shallcross House was left to a relative and quickly sold on and much of the grounds were sold for building. Those closest to him received annuities along with £20,000 to Pembroke College with a request that it be used with music in mind.

THE POCAHONTAS PLAYERS

"Who Were You With Last Night?"

So, here's the thing. I saw a post on Facebook from Josh Chilvers publicising the Pocahontas Players upcoming production of "Who Were You With Last Night?". I said, since I am coming to see the show ... would you like a NODA (National Operatic and Dramatic Society) style review? Aside from a good night out, my motivation was to demonstrate to the great and good of the PP that NODA might be a worthwhile consideration for them. They are, after all, the biggest society in the 4 North region who are not affiliated. I should also point out that, as a past Lynn News reviewer, I have previously deputised for the local reporter during his holidays and have been delighted to put pen to paper on more than one occasion waxing lyrical about this prominent troupe. So, here I was, Heacham Public Hall, bottled beer in hand and thoroughly looking forward to the night's entertainment.

At this point, after the usual preamble, people get really nervous about whether I thought it was any good or not, or if I enjoyed it, and start skimming down to the money paragraph. In order to focus anyone who can't be bothered to wade through this ... The show was great! That said ... there is an awful lot more that needs documenting! The venue for instance ... what an amazing place Heacham Public Hall is, and the raked seating (£13,000 I was confidentially told) just made the whole auditorium feel like an honest to goodness theatre. The resources of this society were also impressive. They have their own lighting, which was excellent, and all the main characters had a mic! I had never seen a play with full amplification until earlier this year, so this is pretty much cutting edge! The Front of House team were all in costume and the reception area was humming as you entered to

pick up your tickets, get a programme and buy your raffle tickets. Very slick and extremely well organised. With an excellent bar to top it all off ... where else would you want to be on a Saturday night!

The set (uncredited) was outstanding. A selection of curtains allowed significant changes to take place with lightning speed and precision and Backstage Manager, Barry Shaw, clearly had everything well in hand. The painted backdrops (Dave Curtis, Jim and Janet Race with Esther Boehm) were a good touch adding greatly to the overall spectacle. Sound and light (management by Dave Curtis and execution by Esther Boehm and Joseph Rumens) did everything that it needed to do and the amplification was completely free of feedback, rustling and unexpected booming. Incidental props (Dave Curtis, Noel Gill, Barry Shaw and Joseph Rumens) were plentiful and of a very high quality. Costumes (Janice Curtis and Harvey Costumes) were all very good with plenty of changes for the extensive cast. Hair, wigs and make-up (uncredited) were equally high quality and I was stunned by the amount of time and effort that had been lavished on this production on every single front.

This was a big cast. Considering this was predominantly a play, the writer had not only built in plenty of lead characters, but also allowed for a chorus together with a not insignificant dance troupe. In fact, the five members of the Charleston Belles Wendy Nudds, Bridget Neeham. Lisa Belverstone, Jemma Greef and Kelsie Hall were on-and-off throughout both halves. This was a home-produced script, and writer Janice Curtis had presumably worked her words, songs and dance breaks around her regular performers. I don't know that this was the case, but if it was, I can certainly vouch for the fact that there is nothing more satisfying than taking a part in a play that was written especially for you.

Of the supporting cast, I enjoyed Barry Shaw, Stephen Boston and Noel Gill as the Club Members with Mr Shaw returning as the photographer and Mr Gill returning and making a good job of Jack the Butcher, a part that also included a fair bit of singing! In addition, there was solid work from Jake Dorman as Alfred the Chauffeur, Ria Tipple as Ada the Parlour Maid, Naomi Rix as Lizzie the Ladies Maid, Lucy Hughes as Dottie the Kitchen Maid, with some neat scene stealing by Louise Pearce as Granddaughter, Rosie Bigwood. There were a couple of nice cameos from Anne Gill as Primrose Bigwood and Simon Boston as Rory Bigwood with Garry Pearce really standing out as Reg the Barman. A small (ish) part and yet he was able to develop the character to quite a high level in a short space of time, demonstrating empathy as well as loyalty which really helped the story in the later stages. I have a feeling I have seen Mr Pearce deliver a brilliant dame at this location ... but then again I may be confusing him with someone else....it was a very long time ago. One man I had most definitely seen here in pantomime is the legend that is Jim Race. This time out he had a cracking



cameo taking the part of Sid the Comic, delivering a quick-fire routine of some five or six jokes. A little racy I thought and perfectly in keeping with the golden age of Music Hall. I wrote one of them down as I left the hall and will retain it for future use! Mr Race also popped up in the wedding scene as a chimney sweep and I am led to believe he will be taking bookings as a good luck charm for weddings and bar- mitzvahs etc.

In the more prominent parts, there was solid work from Sian Playford as the sulky 'daughter-from-Hell', Isabelle Ribchester and Hunstanton regular, Mick Yates was perfectly cast as the Butler, Mr James. I watched Mr Yates during some of the scenes where it was all going on around him and his focus was impressive. I never caught him out of character, nor did he ever stop acting at any time. The backbone of the story and the two entrusted with the largest portions of script were Sharon Yates as Lady Rosemary Ribchester and Tom Whybrow as Lord Bernard Ribchester and both were excellent! Last time I saw Mrs (Shazza) Yates it was as a Nun I think, but as the wellmeaning upper class Matriarch she was delightful. Solid with her lines and confident with all her many moves. The exact same thing can, and must be, said of Mr Whybrow. A superb, deep characterisation that was both physical as well as vocal and one of the best in this production. I think it was 'Blackadder Goes Forth' that I last saw him in and he was perfection as Lieutenant George. It is never anything less than a pleasure to watch Elaine Verweymeren on any stage and she was very much on top of her game on this one. Cast as the friend of Lady Rosemary and secret mother of Filly the Parlour Maid, Mrs Verweymeren delivered a precise and delicate performance full of pathos and uncertainty. A brilliant actress, well cast!

The romance of the story was left in the more than capable hands of Joshy Chilvers as young master and heir to the family silver, Rueben Ribchester and Laura Thomas as Parlour Maid and orphan of this parish, Filly (Felicity Seymore-Smythe as it turned out). Both were on top form, wading through mountains of dialogue and (in the case of Miss Thomas) a couple of songs as well. The relationship was credible with only a hint of reticence on the kiss that reassured me that Miss Burton (see opening paragraph) had nothing to fear! Although sweet and accurate Miss Thomas's voice sounded untrained and I wondered as I travelled home if a little professional vocal coaching would turn that good voice into a great one! Did you think I had missed someone out? I certainly hope not but I need to spend a bit of time on Jeannie Tooley (don't you have a wonderful daughter somewhere) as the Cook, Mrs Wilcox. Proving once again that there are no small parts only small performances, Mrs Tooley all but stole the show with a masterclass in character acting. Her physical characterisation was matched by her vocal delivery and she carried all before her with a powerful and animated performance that really impressed me.

Those of you who are new to my NODA reviews need to understand that ... in a side-swipe to all that is Am-Dram ... I

If it does not, they can put the whole review in recycling or trawl through the rest of the text to see if they appear anywhere. Occasionally, it is not a performer you will find here, and on this occasion, penultimate paragraph honours must be spread equally between all the members of this Society. The quality of what took place on stage was at least equalled by the ambience of the venue, the warmth of the welcome and the whole organisation of the front of house. Everything connected with the evening's entertainment was classy. Very classy.

My compliments to Director, Peter Everingham. This is clearly an all-inclusive group with a rich variety of performers. To work them into such a tight fighting group must have taken a lot of hard work and a considerable amount of artistic and manmanagement skills. I also extend that praise to writer, Janice Curtis, for a good story, neatly woven with plenty of great lines. To use the plot to incorporate song, dance and comedy is no small feat. Dance choreography by Jaime Parry (wait a minute) was perfect for the ability of the dancers and the size of the stage and that is crucially important! As a member of the audience I had a great time and, what is significantly more important, I am damn sure those who were on the stage had a great time too. I hope I may be able to persuade the Pocahontas Players in NODA's direction. They are (without doubt) as good a standard as any of the societies already assimilated. Bravo PP. Loved it!

Heacham History Group

Andrew England was our speaker in May and, as usual, delighted us all with his tales

of Heacham in the Great War. His enthusiasm and his knowledge of the people and events of that period in Heacham made for a very interesting talk. With the increasing interest in the First World War, we are finding out more and more about the ordinary people caught up in the conflict and the impact it had on our own communities.

He recounted the "saga of the unexploded Zeppelin bomb" which started in a field near Stainsby's garage with a local soldier home on leave trying to pull a piece of metal out of the ground. With the help of several men, the bomb, finally extracted, was trundled through the village in a cart. It finally rested in a garden in front of a pair of French windows, an armed guard of one, and then two, soldiers was set over the bomb. It was visited by numerous villagers, local dignitaries and the local police. From Andrew's slides, most of them seemed to have had their photographs taken with the bomb before it was collected in a car and driven away to London.

We all know about the Americans over here during World War Two but Andrew told us of another "friendly invasion" during World War One. The Lovat Scouts, a Scottish regiment originally formed during the Boer War from stalkers, ghillies and shepherds, went on to become the British Army's first sniper unit. In 1915, they were in Norfolk on training and were billeted in houses in Heacham. They must have been an unusual sight striding down Heacham High Street in their kilts!

The next meeting will be on the 31st July when Mike Weatherstone will be talking to us on "Norfolk – A History Through its Village Signs". We all know why we have Pocahontas on our village sign, but what about the other villages, what do their signs mean? Heacham at Night

July; the turn of the year sliding towards longer nights. Hopefully, a few clear ones.

Remember July 3rd at 9.11pm the Earth is at aphelion, its furthest point from the Sun - 152 million kilometres or around 94.5 million miles. So, from the 4th until about Christmas we are getting a little closer to the fire; hold your hands out and feel the warmth.

Significant planets to see in the night sky remain Jupiter and Saturn (see last month's article). Jupiter is still bright in the SW but wanes as the month progresses. On the 28th /29th the crescent Moon is close to the gas giant and the star Spica.

Saturn sets about 3am but is easily visible late evening in the south. The Moon is above the ringed planet at about 11pm between the 5th and 7th. It is closest to the Moon on the 6th and almost due south.

Venus is really bright, a true 'Morning Star'. You will have to get up to see it about an hour before sunrise at 4.30am. Look a little north of east. At the beginning of the month it is close to the Seven Sisters – the Pleiades. On the 20th / 21st Venus will be close to the crescent Moon and the star Aldebaran.

As viewed from Earth, Mercury is moving away from the glare of the Sun and might be visible as a bright spark very close to the NW horizon about an hour after sunset. You need a sea view and no atmospheric murk but worth looking for.




Pluto and Charon from New Horizons

On the 10th July we are as close to Pluto as we will get in our lifetimes as it is at opposition and a mere 3,007,120,365.282376



miles away. Look due south and about a third of the way up the sky and you will be pointing your eyes in the right direction. You won't see it as a significant telescope and very clear, dark, skies are needed to do that. I saw it once but that was in the winter. On the 10th at 1.15am, Pluto lies due South and is between the Moon and Saturn.

Two years ago, on the 14th July, the New Horizons spacecraft flew by Pluto and its largest Moon Charon. Data is still being analysed from that visit whilst New Horizons flies on to a rendezvous with 2014 MU69 a Kuiper Belt object far, far away. Read about it next year.



Internet

Look above your head when evening has just become night and you will see three bright stars arranged in a triangle, the Summer



Triangle. An asterism popularised by Patrick Moore in the 1950s. The stars are Vega, Altair and Deneb. Vega is the brightest and highest, Altair the lowest and Deneb off to the left in the middle. Just to the left of Vega is Epsilon Lyrae, which those of you who are young and have keen eyesight might split into a double star. With good conditions a telescope splits each star of the double into two stars – it is a double double!

Even in our light polluted stretch of NW Norfolk it is possible to see the faint loom of the Milky Way stretching across the middle of the sky. Follow a broad line from the southern horizon through the Summer Triangle and roughly north. You are looking through our galaxy towards its centre. We are about half way out from the centre of a spiral of between 200 and 400 million stars. The band of light is uneven and has gaps where great dust clouds obscure the stars behind them. At the centre of the galaxy is a black hole which gobbles up passers by. Take care.

Day 3 - Shira Camp 2750 metres to Barranco Camp 3900 metres via Lava Tower 4600 metres

Hi all



Today is going to be a hard-long day. To ensure you can cope with the higher altitude you have to do acclimatisation walk to get used to lack of oxygen as you climb higher. Altitude sickness is one of the main reasons for illness and failure on the mountain. It is very debilitating and can cause serious side effects.

It's important that the doctor and the guides can judge your ability to reach the summit and

you yourself can get a handle on how you feel. So, we climb high and sleep low. With this in mind, today we will ascend from Shira Camp at 2750 metres up to Lava Tower at 4600 metres then return back down to Baranco Camp at 3950 metres. The whole walk will take 7-8 hours with an hour at Lava Tower.



I had an absolutely terrible night, having to leave my tent at midnight for a toilet visit. It was so cold there was frost on the inside of the tent roof. I climbed into the sleeping bag with as many clothes on as I could muster. I had pain in my ears and head.

Breakfast was an unappealing bowl of watery porridge. Although most of the meals are good, breakfast is not always amongst them.

The path starts steep and rocky and in some areas we have to scramble over the rocks, but eventually the trail becomes more undulating.




The weather is constantly changing from hot and sunny to damp and cold, then back again. The views are absolutely fantastic as we climb up above the clouds. They look like a big quilt you can jump and bounce on. In the distance, we can see

Mount Meru which is 4600 metres high, the same height as we were trekking to today.

We arrive at Lava Tower after a 4.5 hour walk. I feel fine considering the previous night. The only thing is my ribs hurt and one of the guides thinks it's the position of my rucksack, so we sort that out ready for the next part of walk. There is an hour to rest



during which time we have some lunch and a hot drink. The doctor checks us all. I feel tired but no signs of altitude sickness. My heart rate and oxygen levels are good. It's important that you drink as much as possible to stay hydrated avoiding your nasal passages drying out, and to keep an eye on the colour of your wee to ensure your kidneys are working correctly. Liquid





The walk down to Barranco Camp is steep and rocky and more than once I nearly fell. We come across some Elephant trees. The myth is that hundreds of years ago a herd of elephants wandered

onto the mountain but were unable to get off; a magic man seeing their struggle turned them into trees so preserving them. The clouds follow us and after 3 hours we arrive at a large spread out camp. This is Barranco Camp. It's impressive and a dried-up river bed marks its boundary. Behind it though stands the equally impressive Baranco Wall. This is 257 metres high and we have to climb it tomorrow.

That is for next time. Take care friends.



PUBLIC URGED TO STAY ALERT

Norfolk Police Chief

24 May 2017

Norfolk's chief police officer has urged people to go about their daily business, while being alert to suspicious activity.

It comes as police respond to the national terror threat level being raised to critical.

Armed officers have been deployed to key locations in both counties, in particular crowded areas with high footfall such as the city centre, to provide visible reassurance.

It comes after the Joint Terrorism Analysis Centre raised the threat level last night - meaning an attack not only remains highly likely but a further attack may be imminent.

Chief Constable Simon Bailey said: "The public would expect us to respond appropriately to this raised threat level and the deployment of armed officers is our primary response to this.

"Norfolk is a safe county and this additional policing is about providing a visible reassurance to the public.

"I would encourage anyone who sees those officers carrying out patrols to approach them, speak to them and support them because when incidents happen like those witnessed in Manchester and in Westminster, it's those officers who rush to the scene to help, at a time when everyone else is trying to get away. I know they would appreciate the support."

Military personnel are not currently being deployed in joint patrols with police officers in crowded places - but the threat assessment is continuously under review.

Officers are also reviewing security plans for a number of events in the coming weeks.Mr Bailey added: "I would urge people to go about their daily business as usual, but be extra vigilant and report anything you think looks out of place."

Members of the public are asked to remain calm but alert - if you see anything which causes you concern, then call the police immediately. Look out for anything that seems out of place.

Q&As

The national threat level has been raised to 1. 'critical' - what does this mean?

The Joint Terrorism Analysis Centre raised the threat last night (23.5.17) meaning an attack not only remains highly likely, but a further attack may be imminent. In response to this heightened threat the public will see an increased policing and security presence across the county and at key sites and other crowded places to help protect communities.

What does this mean specifically for Norfolk?

Norfolk remains a safe county and any additional policing is about providing a visible reassurance to the public.

3. Are military personnel being deployed in joint patrols with police officers across Norfolk?

Military personnel are not currently being deployed, but the threat assessment is continuously under review. We will be patrolling some of the key locations in the city and town centres as well as other places that have a high footfall. They will be carrying weapons and are there to provide reassurance whilst

remaining approachable. We would encourage anyone with questions about what their role is to go and speak to them.

4. There are events coming up – are these safe to go to?

Our officers from the event planning team and protective security experts will be working with event organisers and the multi-agency Safety Advisory Groups to ensure that venues have appropriate security measures in place.

5. Will these events still go ahead now that the threat level has been raised?

Some public events may be subject to cancellation. Please contact your event organiser or check details online before attending large events such as sports matches and concerts.

6. What do I do if I'm going to one of these events?

Allow extra time in advance of attending public events as heightened security measures, such as searches, may be implemented. Please be patient while these important checks are made by a police officer or authorised security representative.

7. What is your advice to members of the public to keep safe?

Norfolk Police and our partners are doing everything we can to prevent an attack and to protect the public, but communities can take steps to help protect themselves. We urge the public to tune in to national/local news bulletins and to follow the @NorfolkPolice Twitter account for advice and information about keeping safe.

8. What do I do if there is a terrorist incident in Norfolk?

If you are caught up in a firearms or weapons attack we urge you to stay safe by following the 'RUN. HIDE. TELL.' advice. If you come under attack we advise you to:

- RUN, if you can;
- HIDE, if you can't run;
- TELL, when you can, the police what's happening. The police can get help there quickly to stop the threat. Also tell others of the threat so they don't approach danger.

9. What do I do if I suspect someone is involved in terrorism?

We ask the public to remain calm but alert – if you see anything which causes you concern, then call the police immediately on **999** or the anti-Terrorist Hotline on **0800 789 321**. Look out for anything that seems out of place, we would rather investigate concerns which come to nothing, than hear that an incident could have been prevented.

All information passed to the police through the anti-Terrorist Hotline is treated in the strictest of confidence. It is thoroughly analysed and researched by experienced officers before, and if, any police action is taken.





HEACHAM PARISH COUNCIL NOTICEBOARD

PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS IN BRIEF

Cheney Hill Development: The revised application is still to come before the Borough Council planning committee.

South Beach Road parking: Congestion continues to be a major issue. The Police have suggested a clearway of the verge order, as used at Bawsey. Cllr Parish had approached Highways about this and had been informed that this would cost £5000-£8000 and the process could take 18 months.

Footway lighting: The conversion of the village's lighting stock to LEDs continues. This is taking longer than anticipated due to delays in the manufacture of the new units.

Skatepark graffiti: The Council is to commission a local artist to graffiti the Lodge Road end of the Recreation Ground skatepark. It is hoped that 'professional graffiti' will stop the non-professional, offensive type of graffiti.

Beeken's garage: The Council continues to receive complaints about parking on the footway, and in the Station Road layby outside Cunningham Court, associated with this business. The Police are to be asked to take action.

Neighbourhood Development Plan: Mrs Raby reported that the Heacham Parish boundary had been approved as the area of the Plan. Information was being gathered prior to a public launch, informed by findings from the Council's earlier village survey.

Co-option: The Council was pleased to co-opt two new members, bringing the number of Councillors back to the full complement of 17. The new Councillors are Mr Kevin Patience and Mr Mike Trebbick. Mr Patience has been a postman for 28 years and has lived in the village for 34 years, helping with village football and the Heacham Horse Show. Mr Trebbick, who runs a business in Lincolnshire, has lived in the village for 13 years and has been involved with the Social Club and takes an interest in planning matters.

Rubbish and dog bins clarified: Litter bins are for litter, dog bins are for dog waste. Dog waste can also be double bagged and put in your own black bin.

Old Friends Hall Photographic Show: Please do support this local photographic showcase. The show is on Saturday 26 and Sunday 27 August and if you would like to show your work you can pick up a registration form from the Parish Council Office.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING



The Annual Parish Meeting was held on 16 May. The minutes of last year's meeting were approved and matters arising noted. The Chairman reported on events of the last year including the sad loss of Tracey Swann, the retention of School Crossing Patrols, the Hopkins Homes roundabout and the Lidl planning application. He noted the Council's intention to adopt a Neighbourhood Plan and continued involvement in the Wash East Coast Management Strategy forum. The Clerk gave the financial report, showing that the Council's financial situation was healthy. There were reports from Ward Members and village organisations. Presentations were given on the new Community Building Project and Neighbourhood Plan. Parishioners items for discussion included the poor quality of the Borough Council's grass cutting, rural crime, buses, 'No cold calling areas' and Borough recycling.
