They then use their bus passes to get a free ride into Hunstanton or King's Lynn from the bus stop on Lodge Road.



They park in such a way that it causes a narrow chicane in the road, making it very difficult for large vehicles like ambulances, fire engines, minibuses, bin lorries or delivery vehicles to get through.

Some of the parked cars could make use of the allocated parking spaces to the rear of the properties, but the drivers are just too lazy to walk.



Something needs to be done before it is too late.

I thought you might be interested to hear about my recent trip down Memory Lane.

I recently celebrated my birthday (84th) while on holiday with my son and family in Norwich. He took me to Heacham for the day as I have vivid memories of the time I lived there during the war.

With my mother, Rose Letter, and my brother Kenneth, we moved to Heacham about 1940/41 while my father was serving



in the R.A.F. At first, we had rooms with Mr Bittsen and Laurel in Lodge Road, alongside the park near Benstead's the bakers shop (now gone). Miss Fielding, a schoolteacher, lived next door. We then moved to a house further along the road and later to the house behind and over the shop on the corner

the shop on the corner of Neville Road (builders were working on it when I called). Although the village has grown considerably, I was delighted to find that these houses are still there. I also found the school we attended but could not find the Wheatsheaf Pub, a prominent landmark at the entrance to the



Wheatsheaf Pub, a prominent landmark at the entrance to the village at that time. I then learned that this is now a Tesco's supermarket.

We moved back to our



home in Essex but when the doodlebugs started bombing the UK my mother sent me back to stay with my aunt, Mrs Emma Crisp, who lived at 'Ellerslie', Wilton Road, and my cousin Malcolm. My uncle, George Crisp, my mother's brother, was also in the R.A.F. I also remember two very young Canadian pilots

and their wives were billeted with my aunt. They were stationed at Bircham Newton. Sadly, one of them did not return from a mission. The house is still there too.

A very enjoyable day.

The Royal British Legion - Heacham

The Royal British Legion provides lifelong support for the Armed Forces Community. They serve members and veterans of the British Armed Forces, their families and dependents, providing social, financial and emotional support all year

round. The Royal British Legion also campaign to improve these individuals' lives, organise the Poppy Appeal and remember the

The British Charity was formed on 15th May 1921, bringing together four national organisations of ex-servicemen that had established themselves after the First World War. By this time, the tradition of the annual Two Minute Silence in remembrance of those who had died had been established. Also, the first ever Poppy Appeal in history was held that year, along with the first Poppy Day on 11th November 1921.

Originally, the main purpose of the Legion was to care for those who had suffered as a result of their own service or through that of a husband, father or son. There were many forms of suffering; the effect of a war reflected on a man's ability to earn a living and support his family, or a war widow struggling to provide her children with an education. These struggles were also included in the lives of those who had come through the war relatively unscathed and therefore they struggled with employment as well.

Due to the War, Britain's economy took a high fall and in 1921 there were two million unemployed. 725,000 of the six million men who had served in the war sadly never returned home, although 1.75 million of those who returned had suffered some kind of disability and half of these were permanently disabled. There were also families at this time who depended on those who had gone out to war. The wives and children, widows and orphans as well as the parents who had lost sons in the war, who often contributed to the household income.

Lancastrian Lance Bombardier Tom Lister was so moved by the situation that he decided that, if the government was unable to

come to a conclusion about how they could help to improve the lives of ex-servicemen, he would do something himself. And that's exactly what he did, leading to the formation of the British Legion we know today.

At the moment, The Royal British Legion are hoping to have their own branch at Heacham. Colin Toule is organising the Heacham Sub Branch to return from King's Lynn to Heacham.

I spoke to Colin, who is part of the branch from King's Lynn Royal British Legion. He commented, "It's my intention to get enough members to join Heacham British Legion to bring it back to where it belongs after around twelve years."

In order to do this, Colin will need to get enough members for the Heacham Sub branch. He aims to bring more of a social side to the Heacham British Legion with various ideas on how to do

New Brown Bin Calendars

Residents with brown garden

waste bins will soon receive a new 2-year calendar under their bin lids, which will show the collection dates for their brown bin.

Formerly, the calendar ran from January to December, but will now run from August 2017 to August 2019 instead. The new calendars will not affect or change the brown garden waste bin service in any way, and collections will remain as they are currently.

The Borough Council's cabinet member for Environment, Cllr Ian Devereux, explained: "Calendars were previously delivered under the bin lids in January. Many residents did not receive them because they hadn't put their brown bin out for collection, as this is traditionally a quieter time in the garden. Delivering the calendars under bin lids in August when people are regularly cutting the grass and pulling weeds, makes much more sense as a greater number of brown bin users will receive the calendar".

The brown bin garden waste service now empties and collects recyclable garden waste from over 25,400 brown bins.

Just a thought....

Many years ago, I had a cat called Raffles. Raffles was 21 years old when he died, but in his very lazy life he enjoyed nothing more than coming into my study in the early morning and either stretching himself across the desk pushing all the papers everywhere, or sitting quietly on my knee and going to sleep whilst I listened to music.

Now during those moments that he slept on my knee he purred, and that purring sound really relaxed me as I talked with God about the day ahead, or people that were needing prayer. In other words as Raffles slept, I was still with God; and being still with God was, and is, a necessity to prepare myself for what is ahead of me.

Psalm 46, has some very wise and wonderful words to tell us 'Be still and know that I am God'.

Be still," says the Lord, "and know that I am God."

When our hearts are quiet—when we are waiting and listening and watching—when we see the world around us—really see it—we know that God is God.

It's as simple as that. The beautiful sunrise, the rain, the stars, the joy of love all these things are reminders that God isn't far away, that life in all its wonder is only an outer garment of God, that God is as close as the breath we take, or the breath we expel, that God is always waiting to reveal himself to those who look for him.

"Be still and know that I am God."

Being still with God is being conscious of His grace, being aware of His presence, and being present when He calls. And this used to happen very often in the early morning with a very needy cat who loved his cuddles and softly meditative music playing in the background.

So wherever and whenever your moment is – bear witness to the words of Psalm 46 "Be still and know that I am God".

Borough Council News

Various issues are stirring the Heacham pot. Missives about the possible loss of trees and over-development along Hunstanton Road found me, even when I was half-way up a mountain, several thousand miles away. There is obviously a lot of local and wider concern. An altruistic solution would be for the piece of ancient woodland in question to be gifted to the village. The adjacent land about to be adorned with 9 houses did realise a significant sum - allegedly about £650K. These houses came about because of a planning inspector's determination that errors were made by the Borough Council and, for a few months, there was no 5-year land supply. Consequently, permission was given for housing development in places where it wouldn't have been given earlier and wouldn't be now. Anyway, whatever your views about the new proposals for the woodland, there is still time to register them on the planning portal.

There have been multiple complaints about businesses apparently operating in ways which inconvenience or hazard pedestrians and road users. These businesses are involved in motor vehicle sales and repair. Concerns have been registered with planning enforcement officers.

Such investigations take time and cost money. The Borough and County Councils have to balance their books and choose where to allocate funds and where to reduce costs. Consequently, I do not get excited or vocal about grass cutting as I know more money spent on that will reduce expenditure on other services. Some people are very worried about speeding vehicles and I do share those concerns as it is, potentially, a life-threatening issue. Measures to try and do something about it will also have to be paid for.

Lidl's site preparation is well underway as clearly indicated by the mud across the full width of the pavement on the A149 and debris on the road itself. This is not supposed to happen and I have raised the issue with planning officers. Meanwhile, take care along the frontage and beware of heavy lorries leaving or entering the site which can suddenly slow traffic.





Andrew Groom from 'Bound for Sound' kept the public entertained for the entire day with his music and updates.








Along the platform edge had been freshly painted white,

36 goals, After leaving Oldham, Colin moved to Huddersfield, then Colchester where he won promotion to Division Three in 1977. He then joined Portsmouth, where he again experienced promotion in 1980, as well as being the country's leading goal scorer. He won the Golden Boot for the Division 4 1979-80 season scoring 27 goals, (17 for Portsmouth and 10 for Aldershot). He left Pompey for Aldershot (Aldershot's record signing at a reported £54,000). He stayed at Aldershot for a couple of seasons, before moving north to join Boston United where he scored 18 goals in as many games, before breaking his ankle and ripping his Achilles tendon. This unfortunately ended his playing career. However in 1987 the Heacham Minors U-16 team of 63-64 got back together again to play the 1987 Heacham Minors U-16 team. The result was a 2-0 win to the 'old boys'. Colin now works for a transport company in Wisbech and is a Director, and the Press Officer of Wisbech Town FC in the Jewson League. Colin's son Mark also played for Wisbech in the 1990s, where else but up-front!

Heacham at Night

October! At Halloween, there will be just 54 days to go to Christmas Day. With that cheery thought don't forget that, on the 29th, the clocks go back an hour – at 2am in the morning if you want to be fastidious.

The Great American Eclipse of August 21st 2017. Yes, I was there, in Casper, Wyoming to be precise. And the sky was clear and it went dark, very dark. The odd star popped out and Venus was visible.

My son and I were in a hotel alongside a rough gopher field at the back of a Wyoming bank, so we set up there along with a hundred or so others. The Sun was gradually reduced to a slim crescent, a spirited soul counted down from 10 and cried out, 'Filters off now!' Up to that point we had been observing and photographing with special solar filters in place on binoculars and cameras. A chain of sunspots provided additional interest. At totality, nothing would be seen through filters so they had to be snatched away.

Totality could, and was, viewed with the naked eye which gave a far wider field of view and a gasp echoed over the gopher patch. It was a magical 2 minutes and 66 seconds. During it I clicked a remote switch for my camera which was mounted on a tripod and tracker. An image is above though I don't expect the detail will be seen – perhaps it will be better on the website where you can enlarge it. At around 1 o'clock and 3 o'clock solar prominences are evident; at about 11 o'clock there are three bright dots which I believe are Bailey's Beads, light shining through valleys on the Moon.

'Filters on now!' After totality, we watched the Sun emerge again or, rather, the Moon slip past it but only for a short while. We were off on our long road journey which would take us to Yellowstone, The Grand Tetons and the Rockies, but that is another story.


Back to Earth at Heacham in a literal fashion – Heacham is around 20 feet above sea level, none of our American trip was below 5,300 and most was around 7,000 feet, extending to 12,000 in the Rockies.

Jupiter is well and truly lost to us this month but Saturn hangs in at least during the first half. It is low down in the SSW / SW and sets by 6.30pm at the end of the month. If you want to see the rings and you are, like me, getting on a bit, make an effort. They are the widest open on the 16th that they will be for a decade or so. After the 16th the view from Earth will be of rings tilting closer to the planet until in March 2025 they are edge on. After that they will open again.

Did you remember to wave goodbye to Cassini? The remarkable craft hung on about 30 minutes longer than I predicted last month. At its demise, there were many sad faces on television and the net.

Neptune and Uranus are the planets to aspire to see this month. Uranus is at opposition on the 19th – in a direct line between us and the Sun so presenting a full face to us. Uranus was discovered by Herschel in 1781 and its orbit doubled the size of the then known Solar System. A keen eye looking into a very, very, dark sky will see a blue dot. Otherwise, good binoculars should reveal it and a telescope produce a brighter, bigger, dot.

Uranus was viewed by Voyager 2 as a pretty boring inactive place but its elliptical orbit has now bought it a little closer to the Sun and the extra energy seems to be 'waking' it up. Uranus could turn out to be another distant surprise. It does have rings like Saturn but they are less extensive and made of dark dust particles rather than glittering ices. It also has at least 27 moons. For pub quiz aficionados, Uranus is the planet which orbits the Sun on its side due likely to a severe bump in the distant past. Consequently, its seasons are a little unusual.





Three asteroids are up and about this month. One of them, Ceres, is now classified as a dwarf planet like Pluto and a spacecraft is still in orbit about it. Vesta and Pallas are true asteroids; Pallas, unlike the other two, has an orbit very inclined to that of Earth's so does not appear so regularly. A dark, clear sky, and at least a good set of mounted binoculars are needed to glimpse them. I have managed to find Ceres and Vesta in the past. Google to find locations and try and avoid all of the astrological references which seem to appear. Astronomy is science, astrology is daft – no apologies.

A meteor shower not affected by moonlight! The Orionids peak on the 21st. These remnants of Halley's Comet will appear to originate just above Orion, harbinger of winter. Look from 11pm BST. Realistically, 5-10 per hour should appear.

For morning people, look east around 6.30am on the 5th or 6th and see very bright Venus almost touching dim red Mars. On the 16th and 17th look again and see a thin crescent Moon and bright Venus with Mars in between. I will hope for clear skies and try and take a photograph. Mars is on the far side of the Sun to us and moves much slower than closer Venus so the conjunction, closeness of the two, is a matter of perspective and separation is quite swift.

Deep sky at night: The Square of Pegasus stands out in the autumn sky. Look south and find four prominent stars. The top right one is a red giant named Scheat which pulses. To the right of the square is Enif. This bright star is a yellow supergiant with a blue companion. Good binoculars should separate them. And 'close' to this star but much further away is M15, a globular cluster of around 100,000 stars. A telescope will reveal some of them.

Close to the middle of the right side of the square is 51 Pegasi (blue arrow on picture above). This is the star with a Jupiter sized planet orbiting closer to it than Mercury does around our Sun. In 1995, it was the first extra solar planet to be discovered. Since then, 3,666 more have been found.

On 20th October, a lump of rock 20 metres across will hurtle past the Earth. It will be visible in binoculars but only from the southern hemisphere. A nudge could make it plummet towards the Earth. What useful task could it accomplish?

And, if you missed The Great American Eclipse 2017, then start planning for The Return - The Great American Eclipse April 8th 2024.

Early darkness beckons.

Are you 'Recycling Right'?

Give your recycling a little bit of love - or in other words - make sure it's clean,

dry and don't bag it when it goes into the recycling bin. This is the message the Norfolk Waste Partnership wants local residents to heed as part of a major push to 'Recycle for Norfolk'.

The revitalised recycling message comes in the wake of national research by the charity WRAP, which promotes the sustainable use of resources. WRAP found that, overall, 64% of households dispose of one or more items incorrectly. Recycling in West Norfolk is easy.

There are 3 simple rules to remember to get recycling right in Norfolk: Clean, Dry, and Don't Bag it.

The recycling awareness campaign reinforces the 3 simple recycling rules in a leaflet which has gone to every Norfolk home during the past month. Posters, radio, television adverts and website information will also remind everyone how to recycle right.

Cllr Fisher, chair of the Norfolk Waste Partnership, said: "Getting recycling right is everyone's responsibility. All of our councils and crews work hard to empty our bins and when they find a recycling bin full of unwashed food containers and, in many instances, used nappies and even pet food, it can be soul-destroying. It is especially unpleasant for the people at our Material Recovery Facility (MRF) who hand-sort Norfolk's recycling material".

There is also a cost when people don't follow the rules on recycling. While it is 33% cheaper to recycle one tonne of material than dispose of it as rubbish, last year Norfolk's district, borough and city councils paid an additional £430,000 to have Norfolk's recycling material cleaned-up before it could be made into new products. If everyone makes sure their recyclable materials are clean, dry and loose and that they are placed in the right bin, it will save money.

WRAP's research also found that almost half (49%) of UK households dispose of one or more items in their general waste

bin when it could be put in the recycling bin instead. The most common items that aren't recycled but can be in Norfolk include aluminium foil, aerosols, plastic cleaning bottles, and beauty product pots, tubs and trays.

Cllr Ian Devereux, cabinet member for Environment for the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk said: "Lots of householders in West Norfolk do a great job of recycling, but we need to encourage everyone to recycle right. The leaflet you'll be receiving soon, and the posters, TV and radio adverts you'll hopefully spot, will be a handy reminder of how easy it is to recycle well. Your recycling just needs to be clean, loose, and dry. It's important that only the right materials go into your green bin; always remember that nappies, takeaway food boxes, and pet waste should go into the black bin".

TAX IMPLICATIONS OF PROPERTY LETTING: PART I BUY TO LET – IS IT WORTH IT?

Why Buy To Let? (BTL)

There are a number of reasons why BTL properties have become an attractive investment in recent years. The turning point was the introduction of the "Assured Shorthold Tenancy" in 1988 which removed the spectre of the protected tenant with a low rent and full security of tenure. Other more recent factors include:

- The reduction in the availability of social housing
- The development of specific BTL mortgages
- Capital for deposits (or property to let) becoming available by inheritance as a result of the passing of the first generation of owner occupiers
- Increased proportion of students who need to rent, but might otherwise have stayed at home or bought their own property
- Increased divorce rates leading to more single person households
- Population growth in the UK generally (up by 8m between 1981 and 2011) and limited numbers of new build homes
- Restrictions on lending criteria making it difficult for first time buyers without a substantial deposit, who therefore continue renting
- Low interest rates making BTL an attractive income earning proposition
- High growth in property values making it an attractive way of achieving capital gains

The "tax" attack on the rental sector

Faced with a strongly growing BTL sector and the realisation that a generation of voters might never be in a position to buy their own homes, or at least not until much later in life than has been the case previously, Governments have brought in a number of tax initiatives to help first time buyers, and others to dissuade BTL investment. It remains to be seen quite how effective they will be, particular since some will encourage the retention of BTL investments, rather than freeing up homes for owner occupation. The relevant tax measures, and the dates at which they apply include:

- Restriction in use of losses incurred in holiday letting (2012)
- Acceleration of Capital Gains Tax (CGT) Returns and payments for non-residents (2015)
- Penal rates of Stamp Duty Land Tax for second homes/BTLs (2016)
- Higher CGT rates for chargeable residential property gains (2016)
- Restriction in relief for mortgage interest for higher rate taxpayers (2017-21)
- Acceleration of CGT Returns and payments for residents (2019)

Is it still worth it?

History has shown that the swings in the level of home ownership and the popularity of letting have been heavily influenced by political decisions, but such change is a very slow process. Unlike many other investments, property cannot be sold overnight and many owners prefer to wait years before making strategic decisions. Governments have tried to slow the growth of the BTL sector but one suspects that this is as much about raising revenue as about helping the next generation.

The fundamentals which underlie the growth in the sector remain, and as long as interest rates stay low and households are formed quicker than new houses are built, the sector seems likely to produce income returns in excess of those earned by cash deposits and capital growth in line with inflation. 





Dear Friends

How are you all? I'm back to continue the story of the Kilimanjaro Trek with Dean after a sad family bereavement and a holiday. So, where were we? Ah yes, Baranco Wall....

Today is another acclimatisation day. We climb up Baranco Wall and up to 4200 metres before descending back down to the camp in Karanga Valley.



Baranco camp nestles in a valley with a dry river bed on its outskirts. It is a large sprawling camp with fantastic views down the valley and the mountain. Standing like a shadow over the camp is the Baranco Wall. It is 257 metres tall and it must be climbed to reach the next camp at Karanga in the Karanga Valley



I awoke that morning to find ice on the outside of our tent and it's freezing again (though we Penguins don't notice!!). Our guide had advised us to prepare for a scramble which will require all our strength and concentration. After a hearty breakfast, we set off towards the wall. On reaching the foot of the wall my nerves are tense as I look up at the path ahead. Thank heavens I will be tucked in a rucksack!! It's rocky and narrow in places. There is a spot called the "Kissing Rock".



It stands out of the wall face. You must hold on with both hands then stretch across the gap planting your boots on the nar-



row path on the other side. The rock is centimetres from your face and you can literally kiss it hence its name. Luckily, we have guides and each other to help. It takes approximately 2 hours for us all to get up and the group is physically tired but the views once we get to the top are amazing.

It's another two hour walk through a valley with a little greenery until we reach our camp for the night. Greedily we tuck into a snack prepared for us of warm peanuts, popcorn and hot chocolate. It's time for a rest and recount our adventures. Tea that night consisted of Cucumber Soup, Rice, chicken and beans, followed by fruit and yoghurt. Not bad to say we are so far up and it must be carried. The air is a little thinner here and we are all tired. The temperature drops quickly once dark and it's important to stay warm and hydrated. After tea, an early night huddled in the sleeping bag. Today's trek has provided both a physical and mental challenge but we have overcome. With only one more camp before the final ascent we will need to dig deep.

Next time, from Karanga camp to base camp 4600 metres at Barafu.
