Local Finances

Interesting points in the latest Parish Newsletter. I talked at length to Tracy Raby at the drop-in session the PC ran about the community centre project, and thought her arguments were very convincing, in spite of the flyer which was then circulating arguing otherwise.

But now the debate seems to be opening up again. Peter Sutton has been involved with parish matters over the years, especially the Parish Youth & Community Project, and he's a man whose opinion I'd respect. He argues quite powerfully in favour of the alternative, cheaper project (Money no object to Parish Council!)

Then there's a letter by a Hunstanton resident about parking charges and restrictions on South Beach Road. He refers to the incident of dangerous parking on a Bank Holiday that I'd previously written about. While I agree that something has to be done about parking down there, I have to agree with him on the charges. I'm recovering, from major surgery, and once I can drive again, would like to take my dog in the car to the beach for a run. But as a resident, paying council tax, I resent having to pay to park down there.

The two letters point out that we seem to be facing parking fees wherever we go these days, that the PC do seem to be quite generous with tax payers' money, and that the council tax is going up again this year.

I remember going on holiday many years ago to Polperro, which had limited parking space. I'm not proposing that visitors should be restricted to park and ride on the edge of the village, as in Polperro, but they did give residents a windscreen sticker to allow them free parking in what space there was.

It would be a nice gesture if our PC were to do the same and, as the Hunstanton Resident points out, concentrate their enforcement on the no overnight parking rules.

The Mayor of Hunstanton Cllr Anthony Bishopp issues a warning to people to take the current Coronavirus pandemic seriously.

Following the announcement and guidance introduced by the government over social distancing, I am appealing to people and businesses to limit social contact to save lives.

This past week the government advised us all to take drastic steps to slow down the spread of Covid-19 which is having a major impact on our community both locally and nationally.

We have been asked to cut down on all unnecessary travel and socialising and follow "social distancing" guidance. We have seen pubs, clubs, cinemas, theatres, restaurants etc. shut down. These are huge steps that impact on our lifestyle. No-one wants to avoid socialising with friends and family, but the reality is we have to.

We must all take notice if we want to reduce the spread and impact of this virus to help our colleagues in the NHS to be able to cope with an increase in demand for critical care.

I am disappointed to see that so many people in Hunstanton are ignoring this guidance and simply gathering in the Town, enjoying the sunshine, oblivious to the concerns for the welfare or the residents of the town. A town that has a considerably high number of elderly residents.

I appeal to everyone in Hunstanton to please stop unnecessary travel and unnecessary socialising because this is the only way we will reduce deaths. We all need to play our part, and do this now.

I am aware that a number of people are coming to Norfolk and using their second homes or holiday homes to seek shelter away from more densely populated areas. This may place an additional burden on local services and I would ask those visitors to ensure that they practise social distancing to prevent the spread of the virus here in Hunstanton.

Many in our community feel they may not be affected by the virus as they are young, or fit and healthy but this virus can be life-threatening to young people too.

We cannot and should not take comfort from the fact that victims are mostly the elderly or chronically ill because they are all human lives and we owe it to those people to limit our activities now. Please think about those vulnerable people who are scared and alone as they seek to take shelter in their homes. Please do everything you can to support them.

I ask you to please speak to your young people, let them know how serious the situation is and the importance for them to limit their socialising too. As young people are sent home from school, please ask them to stay at home and not, as we see, congregating in groups in the town.

These measures will undoubtedly have a terrible impact on the local economy and we all hope that HM Government find ways to support our local industries but I would ask business owners to consider whether continuing to attract groups of people to come together is socially responsible.

My final appeal goes out to shoppers to stop stockpiling food and to think of others as panic-buying continues in response to the coronavirus crisis.

Taking more than you need is making things difficult for the elderly and vulnerable and for frontline workers, such as NHS staff. Please think of those finishing their late shifts and going to a supermarket only to find empty shelves.

Please, we all need to limit our socialising and travelling now so that we can reduce the spread of the virus and save lives. That's how serious this is.

For those of you who tuned into or would like to tune into the **Gospel Hour,** I am delighted to say that it will be back up and running **every Sunday at 10am on the following link:-**




I would like to thank all the people who work so hard in our shops in the village; they put themselves in the frontline of our necessities and we should be extremely grateful to them.

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Development on the 'Saltings' North Beach

The Heacham Newsletter has heard, from a reliable source, that a tourist-based development along Heacham's North Beach is in the pipeline.

It appears that the 'Saltings' which has been under the stewardship of the Parish Council for many years, will become a marina for sea going craft. The implications and the size of investment for our community is enormous. The 'Saltings' has been a natural habitat for decades and the scrapes (shallow lakes) that have been provided by the Council, to increase bio-diversity, will be considerably deepened to allow the mooring of up to 300 craft.

Now the question we asked, was how would access to the sea be achieved? The answer was a mind-boggling solution reminiscent of our great Victorian inventors. In fact the basis of the proposed system could have been seen in several Midlands locations during the 1900s where barges were lifted and dropped between canals of differing heights. The proposal is to construct a channel or cutting between the Sea and the 'Saltings', near the old Coast Guard Watch Post. Then with the use of tracks, a pulley system and two large 'Tubs', best described as landing craft with opening doors at either end. The shallow draft sea going vessels, of up to 40 feet, can be floated into a 'Tub'. The doors sealed and the whole entity hauled up the incline and deposited on the other side into safety and calmness of the inshore lagoon. To see where similar schemes are in use and have previously been used, please Google 'Canal Inclined Planes'. The power source to drive the winches will be electric and, as this is a green project, it will be powered by the installation of a 30-Metre windmill erected onsite.

The implications we believe are great, but what a tourist attraction it might become in its own right. What happens to the wildlife, access along North Beach Road or indeed along the Promenade?

We hope to investigate further and bring you the answers to these questions in the May edition of this publication.

The other night I was sitting in front of the TV when my phone pinged with a message from Google: "Is it you trying to change your password from Pleasantville, Canada?" Tap 'No' and back to a gripping Scandi detective drama.

"Is it you trying to change your password from Pleasantville, Canada?" Tap 'No' and go to make a cup of tea.

And that is a perfect example of why it's important to keep contact details up to date, and it's a perfect example of something very simple with a grandiose geek name: dual-factor authentication, sometimes abbreviated to 2FA.

Put simply, 2FA adds an extra hurdle for someone trying (legitimately or otherwise) to access your account. Something you know – like a password or your mother's maiden name – can sadly be stolen quite easily in this day and age, particularly if you use the same password in different places. So 2FA adds something you have or something you are, like a phone or a tablet or a fingerprint.

It can be as simple as the example above: log in from a new device and the website sends a message with either a number to type in or a button to press to confirm that whoever is trying to login not only knows your password but has your phone. This is something you'll already be experiencing more often when shopping, as banks are already using 'Secure Customer Authentication' to confirm that purchases are genuine.

On the one hand, this is another obstacle to doing what you want to do quickly and easily. On the other hand so are seatbelts, and the millions of people worldwide who wouldn't otherwise still be here probably don't regret losing two seconds every time they set off on a journey.

At the moment only about 5 per cent of online account holders have enabled 2FA, but a recent statistic released by Microsoft might show why it's a good idea: of the over one million Microsoft accounts hacked last year, 99.6% weren't using 2FA. So out of a million people, statistically 50,000 ought to have been hacked but, presumably because of 2FA, only 4,000 of them were

For most people, setting up 2FA is as simple as giving the service you're logging on to your mobile phone number (it tends to be a mobile number because they can't text a code to a landline). It's also possible to install an app on a phone to generate a code to prove you're genuine even if you're logging on from a place with poor mobile signal (like, oh, I don't know, Heacham). I use the Google Authenticator app but others are available.

fly a short distance before letting go of Ruffle.


As though well trained, the handkerchief opened one more time and Ruffle floated down, this time landing next to a large lake.


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

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Chair of West Norfolk CCG wishes patients healthy futures as he steps down from role

The date of the merger of the NHS Norfolk and Waveney clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) and the formation of the new single CCG is nearly upon us. My last day as Chair of West Norfolk CCG is 31 March. The new CCG's west locality team is up and running under our locality director Howard Martin and I will be chairing the last West Norfolk CCG Governing Body meeting on Thursday, 26 March at the West Norfolk Deaf Association building in Railway Road, King's Lynn, at 9-15am.

I will be sad to say good-bye to West Norfolk CCG. I think it has done an excellent job in focusing on the health issues facing the population, and the problems faced by healthcare providers, in west Norfolk. During its tenure West Norfolk CCG has been able to give local support to healthcare providers and has had a greater understanding of the different needs of people living in the west of the county.

Those lessons and ways of working will now be continued as the new CCG will have a locality focus, with specific teams based in key geographic areas, including the west. This will give each area a voice and a dedicated workforce to ensure they can focus on local issues.

Each locality has a Local Delivery Group (LDG) as part of the work to transform health and care services locally. This group is represented by all the providers of healthcare in the area, including voluntary sector organisations and primary care. It also has patient representation and involves social care providers, and in the west, the Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk, which is responsible for so many local services and initiatives. The West Norfolk LDG is an especially vibrant and energised group in which each organisation wants to help the others to deliver the best care possible so we can continue to drive down health inequalities and new ways of working in west Norfolk.

We have supported the new executive team at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital King's Lynn to deliver improvements following challenging Care Quality Commission (CQC) reports in the last two years. That is bearing fruit as there have been some very noticeable improvements at the Trust which we will hear more about at our next Governing Body meeting.

The novel coronavirus continues to receive much attention in the media. A national campaign is underway to promote key public health advice and I would encourage you to look out for these messages and follow the guidance, particularly in regard to hand washing. Do call NHS 111 if you are concerned about your health and please don't visit your GP surgery, hospital or pharmacy if you think you might have symptoms of the virus. You can find out more information about the novel coronavirus on the Government and NHS websites.

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Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

Happy Easter to you all. As I write this, self-isolation has entered the vocabulary and the question of when the Council is affected has arisen. Officers who do the work are all below, well below, 70 years of age but many councillors are not. So, councillors might be prevented from doing a proper job. What difference will it make you might ask? Not a fat lot would be my immediate response.

Almost half the Council are opposition councillors.

The function of councillors is to steer policies and ideas through panels and committees, make recommendations and, most importantly, challenge decisions (which emanate from Cabinet) through scrutiny. Scrutiny can be done in two ways. Sufficient numbers of councillors may request that a decision is referred back to a different panel and that panel may disagree with Cabinet and throw it back to them or to Full Council. Or, recommendations that come forward may be questioned, challenged, at Full Council.

During the last month or so the process of scrutiny, already considered token by opposition groups, is now either thought of as fiction or in the process of becoming so.

Local politics is either Tory or something else. Tories hold the majority on Council; all significant panels and committees are chaired by Tories and a majority of their members are Tories. Effectively, decisions are whipped. All the Cabinet are Tory councillors and what the Cabinet decides is never questioned by Tory Councillors at Council. The only significant and consistent questioning at Panels is from opposition members. The only questioning at all at Full Council is from opposition members. (One Tory councillor occasionally says something).

At the last Council, questioning from the public and from opposition councillors meant that the meeting reached the 3-hour limit set by the constitution. It could have been extended but the leader proposed it was terminated and the Tory majority agreed. Debate was cut off mid-sentence, a motion (to do with climate change) was not heard (again).

The Leader is now proposing that questioning is restricted by time and numbers. Tory councillors will be allocated some of this time and, though they have never questioned before, you can be sure they will do if it further restricts opposition questioning – scrutiny.

There is no digital recording of Borough meetings including Full Council. Consequently, the discrepancies between written minutes and what actually is said, is a cause for concern. I proposed a motion at Council several months ago that meetings should be recorded. It was kicked into touch by the Leader even though the County Council, of which he is also a member, does record. The proposal is supposed to be resurfacing soon.

So, coming back to coronavirus. If panels and Council come down to emails between members, the Y (yes) keys will have it and the N (no) keys will not. Scrutiny will move from ineffective to isolated. Spot the difference if you can.

Enough of this politics. Has anything happened of great significance to yourselves? No, not really. The Environment Policy, covering all sorts including climate change, plastics, trees, house building and developments etc etc, is slowly, so it is said, coming to a conclusion. The Local Plan Task Group is being thorough considering the ramifications of various policies emerging for the new Local Plan. The mix of houses is becoming

more important. Energy generation and efficiency is being taken seriously though there remain market limitations – cost - as national dictats and building regulations are not changing fast enough. The proposed Gaywood development, 380 homes, will all be fitted with photovoltaics or air source heat pumps; they will be available to rent, buy, shared ownership etc. Various national grants for town centres are being chased which, if successful, will mean something for Lynn.

Locally, not a lot. Heacham awaits movement on Cheney Hill, still; a few minor applications court controversies and, as always, discussing proposals with the Parish Council would help. Parking charges at South Beach were reconsidered following my request but no answer has been forthcoming.

Sedgeford was quiet but I have this minute been informed that a consultation is to begin on the proposed closure of the primary school from 31st August. It remains to be seen if either Sedgeford or Fring will benefit from national budget proposals re buses. I doubt it but will pursue that with County Councillors once more is known.

Last thing. I will be interested to hear of the impact of the corona virus on local businesses – problems or opportunities – will all of England holiday in Heacham and Hunstanton this year to avoid stranding in foreign parts? In which case, the sewage system will be tested.

Another recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

Vegetable Soup

I did think about a cake recipe for this month but decided a nourishing soup would help our bodies fight viruses more than cake; also I have

now made it in my new soup maker.

Firstly, on the hob:

Approx. 230g / 8oz. Cabbage a medium size carrot a medium size parsnip a medium size potato 1 Vegetable stock cube Salt and pepper Knob of butter Medium size shallot

Method:

Dissolve stock cube in 500ml /1pint hot water.

Remove and discard outside leaves of cabbage, trim off and discard discoloured area of base of stalk cut away stalk and place in a bowl of cold salted water, slice leaves thinly and leave in bowl with stalk.

Peel and trim carrot and parsnip and cut into small pieces. Peel potato and cut into small pieces.

Rinse cabbage stalk and cut into small pieces. Peel and slice shallot Put butter into a saucepan and over a low to medium heat soften butter then add shallot Mix well. Cook for I minute stirring continuously.

Add carrot, potato, cabbage stalk and parsnip to saucepan, pour in stock stir and mix well, bring to boil, reduce heat, cover and leave simmering gently.



Rinse cabbage leaves and add to saucepan, stir well, bring back to boil, reduce heat, cover and leave simmering for 25 - 30 minutes or until vegetables are fairly soft. Season to taste.

Strain off liquid into a jug. Put vegetables into a suitable jug or bowl and whizz with blender until soft. Carefully return liquid to pureed vegetables in a saucepan, stirring gently to mix well. Reheat, serve and enjoy.

And in my Soup Maker:

My soup maker is a Morphy Richards. From asking around I feel this is very popular. Mine is the compact one with a min of 800ml and a max of 1000ml. I found the above quantities reached above the minimum line so I used slightly less:

Approx. 200g / 7oz. Cabbage Approx.170g/6oz. Carrot A medium size potato 1 Vegetable stock cube Salt and pepper Medium size shallot

I was using a sweetheart cabbage so didn't use a parsnip as I felt it would be sweet enough.

Method:

Remove and discard outside leaves of cabbage, trim off and discard discoloured area of base of stalk. Slice rest of cabbage thinly and place in a bowl of cold salted water.

Peel and trim carrot and cut into small pieces. Peel potato and cut into small pieces. Peel shallot or onion and slice thinly.

Place carrot, potato and onion into soup maker.

Rinse cabbage in cold water and put sufficient into soup maker to reach min. line. Add stock cube and 400ml cold water, this should not pass max line. Set to smooth or chunky setting and leave it to do its stuff.

Heacham at Night

Spring has sprung, grass needs cutting and the birds are nesting so leave the hedges alone.

Self-isolation will provide many of you, including me, the excuse to look at the sky more often. This month allows you to catch up with Venus. It has dominated the evening sky for several months and will continue to be a lantern in the SW during April.

It is so bright that it dazzles in a telescope and, in order to observe its phase, you either have to use filters or look at it at twilight when there is still some blue in the sky – the contrast is less. Venus is moving towards us (relatively speaking) and its phase will change from half to crescent. Maximum brightness is on 28th April when it will be visible until after midnight.


There is a special event on the 3rd April when this edition appears so I should have told you last month. Venus passes the Pleiades star cluster and it will be surrounded by bright stars. The effect will still be seen on the 4th but not so well. If you miss this, then go for Venus and the crescent Moon on the 26th



The Pleiades, Messier 45, are a cluster of 'new' hot, bright, blue stars which illuminate the nebulae gases around them; an excellent sight in binoculars. The brightest star,

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On the 8th April the Full Moon will be the brightest of the year. It is one of the four 'Super Moons' this year. They occur when the Moon is at a distance of less than 367,607 km. The previous night, the Moon is at perigee, closest approach, at 356.900 km. On the 8th it is a tad further away at 357, 029 km. It will appear almost a third brighter than the faintest Full Moon (occurring when the Moon is furthest away). These changes in distance are due to the elliptical orbit the Moon describes. It is almost circular but not quite; no orbits are.



Other planets easily visible are morning objects again. Look low in the SE at around 5.30 am to find Jupiter, Saturn and Mars. The Moon is just

below them around the 15th and 16th.

Meteor showers are back. The Lyrids peak on the 22nd in the early morning though the night before, the 21st, will do for most of you. For once, there is no moon light to wash them out, so all we need is a clear night. They are not so prolific as some showers, maybe 18 / hour, but some of the meteors will leave persistent trails. They are the remains of the comet Thatcher. Look NE for the radiant, the point they appear to come from. This moves higher as the Earth turns and is at about 60 degrees above the horizon by 3am on the 22nd. Meteors can appear in any part of the sky and lying on a recliner, looking up, is your best bet.

A telescope object to try for is the minor planet or asteroid, Vesta. This passes over the top of the Hyades star cluster in the middle of the month. You need to Google and/or use Stellarium software to pin its position down.



Use the warmer evenings to look at the constellations of stars in the sky. The Plough is an asterism, part of the constellation of Ursa Major, The Great Bear. The pattern remains a favourite as



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it is easily recognisable and it is sometimes referred to as The Saucepan now as ploughs are a little different than they used to be. Americans call it The Big Dipper.



Star patterns have remained more or less the same for several thousand years but, as stars move in different directions and speeds, patterns will alter and the sky in the distant future will look different. very However, all the stars that make up Plough, except Dubhe and Alkaid, are about

the same distance from us and are all moving in the same direction, so it will be more or less recognisable for a very long time

The star at the middle of the 'handle' is Mizar. Good eyes on a clear night will discern that it is a double star. Binoculars will split the pair easily and Alcor, Mizar's companion. will be revealed.

All the individual stars you see are within our own galaxy, the Milky Way. This is part of a Local Group of about 80 galaxies (a new one was just identified). The Andromeda Galaxy is the biggest member of this group and has its own cluster. The Milky


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Way is second largest with its own cluster; both clusters are moving towards each other.

The Local Group is part of the Virgo Supercluster of 2000 very large galaxies. The Virgo cluster itself can be seen in the constellation of Virgo immediately south of The Plough and about half way up the sky. A small telescope on a clear night will reveal many fuzzy blobs.



The gravitational force from the Virgo Cluster which ensnares our own Local Group emanates from a distance of around 60 million light years.

No matter how far away from each other astronomical objects are, they never achieve isolation because there is always some way they can connect. May the Force be with you.



But judges still had another accolade to present to the park, and it came in the form of a very special individual honour for its director Paul Searle.


In front of VIP guests from across the two counties, Paul received the Outstanding Contribution Award for his longstanding services to the tourism industry.

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Hunstanton Town Council implements additional measures during coronavirus pandemic

Currently there are no known or suspected cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) in Hunstanton, but in the light of the most recent advice from the Government, the town council is taking a proactive approach to mitigate the risk of the virus to help ensure all members of our community stay as safe and healthy as possible. These are some of the measures already implemented:

- Hand sanitisers have been installed at the entrance to all our public buildings and visitors are urged to use them on entering and leaving.
- The Annual Town meeting originally scheduled for Friday 17 April has been deferred to Friday 29 May 2020 and the Saturday Car Boot sales originally intended to begin on Saturday 11 April will be deferred to Saturday 6 June. All dates are subject to further advice from the Government.

If you have a new continuous cough - this means you've started to cough repeatedly - and a high temperature (you feel hot to touch on your chest or back) you need to stay at home for at least 14 days and so do the rest of your family if they live with you.

DO NOT go to a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital. You do not need to contact 111 to tell them you're staying at home. Testing for coronavirus is not needed if you're staying at home.

If you feel you cannot cope with your symptoms at home, your condition gets worse or doesn't improve after 7 days then use the **online 111 coronavirus service.** You should only call 111 if the online service can't help.

Hunstanton Town Council will be constantly monitoring the Government websites for more information and will publish regular updates on Facebook and on the Town Council website.



BUDGET 2020 'STABILITY TODAY' AND 'PROSPERITY TOMORROW'

In a nutshell, the Budget on 11 March 2020 was one of the most extraordinary in recent memory. The first Budget of the decade, and the first one in 50 years outside of the EU. It marked a significant swing in economic policy from austerity coming to an end to a level of "borrow & spend" that nobody would have imagined possible from a Conservative government.

The new Chancellor came across well, articulate and brimming with "Getting it done?" enthusiasm, seemingly having the full attention of the House.

Wherever you go, the Coronavirus is at the forefront of everyone's mind – and this Budget was no different. The Chancellor acknowledged the significant impact of Covid-19 on people, place, business and public services. His "temporary, timely and targeted" measures all spoke of a government that is willing to intervene and do "whatever is necessary".

Given that they are likely to be the hardest hit, small and medium sized enterprises were a primary focus with access to cash and staff support at the forefront. Businesses with less than 250 employees will have 14 days of statutory sick pay for employees who are off work with the virus refunded by the government. The "Time to pay" scheme is to be scaled up, with a dedicated phone line and 2,000 HMRC staff to man it. A new temporary business interruption loan scheme will be put in place but we need to understand how quickly and effectively these loans can be administered as cash flow pressure is day to day, and taking 14 or 30 days to receive funds may be too late.

The Chancellor announced a temporary abolition of business rates for small businesses in retail, leisure and hospitality with premises that have a rateable value up to £51,000. This means that those sectors likely to be hardest hit by self-isolation measures, such as shops, restaurants, bars, gyms, and cinemas, will see their Rates bills fall. Additionally, small businesses who do not pay business rates as a result of receiving Small Business Rate Relief, will receive a £3,000 cash grant to help smooth their anticipated cash flow pressures.

For individuals, there were a range of measures to provide security and support to those who need it most, including Statutory Sick Pay from day one of absence from work due to the virus (or Employment Support Allowance for the self-employed).

After he announced the special Coronavirus measures the Chancellor moved to the main business of the Budget, including:

- There wasn't much in the way of announcements on Personal Tax and National Insurance. The increases in the NIC thresholds will be worth £104 to most employees and £75 to the self-employed. There were no changes to personal Income Tax Allowances and Rates: the 2019/2020 figures continue for a second year, as expected.
- The tapered pensions Annual Allowance Charge thresholds will be increased by £90k each, which should help mitigate Income Tax liabilities for higher paid employees in a salary and contribution windfall year.
- Corporation Tax rates are to be held at 19%.
- Entrepreneurs Relief was not entirely scrapped but the Lifetime Allowance was cut back from £10m to £1m for disposals on or after Budget Day.
- Structures & Buildings Allowance was increased from 2% to 3% with effect from 1 April 2020.
- VAT Zero rating of books and printed matter was extended to e-equivalents from 1 December 2020

- Fuel duty was frozen for the 10th consecutive year.
- Fuel subsidies for "red diesel" will be scrapped "for most sectors" in 2 years' time agricultural, rail and non-commercial (e.g. domestic heating) will be excluded, but concern has been raised by the Construction Industry as it has been suggested that this measure will add c.£3k to the cost of a new house.
- There will be no delay to the implementation of the Construction Industry VAT Reverse Charge which will come in as planned on 1 October 2020.
- The Revenue's standard Home Working deduction has been increased from £4 p.w. to £6 p.w., but it is unclear as to whether this will only be available for permanent home working or whether temporary homeworking arrangements whilst the Coronavirus crisis continues will qualify.
- The Capital Gains Tax Annual Exemption for 2020/2021 will increase to £12,300.
- There will be no delay to the new rules for reporting and paying Capital Gains Tax on chargeable residential property, so the deadline becomes 30 days.
- Total investment in flood defences will be doubled to £5.2bn over the next 5 years.
- £640m will be made available for "nature for climate fund" to protect natural habitats, including 30,000 hectares of new tree planting.
- More than £600bn is set to be spent on roads, rail, broadband and housing by the middle of 2025, representing the largest capital investment in infrastructure for generations.
- £2.5bn will be made available to fix potholes and resurface roads over 5 years.
- The ISA allowance remains at £20,000 p.a. but the Junior ISA and Child Trust Fund investment limits were increased materially from £4,638 to £9,000 to encourage saving for the younger generation.

Budget 2020 had been anticipated with some foreboding by tax practitioners. Several advisory bodies had recommended root and branch reviews of Capital Tax reliefs and there was a feeling that a new government with a clear majority for the next five years, and plenty of energy, might have taken the strategic opportunity to deal with the bad news first, keeping more palatable announcements for later.

In the event, and with the threat of economic disruption from Covid-19 looming, hardly a single one of the predicted, or feared, adverse changes came about.

All in all, it was a remarkably benign Budget designed to stimulate the economy and prevent Covid-19 tipping the economy into a deep recession. However, sooner or later there will be a financial reckoning, so, beware: "spend today, tax



tomorrow". Hence we all need to be braced for the Autumn 2020 Budget as somebody is going to have to pay for all of this!

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Making the Most of Modern Life with an **Ancient Form of Exercise**

Life today can be very busy and stressful. Lots of us have roles and responsibilities that can weigh us down. Work, caring roles, not having enough time in the day, feeling low in terms of energy and mood.... These will help adults with restricted mobility, balance issues, or those who cannot do traditional weight bearing exercise. These classes will give some of the many benefits of yoga to a new group of people helping to increase their energy levels, boost low mood, improve stamina and strength, reduce muscular and joint pain, slow down the ageing process, aid weight loss and better sleep and also boost immunity.

With the current concerns about coronavirus, many people (especially those from vulnerable groups) may worry about attending group classes in public locations. This is where the ancient form of exercise can be combined with technology as I can video classes, or instruct people using FaceTime! If you have children who would like to do yoga I can recommend Cosmic Kids Yoga on YouTube where you can find lots of stories, breathing exercises and mini-meditations...it may be just the thing if the school holidays are extended and you have bored and restless kids on your hands!

So, perhaps after reading this you may think about trying yoga at home? My top tips are:-

- Always listen to your body don't push too hard and adapt poses to suit you.
- Create a warm, comfortable space to practice your yoga and use a mat so that you don't slip.
- If you are a beginner take advantage of videos online to help you learn - there are lots of different styles of yoga so there's bound to be one to suit your needs.
- Always end with a calm, quiet time (either a meditation or guided visualisation or relaxation).
- Don't worry about not having an hour to practice ...just do a little bit as often as you can, even 10 minutes can help you de-stress.

And finally...relax and enjoy yourself! I am a great believer that exercise should be fun, not a chore.
