Old Dairy Site

It is very disappointing to see although we are not having the grandiose scheme at the Old Dairy site as originally planned and was expected by Heacham residents, we can not have have anything else, even something beneficial to trade and costing the Parish much less. The recent village survey 'vote' for an alternative feature to be added, favoured the much-needed central village car park and clock tower proposal, which caught the eye and inspiration of almost all who completed the survey and which was also part of the original plans.

As seen recently in the news (EDP 10 May), Norfolk and Waveney are planning to remove the second home owner's discount and may even impose an extra levy in a bid to address fears that villages are being ruined by the large numbers of empty homes. After all, empty homes do not bring business to our local shops. Shops who have sadly closed not only because of the pandemic, but because of a lessened footfall.

A central village car park/square could host events all through the year attracting people to our village. This would generate extra income for local traders and bring life into the heart of the village, benefiting locals and visitors alike.

I would also like to see the Parish Council consider allowing and proposing more of the current mobile home sites to be open for 11 months of the year, which would allow the owners, the opportunity to enjoy this beautiful part of the country for more of the year. This simple change would no doubt provide an increase to local revenue, helping local traders to remain open, again benefiting both locals and visitors.

Joint Statement in support of the Heacham Neighbourhood Plan which is subject to a Public Referendum on 16th June 2022.

We fully support the content and purpose of the Heacham Neighbourhood Plan which will enable villagers to have significant influence over any planning applications in Heacham. The Plan reflects the interests and concerns shown by residents at numerous consultations.

Having a Neighbourhood Plan also benefits the village financially. It will receive 25% of Community Infrastructure Levy funding, rather than the 15% it does currently. CIL is levied on almost all development which is considered fixed.

The Borough Council recognises the importance and status of Neighbourhood Plans in the Planning Process and encourages them to be written. It provides technical support and advice throughout the several years it takes for them to be completed.

Heacham Park

We bought Heacham Hall and Heacham Park during lockdown and have been gradually meeting people since lockdown ended. We know many people are concerned that Heacham Park could be developed, and a 300 year-old part of Heacham's heritage lost forever. We have no plans to do that, or to sell, but we'd be horrified if a future owner were to develop the park.

We believe Heacham Park should be preserved for future generations and we would like that preservation to be secured with a legal agreement. After discussions with the Parish Council, we have entered into a legally binding deed of covenant which will prevent either us or any future owner from ever developing Heacham Park. 
Only the beneficiaries of the covenant can agree to change this in future, and they are listed as everyone owning a house or land in Heacham, the Parish Council and the Borough Council. Neither us nor any future owner will be able to develop the Park.

We are also keen to discuss ways of letting local community groups benefit from Heacham Park - we're speaking to the Parish Council, and would love to hear from anyone else with ideas.

Making sense of the Chaos

So much has been happening around us. The politics, the Covid and the War. As if that is not enough, the rising costs of energy and fuel catapulting the cost of living beyond the means of many working people in the country. We can handle pressure, but too much can be unbearable. It must be acknowledged that there has been so much goodwill among people towards each other and to those needing our support. The support towards Ukraine and refugees for example. The resilience of the human spirit is amazing. I have managed to visit a few coffee mornings in Heacham and in neighbouring villages; people have come together to chat, to share and encourage one another. If we needed hope, it is there in abundance; that hope is in each of us and our ability to defy the odds, not to succumb to despair due to the battering of circumstances around us. It goes a long way to show the gifts we have despite the vicissitudes. Yet we still struggle, each of us has their own struggles, we are driven to despair sometimes as we fail to find meaning in the chaos.

Easter is that period of hope amid chaos, it is a season of turnaround from death to life, purposelessness to meaning and hope. Christ's resurrection and his appearances transform our experiences and circumstances and so our direction. This hope is available to ordinary people, anywhere. The women who had gone to anoint his body, having totally forgotten about all he had told them. The disciples who were locked behind their doors, in fear, a bunch of deserters, who had left him alone to die on Thursday evening. Or the two disciples on their way to Emmaus. Peter and friends had gone back fishing. Easter is about Christ who follows us, meets us despite our failures, our weaknesses, doubts and fears. Circumstances of life, sickness, a misfortune, a battle with an addiction, for some people events at the world stage, can drive us to anger and frustration, to retreat to despair and a life of purposelessness.

The risen Christ walks with us, sometimes silent, or as a stranger who chats with us, or a gardener waving at us. Christ shares our moments of pain and is patient to listen to us wherever we are. The good news is not that he did it in history, but that he can do it anytime to all who call on him. As churches together we are grateful that we had opportunities to meet each other and share the good news of Christ at Easter.



Heacham at Night

NEWSFLASH reminder, 1st June early morning, Comet Schwassman-Wachman-3 may produce a spectacular meteor shower.

June and the 21st brings the longest day and shortest night, the Summer Solstice, Midsummer's Day. The Solstice is actually a point in time when the Earth under your feet is most tilted towards the Sun. It occurs at 10.13am BST this year.

June is a time of almost persistent twilight, with sunrises at around 4.30am and sunsets around 9.15pm. On the 21st itself there are 16hrs 51 minutes and 51 seconds of daylight.

After that it slowly goes downhill, or uphill if you like the night sky, turning again on the 21st Dec. And so it has done and will do whatever else happens. And a good job too as most life has evolved to live with seasonal change.

The sky does not get very dark and any moonlight scuppers most observations. The Sun can be looked at with special filters and I

observed several clusters of sunspots in May. These are areas that have a temperature a little lower than their surroundings so appear dark. From them spew coils of Sun contained in magnetic fields. Sometimes these bits of Sun are flung off and occasionally head our way. These coronal mass ejections have been increasingly reported in the news as, if they impact Earth's magnetic field, they result in auroral displays and have the potential to disrupt communications and electrical power distribution.

After the Sun has fallen below the horizon, light from it still illuminates the

atmosphere high above your head. If thin wispy clouds are present 50 miles or so high then they light up and glow. These are called noctilucent clouds and 'tis the season for them. Look North.

14th June. The second best Supermoon of the year. It will look a tad bigger as it is a tad closer and also near the horizon which makes your brain think it is bigger anyway,

The Moon is a good target for naked eyes, binoculars or small telescopes. Choose a night when it half full or below and look along the terminator, the line between the sunlit portion and the dark. Shadows highlight crater walls and mountains; higher magnifications will show the tips of mountains sunlit whilst the



crater they sit in are in shadow. The large flat areas are mares, seas, as early observers thought that's what they might be. We now know they are ancient lava flows likely caused by massive impacts on the farside.



Internet

The farside is something you will never significantly see unless you orbit the Moon in a spacecraft. It is more heavily cratered than the face we are familiar with. Small parts of the edges of this hidden face can be observed from time to time as the Moon slightly changes its position in its orbit with respect to the observer. This is called libration. Overall, about 59% of the Moon's surface is visible from Earth.



A NASA image from an Apollo orbiting the Moon. That's the Earth in the distance.

The reason for this one-sided view is that the Moon is tidally, gravitationally, locked to the Earth and turns once on its axis in the time it takes to orbit the Earth – 27 days, 7 hours and 43 minutes. As this is not a complete number of days (one day is a complete rotation of the Earth), the Moon moves a little East every day and moonrise is 50 minutes later each day as a consequence. Consequently, the Moon can and does appear in the daylight sky.



Whilst you are looking at the Moon through binoculars, look at the dark side of the terminator and you will find you can see a ghostly surface. This is due to Earthshine; Sunlight reflected from the Earth's surface striking the Moon and reflecting from it back to our eyes.

The Moon is a large moon, very large relative to the Earth's size, and it has a major impact upon the Earth. It stabilises its spin so that the seasons and the lengths of days and nights remain pretty constant over millennia. It is the principal cause of sea tides (the Sun contributes) and the intertidal zone, the place of rockpools, was essential in evolution. Its light and gravitational affects enable animal breeding to be triggered and migrations to be made.



Internet.

It has a wobble in its orbit which follows a cycle over about 18 years. Where it is in the cycle affects tidal range and NASA has recently predicted that the mid 2030's will see higher tides just as sea-level rises due to climate change become more significant. In effect, more coastal flooding than earlier thought.

The planets. Nothing to see at night. The gas giants start rising in the early hours. Look to the SE and east. Saturn pops up around 12.30am, Jupiter an hour later. It will be around 4am when either achieves a decent height above this difficult horizon.

26th June, just before dawn, find the crescent Moon. Bright Jupiter will be to its right, dim Mars to its left. On the 26th, a thin crescent Moon will be close to very bright Venus. Look ENE for this promising tableau. Above the Moon will be the Pleiades though you will need binoculars to bring them in to view. If you have a very good ENE horizon then, below and to the left of the Moon, you may glimpse the spark of Mercury too.

And talking of Mercury, on the 23rd, space probe Bepi Columbo will be swinging past it for a second time, losing energy and braking ready for orbiting the planet in 2025. I think my name is on it, deep within a microchip with countless others.

One star to find, Antares. The name means 'rival of Mars' because it is red and bright. Look SSE after sunset. Quite low at first but it rises. On the 13th you will find it just to the right of the almost Full Moon. It is 600 light years away and a red giant nearing the end of its life. A hot core remains but much of the star stuff has expanded outwards and cooled. The core will collapse and explode

as a supernova, All the elements made in the star will be distributed, join with more, and new stars will form from it.

This has been going on for an awful long time. The question is, when will it stop? The answer is linked to the Hubble Constant which describes how fast the Universe is expanding. Recent new physics has determined that the rate of expansion is increasing and an entity known as Dark energy has been proposed to explain that. Now a researcher has revealed that her work demonstrates that the size of the observable universe is not quite as it was thought. Consequently, expansion isn't and the new physics has been a waste of many years thought. This isn't going unchallenged.

$$v = H_0 d$$

v = recessional velocity of galaxy

H_0 = Hubble constant

d = distance to galaxy

V is effectively the rate of expansion of the universe. So, get the distances wrong and that changes. Calculate H incorrectly and expansion is again wrong.

Using an Armature for Sculpture

There are a great many materials and methods that can be used for sculpture. What you choose depends on the design of the project you are working on. Clay modelling is a wonderful technique but it has its limitations when it comes to more delicate, larger or complex forms. For example, a sculpture of a horse would be difficult using clay alone due to the slender legs and the weight of the wet clay bearing down on them. In such a case, you could build your sculpture using an armature.

An armature is a structure on which a sculpture can be built; its carrier. Traditionally it is built using wire and chicken wire but there are many variations on this theme. The size and design of the sculpture you plan to make will determine the best steps in making your armature. If it is well built and sound, this will

make further steps easier and more successful. A weakness in the armature will be reflected in your sculpture.



Pictured above: The wire armature is 'stuffed out' with newspaper for use with paper clay.

Once the armature is built there are two possibilities:

In the first - clay is used and modelled onto the form. When finished, a mould would need to be taken for the sculpture to be cast in plaster, bronze or any other suitable material. Clay when it dries will shrink and crack on the rigid structure of the armature so is not suitable for a direct finished piece.



Pictured right: For these larger scale pieces, steel rods are welded to a metal base. The 'stuffed out' elements use plaster whereas the pure chicken wire element uses 'Ciment Fondu'.

In the second - there are many materials that can be used to work directly onto an armature to create a finished piece. These include papier mâché, paper clay, plaster (including plaster bandages / modroc) and cement. The choice of material depends on the quality of surface you want to achieve and the amount of detail desired.



Art and “Levelling Up”

Social mobility in the cultural industries is a problem. Recent studies have shown that the Arts sector can be “quite socially enclosed” and working-class people continue to be hugely under-

represented: 12.6% in publishing; 12.4% in film, TV and radio; and 18.2% in music, performing and visual arts. There is a prevalence of unpaid work in the arts which is why it can be more like an elite profession rather than an open and meritocratic one. Some believe it’s time to challenge the “old boys’ network” in the creative industries.

It has been suggested from data going back to 1850 in the US that a major determining factor in whether someone becomes an artist is their family’s wealth. The greater the family income, the greater the chances of a person identifying themselves as an artist, musician, author, actor or other creatives. The same study also showed that the annual income for US artists is typically below average for the country, and there are still lesser minorities in the arts, especially in the visual arts and literature, than in other occupations. The same can probably be said for the UK.

The Government intends “to tackle cultural disparities and ensure that everyone, wherever they live, has the opportunity to enjoy the incredible benefits of culture in their lives.” (*The Levelling Up White Paper*, February 2022). The Paper talks about a ‘Renaissance’, and a ‘21st century Medici model’. It identifies six factors that will help drive the levelling. However, at the heart of a 21st century Medici model would be arts and culture, and these are omitted from the central

capitals of the ‘Renaissance.’ To address the inequalities in the creative arts sector, working class communities need to be supported to provide the makers, musicians, the creators, curators and directors.

There is a disproportionate distribution of finances in the art market. Most artists are struggling, whilst a handful of the most popular can sell paintings for huge sums of money. The visual art world is divided between the popular and financially successful artists and auction houses, and the lesser known and struggling ones. “Levelling up” may well produce more artists but will it produce more successful ones who will share in a more proportionate distribution of the art economy?

Two famous modern artists who overcame any social mobility problems – Banksy and Basquiat - had periods as struggling artists and now have their works selling for huge sums. The secretive Banksy allegedly became an artist at fourteen, was expelled from school and served time in prison for petty crime. Basquiat grew up in a solid middle-class home in Brooklyn, neither poor nor uneducated. But he was a street kid who described his family as “highly dysfunctional”.

Banksy and Basquiat: Superstars of Street Art
Lecturer: Ray Warburton

What binds them together is 'street' or 'graffiti' art. Banksy, from Bristol, emerged in the 1990s with a stencil-based approach to street art. Most memorable are large rodents, girls with balloons and flower-throwing freedom fighters. Some see Banksy as a prankster but with increasingly serious cultural or socio-political points to make, as in the picture that shredded itself at Sotheby's in 2018. Banksy remains anonymous despite his popularity.

Basquiat was born in Brooklyn in 1960. On the streets, he made graffiti; but once he moved into Andy Warhol's protective world, he gained a reputation for studio-based neo-expressionist art full of graffiti-like logos and images, with historical and political overtones. Basquiat died of a heroin overdose aged 27.

The lecture will trace their careers and describe their major artworks. Over and above the tag of 'street artist', and despite their very different backgrounds, the lecture will make connections between them and attempt to evaluate their contribution to contemporary art and their status as art Superstars. The lecture will be jargon-free with audience engagement, backed by high quality images.

JANET AND JOHN EVENTUALLY GET IT RIGHT

Readers may remember Janet and John who have been married for many years, have two adult children and several grandchildren, and are reasonably well off, owning their own home worth about £1m, and having a good level of pension income. A couple of years ago they inherited a share portfolio and a cottage from John's parents (now worth about £600,000), which they use as a Furnished Holiday Let (as defined for tax purposes). It is in a popular location and is let nearly every week, but much of this letting income goes on paying the Inheritance Tax (IHT) on that legacy which is being paid over ten years.

In the first instalment of their story, John thought up a cunning plan to avoid Inheritance Tax by simply gifting both of the properties to the children whilst continuing to live in one and draw rent from the other. Fortunately, he saw the local lady accountant at the last minute who pointed out the range of ways in which this course of action would have disastrous results.

After a second meeting with his newly appointed accountant, John has learnt that most of the apparent ways of avoiding IHT have already been anticipated and blocked by the relevant tax legislation. He now knows that he needs to beware of creating a "gift with reservation of benefit" (GROB), where the donor is still deemed to own the asset until such time as the reservation is lifted; that Capital Gains Tax (CGT) and IHT have different rules; and that there is no concept of a GROB for CGT so potentially some value can be caught by both taxes on the same transaction, which seems unfair, and illogical (but so do many things in the world of tax).

However, he also learns some interesting and helpful things. The GROB rules do not apply where the donor pays the donee a market rent to occupy the property; they do not apply to gifts between spouses; and they do not apply where the benefit is minimal – for example, where a property is gifted and the donor visits occasionally (perhaps "housesitting" for a fortnight a year or staying with the donee for up to a month). There is also an exception in the event of a sudden and unforeseen serious illness, where an aged donor moves in with the donee being unable to live alone through old age or infirmity. Finally, there is a more useful relief where a donor gifts part of a property to a donee (typically a single adult child) and they then share the property, each contributing fairly to the joint expenses. He also learns that there are useful annual reliefs for small gifts and also for "regular gifts out of income".

None of these reliefs are of great relevance to John and Janet now, though he stores the information for the future in case there is a change of circumstances. Instead, they decide on a different course of action, liquidating sufficient investments to pay off the IHT and putting the holiday cottage into a Trust for the benefit of their descendants. The investments have not increased in value significantly since they were inherited, so any CGT is covered by the £12,300 Annual Exemption to which each vendor is entitled. Because the cottage is used as a qualifying holiday let, meeting various criteria about the number of let days, the CGT on that disposal can be "held over" so no charge arises until it is sold. Since no individual donee has a right to the property,

the Trustees can control its management and it should be beyond the reach of divorce proceedings – although care needs to be taken with the income distribution policy. The flexibility of the Trust also means that income can be directed to the grandchildren when their needs are perhaps greater than those of their parents.

Overall, and provided that they survive seven years, John and Janet should reduce their IHT bill by about £240,000, or more if they can also utilise the small gift and "normal expenditure out of income" exemptions over the coming years.

All in all, John decides that in future he may pay less attention to his friend in the pub, and that DIY IHT planning is a bit like servicing your own car brakes – easy in theory, but potentially disastrous if it goes wrong.

The other half was pre-CIL. And, no, no news about the Reserved Matters application for that. When it does come to planning committee then the nature of the site will come under Neighbourhood Plan policies – should the village vote for it.

In Downham Market the application for a Lidl was successful. It generates £250K of CIL. No neighbourhood plan means Downham misses out on £27K.

There should be more about neighbourhood plans in this publication including a joint statement from me and Cllr Dark.

Boots Chemist. I raised the concerns about queuing, opening hours and delays a couple of issues ago. I have followed this up at a meeting with the Area Manager. The principal problem is due to difficulty in recruiting pharmacists. Small stores cannot open at all if there is no pharmacist present. Prescriptions have to be checked by a pharmacist and a back log quickly builds up when one is not available.

Efforts have been and are being made to reduce the problem and I hope that Boots will provide an article explaining these in detail. Otherwise, I will update next month. I can say that staff in the

Heacham shop are working above contractual hours, including Sundays, to minimise delays when a pharmacist is there. Note that this is administrative work, the shop is not open on Sundays.

I was also told that recruitment problems extend to counter staff, not necessarily in Heacham, so there may be job opportunities.

Moving Heacham Boots into the vacant shop next door is, apparently, not viable as the income generated would not meet costs. So, some useful use for it needs to be found. If you have any thoughts let me know.

Late last year, Borough Councillors were given £1,000 to spend on useful activities going on in their Wards. Mine went to Heacham in Bloom, the reboot of the Heacham Horse Show and, together with Cllr Dark, one of the football teams. May is the start of the new political year so I have another £1,000 with longer to spend it in. You can come to me with ideas but there is a formal application process on the Borough Council website. Google Councillor Community Grant Scheme King's Lynn.

There are matters which need raising about a number of things but I will leave those to July, after the Jubilee celebrations. Sedgeford Village Hall is doing those in fine style with a beacon lighting, a hog roast, and entertainment. I'm sorry that I will miss that but I want to watch Heacham Beacon afire. Some of you are holding street parties and my best wishes for all of those. I hope the day will be dry though the area, until the time of writing, has been desperate for rain. All important food crops need or needed it.

I now have to get ready for the Mayor making ceremony in King's Lynn. The first confirmed mayor was Robert, son of Sunolph, in 1308 though an earlier one may have been Bartholomew de Beluaco in 1248. A very old tradition.
