## Heacham to Snettisham Coastal Walk


One of our favourite local walks is along the flood bank towards Snettisham and back along the beach.

A jet-ski by its design of smooth hull and lack of exposed rotating parts makes an unlikely seal killing vessel!

I could state from a reliable source that it is fishermen inflicting the wounds to cut the seals free from nets but that would be as outrageous as saying it's a jet-ski.

There are many boats, sea-going vessels into Sutton Bridge, commercial fishing, private pleasure craft even the Wash Monster with exposed propellers that could maim a seal.

But to label a particular water user and publish the letter in the first place without checking the facts is in my opinion irresponsible.

#### Welfare of Seals

I am writing to follow up our recent telephone call where you explained that the people of Heacham were concerned about the welfare of seals in connection with jet-skis and watersports in the area.

I have spoken with our animal care team and am writing to confirm that:

"Jet-skis and watersports are not a cause of concern in relation to seals. Seals tend to avoid and stay far from vehicles such as jet-skis. Most injury caused to seals in our local area is due to plastic pollution, including entanglement in plastic waste as well as ingestion of plastics and microplastics."

We would recommend that those who are concerned about seal welfare and would like to partake in seal conservation make an effort to recycle their waste, buy less plastic products, and perhaps join us for one of our local beach cleans which are run in Hunstanton each month.



## Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

**Celery Soup** 

## Ingredients for 2 generous servings:

4 or more sticks Celery

1 medium size onion

1 medium size potato

Chicken or vegetable stock cube dissolved in 500ml hot

water

Knob of butter

Salt and pepper

#### **Method:**

Trim off, and discard, ends of celery. Clean stalks and slice thinly.

Peel potatoes and cut into small pieces.

Peel onion and slice thinly.

Put butter into a saucepan and soften over a low to medium heat, add onion, stir well. Cook for a minute stirring frequently.

Add potato pieces, celery slices and stock, stir well. Bring to boil then reduce heat, cover and leave simmering, stirring often, for 15 minutes, or until potato is soft.

Season to taste. Strain off most of the liquid into a jug, put aside while you either put vegetables into liquidiser or use a hand blender and whizz until pureed.

Carefully return liquid to pureed vegetables in a saucepan, stirring gently to mix well.

Reheat if required, serve and enjoy.

As I write this, my husband and I are mourning the loss of our beloved dog Leo who passed away 3 days ago. He was 12 years old, his back legs were extremely weak, his quality of life had dipped and we

knew it was time to let him go.

Leo and his mum Lacey came to us just over 10 years ago from Hillside Animal Sanctuary. Lacey was a Rottie and Leo, a RottieX. They'd come from neglect and had been in the sanctuary for 12 months. Nobody wanted the two of them together because Leo was territorial behind a gate (he was, in reality, a nervous and worried dog). The first day we brought them home, we took them to the beach (unleashed), and they never left us.

The bond was instant. Lacey passed away 3 years ago, Leo missed her terribly, she was his confidence. The anguish felt was nearly unbearable, but I sat one day in silent prayer with God, and I knew that emotionally, I had to hand Lacey over to Him completely and let her go into His care.

Now Leo has gone too but we take comfort in the fact that He is with God and has been reunited with his mum. They will both be free from pain, made whole again and once again be playing together how they used to when we first brought them home.

Animals are sentient beings. They feel pain, sorrow, joy, and grief just as we do.

Our pets give us companionship and, for some, a reason to get up in the morning to face the day ahead. They communicate verbally and by body language. They make us smile, laugh and cry. They do not hold grudges or harbour feelings of jealousy. They are faithful, loyal and loving.....Yes, we can learn a lot from animals, they are free from sin.

## DO ANIMALS GO TO HEAVEN?

There are many who don't believe they do (mainly because they don't believe animals have souls). I truly believe they do and so did the late Billy Graham and Martin Luther.

There are no specific biblical references to animals going to Heaven, but we read in Isaiah's prophecy: 'The wolf shall dwell with the lamb and the leopard shall lie down with the young goat and the calf and the lion and the fattened calf together and a little child shall lead them.'

Animals are part of God's Creation, He saved them with Noah and his family by placing them on the Ark. God promises that His Creation will be restored so we can conclude from that, that animals will be part of God's restored Creation. Animals are a blessing from God, why would He not take them into His care?

For those of you who mourn the loss of your pets, they are not far away. Remember the joy they brought to your lives and feel the comfort knowing they are in God's care.



## **Hunstanton Catholic Parish**








## Heacham at Night

On the 23rd, at 2.03am, it is the Autumn Equinox, day and night are equal in length once again. After that astronomy gets easier as days get shorter until the 21st December, the Winter Solstice. I have written sentences like this in the Heacham Newsletter, every September, for around 10 years. Some things never change or do so very, very slowly. I sometimes wonder if my last words on the equinoxes will be to welcome the dark or herald the Spring.

Enough such musings. At the time of writing, we are heading for the second significant heat wave of this Summer, the ground remains bone dry, and the wildlife is suffering. All this is down to weather patterns which are controlled by the Jet Stream which is not following its historical pattern.

Though the Sun provides the heat, it is a pretty constant star with its energy output changing by just 0.1% over a 11-year solar cycle. The current cycle began in 2019. Since then, the Sun has grown more active and this will peak in 2030.

Solar activity used to be measured from Earth observation and was a case of counting sunspots. That can still be done (three small spots observed early August), but there are now several spacecraft dedicated to observing the Sun in wondrous detail and it is they which allow warnings of space weather to be issued. Solar activity means auroras and potential harm to all things electrical. Good auroral display (Northern Lights) was seen off the north Norfolk coast in August.


(A recent article issued by railtrack explained how investigations were proceeding into how a solar storm might change signals on the railway as miles of track make a very good receptor of fluctuating magnetic fields and charged particles – the wrong kind of Sun).

The number of solar flares and coronal mass ejections (lumps of sun stuff thrown into space and, sometimes, headed towards Earth) have certainly increased in the last year as has auroral activity. In May, 37 sunspots were predicted but 97 observed. Sunspots are where all the solar activity is generated through magnetic fluctuations.

A debate about the impact of the variation of solar radiation on climate enjoys periods of warming up and cooling down. About 6 years ago, the University of Northumbria predicted a Grand Solar Minimum in the 2030s which could result in a new little ice age like the one centred around the mid-17th Century. The Maunder Minimum, an historical low level of solar activity, has been suggested a contributor to the little ice age but dust from significant volcanic activity likely had a much bigger impact.

Human activity is the cause of current global warming, the Sun, pulsing a little, adds to or detracts from warming but has a marginal effect on the trend. I will keep my eye out on solar activity and, if an alarm is needed, I will ask for all the bells to be rung in Wallis's cycle shop. If you hear them, line your sun hats with foil and turn off the toaster.

In the first week of August, I made my first, brief observations of Saturn and Jupiter for a long time. They were visible at a reasonable time and I got my new telescope mount to work, almost. Saturn was its usual majestic self, the ringed planet swimming in a void. Jupiter was a tad disappointing as it was



too bright to discern its bands of colour and being quite low to the horizon, was viewed through all the dust in the atmosphere and the heated, turbulent, air. The Galilean Moons were nice to see though and helped me focus as they should appear as sharp points.

Noises off during my observations were the multiple crunching of Spike hedgehog food behind my observatory. However, should anyone like to listen to things astronomical, I recommend Googling 'sound of Saturn, Jupiter' etc. You should find recordings derived from the Voyager spacecraft which flew by the gas giants in the 70s.

Six planets are visible in the heavens this month, 5 of them at night which makes a change.

Jupiter shines all night, rising in the SE and setting in the SW. It will be having a magnitude of around -2.9 and you really can't miss it. It is closest, at opposition, on the 26th at 7.33pm to be precise. Closest means 393 million miles.

The four Galilean Moons, Io, Callisto, Europa and Ganymede are visible as sparks in very good binoculars or a spotting scope. If you only see 3 then one is behind Jupiter. Observation over an hour or two will show movement and over several nights very obvious changes in position. Orbital periods are: Io 1.8 days; Europa 3.6; Ganymede 7.2; Callisto 16.7. Io moves around 70.000km in an hour.

It was such observations, in 1610, that confirmed Galileo's thoughts that the planets, Sun, and stars did not orbit the Earth. Thoughts which he had to publish as a hypothetical story to limit the Church's anger. The Vatican admitted it had erred 350 years later in 1984.

These four moons are worlds themselves. Io is the innermost and has more than 400 volcanos erupting. It is very mountainous and is splattered with sulphur. It is slightly larger than our Moon.

Europa is next and is one of the prime candidates for life as it has liquid water under a thick icy surface, Geysers erupt at its poles. It is a little smaller than our Moon

Ganymede, the third out from Jupiter with a diameter of 5364km, is larger than the planet Mercury. It has a very thin oxygen


atmosphere and, unusually for a moon, a magnetic field. It is also thought to have a vast, underground, salty ocean.

Calisto is the furthest out and the one you might miss in a small telescope even though it is only a little smaller than Mercury. You will be looking towards Jupiter and you need to look for a spark away from the three innermost Galilean Moons. It is the most heavily cratered body in the Solar system.

Rising before Jupiter, but harder to spot, until you have seen it once, is ringed Saturn. From my recent, local observations, find Jupiter, move your eyes around 70 degrees to the right and go up about two fist widths. Look for a faint dot, magnitude +0.4,

which looks different to a star. A good birding scope, will reveal the rings.

has 83 Saturn moons. Ones of note have magical names: Mimas; Enceladus; Tethys; Dione; Rhea and Titan. Classicists will know from whom the names derived. are Enceladus is a better contender for life than Europa.

Titan is bigger than Mercury but smaller than Ganymede. Titan has a weather system with a nitrogen atmosphere, lakes of hydrocarbons like methane and a dry river network which connects them. You might detect the spark of Titan in a good binocular though a spotting scope would be better. It is a long way from the planet. Once, long ago, I captured a simple image of an over exposed Saturn with its larger satellites strung out as blobs.

Uranus and Neptune are both visible all night. Neptune is the most distant planet and both telescope and the sky have to be good to see it. It is at opposition on the 16th so will be at its brightest with a magnitude of +7.8.

Uranus is an enigma, as at times it is bright enough to see with very good eyes in dark skies but the ancients never recorded it. This month it has a magnitude of +5.7 so good binoculars etc should pick it up if pointed exactly at it. Google for directions.

There is a rare event which will help you locate Uranus on the 14th. It will be occulted by the Moon. Occultations are when one astronomical body passes in front of another. You watch its disappearance and, then, the re-appearance.

Look at the sunlit side of the Moon's disc from about 10pm. Use good binoculars to find a blue dot a little above the Moon's 'equator'. As 10.30pm approaches, the dot will close with the Moon and disappear behind it. Re-appearance, at the dark limb of the Moon, is at 23.21hrs when it will be a tad higher.

Mars is a good naked eye object with a magnitude of -0.3 and rises around 10pm. Midnight onwards will find it sufficiently high in the sky and it will be best to leave observations towards the end of the month. It will then be a little north of east. Jupiter will be prominent and higher in the SSE; Saturn will be at a similar height in the SSW.

Look for a reddish dot, binoculars will brighten it. Don't get mixed up with the star Antares which is a little east of Mars and also reddish. Planets don't sparkle. In your binoculars you should also find two-star clusters, the Hyades to the right of Mars, and the Pleiades above it.

Mars is a very busy place with probes orbiting it and vehicles crawling about on the surface. Google live images and you might be the first to spot a Martian.

Venus is the last planet to consider and you need to make the effort early in the month as the Morning Star will disappear into the dawn well before the 14th. You need a very good easterly view as the planet will be close to the horizon. Look from 5.45am. It will be shining with a magnitude of -3.9 which is very bright. Do not use optical instruments as the Sun will quickly follow it into the sky.

Meteorites. I stayed outside, on the 12th August, until well after midnight for the Perseids. Around 12am, I saw 3, perhaps 4. Other years I have started counting at 8pm but the sky, this time, was well washed out by the very bright, large, Full Moon. This shone, blindingly, from the south but Jupiter, to the east, and Saturn to the west were still clear to see. If anyone saw more meteors in the early hours of the 13th August, please let me know.

This month is devoid of significant meteor showers, though there are the Southern Taurids which start on the 10th and finish in November. However, September is the busiest month for random meteors, those not known to be associated with any comet and likely to appear – at random. So, keep looking up. Don't mistake a meteor for satellite trails which are becoming a significant nuisance.

The Moon is the most obvious thing in the night sky unless it's New – the Sun is behind the moon but the alignment is not such as to cause an eclipse. Anyway, the Full Moon on the 10th is the closest to the Autumn Equinox so it is this Year's Harvest Moon. Because moon rise times are almost the same a few days either side of such full moons, light was provided for traditional harvests. Let's hope there is some harvest worth the name this year.

Darkness is coming which I prefer to never ending Sun. Use the warm evenings of autumn to enjoy the night sky. Don't forget to feed up the hedgehogs ready for the winter and, if it continues dry, keep the water bowls filled; birds and insects will use them too.

## SAVE OUR QEH – BEFORE IT'S TOO LATE

The Queen Elizabeth Hospital in King's Lynn was opened in 1980. The roof was constructed in the main by using Reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC) planks, which was seen as an inexpensive way of building a new hospital. The downside of using these was that they are weaker than traditional concrete, and deteriorate quicker. At the time the hospital was built, it was accepted that the life span of the building was approximately 30 years.

Time passed, and 2010 came and went, and there were no plans, no discussion about the hospital roof, and the need for it to be replaced. Nothing was done in fact until 2018, when a school roof in Essex, constructed with RAAC planks, collapsed. This led to a number of hospitals, which were built using the same concrete, having roof inspections.

In October 2020, the government announced that 40 new hospitals would be built as part of a health infrastructure plan, as part of a package costing £3.7 billion pounds. Despite the issue with the roof having been already identified, and the risks that went with it, the QEH was not named as one of the new building projects. It should be noted that the estimated cost of a new hospital at that time was estimated at £679 million. The government announced that a further eight hospital projects would be announced the following year.

In December 2020, The Lynn News launched a campaign 'Back our bid, build our future', following the temporary closure of two wards due to roof issues. In March 2021, the Critical Care Unit had to be evacuated immediately, following the identification of serious issues in the roof. Patients, many seriously ill with Covid, had to be moved to another part of the hospital. It was several weeks before the unit could be re-opened. At this time, there were 131 props holding up parts of the roof.


The Eastern Daily Press launched an online petition, 'Rebuild the QEH' late in March. In April, the Save our Queen Elizabeth Hospital campaign was launched by King's Lynn Trade Council to help raise awareness of the need for a new hospital. In June, the EDP attempted to deliver the petition to the office of the Health Secretary, Matt Hancock. The reporter was refused entry, and was threatened with the police. A couple of days later, Matt Hancock visited the QEH with James Wild MP to see the building for himself. A week later, the Health Secretary resigned, and was replaced by Sajid Javid.

In July 2021, the Department of Health and Social Care invited expressions of interest, effectively bids, from hospital trusts who wished to be considered for one of the 8 new hospital building projects. At the same time, Love West Norfolk Ambassador James Bagge launched a petition 'Love West Norfolk, Love the QEH, Sign the Petition'. West Norfolk Council passed a motion, supporting the need for a new hospital. Local MP Liz Truss paid the hospital a visit, saying that a new hospital was a priority. At this time, 210 props were known to be holding up the hospital roof.

On the 9th September, the QEH submitted two separate bids, along with around 120 other expressions of interests. Trusts were told a decision to shortlist would take place by November. A week later, a delegation from the Trade Council and the Save our QEH campaign group met local MPs on College Green by the Houses of Parliament. The MPs promised that they would arrange a meeting with the current Health Secretary, Sajid Javid, so that he could hear the concerns first hand. No meeting was ever arranged, and when campaigners met James Wild MP just before Christmas, he denied the conversation ever took place.

Time passed, and no decision on a new hospital was made. We were told it would take place in December, but it didn't. It was then going to happen in January, then it was delayed until February, but there was still no announcement. No reason given,







no explanation, just silence. By now, 470 props were holding up the hospital roof.

In March, the Health Minister Edward Argar said a decision would be made 'by the end of the year'. On 20th April, campaigners once again went to Westminster and met with James Wild. The King's Lynn and West Norfolk MP told myself and others present that he had been given assurances that a decision would be made in May, following the local elections. A week later, it was made known that the number of props holding up the roof was now more than 1,500. May came and went, and still no decision on the hospital.

The Health Minister was the latest government minister to have a photo opportunity in early June, but he had nothing new to say. Following the resignation of Sajid Javid in July, Steve Barclay was appointed Health Secretary in July. He too took the time to visit the QEH days later, but was not able to give any reassurances over a decision on a new hospital. The front runner to replace Boris Johnson, Liz Truss, mentioned the plight of the hospital while campaigning, saying she was very committed to a new QEH. It had only been 12 months since she last spoke about the hospital. This was around the time 3 theatres had to be closed at short notice due to movement of the roof.

The hospital has been in the news regularly over the last couple of months. As well as reports on Look East, and ITV Anglia, it has been discussed on Radio 2 on the Jeremy Vine Show, as well as LBC radio. Articles have appeared in The Times, and the Independent, to name a few. Radio Norfolk has run a number of articles on their breakfast show. Unfortunately, the Chief Executive of the hospital has

announced she is leaving, as has the Chief Operating Officer. Both have said it has nothing to do with the lack of a decision on a new hospital.

So, what is the current situation regarding the future of the hospital. No decision is now expected before October. The Trust has said that the QEH is on life




support. Extensive surveys have made clear that the life of the building cannot be extended beyond 2030. Essentially, the hospital building will not be viable beyond this date, and cannot function as a working hospital after that. Due to the time it takes to put into action the building of a new hospital, a decision on a new one needs to be made as soon as possible.

If the government doesn't give the go ahead before the end of this year, it is unlikely that, even if given the go ahead, the 'new QEH' would be completed in time. That would undoubtedly mean the transfer of services to Peterborough and Norwich, and a loss of hospital beds. This for a community hospital that serves around 250,000 people. And as none of the hospital projects agreed more than 2 years ago have yet to even lay a brick, it is not looking good for the future of a new hospital here in Norfolk. Let's hope that the government will finally make that decision, and guarantee the future of a hospital in King's Lynn beyond 2030.





# WORKING FROM HOME - WHAT IS THE TAX ANGLE?

The idea of working from home has been around for some time as part of the "work life balance" concept, but, of course, it became infinitely more widespread during the pandemic. Along with Zoom and Teams conferencing, it seems likely to stay with us for the foreseeable future, with many businesses looking at "hybrid and distance working" long-term. The Office of Tax Simplification (OTS) has recently published a scoping document raising some important issues regarding the potential tax and social security issues for both employers and employees.

From a tax perspective, employees can claim relief where expenses are incurred "wholly, exclusively and necessarily" in the course of carrying out their duties as an employee. Each leg of that clause has been examined in the courts, so, for example, a barrister's black dress which she wore to court was not eligible because, whilst necessary within the court, it also performed the personal function of keeping her clothed. In contrast, her wig and court robes performed no function whatsoever beyond compliance with court rules and were therefore a deductible expense.

HMRC deal with the issue of home working within their internal manuals. Where an employer "makes a payment to an employee in respect of reasonable additional household expenses (incurred) in carrying out the duties of the employment at home under home working arrangements", no tax will arise on that payment.

"Homeworking arrangements" is further defined to mean a formal and regular pattern of working from home as <u>specifically required by the employer</u> (WFH) (rather than an occasional afternoon when the plumber is calling!). Household expenses will include heat, light, metered water, business telephone costs and increased broadband. Rent and mortgage payments or existing broadband contracts are not eligible for reimbursement, since there is no additionality as a result of the home working. Payments of up to £6 pw can be made without evidence – beyond this they need to be supported by calculations and bills.

Equipment provided by the employer will not give rise to a taxable benefit providing that there is no private usage – so an employee who already had a desktop pc and was then required to do office work only on an office laptop (which should not be used for private purposes) would not be treated as having a benefit in kind. On the other hand, if the office made a contribution to upgrade the personal desktop, there could well be a tax consequence. It is probably for this reason, as much as security and data protection issues, that employers are restrictive in their conditions on private use of company IT equipment.

Where the additional costs of homeworking are NOT reimbursed by the employer, the employee may be able to make a claim for tax relief but only where they are "obliged" to work from home under the terms of their employment. This would also apply if they were required to stay home because of, for example, Covid self-isolation rules or perhaps where the normal work premises could not be occupied. Those who "choose" to work from home will not be able to claim.

When an employee logs onto a Zoom/Teams meeting nobody really knows whether they are at home or at some exotic location on the other side of the world. Organisations are having to review their policies to cater for the likelihood that staff may well want to work overseas.

We have all been brought up on the rules for home-to-work travel and the restrictive regime for working-at-home expenses as above. How will the future look in a world where for many people, there will clearly be no hard and fast division between their home and their workplace?

The OTS review therefore provides an opportunity to assess whether developments in remote working are likely to make complying with the tax system more complicated and hence aims to identify opportunities to simplify existing features of our current tax system.



## Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

I had a list of local matters causing problems last month. Some are now part way through the process needed to resolve them; whether correctly or not remains to be seen. The Fring planning applications which are of note, will go to planning committee. Anyone wishing to speak will need to book with planning administration. Places are limited.

One problem which has not gone away is the collection of prescriptions from Boots in Heacham and in Hunstanton. I must stress that there is no fault with shop staff who continue to do probably more than is required of them.

I contacted the area manager again in July and he stated that 'a lack of pharmacists was continuing to affect Boots as it was in other chemists nationally. The holiday season also means more shop closures, part day where possible. Locum pharmacists are not readily available. Concerns have been raised with the NHS.' (Email truncated).

Members of the public have described problems with queues, waiting times, and prescriptions not being ready. I emailed James Wild MP, to share these concerns and to ask for the lack of pharmacists to receive government attention. I also asked him to investigate the rules which mean a small chemist's shop has to close completely if no pharmacist is present which causes non-prescription items to be unavailable too. At the time of writing, I await a response.

I also made enquiries at Heacham Group Practice and it was confirmed that their dispensary in Station Road, Heacham, serves only patients who live more than mile from the surgery. This is why Sedgeford residents have not had the problems experienced in Heacham. I asked if, given the problems at Boots, the Heacham Practice dispensary could assist. Unfortunately, it cannot as there is not the capacity – there is a shortage of pharmacists.

Anyone experiencing difficulties with prescriptions should bring them to the attention of the media. The BBC caught up on the problem of finding a dentist and found Norfolk was a dental desert as well as the real one it is currently becoming.

Speaking of which, water, the lack of it falling from the sky. In August the ground remains very dry and poses a fire risk. In July, a fire required evacuation at Brancaster Staithe. Another at Wild Ken Hill damaged many acres of reserve. An official Borough recognition and thank you for the Fire Service's work will be made in October.

Sea water. Plenty of that but not for swimming in at Heacham. I will be in a meeting with Anglia Water and the Environment Agency in early September. This is a bit like Groundhog Day as I had a meeting with them about the same issue, sea water quality, lack of, a year ago, and before Covid.

There has been a lot of criticism of water companies in the media due to water restrictions, water leakages, profits, CEO pay awards, and pollution. A few facts about Anglian Water follow:

2020/21 CEO pay £2,074,647; this was up 62% on the previous year. Profits for the year ending March 2020 £74million. This is about a 25% increase from the previous year. Dividends paid out in 2021, £92 million. Principal shareholders, Abu Dhabi Investment Authority, Canada Pension Plan, IFM Global Infrastructure Fund.

In 2020, Anglian water had 17,428 untreated sewage releases into rivers/coastal waters. These ran for a total of 170,547 hours. Anglian water does have half the average number of leaks amongst water companies in England. However, half of a big number is still big.

Local campaigners say the River Gaywood in King's Lynn has 'been sabotaged by sewage'; 'it's seen as a means of moving dirty water and waste out to sea.' A Norfolk County Councillor stated that, 'Grimston sewage treatment works spilled 159 times last year for a total of 3,500 hours.'

I hope that the forthcoming meeting will be useful, action actually results from it, and possible pollution vectors are eliminated so improvements can be made.

Energy prices are of prime concern to many people, most of whom will be receiving the £400 rebate on their bills paid out over the next few months. Residents of park homes, who pay their energy costs to the park owner, may not receive this money, engineered by Sunak when he was Chancellor, until much later. I have been chasing this up, since 20th June, on behalf of local residents. The answer has, repeatedly, been, 'an announcement will be made'. This has now been delayed to sometime in autumn...

Borough Council stuff. The King's Lynn Towns Fund projects largely administered by the Towns Board (no opposition members allowed near), is passing more administrative milestones with the agreement of business cases for the projects in hand:

Guildhall £12.2 million;

Community Hub £12.4 million;

Riverfront £5 million;

Active and clean connectivity (e.g., cycle ways) £6.3 million: Youth Pledge £0.5 million


Constituted Constitution

Consultants' fees £0.5 million

A completed submission will eventually be made to government for the £25 million Towns Fund pot available to King's Lynn to 'enhance long term economic outlook and growth'. Your thoughts on that would be welcome.

I will be back to more, very, local matters next month, hopefully reporting at least some success.

The village hall in Ringstead will host a group show of four prominent West Norfolk artists, Jane Brun, Helga Joergens, Barbara King and David Lendrum, as part of the county wide Norfolk Open Studios event.

Individual, yet complementary, united in their love of bold forms, colour and texture, these artists' collective works will range from figurative to abstract and encompass oil, acrylic, wax crayon and other mediums. Throughout the exhibition all four artists will be at the hall to meet and greet visitors and each will have a 'pop up' studio space in which they will be creating new works.

Jane Brun is a Landscape and Portrait painter. As a young student



she studied fine art in Florence and became a student again in 2020 on Martin Kinear's Diploma course at The Norfolk Painting School. She has started to create collections on themes and loves to paint the countryside and has found oil paint to be her perfect medium. "At the moment I am making

tracks, a collection of Norfolk paths and lanes where I regularly walk.....my next project will be the British Seashores."

The abstract pictures by Helga Joergens are created spontaneously and developed in the drawing or painting process. She begins by drawing lines, marks or colours to indicate a composition, and as soon as an idea evolves, she follows the direction in which it takes her. The



titles express her feelings, thoughts and associations when she

views her completed works. She will be drawing and painting during the exhibition.



Barbara King's works are a response to the natural flora in the nearby roadside verges and hedgerows. After time spent studying, photographing and

sketching the changing forms and colours of these humble plants, the paintings have been created mostly in acrylic on canvas or paper. The fast-drying properties of the paint and the almost exclusive use of palette knives and other mark making objects enhance their textural, expressive and gestural qualities. She is currently working on a series of sea and landscapes using the same techniques.

David Lendrum's abstract paintings derive from nature. Recently, he has been inspired by the ideas of water, gravity and fluidity, the effects of which he recreates on canvas by using thick and thin acrylic



paint which he pours down the canvas. He allows the colours to blend and mix in surprising ways and creates different moods according the colour ranges employed. Chance effects which evolve during the process add to the spontaneity of the paintings. During the exhibition he will be working with watercolours on a smaller scale.

Jackie states 'Although there isn't a massive issue in town, it is nice to know that we can communicate with each other from now on'.

Hunstanton Town Council has supported this group and will be printing the posters for the shops, should anyone else like to come on board.
