



Christmas greetings from the Ministry Team at Heacham Parish Church.

By now most of us have bought our Christmas cards and I am sure many have been written and posted.

As I look around the shops there <u>are</u> cards saying: "Happy Christmas", "Joyeuse Noel", "Christ is born" but many use the much blander "Seasons Greetings" - not even naming the festival. Some wish you a "Merry Xmas" thus taking Christ out of Christmas and apparently celebrating X - the unknown quantity. I have not yet seen one wishing me a "Happy 4th Sunday in December" but that could yet appear! As we stick stamps on to the envelopes, they at least have a Christian theme. The Christmas stamps this year feature nativity scenes and angels. Notably they are the last stamps to be issued with the head of the late Queen Elizabeth. How utterly appropriate for a lady who was never afraid to own the faith which guided her life.

Regrettably, in other years, those stamps often reflect the mythical and commercial characters of the season. This is one more example of the way in which officialdom, in pursuit of political correctness, is obscuring the Christian culture of our country. We have heard in the news how Christian crosses have been removed from hospital chapels and crematoriums. How can we expect others, be they politicians or fundamentalist

It's Christmas, Eve!



We Have a new Bishop

The Holy Father, Pope Francis, has appointed Rev Canon Peter Collins, a priest of the Archdiocese of Cardiff, as the fifth Bishop of East Anglia. The Episcopal Ordination of Bishop-Elect Peter Collins will take place at the Cathedral church of St John the Baptist in Norwich on December 14th 2022, at 11.30am. Bishop Alan Hopes is retiring after 9 years of dedicated service as our Bishop. You can listen to the announcement and find out more about Rev Canon Collins on the Cathedral's website or through YouTube.

Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

I have been asked for ideas for budget friendly ways of using up leftover cooked chicken. As there are some nice leeks to be had at present, I thought a Leek and Celery soup would be

ideal; it could be made in advance and frozen.

Some of this soup together with cooked chicken pieces could be made into:

Chicken and Pasta in Leek & Celery Sauce

(Using cooked Chicken) Makes 2 generous portions

Ingredients:

Approx.150g cooked Chicken cut into small pieces 100g/4oz dried Pasta (I used penne) 1 or 2 rasher of rindless bacon (or cooked 'Pigs in Blankets') cut into small pieces

Approx. 300ml Leek and Celery soup

Method:

Cook Pasta as per instructions on packet.

Meanwhile fry bacon pieces until nicely cooked, keep warm. Pour soup into saucepan, stir in chicken pieces and bacon and gently heat until starting to bubble, stirring occasionally.

When pasta is cooked strain off most of the water and stir into soup. Mix well, serve and enjoy. You might like to make a few croutons and sprinkle them on just before serving

Leek and Celery Soup

Makes approx. 900ml

Ingredients:

Approx. 230g/8oz Leek A rounded tablespoon Rolled Oats 2 sticks of celery 1 medium size onion or shallot Chicken or vegetable stock cube. A knob of butter



Salt and Pepper

Dissolve stock cube in 500ml hot water.

Trim and clean celery and slice fairly thinly.

Trim and wash leek, slice thinly and chop a little to break it up. Peel shallot/onion and slice thinly.

In a medium size saucepan and over a low heat, soften butter then add onion/shallot stir well and cook for a minute stirring constantly.

Carefully add leek, celery, oats and stock to saucepan, bring to the boil, reduce heat, cover and leave simmering gently, stirring occasionally, for 15-20 minutes or until leek and celery are soft.

Strain off most of the liquid into a jug; leave this to one side while you either put vegetables into a liquidiser or use a hand blender and whizz until pureed.

Return pureed vegetables to saucepan, gently stir in stock, mix well, reheat, serve and enjoy.

Pieces of cooked chicken could be added to make a sort of Cock a Leekie soup.

You might like to make a few croutons and sprinkle them on just before serving.

I used a chicken breast weighing 225g costing £3.20p. I cut it into small pieces and stir fried it and it was ample for both soup and pasta for 2 adult portions.





Time marches on never ending and a New Year beckons but before that we have Christmas. May it be a happy one.

December:

The planets continue their aeons long path around the Sun. In recent years I have asked you to look out for the Christmas 'star' and it will appear again. It is the planet Venus which becomes the Evening Star once again from the beginning of December. By Christmas Day it will be blazing low in the SW sky with a magnitude of -3.9.

You need to look out for it before tea time as it sets, sinks below the horizon, by 5.30pm.

Venus will be unmistakeable and your eyes are all you need. However, use binoculars to scan just above and to the left of the love goddess to find her messenger, the planet Mercury. It will look like a very bright spark with a magnitude of -0.5. On the

21st Dec separation from the Sun will he maximum. Remember that the Sun will be in a similar direction so don't binoculars until it has gone down.

Go somewhere like Heacham Beaches to catch Mercury. Parish



On the 25th, at 4.45pm and before you put the crackers out again, find the Crescent Moon in the SSW. Look to the right, the SW, and close to the horizon. Venus will be shining bright and above and to the left will be Mercury. On the 29th Mercury is just above and to the right of Venus.


I hope you have noticed Mars growing brighter from the SE through last month. It has been the second brightest object in the sky, Jupiter still outshining it.

Mars has also been very red because it is relatively close and is closest on the 1st Dec when it will be 81 million km distant. The point when Mars, Earth and Sun The traffic light which was Mars in fall on a single straight line, 2018. Parish opposition, is on the 8th. This is



when Mars presents a full face to the Earth and reflects the most light. So, between the 1st and 8th, Mars will be the red nose of Rudolph soaring past the Earth. On the 7th, Rudolph will be close to the Moon which provides good grazing for ethereal Cervidae

The Mars opposition occurs at 4.24am. At almost the same time the Moon is full, presenting a full face to the Earth and the Sun. The Moon is on the straight line mentioned above. The Moon moves across the field of view comparatively quickly and at 4.55am it passes in front of Mars; the planet is occulted. About an hour later, Mars will emerge again from behind the Moon. This event was last seen, from Britain, in 1952. If you miss it then your next chance is in 2052.



Where the Mars occultation can be seen. Compare it to the Uranus occultation on Jan 1st shown on page 18. Internet


Jupiter has dominated the sky for several months. It is dimming a little now but still has a magnitude of about -2.5 and will be visible all evening, setting just after midnight. Just look SE to SW from sunset onwards. On the 1st the Moon is just below the gas giant; on the 28/29th it is close to the quarter Moon.

Saturn is still visible from when the sky darkens until it sets at 8.30pm. Look for the rings this month. On the 25th Dec it will be due SSW and, on Boxing Day, just above the crescent Moon.

Uranus remains relatively 'bright' after its opposition last month though, at a magnitude of +5.7, all but the keenest sighted will need steady binoculars. It lies between Mars and Jupiter. On the 5th Dec at around 4.50 pm, Uranus is occulted by the Moon, reappearing around 5.20pm. This is the second occultation of Uranus this year. Clouds stopped me seeing the first in September.

Neptune is well within view of a small telescope with a magnitude of +7.9. It sets by 11.30pm.

Meteors! Before midnight on the 14th and into the early hours of the 15th, Phaethon makes his seasonal visit showering meteors down. They are debris from his asteroid so not bits of a comet's tail. They create the shower known as the Geminids which can be bold and bright. The Moon rises about 9pm to spoil his fun but hope for a clear night and look anywhere but at the face of Artemis.

The Ursid meteor shower occurs between the 17th and 26th peaking on the 22/23rd.

The Winter Solstice. At 9.48pm on the 21st December, the Sun is as low as it gets, the day length is shortest and the night longest. The start of Yuletide, fires, food and festivity.



January: Happy New Year to you all.

On the 4th at 4.17pm, the Earth is at its closest point to the Sun in its orbit, or perihelion. A tad more warmth is received than at aphelion, the furthest point, which the Earth reaches on the 6th July. The difference is just 3.1 million miles.

The ellipse, egg shape, of the Earth's orbit is greatly exaggerated. It is almost circular otherwise the climate would be far less stable. Internet



Venus is prominent in the dusk, very bright in the WSW and setting by 6.30pm. On the 22nd, the Evening Star is very close to Saturn, the ringed planet being 1/75th as bright. This demonstrates how the scale of brightness, magnitude, is not linear. The magnitude of Venus is -3.9, that of Saturn +0.8.

On the 23rd, Venus and Saturn have separated a tad but are joined by the Crescent Moon. A celestial masterpiece.

Mercury is a morning object in the second half of the month. It will be low in the SE which is a difficult horizon to achieve here. It is relatively bright at magnitude -0.1 and is well separated from the Sun in the last days of January.

Mars is well up in the sky but fades through the month from magnitude -1.2 to -0.3. As it dims so the red is lost. Mars is comparatively close so the motion of the Earth quickly leaves it behind whilst planets much further off, the gas and ice giants, take much longer to change.


You still have all night to view Mars. On the 3rd, at about 10pm, the Moon is just below the red planet. It is close again on the 30th.



Whilst looking up at Mars use binoculars to scan the two-star clusters discussed last month. The Pleiades to the right and the Hyades below it. Amongst this open cluster you will see another, fainter 'Mars'. This is Aldebaran a red giant star. It forms part of the constellation Taurus and Aldebaran is the eye of the bull. Left of Taurus is Gemini and below and between The Twins and The Bull, is the Hunter, Orion.

Back to the planets. Jupiter is prominent until it sets at 10.30pm so early evening is a good time to turn a telescope on it to see its Galilean Moons and the bands of colour on its gaseous surface.

Saturn, I have mentioned. Catch it in a telescope whilst you can.



Observation of the Uranus's third occultation is restricted. Heacham is just about on the lower limit. Hunstanton, further North, may see it and Heacham not. Internet

Uranus is up to tricks as, on the 1st, it is playing hide and seek with the Moon again. Look from around 9.15pm with binoculars. Uranus should get occulted, for the third time, sometime after that and re-appear several hours later. I am a little vague as much further north than here Uranus just 'skims' the Moon. I have looked at Stellarium, set at Heacham's latitude, and it seems we will see an occultation but the times are difficult to establish precisely.

Meteors. On the night of the 3rd/4th, look out for the Quadrantids which are remnants of Comet 2003EH. The Moon will spoil things but patchy cloud might help.

Take a good look at Orion in the dark of January. The names of the principal stars are magical, Betelgeuse and Bellatrix, Rigel and Saiph, with the belt stars Alnitak, Alnilam and Mintaka. All are very much brighter than our Sun which means they are prominent despite being far away. Alnitak is a triple star system with a blue supergiant as the principal star. Rigel, Alnilam



and Saiph are blue supergiants, Bellatrix a blue giant and Betelgeuse a red supergiant. Mintaka is a multiple star system.

Use binoculars or a small telescope to look at the misty patch below the belt. This is the Orion Nebulae, a

cloud of gas and dust 24 light years across where new stars are still forming due to gravity coalescing and heating matter. It glows a nice pink from the light of the stars within it.


May the New Year be dark and clear at night, not too much heat in the day, have sufficient but not excess rain, and can the wind not blow too hard too often.





Wild Ken Hill

Season's Greetings! It feels only yesterday when I last wrote for The Heacham Newsletter, but looking back at my calendar, it was back in February! They say time flies when you're having fun – it also seems to hurry by when you're busy, and that is exactly how things have been at Wild Ken Hill. With that in mind, it's my pleasure to give you a festive update on all that is going on here.

An unfortunate highlight of the year was the fire that took place in the area we call the Coastal Park – the finger of land between the two sea walls to the south of Heacham South Beach. It was shocking and scary to watch – we witnessed wildlife perish in the flames, and at one point I was concerned that the blaze could reach the properties at Heacham South Beach. Thanks to tireless and brave work by our Fire Services, that eventuality was averted, and the blaze was put out. It took with it around 80 acres of good habitat, and much wildlife. It will take time to regenerate, but it is encouraging to see that this process has already started, with green shoots and leaves appearing across the area.

It is poignant therefore we recently had a carbon assessment of the entirety of Wild Ken Hill. The results have been encouraging; we have gone beyond 'net zero' and are 'carbon positive' as a business. Thanks to dedicating space for nature as well as improving soil health in the farm, we are sequestering around 3,000 tonnes more carbon than we emit. That's equivalent to about 1,600 return flights to New York!

Elsewhere on the site, we are starting to collect encouraging data on the progress of our rewilding and farming projects, which both began in 2019. In the rewilding area, survey work performed this summer shows that this nature-led approach is already positively impacting wildlife. For example, we have doubled the diversity of plants and wildflowers in plots that we

surveyed this summer. This is a fantastic result in just three years - congratulations to the Exmoor ponies and Red Poll cattle that have made this possible with their gentle grazing!

We also had some fantastic wildlife sightings, including Nightjar, and an exceptionally rare White-tailed Lapwing and Golden Oriole, perhaps suggesting that the landscape-scale nature recovery we are aiming for is starting to work! We've also put considerable work into further improving the freshwater marsh to the east of the inner sea wall, as well as restoring several ponds that were extremely silted-up. And finally, we are shortly due to start work on creating a new wildflower meadow with ponds close to Heacham South Beach.

All of this work has the aim of restoring our ecosystems, and it is of course the growing wildlife here that the BBC continue to come to Wild Ken Hill to film. I hope readers managed to catch some of this year's Autumnwatch which featured some great footage of the beavers reintroduced in 2020, as well as a rare Goshawk bathing in the wet areas created by the beavers themselves. We look forward to welcoming back the BBC in late January for the next edition – Winterwatch!

Turning to our programme of education and engagement, our volunteering programme has reached its first anniversary and we continue to host a range of opportunities for local children on site. At the time of writing, I am also looking forward to an open day for Heacham residents on 26th November, where there'll be the chance to get to know each other better and get a closer look at what we are up to. These open days continue to be oversubscribed so we will be looking to run further days in the New Year.

To come together and celebrate nature, we ran a new nature festival called 'Gathering' for the first time. We felt it was a great success, and it was good to see a number of folks from Heacham there. Alongside 'Gathering', we were humbled that around 1,300 visitors also joined us on guided tours this year,

walking or driving through the nature restoration areas with a guide. I think these are a wonderful example of best practice tourism – sustainable, year-round, educational, and providing income to local guides – and a blueprint for anything else we are able to do in the future.

Finally, I have had some positive discussions with Cllr Terry Parish recently, including beginning discussions on identifying any areas within Heacham that Wild Ken Hill may be able to help improve for nature. I hope this all goes to show our unwavering commitment to people, climate, and wildlife, and I hope our project is allowed to do more and more on this front.

The Art of Christmas

Christmas is an ancient custom, started probably around the 1st century BC, during the European Iron Age. Midwinter festivities by the Germanic Pagans to mark the winter solstice became known as 'Yuletide'.

Celebrations in December have continued for centuries in many countries and religions, and somewhere amongst all the modern celebrations with friends and family, of presents, extravagant food and drink, some take the time to remember the birth of Jesus.

The Christmas tradition depicting the birth of Jesus Christ has been frequently painted throughout the history of art. The predominance of the Roman Catholic faith in the 14th century, particularly in southern Europe, resulted in many paintings of the Nativity scene. Church murals and altarpieces were favoured places. The altarpiece in the Sassetti Chapel in Florence, painted in 1485 by Domenico Ghirlandaio, depicting *The Nativity and Adoration of the Shepherds*, is a famous example and recognised as one of the artist's masterpieces. The donors of the portrait are also depicted in the altarpiece, kneeling to one side.

The painting of Nativity scenes developed with speed during the Renaissance period, from earlier depictions of the subject showing choirs of angels and an array of richly dressed characters, to a much darker theme. Much of the change can be attributed to artists such as Caravaggio and the use of light and dark in his compositions. His *Adoration of the Shepherds*, 1609, portrays a more realistic scene of a very tired looking Mary, cradling her baby child, with haggard looking men transfixed by the ecstasy of the scene before them. The lighting is dim and whilst the manger is a simple, lowly setting, somehow the painting has a feeling of love and humility.

By the 17th century artists throughout Europe continued generally to paint realistic Nativity scenes in classical settings with humanlike characters. However, social and cultural changes were emerging that would see a move towards separating religious or spiritual concerns from the traditional Christmas themes. During the 19th century, celebrating Christmas with family became important and paintings were more likely to depict domestic scenes. People no longer just wanted to look at Old Masters' paintings. Paintings depicting snow-filled landscapes (Caspar David Friedrich, Winter Landscape with Church, 1811) and families dancing merrily around a candlelit Christmas tree (Viggo Johansen, Glade Jul, 1819) were favoured. Charles Dickens' famous literary work, A Christmas Carol, resulted in the joyous family-oriented scene by John Leech's Mr Fezziwig's Ball, 1843. On the other hand, some artists have depicted the sadness and loneliness of Christmas. Edvard Munch's Christmas in the Brothel, 1903-1904, is thought to convey the sadness of those with no one to turn to who seek paid company.



'Save our QEH' Campaign Group AND STILL WE WAIT

For those of you who can remember last year, the Government promised to make a decision on funding for a new hospital in King's Lynn last November. Yet here we are, 12 months on, and we are still waiting for something to happen. Repeated delays, with no explanation, reason, or even an excuse. Just constant delays.

This time last year, there were a few hundred props holding up the roof of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, now there are around three thousand. By the time Christmas comes, it is estimated there will be three and a half thousand steel and wooden props in place. It must be worrying, both for the staff who work there, and for the patients - those who have to work or be cared for in the conditions that currently exist. And things will not, in the short term, get any better. In order to keep the building safe, more areas of the hospital will have to have the roof supported by wood and steel.

Since writing my previous article, two Health Secretaries, (and two Prime Ministers) have been and gone. And now we have the same one as we did before. And yet we are not any further forward. Steve Barclay came, he saw, and left again, with no decision made. Therese Coffey promised to come and see the roof, but was given a different job before she had a chance to see how bad the situation is with the roof. They all want to visit and have a photo opportunity, but none of them will make a decision on a new hospital.

The only way forward is with a new hospital, but is there the political will, or even the money available to make this happen? Recent budget decisions have had an adverse effect on the country's finances, thus reducing the likelihood of money being available for a new build. The current figure stands at £862 million, and that is only likely to increase in the coming months. The initial list of 40 hospitals is way behind schedule, and they haven't even decided on funding for the proposed eight new buildings. So where does that leave the QEH?

In a state of limbo it would appear. Our campaign group visited Westminster on the 2nd November, and as well as meeting James Wild MP, we protested outside the Department of Health. Later that day, the Government spoke to the media, insisting that a decision would be made by the end of the year. Having been met with constant delays, more than one person I spoke to responded with the question 'What year?' Having failed to make a decision for a year now, there is little confidence that this latest promise will be fulfilled.

We certainly hope that it will. The Trust has made it clear that a decision is needed sooner rather than later. By 2030, the current hospital will have to close parts of the building, which will mean a loss of services due to the dire state of the roof. This in turn will mean a loss of services, and patients having to travel to Norwich or Peterborough if a new hospital has not been completed. So we must continue to keep the hospital in the





Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

First, Happy Christmas and Best Wishes for the New Year, may it be more settled than the last.

The last month has been a mixed bag. Many planning applications have apparently stalled awaiting more information or an officer free to make a recommendation. Recruitment of planners remains a problem.

The theme of the most significant plans is tourism. There are applications to convert agricultural buildings to holiday accommodation in Heacham and in Fring. There is an appeal against refusal of an extended caravan site in Heacham. And, applications for a touring caravan site, glamping pods and a campsite either side of Lamsey Lane near the junction with the A149. The latter two are associated with Wild Ken Hill.

Such applications can cause a dilemma. The residents of Heacham said, quite clearly, that there was quite enough tourist accommodation and they wanted no more. The Neighbourhood Plan thus places restrictions on where and how development can take place. Around half of the residents of Fring don't want any more either – 'It is becoming something like Centre Parcs'.

The Borough Council likes tourism – it brings in money. However, there is a little concern and a working party is being set up, though this will likely investigate ways of encouraging tourists to visit throughout the year (correct me if I am wrong but I think most residents like a rest). This group of councillors and officers will also consider a Tourist Tax, a sum of money for each night spent in accommodation.

It should be noted that many busy tourism areas in the country are considering ways to restrict visitors rather than encourage more. The impact of numbers on local services, infrastructure and assets such as buildings and footpaths is, apparently, becoming detrimental to residents. (Discuss).

Nothing more has emerged about the poor sea water quality in the Wash, specifically off Heacham beaches. Promised meetings were cancelled and I await confirmation of new dates.

A meeting dedicated to things along the East Coast and The Wash talked a lot about groynes; those things that stick out into the sea to hinder sand being moved along the coast by waves and tides. Apparently, some of those in Hunstanton and Heacham are of unusual construction. The conclusion, by technical officers, was that the groynes did very little as evidenced by the lack of sand piling up on one side of them. Consequently, replacement would, overall, be a waste of resources.

There was another meeting about the Wash called by an organisation called Portevo. They have resurrected the idea of

creating a barrier across the Wash from West Norfolk to Lincolnshire and putting a road on it. The material would come from dredging the Wash at the location for a new port. I don't mind saying that I think it daft. Pollution, storm surges, and ecology could be listed as a few of the reasons against it.

The solar farm application at Sedgeford got refused principally due to the loss of agricultural land. Such applications are being met with resistance across the country as people have realised vast swathes of farmland and countryside could be covered with panels. Food supply for our expanding population will be a worry in a few years. And solar panels are most effective in the summer when we export electricity, they do little for winter shortages. France has a different idea, all carparks there have got to have roofs with solar panels on top from next year. They have more farmland than us but they don't want to lose any.

Standards in public life are, too frequently, parliamentary news items. Such matters also occur at Borough, Town and Parish level too. The Borough has a monitoring officer whose job includes investigation of complaints and has a standards committee to consider those councillors referred to it. There is a list of sanctions which can be applied or recommended. The whole process can be very slow. I made a complaint in March 2021 which is still active. However, things will improve with the appointment of additional legal support to the Borough rather than relying on sub-contracting the work out. A very significant standards complaint about a town councillor was resolved and made public in November and you may have read about it by now.

I use local suppliers and shops whenever I can and have never been let down by the goods or the service provided. Prices are competitive and there are no travel costs. As we enter yet another 'crisis' remember the old adage, 'use it or lose it'. Have a break from internet shopping and delivery vans and see what is available close to home.

And Last. Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year again. May all developers be beneficent and not pursue matters which distress neighbours.
