

#### **Brays Pit Working Party**

The banks around Brays Pit, which enclose the body of water, have been subject to erosion for a number of years. They are not too severe at the moment and last year we made a start on a shore line project, designed to restore the badly eroded section of the bank with interwoven willow fencing, made with wood pollarded from trees taken from the rear pond, at cost neutral to the parish. A certain amount of pollarding is done every year to keep the rear of the site open to sunlight.

We cut the wood into poles the day before to save time on the work day, but unfortunately thieves stole the cut poles and left a



mess for us to clear up. Backfilling behind the fencing over a period of time with debris and natural materials from the ponds and planting of other trees or shrubs for root binding of the shoreline in future years, should sustain the banks for many years to come.

To all the volunteers who turned out for the work day, 'Thank you' and 'Well done'.



#### **Hats for Premature Babies**

Local women from Heacham have made hundreds of hats for charity after Diane's grandson Ralph needed vital hospital care as a baby.

Diane Roper began to crochet after Ralph was born at the QEH hospital in King's Lynn in November 2020 and rushed to Great Ormond Street hospital for major heart surgery. Diane said: "After seeing Ralph lying there with machines and wires attached to him, I wanted to help other babies too. Ralph had a little hat on."

Now Diane, pictured with Ralph, has crocheted over 150 hats and butterflies which have been donated to HUGS charity who help bereaved families. The hats and butterflies go in memory boxes for parents who have lost a baby; the butterflies are their symbol.



Diane has made hats for Great Ormond Street and QEH King's Lynn too. She has now been asked to do hats for the neonatal ward at the Leeds Hospital and The Tiny Miracle Foundation in America.

#### Heacham in Bloom Needs You!!

Heacham in Bloom has been an active group since 2009 and has and continues to try to maintain planting features around the village, but over the years our numbers have diminished and we are now a very small group, with only half of the willing volunteers from when we were first established. This reduction in numbers does not allow us to maintain the areas for which we are responsible as well as we'd like. Those areas are: Village Sign, Lavender Bed, A149 Troughs, Troughs at the War Memorial, South Beach Boat and Planting area, North Beach Bed (around the toilet block), North Beach Boat and bed, North Beach Roundabout and the Plough at the northern entrance to the village. The Flood Memorial is not maintained by us, that is the responsibility of the Parish Council.

Due to the pressure all of this entails we, as a group, may need to re-think the number of areas we will be able to continue to maintain/plant unless we can increase our group numbers. So, do you like gardening? Do you like meeting people? If yes, to either or both of these questions then teaming up with Heacham in Bloom may be for you.

If you think you could help us weed, plant and water, etc., why not come along to our meeting on Monday 17th April, 7pm at the The Fox & Hounds, Station Road?

#### **Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner**

As we are being warned of vegetable shortages and high prices, a number of people have told me they are purchasing pulses and asked for recipes using lentils. The weather still being on

the chilly side I thought another soup would be welcome. Maybe I will share a recipe for a vegetable and lentil bake next month.

#### Carrot, Courgette & Red Lentils Soup

#### Makes approx. 900ml.

#### **Ingredients:**

1 med. shallot or small onion Carrots approx. 170g/6oz 1 large or 2 medium sticks of celery Red Lentils (dry) approx. 60g/2oz. (see note) Medium size courgette (Like a small marrow) Chicken or vegetable stock cube Salt and pepper to taste.

#### Method:

Rinse lentils well in cold water. Place lentils in a large pan (they do froth up when boiling) and add 500ml of cold water. Bring to boil and boil rapidly for 10 minutes, stirring often to prevent lentils sticking to base of pan.

Meanwhile, peel carrots and cut them into small pieces. Peel shallot or onion and slice thinly. Trim off and discard ends from celery and courgette - clean and slice fairly thinly.

Remove pan from heat, place stock cube in a jug and strain off most of liquid from lentils into same jug, top up jug with hot water to reach 400ml and stir well to dissolve stock cube. Return stock to lentils in saucepan, add all vegetables. Stir and mix well. Increase heat and bring to boiling point. Reduce heat and leave covered, simmering gently, stirring often for a further 15-20 minutes when vegetables should be fairly soft.


Strain off most of the liquid into a jug, put aside while you either put vegetables into a liquidiser or use a hand blender and whizz until pureed.

Carefully return liquid to pureed vegetables in a saucepan, stirring gently to mix well.

Season to taste. Re-heat stirring gently. Turn off heat, serve and enjoy.

Note: Boiling rapidly for 10 minutes was in accordance with instructions on the packet.


From our wide selection of modern adult fiction, we are returning to crime this month and featuring Canadian writer, Louise Penny.





#### The Wild Scything Event

Early in March enthusiastic members of the SABI, the 'Scythe Association of Britain & Ireland' came to The Saltings, our village's wild space behind the North Beach. They came from as far as Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire, Lancashire and North Yorkshire to take part in our annual reed bed cutting management plan under the Countryside Stewardship Scheme. Scything by hand is the only way to manage the ground where mechanical cutters cannot access.

Stuart Dark MBE, council leader, said: "We know that our local lifeboat crew do wonderful work so, when they approached us saying that they were having more emergency callouts in Old Hunstanton due to holidaymakers not knowing the tide times and the dangers of being cut off from shore, we wanted to help them all we could.



"It became clear that a simple and straightforward solution to increase public safety and decrease demand on the crew was available by putting in clear signage and it was absolutely right that we, as a council, found the money to make this happen promptly."

Charles Le Strange Meakin, of the Le Strange Estate and president of Hunstanton RNLI, said: "I'm very grateful to the borough council for their help in improving public safety information here at Old Hunstanton. It's a great contribution to keep beach users safe."

Rigil Kent, Lifeboat Operations Manager, Hunstanton RNLI, said: "The installation of the safety sign has been a great collaboration between the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk, the Le Strange Estate and the RNLI. To see it coming to fruition makes us all very proud that we are able to display safety messaging in such a pragmatic way. Hunstanton Lifeboat Station has always displayed tide times on the station notice boards but these were not easy for everybody to read. The new sign displays the tide time electronically, features a scrolling screen which can be used for additional safety messaging, and includes printed beach safety messaging. We would like to thank the borough council and Le Strange Estate for working with us and for helping us to make our beaches safer."



Spring is well underway though, at the time of writing, snow and sleet batters the windows. Recent cold weather cleared the night skies a little but mist often intervened.

I did observe bright Venus on several occasions and saw the evening star drawing closer to Jupiter (or the other way around). I even saw the actual conjunction, closest approach, between clouds but missed a photo opportunity by being too slow – I went in to gather the kit and upon my return the sight had gone. Such is life. However, I think it is more valuable to see things with your eyes than capturing them on camera – someone else will have done that.

This month, Venus remains an unmissable object in the west after sunset. It doesn't set, fall below the horizon, until midnight.


Venus was the Roman Goddess of Love and has been called the Evening Star and Morning Star for millennia. As it is closer to the Sun than Earth, the planet is always seen towards the Sun, either in the west as the Sun sets or in the east when it rises. Most people see it in the evening sky.

I was once lucky enough to see Venus in the middle of the day with the Sun high overhead. It was in 2017 during the few minutes of the total eclipse of the Sun in Wyoming. The Sun went out and Venus and Mercury were revealed.

Venus is by far the brightest planet in the sky and this is due to several obvious reasons. It can be relatively close, roughly 30 million miles if it is our side of the Sun, though 130 million when on the far side. It is the size of Earth and being closer to the Sun, receives far more sunlight. The reason why it reflects much of this light is not so obvious; it is because it is completely encased in reflective clouds of sulphuric acid and carbon dioxide.

Early assumptions in the 19th and 20th centuries were that the clouds were water vapour and hid a primeval surface of water and

jungle populated by beasts and Venusians. Science fiction novels based on this premiss abounded, some by renowned authors like Asimov, Heinlein and C.S. Lewis. My Boy's Book of Space by Patrick Moore (1954) has a plate showing an artist's impression of the surface of Venus showing rain, lakes and jungle. However, there is also a plate showing it as an arid desert and Patrick considers both descriptions in his book.

The truth of the matter was not really tested until the first spacecraft landed on the surface of Venus in 1972. The Soviet Union's Venera 8 was the first successful landing on another planet. Twenty other craft had preceded it. They either failed, flew by Venus or entered its atmosphere. They included Mariner 2 from NASA which scanned the planet's surface by radar in 1962.

Since then, 25 more craft have shown interest in Venus, some on the way to Mercury, Saturn or Jupiter (using gravity slingshots etc). The Soviet Union was the most successful and interested country and 5 or 6 more landings were accomplished though craft survived just minutes. The European Space Agency's (ESA) Venus Express orbited the planet between 2006 and 2016 whilst a Japanese craft has been doing the same since then.


Observations from the various missions revealed Venus is the hottest planet in the Solar System. At 475C, hotter even than the closest planet to the Sun, Mercury, which is at a paltry 164C. The thick Venusian clouds trap the Sun's heat in a greenhouse effect (as does increasing levels of carbon dioxide in our own atmosphere). There is also evidence of active volcanos. The atmospheric pressure at the bottom of this dense atmosphere is enormous, 90 times more than we live in and the same as that at about a mile under the sea. Venus is not a planet destined for human exploration and habitation as described in the books of my youth. Mars remains the hope for that.

Venus's orbit of the Sun is almost circular and observations of it follow a regular pattern. It shows phases which are dependent on it's position in its orbit. When on the far side of the Sun and furthest from us it can be almost full (like a Full Moon). When on our side, almost at its closest, it shows a crescent. In between half or quarter phases. Where it is has little effect on brightness

when crescent it is closer, when almost full, further away.



On the 11th April, Venus is close to the Pleiades star cluster which will be to its right. A week later and the Hyades open cluster is its neighbour and the star Aldebaran also close. Later in the month, on the 22nd and 23rd, a Crescent Moon joins Venus.




Above: Messenger image of cratered Mercury. False colour used. NASA

I briefly mentioned Mercury earlier. This small rock of a planet has a very elongated orbit and observational opportunities depend on where it is in relation to the Earth. This April provides the best opportunity to see it this year. Lying closer to the Sun it follows Venus into the sky but is always much lower and generally in a brighter and murky part of the atmosphere.

This month, Mercury is brightest, magnitude -1.2 at the beginning of the month when it is also lowest in the sky, not far above the western horizon and to the right of Venus. As the month progresses it gets higher but dimmer. It is furthest from the Sun, maximum elongation, on the 11th when it has a magnitude of 0.1. This is well within naked eye visibility but you have to know where to look. If you have an app on your 'phone, use that – or download one. I use Stellarium which is free. Later in the month, Mercury drops down towards the horizon and fades away.



Mariner 10 flew by Mercury in 1974 and 30 years later Messenger orbited it for 4 years before being crashed into its surface. Messenger revealed many things and it is worth Googling it. The ESA Bepi Columbo mission arrives in 2025 and my name is filed on it somewhere along with many more.

Mars is still around, setting at 2.30am. It is naked eye visible at magnitude 1.2 but much fainter than Mercury (remember magnitudes work backwards, the higher they are the fainter the object). Mars is close to a Crescent Moon on the 25th at 10pm. It will be in the middle of Gemini and the two bright stars above it are Castor and Pollox.



Now for something different. The Hunstanton Observatory has begun construction and it is intended to be completed, weather permitting, by the end of April (the cold snap in March delayed matters a little). There will be an opening event announced and I will be giving a talk, in tandem with a friend from King's Lynn Astronomy Society, on May 17th. This will be through the Hunstanton Civic Society and be held at the Heritage Centre, Hunstanton, start time 7.30pm.

The observatory is a shed type with a roller slide off roof. There will be no telescopes housed but places to mount them both inside and outside the shed. It was funded from the EXPERIENCE project which is, surprisingly, European Union funded and managed by Norfolk County Council. It is to support off season tourism experiences but facilities will be accessible to locals. The location will also be used for environmental activities.

And, I almost forgot, a meteor shower peaks on the nights of 21st/22nd and 22nd/23rd April. The Lyrid shower occurs between the 15th and 29th and will be in a relatively dark sky as the Moon will be New on the 19th. No need for any instruments just get your eyes dark adjusted (15 mins outside and don't look at lights), get comfortable and look up. Any direction really but they emanate from the NE close to the star Vega. From 9pm should do but if you can manage 11pm until 2am that will be better.

So, stare at Venus and pretend that Venusians have foiled us and live under those clouds. Then try and find Mercury; Heacham Beaches or Hunstanton cliffs are your best bets for that. See a meteor or two and the month is complete.



#### Films as Art: When the MGM Lion Roared: The Hollywood Studios

The April lecture of the Arts Society, Northwest Norfolk, on April 17th 2023 will be a talk on the history

of the Golden Age of the Hollywood Studios, from small beginnings, through their full glory in the 1930s and 1940s, to the deaths of the founding movie moguls and their inevitable decline and dissolution in the 1950s and 1960s. Many famous names will feature: silent stars such as Pickford, Fairbanks, Valentino and the durable ones such as Clark Gable, Betty Davies, Errol Flynn. The lecture concludes with the new, big movie moguls - the conglomerates like Sony, Mitsubishi and Murdoch's News Corp.

Films were not intended as an art medium when the first cameras were invented, and in the past there has been a very dismissive attitude towards film as "art". Perhaps an "Art House" movie might gain art status, but the usual film audience would not think of a film as art. In the early days, and along with photography, it has been viewed as simply a record of an artistic performance, "A cultural mirror, a reflection of society's attitudes, values, philosophies, and lifestyle" but never art. But the camera is no longer just a casual accessory, it is so much more than an innocent eye making a recording. The process of film making involves hundreds of choices and decisions by the filmmakers before those involved in editing produce the final product. Previously dismissive attitudes have become difficult to sustain and today it is likely that few would stand by the claim that film is never art.

Films are huge entertainment media, so how broadly can we attribute "art status". The danger is that the word "art" is often used in an all-inclusive way. Some films are not high art, and whilst elite opinion may wish to regard high art as the only worthwhile and legitimate form of art, low or simply bad art may still claim to be art. Others cannot qualify to be art at all: a video quickly shot on holiday using a smartphone is clearly not a work of art.

"Art films" are rarely blockbusters. They are made by filmmakers with a distinctive individual style who stamp their own mind and personality upon the film - Fellini, Bergman, Guy Maddin, etc. As *auteurs* they challenge rather than entertain and often shoot in real locations with ordinary characters. Leading art galleries and museums may showcase the Grand Masters but now, more and more commonly, they exhibit films made by professional artists alongside the great works of art and sculpture - such as the early experimental work of Marcel Duchamp and the modern work of Swiss feminist video artist Pipilotti Elisabeth Rist.

If film is not art, why do so many people think of it as art and, anyway, who is it who draws the line between whether a film is or is not art? You can explore the history of the Hollywood Studios with our experienced lecturer, Colin Schindler - a writer, producer and BAFTA winner, on 17th April 2023, at 2pm, in Sedgeford Village Hall (ample parking). 



#### 'Save our QEH' Campaign Group

#### **DECISION ON A NEW HOSPITAL?**

Two different possible answers to the above question. Great news. After waiting 16 months for a funding decision on a new hospital in King's Lynn, Jeremy Hunt announced in the budget on March 15th that the Queen Elizabth Hospital is being added to the current list of 40 hospitals previously announced, and the money will be provided to allow a new building to take place.

The decision to provide funding for a new hospital will be made in due course. A new Queen Elizabeth Hospital is of course a priority, but we are unable to make any announcement as it is the pre-election (purdah) period. We understand the urgency of the situation, and are working hard to resolve the situation.

Back in November last year, our MP James Wild told campaigners including myself that a decision was imminent, and would be made before Christmas, or at least that is what he had been told. Health Secretary Steve Barclay backed this up, talking to media at the same time, saying an answer would be made in December 2022. Nothing has happened, though Lord Markham CBE, the minister who has responsibility for making the decision, has said it will happen 'in due course'.

Cast your mind back two years, to the 11th March 2021. Patients being cared for in critical care unit at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital had to be moved out at short notice due to concerns over the condition of the roof. After emergency work took place, the unit was re-opened once again on the 7th April. Around the same time, the Eastern Daily Press set up an online petition 'Rebuild the QEH', highlighting the essential need for a new hospital in King's Lynn.

On the 14th April 2021, the Save our QEH campaign was launched, and almost two years since it began, continues to do all it can to publicise the necessity for a new Queen Elizabeth

Hospital. Every week, come rain or shine, campaigners gather outside the hospital with placards and banners, making themselves visible to passers-by. As well as King's Lynn, the protest has been taken to towns across Norfolk, including Swaffham, Downham Market and Wisbech.

Campaigners have been to London three times in the last eighteen months. On the 15th September 2021, we met with a number of our local MPs, including Mr Wild, on College Green, due to Covid. At the end of our discussions, Sir John Hayes MP agreed to facilitate a meeting with the then Health Secretary Sajid Javid later that year. In December 2021, when campaigners met James Wild to hand over letters signed by staff and patients asking for a new hospital, he denied that this promise was ever made.


In April 2022, campaigners went to Westminster once again, this time meeting with James Wild and Duncan Baker. Despite media reports of a decision being made the month before, we were informed that an announcement was now going to take place in May 2022, following the local elections that were taking place across the country. Eleven months later, and the promised announcement has disappointedly not yet been made.

This is in spite of a significant amount of media coverage, both locally and nationally, on TV, radio and in a number of newspapers. A lot of this it has to be said has come about due to our local MPs, councillors and even the Health Secretary making numerous visits to the hospital. With each visit comes a photo opportunity, and accompanying it, a statement to the press. These usually include one or more of the words 'important', 'priority', 'high priority' and 'urgent' There might even be a promise that said MP will be speaking to the Health Secretary, or even the Chancellor. And still, sixteen months after a decision was due to be made, nothing has happened.

I write this, with the budget taking place in two days' time, on the 15th March. Both James Wild and Liz Truss had their photo taken with Chancellor Jeremy Hunt last week, and said they told him of the urgent need for a new hospital. Now, there is almost certainly good reason for the timings of the headlines generated by these 'meetings' last week.

One possibility is that the MP's have been told privately that the long awaited decision on funding a new hospital will be taking place this week, and that they are trying to make it appear that they have been instrumental in making this happen. It may be that they do not know if a decision is about to take place, but by having their picture taken with the Chancellor, it gives the impression that they are 'working hard' to get a new hospital for King's Lynn.

Either way, whatever does or does not happen on Wednesday, there is one thing that is a certainty. That is, our local MPs are doing all that they can to put themselves, and the Conservative Party in a positive light. Local elections are in May, and the polls suggest that they will not do particularly well. So, giving the impression that they are working hard for the community in getting a hospital will, they hope, get them a few votes.



And looking a bit further ahead, there is a General Election next year, and again, a decision on a new QEH is a potential vote winner. And particularly for former Prime Minister Liz Truss, whose reputation was damaged by her short period in office, being seen to be a key figure in getting a positive decision would do her no harm at all.

And just to make clear, if no decision is made within the next few days, it will be kicked further down the road until at least the middle of May, after the elections.



Campaigners though, continue to do what they have been doing for nearly two years, and that is to do all we can to help secure a new hospital. Whether it be through protests outside the hospital, visits to the Health Secretary's office in March, or trips to London, the campaign will go on until we get the promise of funding a much needed, indeed essential, hospital for King's Lynn and the people of Norfolk.

We would like to thank everyone for their generous donations and Tesco's for their kindness in allowing us to use their premises at such short notice.



## TIME FOR SOME PERSONAL TAXATION SPRING CLEANING?

The new tax year starts on 6 April. Could there be a better time to take a long hard look at your personal taxation affairs?

- The first £1,000 of interest is tax free (£500 for a higher rate taxpayer). This simple "quick win" should be considered if you currently have savings sitting on low interest deposit accounts or bank current accounts. After years of negligible interest rates, it is now possible to find accounts paying in excess of 3%.
- Are you making pension contributions outside your payroll deductions and wondering whether you have received the correct tax relief? Even non taxpayers (aged under 75) can save up to £2,880 net each year, and the government will top it up by 20%, so you get the relief at source automatically and if you pay £2,880 you will find £3,600 in your pension account. Higher rate taxpayers will also be able to claim the balance of their relief to 40% in their tax return, reducing the year end liability. Remember, the higher rate relief will not be given automatically, so if you are in this position, it will be necessary to file a self-assessment return - according to some sources many higher rate payers fail to claim this relief and the amount lost runs into hundreds of millions every year. There are restrictions on the maximum level of pension contributions that receive tax relief so these need to be checked if significant amounts are being contemplated. Additionally, as always, any investment decision regarding making pension contributions should be referred to an Independent Financial Adviser.
- Are you making charitable donations under gift aid? Rather like pension contributions, gift aid payments reduce your taxable income, although in this case the basic rate relief goes back to the charity, so a £80 gift aid payment will mean that the charity can claim £20 from the government. However, a higher rate taxpayer can also claim the difference between basic and higher rates personally, so would see a repayment or tax reduction in the year-end tax bill. Those who fall within the 60% tax band (see below) could actually have half their charitable deduction refunded in this way – perhaps enabling them to make even more charitable donations. The maximum gift aid relief will be restricted to the total income for the year. There is a limited opportunity to "carry back" gift aid payments to the previous year, but only in respect of payments made after the year end and before the tax return is submitted. This is a rare opportunity to retrospectively "fine tune" income for optimum use of the rate bands.
- Make the most of your marital status / review your individual and joint shareholdings. Gifts between spouses or those in civil partnerships are not subject to capital gains tax (CGT) and take place on a "No Gain/No Loss" basis. With the annual allowances for CGT dropping to £6,000 for 2023/24 and then £3,000 in the following year, splitting the ownership of investments between you as a married/civil partnership couple can reduce the CGT liability when they are eventually sold. Since the tax-free dividend allowance is also reducing (to £1,000, then £500) this course of action can have more immediate benefits. Moreover, since those with more than £500 of dividend income will need to file self-assessment returns by 2024/25, sharing dividend income might well save the need for that chore. It is estimated that over 4 million shareholders will be caught by these new rules. Alternatively, or additionally, if the shares can be liquidated without triggering a CGT charge, it may be advantageous to sell them and repurchase within an ISA, where they will be exempt from both CGT AND dividend tax in future but again IFA advice should be taken.

• Watch your tax rates: From 2023/24 these are:

Up to £12,570 nil NON-TAXPAYER £12,571-£50,270 20% BASIC RATE £50,271-£100,000 40% HIGHER RATE

£100,001-£125,139 60% MARGINAL RATE: SEE BELOW

Over £125,139 45% ADDITIONAL RATE

Many people do not realise that there is an effective 60% band – this arises because personal allowances are reduced by 50p per pound of income where income is over £100,000. The government has made it clear that these bands will not be increased in line with inflation, so many more taxpayers will be affected in coming years.

All this means that careful attention to income levels can be well worthwhile, those in business who may be able to time capital expenditure for best tax effect, but almost everyone can use pension contributions or charitable donations to keep income in the lowest band possible.



#### **Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring**

Spring is well underway, though, as I write, we have a cold spell and snow is falling. However, Park home residents have received their £400 fuel subsidy at last!

We remain in a drought that has followed us from last year and seems set to continue through this. The agenda for the Environment and Community Panel meeting in February was about water management and flooding

A staff member of the Internal Drainage Boards gave a good explanation of what they did to keep much of West Norfolk from surface water flooding whilst improving the ecology where they could. The cost of maintenance and pumping stations is huge which is why you and I pay a large proportion of our Council Tax to them. As said in a previous Newsletter, this tax burden is, perhaps, unfairly levied on areas such as ours and government, having caused it to be charged locally some years ago, is looking at it again. Interestingly, a recent TV programme reported on recycling surface water drainage back to the land rather than letting it run into the sea. Rewetting the Fenland will help alleviate drought problems and keep the peat from drying out.

The other presentation, by the Environment Agency, was about flooding by sea water incursion and coastal erosion which has made the news recently along the North Norfolk coast. Adaptation and resilience are the key words which effectively means being 'better prepared for flooding and 'transition' which appears, to me, to be a nod towards the more emotive 'planned withdrawal' from at risk areas.

The second of three resilience actions is 'avoiding inappropriate development in the flood plain'. Taking it at face value means that much of the development proposed or in the pipeline for West Norfolk should not happen as water tables are often high and the height above sea level small. Hence the IDB and sea defences around Lynn. However, the Borough is set housing number targets by the government and the rules are, if you can't build houses in appropriate locations elsewhere then you can build them where they are likely to flood - if you take measures to protect the inhabitants: Raise floor levels; no single storey homes; move power points higher etc.

I mention all this because a second meeting I attended was of the Local Plan Task Group which has overseen the writing and submission of the revised Local Plan. Government Planning Inspectors, at the recent public hearing, effectively threw the Plan back for more work to be done. It is unfortunate that the officers who could have best represented the revised plan at the hearings have all left the authority.

Anyway, a big sticking point was the massive West Winch proposals which put houses in a wet area with poor road links (bid for but not yet secured). The inspectors want more work done on that and 'a housing requirement calculated for designated neighbourhood areas'. This could spell trouble for some Neighbourhood Plan areas as the Borough has told them all that there is no need for development. Before the vultures start circulating here, they can buzz off, because of the Heacham NP accepting already allocated sites not yet built out (Cheney Hill); we more than meet any future fiddling of the books.

Aside from that, planning inspectors should be having their wings clipped as it has been announced several times by Government, specifically Gove, that the housing requirement numbers calculated by the approved formulae, will be a guide only, not a requirement and could be less if local needs can be met or there are problems with development (flooding?). We wait and see.

A third meeting, that of the Member Major Projects Board, discussed, surprisingly, major projects the Borough is involved in. Several of these were red rated against criteria used to monitor them. One of these, the much flaunted carbon reduction scheme which received £3.8 million pounds of public money to reduce the carbon footprint of public buildings. Essentially this meant replacing gas heating with air source heat pumps. Well, a reduction was made but the heat pumps couldn't cope with cold weather so gas was used to supplement them. Consequently, two heating systems have to run in tandem with associated costs. A warning to all who are contemplating putting heat pumps in older properties.

At the same meeting, there was an amber warning for the infamous Parkway housing development due to 'local opposition' and, incidentally, it may prove to be economically unviable (it is another wet site).

Several Town Deal projects are under pressure due to projected cost overruns. As I intimated last month, the balanced Council budget, kept that way by using reserves faces significant challenges.

I have championed the Heacham Neighbourhood Plan in recent issues. I am sorry to have to inform you that an application which failed to meet one bullet point in a policy was approved by planning committee. This was due to several factors; an officer's interpretation was incorrect and defended; too many planning committee members do not understand, still, neighbourhood plans and several members, who do, were absent for legitimate reasons. Planning can be a lottery and this does need to change.

The two related planning applications which straddle Lamsey Lane junction made by Wild Ken Hill will have come to planning committee on the 2nd April. It has always been anticipated that there would be long overdue junction improvements and these applications would enable them to happen. Highways, whilst acknowledging there are problems on the A149 where it meets Lamsey Lane, have said that the developments will have no impact on that junction. I asked (in February) for a Highways representative to be present at planning committee in April to explain their reasoning. To be continued.



The Parish Council's policy of humane management is not a quick fix, but with Parishioners' support of its no feeding request, current numbers can be controlled and the flock can be maintained at a naturally sustainable balance.

The Parish Council continues to urge residents not to feed the ducks or geese. This is particularly important to prevent mother ducks bringing ducklings off the ponds and onto the roads.

Nesting season will soon be upon us and so now is a good time to spot pairs of ducks hanging around on your property, looking for possible nesting sites. If one does lay eggs on your property then let us know and we will send our PMO to come and prick the eggs, so as to try to keep numbers down to a manageable level. We currently have a small waiting list for our allotments on Sedgeford Road with no vacant quarter plots. Voters will be able to use expired ID if they are still recognisable from the photo. Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online at voter-authoritycertificate.service.gov.uk/ or by completing a paper form. The full list of accepted ID is available on the Electoral Commission's website, along with more information about the new requirement and details of how to apply for the free ID, at www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID If you are unable to get photo ID then a postal vote may be an option and forms are available in the Parish Office and Parish Library.
