Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

I recently made a beef and vegetable casserole in my slow cooker; I added extra vegetables knowing there would be some tasty gravy left. Next day I simply put the gravy and vegetables

into a jug and, using my hand blender, whizzed it for a couple of minutes, reheated it and enjoyed it as a soup with nice chunky bread. This recipe makes a similar tasty, nourishing soup.

Beef and Vegetable Soup

Ingredients:

50g/2oz Minced Steak
1 medium size Carrot
1 medium size onion
1 medium size Parsnip
1 medium size Potato
Beef or vegetable stock cube
Cooking oil or fat
Salt and pepper

Method:

Trim, peel and thinly slice onion. Trim off ends of vegetables, peel and cut into small pieces. Dissolve stock cube in 500ml of hot water. Add a little oil or fat to a saucepan and, over a low to medium heat, fry onion and minced steak for a few minutes stirring constantly breaking it up.

Remove from the saucepan, cover and keep to one side. Don't worry if you cannot get all of meat from saucepan. Stir in other vegetables and mix well, add stock, bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer for 15-20 minutes, or until vegetables are soft.

Strain off most of liquid into a jug, put aside while you either put vegetables into liquidiser or use hand blender and whizz for a couple of minutes. Return liquid to pureed vegetables in saucepan, stirring gently to mix well, add salt and pepper if required. When all liquid is mixed in, add cooked onion andminced steak, reheat, stirring gently. Turn off heat and enjoy.

NHS

In the present climate of what seems to be universal industrial action, it is easy to feel the inconvenience and dismiss it all. Having spent my working life as a teacher and sole earner to a family of four with a mortgage, I find it hard to accept that teachers must demand a salary increase of the size they want or have to rely on food banks. I find it hard to accept Mick Lynch (We're the working class and we're back) on a 6 figure salary making his demands.

There is, however, one sector where I have far more experience than I would have wished, which, however, I feel gives me some right to have my say, and I'm referring to our fantastic NHS.

In 2019, I underwent a AAA at Addenbrookes - literally a life saver. Then, at Queen Elizabeth Hospital, King's Lynn, the biopsy which had been delayed due to risks before the AAA; that was followed by a course of hormone therapy and radiotherapy at Norfolk and Norwich. Then at the end of January, an emergency call via 111/999 led to a stay at QEH, in the news unfortunately for all the wrong reasons - it is literally falling down round our ears while we wait for our long overdue new hospital.

My knee became swollen and painful to the point I could not walk during Sunday. At 5pm I gave in to the pain, and phoned 111. I was told it was a busy night but they would get back when they could. I phoned again soon after, as the symptoms were getting worse. At 2am the call handler phoned back - he had spoken to the doctor, who obviously picked up on something and said 999, immediately. At 5am the ambulance service informed me I was on the list but could face a wait of 7 hours or more. At 6.30am the ambulance arrived and I was in A & E by 9am on Monday. By 11am I was with a doctor and my knee x-rayed; there was some delay, but the Osteopaths saw me by 4pm, and said the knee had to be aspirated doesn't sound bad, but painful in the extreme when it happens. The consultant saw the result and admitted me - as urgent, first operation on Tuesday. The knee was sluiced and drained via keyhole, and I was put on a heavy dose of penicillin via IV four times a day.

It seems I had somehow picked up a heavy dose of staphylococcus, which could have led to sepsis, amputation, death, if not dealt with, as I found out later. Sufficient to say, prompt action has put me on the road to recovery at home, still on a heavy dose of penicillin tablets, twice a day.

During my stay in hospital, I met what I can only describe as an army of angels - consultants, registrars, nurses of various grades, Health Care Assistants, auxiliaries, college students on work experience, domestic staff. OK, to be totally honest, there were one or two agency staff, mainly on night shift, who seemed to lack a degree of patient empathy - as one HCA commented, "You have to care to be in this job; if you're only in it for the money, you're in the wrong job." I say one or two; the vast majority of agency staff were every bit as caring and professional as permanent staff.



They care for us, feed us, wash us and yes, even wipe our bums when we can't manage; I saw them put up with misogynist, racist, physically threatening abuse from patients with dementia, or suffering a bad reaction to anaesthetic, or short temper from those of us who find that our own suffering makes us rather selfish and forgetful that there are others whose need is at least as great as our own. They know when to cajole and when to bully when getting out of bed and getting moving is just too much trouble. And they do it all with the same caring, smiling cheerfulness that lets us know that everything will be alright.

I realise that every pay rise has to be funded from somewhere, and debate goes on as to whether more money in the NHS is the answer, or better use of what there is. But I have to say from my experience, while the powers that be ponder on these questions, we have a dedicated body of caring professionals who deserve to be front of the queue to get all they ask, and who are surely a more deserving case than many others at present taking action.



The Saltings

A little reminder where and what The Saltings are. Located on land behind Heacham north beach, The Saltings were designated a County Wildlife site in 2000. The reed bed is a priority habitat in the Norfolk Biodiversity Action Plan; it is the only remaining wild open land behind the beach and after 20 years it is a well established and used asset in our village identity.

The title was passed to Heacham Parish Council from the Crown Estate so that the area could be protected from encroachment and fly-tipping. It is the intention of the Council to preserve this sanctuary for future generations. There is a dense stand of reed and occasional patches of willow-herb, false fox-sedge; there are species such as wild carrot, tufted hair grass and buckshorn plantain. Wildlife seen in the past year include Muntjac deer, voles, green snakes, lizards, etc not to mention countless species of bird life.

This year we have a new addition to the amenities on site, a bird watching hide for anyone, from the most enthusiastic twitcher to the novice bird watcher, to view the birds and wildlife towards the north to Hunstanton and eastwards whilst hidden from sight. The hide, built by a small group of Heacham Parish Councillors and parishioners, was funded by a Community infrastructure levy grant and is now

open all the year round for you to enjoy. There are a few outside ground work projects to put in place, hopefully that will be complete before the summer.



Hare today and gone tomorrow; Spring Marches upon us. The 20th is the Spring Equinox when day and night are equal in length. It happens at 9.24pm. And don't forget to 'Spring Forward' as British Summer Time starts at 1am on the 26th.



Equinox, day = night due to the Earth's axis being at right angles to the Sun's rays. Internet


A comet at the end of January and the first half of February made the news, it was green and only appears every 50,000 years. I never mentioned it as comets rarely live up to expectations. At the time of writing, 11th Feb, I still haven't seen it, though circumstances limited my own observation opportunities. I will persevere but clouds are back. I do know people who did see it and had wonderful photos so it must be there! (It is still around the first half of this month but much fainter).

This month begins with the note I made at the end of last month; on the 1st a very bright (magnitude -4.0) Venus is very close to a much fainter Jupiter (mag 2.1). I did view Venus last month when it was just over the top of a neighbouring bungalow and it was nice to scan from that along an arc which ended over my head. That's where Mars lay and, in between was Jupiter. You will be able to make a similar move this month, though Jupiter will be much closer to Venus as the gas giant heads ever closer to the western horizon, vanishing by the end of the month.

On the 23rd, there is a nice alignment of Jupiter, Venus and the crescent Moon. Catch it early, from 6pm, before Jupiter slips below the horizon. The next night, around 7.30, the crescent Moon is much closer to Venus. The last time I saw that, the sea nearly breached the dunes at North Beach.

Venus will get higher as the month progresses and, by the end, won't set until 11pm, so the goddess is obviously partying on.

Shy Uranus is close to Venus in the last week. It is faint at magnitude + 4.8 and this month is the last decent opportunity to try to find it. Good, steady binoculars on a clear night should do the job. A blue dot floating in infinite darkness (though Venus will spoil that).





Mars is still around but much fainter than in earlier months. The Earth has sped away from it and distance means everything; brightness diminishes by the square of the distance – double distance divide brightness by 4, treble distance divide it by 9. And, as the alignment of outer planet, Earth and the Sun deteriorates so less light is reflected from the planet.

Anyway, Mars doesn't set until the early hours and it will be a little below the fat crescent Moon on the 28th. 8pm-ish would be a good and civilised time to look.

A little stargazing to do. Look due north between 10 and 11pm and about a third of the way up the sky try to make out a gable ended house – Cepheus. Just to the west of this is, perhaps, the more easily recognisable W of Cassiopeia. Just below Cepheus, where the sewer to the house might be, is the Garnet Star.

This star is 1,000 times bigger and 100,000 times brighter than our Sun. It transcends supergiant, it is a hypergiant. Dim in our skies because of its distance of, maybe, 3,200 light years (according to Gaia space telescope). Its distance appears controversial as different techniques produce different results. It is variable and on the path to becoming a supernova – it will revert to a different type of star and then explode.






Right; Read the following paragraph and use this diagram as an aid too.

Look south, back to the ecliptic, and follow it from Venus, through Mars. On that line, almost due south will be the centre of Cancer, a threelegged pattern of



stars. Just above the centre you may see a faint fuzziness which is the buzzing bees of a cluster of stars (Beehive cluster or Praesepe which means 'The Manger'). Steady binoculars will reveal them. There is a mixed bag of around 1,000 stars ranging from red giants to white dwarfs about 600 light years distant. The cluster has similarities (spectral type, mix, age) to the Hyades cluster which will be well over to the west, above and beyond Orion. They may have started life together, or not.



Messier 44 is what I am talking about above. Messier 67 is a much fainter cluster as it is around 3000 light years distant. It is called the King Cobra or Golden Eye Cluster. Internet

I went to a talk on the history of Chinese astronomy, which was not influenced by Greek mythology. Ancient Chinese names for patterns in the sky are more prosaic. They have animals, parts of buildings and references to emperors. They do have a dipper which refers to a rice dipper, not a big. The Chinese noted events in the sky accurately, several thousand years before the West.

A miscellany:

The failed satellite launch from Cosmic Girl, operating from Spaceport Cornwall, was due to 'an anomaly' which covers all possibilities I suppose.

There is enough wind at Mars's poles to power wind turbines; Octopus will need a long cable though.

It is possible that if you travel through a wormhole to a far-off place in the universe you could send a message back through it, However, the wormhole would then collapse and you couldn't return so 'Goodbye' seems an appropriate communication.

Make the most of dark evenings as they will soon vanish. Catch Venus and the Moon together and think of a suitable message to send as you travel through that wormhole.

Stop Press. Report any balloons you see!





March Hare?!!

Mad about modelling?

Having been born in the city of Edmonton, Canada, I was baffled when a friend told me about the Mad March Hare and suggested my incorporating it into this article. Of course I'm familiar with the March Hare in Alice in Wonderland but isn't it the Hatter that's Mad?

So what does google say? The March Hare is indeed mad (as a hatter?). Maybe that's why they make such a good pair.;-)

Hare behaviour mostly seen in March includes boxing matches, jumping around, running in circles and crazy chases. This madness is the hares mating ritual.



The hare has also become a favourite theme in my clay modelling class and some people are mad about making one. Modelling isn't restricted to hares. Other animals, the human figure, imaginary characters and monsters or even abstract shapes can be modelled out of clay.

Clay modelling is one of the most rewarding ways of doing sculpture and it is actually quite safe. In contrast, with carving, everything you do is finite. Once something is removed there is no putting it back.

The beauty of modelling is that you can experiment without committing to what you have tried. If you don't like it or it doesn't seem right, you just take it away and try something else. You get to put your hands into the clay and get a feel of the material — push, pull, squeeze — move it around.

First, the rough shape is blocked out. Then more detail is added. This is refined, again through adding and taking away, until the piece is 'declared finished'. It is a very personal process that should not be rushed but enjoyed. It can also be very meditative.

Once the sculpture is completed, it is dried to leather hard. Then it is cut in half and hollowed out. The two halves are joined together and finished again around the

When the sculpture dries it can be fired. Usually I fire slowly to a lower temperature (bisque or bisquit) to give everything the best chance of getting through the firing. (So far everything has come through well.) This also gives the opportunity for further steps such as adding colour before firing to the final temperature.

Here are a couple of quotes from people who have taken my course:

"I thoroughly enjoyed my first attempt at ceramic sculpture and was well pleased with the result. I have tried throwing pots on a wheel before but under Esther's guidance managed to create my arctic hare sculpture."



"I enjoy Esther's workshop because all participants have the opportunity to create what they want to make. If you are a beginner, she gives suggestions about what you could make and shows you how to successfully achieve it. If you know what you want to make, she will support you as necessary. I like the freedom of self-directed work and am very thankful for her sensitive guidance when required. She is very inspirational and helpful and the results are beautiful, diverse and express the creativity of the individual members of the group."

You will be treated to a cup with "Drink me" on it as well.



1953 Floods 70th Anniversary Tribute

For the 65th anniversary of the East Coast Floods, I wrote an article for the Newsletter about the disaster as experienced by the crews at Heacham Fire Station. In particular, I told the story of one of the appliances and its crew who were caught in the flood water whilst attempting to reach Snettisham beach.

For this year's 70th anniversary, the son of one of that crew decided to pay tribute to those men and to remember those who perished, in a unique way. Jon England just happens to own an Austin K2 Auxiliary Towing Vehicle or ATV which originally served in the National Fire Service during World War Two. He also has a Dennis trailer pump of similar vintage and together, this type of wartime equipment continued to be in use right up to the 1960's in many cases.

Jon's father, Jack, would've been very familiar with the ATV and trailer pump as it was with this combination that he and the crew set off for Snettisham beach on the evening of 31st January 1953.

Neither the vehicle nor the crew made it to the beach properties that night as they were swamped by the sea quite some distance from their objective. They became part of the disaster as the water level forced them on to the roof of the ATV which they hoped would not be washed away like so much else around them. They were fortunate in that they survived to tell the tale.

Jon's idea for marking this significant anniversary was to use his ATV and trailer pump to retrace the journey made by his father and the crew that night, to stop at the point where they met the sea and then to carry on to the beach as they had wanted to.

I was very pleased to be invited to come along and be part of what might sound like a small and simple gesture, but was actually something quite powerful in terms of the emotions it provoked.

Tuesday 31st January 2023 was a lovely winter's day. Whenever you're doing anything with old vehicles, you hope for dry weather as it eliminates a whole host of potential issues. Jon prepares his vehicles to a high standard but there's always going to be an element of worrying about what could go wrong but on this day, nothing did. Also joining us on board was Jon's brother, Andrew and the Heritage Snapper' who took some amazing photographs of the day.

Our journey proper began at the current Heacham Fire Station as the one in use back in 1953 has long since been demolished. This was one of a number of compromises we were happy to accept as it was just not possible to have everything exactly the same. The roads have changed a lot since 1953 (who remembers Teapot Corner?) and the ATV itself would've been painted red, not wartime grey by then but none of these things really had any bearing on the spirit of what we were doing which was all about remembering the sacrifices and suffering of 70 years ago.



Once on Beach Road, Snettisham, we halted at a location chosen because of Jack's account of his experience. After being swamped by the sea, there was the option of trying to swim to a bungalow they could see if they'd had to abandon their vehicle. There are still some standing where we stopped which appear to predate the floods and so we hopefully weren't too far away from where they had been. After taking some photographs, we continued to the beach to further reflect upon what it would've been like back then.

It's really quite hard I think, especially for younger people who have known nothing other than a world where news can travel around the planet in seconds, to understand that for most of the people caught up in the disaster, by the time they realised they were in danger, it was already too late. We were re- enacting something that happened not on a bright clear day, but in darkness and although there was a cold wind blowing, it only served to give the merest hint of conditions back then.

We ended our tribute with a visit to the Floods Memorial in Snettisham market place and I think I'll end this piece with the same words I used five years ago: We must never forget the past because it always has so much to teach us.

Why Indigenous Art is Special

The traditional people who come from the land are the indigenous, so-called as the descendants of those who lived in a country or region at the time when people of different cultures and ethnic

origins arrived. They inhabit large areas of the world, from the Arctic to the South Pacific, approximately some 300 million people. Since the beginning of time, indigenous people have used and continue to use art as a means of storytelling to establish the knowledge, events and beliefs of their people.

Often the common theme is the strong ties to the land, nature, seasons and animals. The connection is through the four elements of wind, water, fire and air, along with attention to physical, spiritual and intellectual realms. Many forms of media can be used, including wood and rock carving, rock and sand painting, body painting, sculpture, weaponry. The incorporation of symbols has been used to record significant cultural issues, such as the Aboriginal "Dreamtime", as well as teaching the ways by which traditional people from previous generations survived on the land. It is not an ownership of the land, more a custodianship.

Contemporary arts practices undertaken in remote areas promote the use of natural resources, which gives the incentive to indigenous people to cultivate the use of their ecological knowledge so that these resources are protected and managed sustainably. The environment also benefits when traditional people reside on their land. For example, customary fire regimes are continued and maintained to reduce fires that destroy raw material inputs to the arts.

The oldest known civilisation on earth is believed to be the Aboriginal Australians, dating back some 75,000 years. Their rock art paintings are believed to be the oldest art by human beings, by some thousands of years, and their culture probably the oldest in the world. Rituals and ceremonies involving spirts were also recorded with body and sand paintings. This art, dating from between 30,000 and 80,000 years ago, has been hidden in remote locations, and the surviving examples have mostly been discovered in caves and rocks. For centuries no respect was shown to their culture until a gradual change in attitude from the 1970s. As late as the 1980s, real examples of their art would not have been seen by most white Australians.

Indigenous visual arts and crafts play a meaningful role in today's art sector, particularly in economics, with benefits felt by individual artists and their communities, the art industry, commercial sectors and nations as a whole through domestic and international tourism. Success does not always translate into financial success and better living standards for many artists, such as the Aboriginals. Whilst they are vital to the success of indigenous art, they often earn a small part of the overall "take". This cash income is vital, especially in remote

areas, where the concept of sharing is significant, and the money derived from the art may be the only non governmental income supporting the community. It has been said that 'Australia's greatest cultural gift to the world' and their 'most profound, significant and important cultural export' is the indigenous art of The Aboriginals. The benefits and aspects are numerous. For example - health, self esteem particularly amongst the young, pride, maintenance of culture, inter-generational learning, social and spiritual benefits, and the provision of much of a nation's 'corporate identity'.



A FEW TIPS FOR PRE-5 APRIL 2023 TAX PLANNING

Now that the 2022 Tax Returns have been filed and the end of the current tax year is nearly upon us, it is well worth setting some time aside to look at what needs to be considered in the next few weeks to see if it possible to use the available tax reliefs as fully as possible by 5 April. Please note that the suggestions below only refer to the TAX consequences of various courses of action. Advice from a qualified Independent Financial Adviser will be needed regarding the investment aspects of any decision.

Some of the key areas are:

Personal Allowances

Make full use of your personal allowance, savings allowance, starting and basic rate bands. Equalisation of income between spouses/civil partners with children where possible may also ensure that your income remains under the £50,000 threshold for the High Income Child Benefit Charge.

Dividend Income

The tax-free dividend allowance (originally £5,000 and now £2,000) will be reduced to £1,000 in 2023/24 and £500 in the following year. Wherever possible, assuming the company has sufficient distributable reserves, consider bringing forward the payment of dividends to ensure that as many shareholders as possible benefit from this relief whilst it is still available.

Capital Gains

The Capital Gains Tax Annual Exemption will drop from £12,300 to £6,000 on 6 April and then to £3,000 in April 2024. Those with latent Capital Gains should certainly consider realising up to £12,300 before April. The Annual Exemption cannot be carried forward or transferred so it is lost if not used during the tax year.

Individual Savings Accounts

Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) are probably the most straightforward way of investing tax efficiently and shouldn't be overlooked. Every taxpayer can make use of an Individual Savings Account (ISA) within which no CGT or dividend tax applies. The maximum annual contribution is a generous £20,000 (or £9,000 into a junior ISA).

Inheritance Tax Exemptions

Turning to Inheritance Tax, although the annual reliefs have not been increased for many years, they can still be valuable, particularly where they are used regularly. Individuals can each make capital gifts of £3,000 annually, and the allowance can be carried forward for one year, so if nothing was given in 2021/22 the exemption available up to 5 April this year will be £6,000 or £12,000 for a married couple. In addition, £250 can be given to anyone who has not received part of the larger amount.

Pension Contributions

Pensions are a very tax efficient tool, which, subject to taking advice from an Independent Financial Adviser, can be used as part of a wider wealth and tax planning strategy. Pension contributions are particularly attractive to taxpayers who suffer the progressive tapering of their personal allowance as income in this band suffers a marginal rate of 60%.

Remain aware, however, that there are special rules where the total of all contributions, whether employee or employer contributions, exceed the Annual Allowance of £40,000 and unused relief brought forward. Hence, professional advice should always be sought before proceeding.

Charitable Giving

Contributions to charity under the Gift Aid scheme by a taxpayer will extend the normal tax bands. At the basic rate level, the charity receiving the money will be able to recover 25% on the amount gifted. For those with income between £100,000 and £150,000 the effects can be quite startling. A gift of £10,000 made

by a taxpayer in this bracket would result in the charity receiving £12,500 and the taxpayer reducing his/her tax bill by £5,000.

Capital Allowances

Businesses will normally be able to claim relief for qualifying capital expenditure within their accounting year (which will not always be the fiscal year) so those with a 5 April or 31 March year end may wish to review capital expenditure plans in the light of expected income, with a view to accelerating or deferring it for best tax effect.

Check your NIC Record

Those planning to claim the UK State Pension should check their National Insurance record before 5 April 2023 in order to identify any shortfalls in their NI history. Currently, voluntary contributions can be made to plug gaps back to April 2006, but this will be curtailed from April this year. Specific financial advice must always be taken when making the decision to make voluntary contributions.

Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

Warmer days are coming which will be welcome as energy costs have adversely affected most people. Whilst these have been tempered, a little, by Government subsidies, those who live in park homes are still awaiting theirs (at time of writing 10th Feb). The latest date promised is the 27th February when it is supposed to be put in the hands of local authorities to administer. I hope that is the case. I will ask the Borough to do what they can to expedite matters.

The last full Council ended in a bit of disarray. My motion on the proposed County Devolution Deal had scarcely begun when the meeting was closed as it had met the three-hour deadline (it can be extended by a vote but it was not to be). My motion asked for more information about the deal other than the rather biased road show from NCC. A little more has emerged since which convinces me that the deal is anything but open and transparent and a hidden agenda likely exists for forthcoming years.

The carrot is £20m/year for 30 years (to the County). This is not index linked and will not be available for essential services. The stick (elected leader) effectively decides what projects the money is spent on. That leader cannot be removed during the term of office. There is consultation on The Deal but no public vote. County Cllrs will decide for you.

My other motion was asking for a statement that the Borough is neutral on proposals for a Wash barrier and that it, the Borough, would act as a receptacle for the views of Parish councils, organisations and businesses likely to be affected one way or another (should the idea gain traction). An extraordinary council meeting has been called on 9th March for this and other matters to be concluded.

Three matters which took up all of the time at last Council were: 1. The West Winch Growth Area Masterplan where the debate was whether it should be ratified or not. The current Local Plan examination had been suspended with matters concerning West Winch left unclear; a very close vote levered it through. 2. The

Council Tax Support Scheme; moves to improve the offer this makes to hard pressed residents was very narrowly defeated. 3. Parkway Development Update, where the proposal was to increase the budget for this by a further £6m. This is the development which, after much pressure from locals and the opposition, was halved in size. It is now facing increasing development costs which will likely add to Council financial problems down the line.

The budget for the Borough Council has been the subject of numerous presentations. It will have come before full Council at the end of February. The simple picture is that a balanced budget has been achieved for the next three years with no increase in service charges and the 3% increase in Council Tax permitted by government. This has been achieved by running down reserves from their existing high levels to a necessary 5% safety margin.

In fact, the budget will be reviewed by Jan 2024 and it may be that fees and taxes will then have to be increased to demonstrate to auditors and watchdogs that there is a plan to avoid the significant deficit (around £5m) in 2026 when there will be no reserves to fall back on. There is a possibility that salvation will come from a government review into how councils with significant flood risk, like West Norfolk, fund Internal Drainage Boards. Though the latter do an excellent job, currently they take far too a high a proportion of Council Tax.

I mentioned the Rural Prosperity Fund last month. More has been revealed and the words describing elements of it are not always clear, e.g., 'impactful volunteering'. Details will shortly be available on line and via Parish Councils. I have put a marker in for an element linked to 'community' and hope that small businesses in the Ward might also be eligible to apply.

Rubbish – a word you might apply to my wanderings and anything 'political'. However, I mean unwanted stuff disposed of at the recycling centre, via your bins, or unlawfully thrown onto verges one way or another. The County is still minded to reduce opening hours at recycling centres, comments to your county councillor



please. The amount of rubbish on roadsides has suddenly increased hugely. One reason is that hedges have been cut back revealing trapped rubbish which no-one thought to have cleared by a vehicle following behind. In addition, litter collection by the Borough appears to have stopped or been reduced. I can't tell you what is true because, to date, they won't tell me. I am pursuing the matter.

I don't usually comment on Hunstanton but the fact that a travel 'hub' is now going to be developed at the site of the bus station is good news for my Ward too. This is not a result of sudden common sense by the County and the Borough but is pragmatic. The bus station was going to be a mixed development of retail and flats and both Councils argued that a bus station was not needed. Building regulations have stopped those plans and money for rural travel has, serendipitiously, been made available.

Locally, you may have read of the application for a watch tower at North Beach which failed. The story was clouded by assumptions and misleading statements. The application was principally for a new build holiday home in a place where such construction would contravene the Borough's Local Plan and several policies in the Heacham Neighbourhood Plan. The Environment Agency and the local flood officer also refused the application and the planning committee voted unanimously against it. The 'watch tower' on the holiday property was not underpinned by any management structure which would actually ensure its use in a meaningful way.

Neighbourhood Plans in Heacham, Sedgeford and Hunstanton were created after much work and public consultation. It was disappointing that a neighbour, Hunstanton, sought to ignore or dismiss Heacham's at this planning committee.

Still no update on the Cheney Hill development, Heacham. Apparently, developers really are taking the Neighbourhood Plan into account.

Wild Scythe


The Heacham Saltings, our coastal wetland reed cutting with scythes event, is on Sunday March 5th. Scything with Austrian scythes.



FOOTPATH STATION ROAD

The Parish Council are very pleased to see works to the new footpath completed. This work will benefit many of its users as it is now wide enough for wider wheeled pushchair etc.

TREE AND HEDGE TRIMMING

Please make sure all trees and hedges on your property are not affecting the use of the pavements or roads. Cut them back now before nesting season begins. Please see last month's issue for a visual guide to trimming trees and shrubs which abut footpaths and roadways. Once the nesting season is underway and you are not allowed to 'cut back', please remember it is okay to trim if they are causing an obstruction.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Parish Council has been granted a licence to treat Greylag Goose and Mallard Duck eggs. The licence permits the Council to treat nests on private property in the village, but only at the invitation of the property owner.

The Parish Council's policy of humane management is not a quick fix, but with Parishioners' support of its no feeding request, current numbers can be controlled and the flock can be maintained at a naturally sustainable balance.

The Parish Council continues to urge residents not to feed the ducks or geese. This is particularly important to prevent mother ducks bringing ducklings off the ponds and onto the Roads.
