The Big Hedgerow Help Out during May

The Campaign to Protect Rural England, CPRE, is running a Hedgelife Help Out between 1st and 31st May. It is nothing strenuous as it requires a stroll along hedgerows and the use of your eyes to record what you see. There is the inevitable App to help you out. Google CPRE Hedgelife Help Out. Registration is via the national Big Help Out scheme which I found clumsy in April but it may be better now.

Hedgehogs

These creatures need all the help they can get and are out and about now. Supplement their diet, if necessary, with hedgehog food or cat food, not milk. Put out water which is essential as days get hotter and dryer. Make a gap under fences to allow them to move around and keep an eye out on roads. They won't damage your car but they are a sad sight the next morning.

The British Hedgehog Preservation Society, BHPS, is a good call if you are interested, and The People's Trust for Endangered Species, PTES, has a Wild Isles Community Fund which, until 10th May, will triple any contribution made to their Hedgehog Street Campaign.

Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

I did plan to share a recipe for a vegetable and lentil bake this month but I made a couple myself and I'm afraid they weren't a success so that is something I must work on. Hope you like this recipe:

Macaroni Cheese with Leek

Makes 2 generous servings.

Ingrerdients:

150g/5oz dried Macaroni pasta
25g/1oz Butter
25g/1oz Plain flour
300ml/½ pint Milk
¼ teaspoon mustard (I use powder)
100g/4oz strong flavoured Cheddar Cheese grated
Salt & Pepper
230g/8oz Leek sliced
You will need a 850ml/1½ pint ovenproof dish.

Method:

Put leek slices in a colander and rinse well with cold water then transfer them to a saucepan and add the milk, carefully bring to the boil, reduce heat and simmer until leeks are tender.

Bring a medium size saucepan of lightly salted water to the boil add the macaroni boil for 5 minutes then drain. Using a slotted spoon, remove leek slices from milk and place in an ovenproof dish spreading evenly. Mix mustard powder into flour. Melt butter in a saucepan; add flour and mustard powder beating quickly to form a smooth base for the sauce.

Remove from heat while you carefully stir in milk a little at a time until all mixed then return to heat and bring to the boil still stirring constantly. Reduce heat to simmer, add salt and pepper to taste. Cook for 2 minutes stirring often. Add par cooked macaroni to pan, stir and cook for 4 minutes. The starches in the pasta will thicken the sauce as it cooks.

Preheat grill to medium. Remove sauce from heat and stir in 2/3rd of the cheese. Pour sauce over leeks, spreading evenly. Sprinkle over remaining cheese and grill for approximately 6 minutes or until cheese is browned and sauce is bubbling.

Serve and Enjoy.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM



According to the 2021 census figures, about one in three people in our village are old enough to remember a Coronation. As I write, during the Easter weekend, there are still a number of details for the Coronation of King Charles yet to be announced, but the basic ceremony can be traced

back more than 1,000 years. The UK is the only European monarchy to retain such a ceremony and we haven't had one for 70 years. This one may be slightly different to reflect national changes over those years.

Although British Coronations have at their heart an Anglican service conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury in Westminster Abbey, the ceremony combines not only religion but also parts of the UK's uncodified constitution and a degree of theatre. The Coronation Oath is the only part required by law. In this, the monarch swears to 'govern the peoples of UK and the Commonwealth realms according to their respective laws and customs.' The anointing is the most sacred part of the ceremony and takes place before the investiture and crowning. This was one of the medieval holy sacraments and emphasised the spiritual status of the Sovereign. The oil which will be used to anoint King Charles has been made from olives grown on the Mount of Olives and in two monasteries near Jerusalem. One of those monasteries is the burial place of the King's paternal grandmother, Princess Alice of Greece. Perfumed with essential oils, this oil reflects the King's personal family connection with the Holy Land.

In a statement to religious leaders soon after his accession, King Charles said: - 'I am a committed Anglican Christian, and at my Coronation I will take an oath relating to the settlement of the Church of England. I have always thought of Britain as a 'community of communities.' That has led me to understand that the Sovereign has an additional duty. It is the duty to protect the diversity of our country, including by protecting the space for Faith itself and its practise through the religions, cultures, traditions and beliefs to which our hearts and minds direct us as individuals. This diversity is not just enshrined in the laws of our country, it is enjoined by my own faith. As a member of the Church of England, my Christian beliefs have love at their very heart. By my most profound convictions, therefore I hold myself bound to respect those who follow other spiritual paths, as well as those who seek to live their lives in accordance with secular ideals. The beliefs that flourish in, and contribute to, our richly diverse society differ. They, and our society, can only thrive through a clear collective commitment to those vital principles of freedom of conscience, generosity of spirit and care for others which are, to me, the essence of our nationhood. I am determined, as King, to preserve and promote those principles across all communities, and for all beliefs, with all my heart.'

Come and join us at the Parish Church or the Methodist Church as we celebrate having a Head of State who, with love, will uphold freedom of belief.



1953 Coronation

I was only a toddler at the time of the Coronation, so I don't remember anything about it. However, I was in London and watched the Procession! My father worked at The Dorchester Hotel in Park Lane. He was a floor waiter on one of the floors (each floor had 3 waiters). My father told me that the Earl and Countess Mountbatten were staying on the floor that my father worked on, and had a suite at the front of the hotel which overlooked Park Lane and had a balcony. As the Earl and Countess were very much involved with the Coronation, the Countess very kindly invited the families of the waiters on that floor to watch the Procession from the balcony of their suite so my mother took me with her when she went to watch. My mother said it poured with rain for most of the day, so she couldn't see much as everyone was inside their carriages or under umbrellas. However, she remembered seeing Queen Salote of Tonga in her open carriage, without an umbrella, quite happily smiling and waving to the crowds despite the rain as she went by!



We lived in Wembley, which is in North West London and Wembley Borough Council (as it was then) presented all the children living in the Borough with a Coronation Mug. I still have mine.

My Memory of the 1953 Coronation

I lived in Church Lane at the time of the Coronation and had Mumps. My mother had called Dr Marshall to come to see me and confirm that I had actually got mumps (it was in the days when doctors did home visits for less important ailments.)

My mother told me Dr Marshall came in, took one look at me and then promptly went into our sitting room to sit down and watch the Coronation on our television.

The television itself was placed in the centre of the room for anyone wishing to watch the happenings at the time. It was a wooden unit that stood by itself with a very small screen no bigger than a biscuit tin lid but it did give everyone the opportunity to view the event!

My Parents' 1953 Coronation Memories

In 1953 when the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place my parents were both young children living in Edmonton in North London. Many years later after marrying they moved to King's Lynn as part of the expanding town scheme and like myself, now live in Heacham.

They both attended coronation street parties. Two of the photos are of the party in Balfour Road where my Dad's family lived. They had a huge party, the street looks great full of people and bunting. They had a fancy dress competition in the morning, which Dad (Dave Chessum) thoroughly enjoyed! The residents all clubbed together to make the stage and hire a live band, where the adults danced into the evening. The paper hats the kids are wearing look fab, and they all received blue commemorative glasses. Dad is seated in the back row in both images, his mum is in the crowd along with his big brothers who are stood under the lamp post.

My Mum (Lynn) lived about a mile away in Deansway, the only photo of the party there is of all the kids together. Mum is the blonde girl at the back being held aloft by her brother in his school cap. At their party they had lots of sports events on a communal field, which linked several streets together. Her Dad

was busy giving out all the prizes and she was taken to different homes where tea parties were in full swing. She remembers eating lots of Jelly, and being given a


commemorative book and mug. She thinks that her oldest brother might of gone to Buckingham Palace with his School to witness the Coronation procession itself.

Memories of the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II

When Elizabeth II was crowned in June 1953, I was 14 and at boarding school near Kidderminster, some 250 miles away from my home.

Coronation Day was Tuesday 2nd June and my school allowed the pupils to have that day off. Most of the pupils lived in and around Kidderminster with just two boys (me and one other) living close to London. I lived in Pinner, Middlesex (near Harrow). Bearing this in mind, the school agreed that us two boys could go home on the Monday (1st June), returning to school on Wednesday (3rd June), thus giving us Coronation Day at home to celebrate the event.

My father, who commuted to London for work, was planning to travel to London to stand near his place of work in the City to watch the Procession after the service in Westminster Abbey. He asked me if I wanted to accompany him – I wasn't sure and suggested he wake me up when he went and I would let him know then. At about 4.00am he woke me as he wanted to get an early train (the underground, tube and buses were operating most of the night then). I was tired and the weather wasn't great so I said 'no thank you' and turned over for a further sleep. I do regret this now – I don't think I realised at the time the significance and importance of the event.

Anyway, my father went, got wet (it rained most of the day), but enjoyed an uplifting experience which he never forgot.

My mother and I, took 3 buses to travel to Muswell Hill in North London, to my uncle, my mother's brother and his wife to watch the Coronation on their television. Not many people had a television then, but my uncle and aunt did! We got there in good time, to find several of their neighbours already clustered round this big brown box in the corner of the living room. Two wooden doors at the top of the contraption opened to reveal a small TV - black and white of course, but thrilling to me who had never seen one before. My uncle was a bus inspector with London Transport and was working that day so we didn't actually get to see him. My aunt was kept busy throughout the day making sure her guests were more than adequately fed and watered. I have vague memories of some of the Coronation Service and of the Procession that followed. I think we made our way home before the Royal Family came out onto the balcony at Buckingham Palace, as we had a long journey and I had a long train journey back to school the following day.

NB: I'm sure some readers of the Newsletter will remember, that news of the successful ascent of Mount Everest by Edmund Hillary and Sherpa Tenzing on 29th May 1953 reached London early on the morning of Coronation Day resulting in some memorable newspaper headlines. As a matter of interest, I met Sir Edmund and Sherpa Tenzing at the Royal Geographical Society (RGS) in Kensington, London, the following year when they came to England to talk to the RGS about their magnificent achievement. They talked about the arduous difficulties they had faced during their ascent of Everest and showed some lantern slides. I was fortunate to have been able to shake their hands afterwards, along with members of the RGS, at the conclusion of the event. (My geography teacher at school was a member of the RGS and, as geography was my favourite subject, and he knew I lived not far from London, he very kindly gave me his ticket for the occasion. I have been so grateful to him ever since.)



May, after the Greek God Maia who looked after plants. May blossom, the flowers of hawthorn hedges and trees. May Bank Holiday or holidays this year, 1st, 8th and 29th.

Anyway, enough of this, you can tell that lightening nights and the current positions of planets means this article needs some padding.

Early hours of the 7th, Halley's Comet returns! Not really, bits of it do in the form of meteorites. The annual Eta Aquarid shower is with us again. There will be bright moonlight but the Earth will be passing through a lot of the debris this year so get out there with your back to Selene and hope for a few clouds to blot it out.

Planets visible in the night sky this month are Venus and Mars. In the early morning sky are Saturn and Jupiter but both of these are towards the east so, realistically, often difficult from our area. Neptune is also rising in the east but will need a decent telescope to view. Uranus and Mercury will be hidden in the glare from the Sun.

I wrote a lot about Venus in the April edition which is available on-line. Suffice it to say it is a tad brighter with a magnitude of -4.2 (new readers, the more negative the brighter). Look vaguely west to the left of where the Sun went down and the bright thing in the sky is Venus. It doesn't set until after midnight which doesn't support its nom de plume 'The Evening Star'. At the end of August, it will be 'The Morning Star' again.

Remember to check out the Goddess of Love with binoculars or a small 'scope and see if you can discern her phase. If the sky is clear around the 19th (New Moon), find a dark spot and see if Venus will cast a shadow for you, it is that bright.



Between the 22nd and 24th a fattening crescent Moon lines up with Venus and Mars. It is below and to the right on the 22nd, just above Mars on the 24th.

Mars is a whole lot fainter than Venus with a magnitude of +1.5. Look at Venus, shift several fists to the left and up a couple. An orange dot will be Mars, the God of War. It sets about the same time as Venus so plenty of time to observe both.

Mars will be in the news again soon as Space X should have launched its Starship for a test flight at the end of April. This is Elon Musk's rocket for Mars and beyond. The most powerful launch vehicle ever developed.

The Space X website sells Mars really well. A little cold, so warm it up. Grow plants, compress the atmosphere. I would go there but I don't suppose he will give me a ticket. Remember that there are plenty of nations on and around Mars already. Orbiting satellites and crawling rovers, it has been a focus of exploration for 52 years. Musk may be the one to land the first people in his reusable rocket.




Mars has two natural satellites, Phobos, fear and panic, and Deimos, terror and dread. They were Mars' best mates. They are more like large rocks and are likely captured asteroids (large rocks in space). Phobos is 14 miles across and Deimos 8 miles.

Phobos orbits Mars about once every 8 hours and Deimos every 30 hours. Phobos is moving ever closer to Mars's surface and is destined to smack into it or become a disc of dust. Kim Stanley Robinson, the author of the Mars trilogy, has future science turning it into a sun-like object to remove the need for his Martians (colonists) to live in domes.

Remember, Mars is close to the crescent Moon on the 24th.

Saturn rises at about 3am in the ESE with a magnitude of 1, fainter than Mars, and will look like a yellow spot. It is close to the Last Quarter Moon on the 13th and 14th.

In the middle of the month, Jupiter appears bright at magnitude -2.1, look NE from 4am if you are keen. On the 17th May the Moon will be close.

As I write, on the 13th April, Jupiter is in the news as the European Space Agency's JUICE mission is due to launch on its 8-year journey to the gas giant. The acronym stands for 'Jupiter Icy Moons Explorer 'as the craft will take close looks at Ganymede, Callisto and Europa, three of Jupiter's Galilean moons.

Regular readers will know that the Galilean Moons include Io and all are visible through powerful binoculars, a birding 'scope or a small telescope. Io is the closest to Jupiter and is a volcanic world not considered a potential abode of life. The other three are interesting because of the presence of water albeit under very thick icy surfaces.





Callisto is just a tad smaller than Mercury and is the Galilean moon furthest from Jupiter. It is made of rock and various ices, is the most heavily cratered object in the solar system and its density indicates it, too, has a subsurface ocean of water deep down, perhaps at 100km. It has a very thin atmosphere of carbon dioxide and possibly oxygen.

Europa has been one of the main contenders for extra-terrestrial life for several decades. It is smaller than our moon and very smooth with a water ice crust over a very likely water ocean. Cracks in the surface indicate activity below. Plumes of water vapour rise from the surface though these are not so obvious as those from a moon of Saturn, Enceladus. Europa has a very thin oxygen atmosphere.

The spacecraft will build up speed by using gravity assist, swinging past the Moon and Earth in 2024, Venus in 2025, Earth in 2026 and again in 2027 before heading out to Jupiter. This saves a lot of fuel which can be used for manoeuvring at its destinations. It does, however, make the journey longer and the craft will pass through the asteroid belt twice. The New Horizons

mission to Pluto, 7 times further away, took only 18 months longer but New Horizons didn't stop and hasn't stopped. It was a flyby so needed limited fuel for manoeuvring.

It is a Euroean mission, so its instruments will be powered by solar panels which deploy after it reaches orbit in the Jupiter system. I always think this is an error as nuclear fuelled missions last much longer and don't have mechanical complications. The voyager craft still sending back signals 45 years later and New Horizons now in the depths of the Kuiper Belt are good examples.

So, get up early in the morning and find Jupiter and picture JUICE heading towards it or not, as you really have to look anywhere but towards Jupiter for some years.

Back to the Night Sky. Something easy to find. The Plough, an asterism (pattern) which is part of Ursa Major. Look at the handle and find the middle star. This is Mizar and is a double that keen eyes or normal binoculars can separate. The companion star is Alcor.





Norfolk Fire & Rescue Service "Fire Cadets Recruiting"


On Saturday 15th April, the Hunstanton Fire Cadets opened their doors to the public for an insight into Norfolk Fire & Rescue Service and to show exactly what it means to be in a fire cadet unit. There were great activities on offer where children and adults were able to get involved, from running out fire hoses to extinguish a simulated fire, to throwing a rescue line to retrieve a casualty. The fire cadets took centre stage three times with drills where they performed a rescue from height with ladders, they put out a mock fire and rescued a casualty using hoses and breathing apparatus, and then to top it off a fine display of a roof removal on a car. 



Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

May cometh and, perhaps, a new dawn. We shall see.

Starting where I left off last month. At planning committee on the 3rd April, I proposed that the applications for the Wild Ken Hill developments were deferred due to issues about road access off the A149. The applications could not be deferred for long due to planning rules and they will come before committee again on June 5th. Public comments can be made on the planning portal (Google King's Lynn Planning) or by letter to Planning at King's Court, Chapel St, King's Lynn, PE30 1EX, up until the 31st May.

The issue about the Lamsey Lane junction is clear. It has been awkward and dangerous for some years and gets very bad in the holiday season. The developments will attract an estimated 81,907 visitors/year, and an estimated additional 117 vehicles/hour will use the junction.

Highways accept that there is a problem, and appreciate the concerns of locals but have no objections to the development. When questioned they effectively said that the junction caused queues and problems anyway so it wouldn't be any worse. What highways are doing is evaluating how the junction can be improved in the future and, if they come up with a plan, they will seek funding to carry it out. Ken Hill are willing to provide land to enable work to be done.

I have asked for a better proposal with a time frame for such improvements and a solution which prevents traffic leaving the sites turning towards the village to avoid the difficulty of turning right out of the current Lamsey Lane /A149 junction. It has to be remembered that traffic from 135 houses off Cheney Hill will be in the mix at some point.

Both Heacham and Snettisham Parish Councils objected to the applications principally on highways grounds but officers were minded to recommend approval anyway and received support from a minority of councillors including a very local one who spoke from the floor.

Other matters may be of interest and I suggest you read the application if you have not already done so. I continue to have meetings with the applicant who has always been keen to involve me and others with the plans. This is not common and I thank him for that.

Sedgeford experienced a bit of a glitch at the same planning committee and I hope that will be sorted by the time you read this.

I have no more news of the development going ahead at Fring and I hope to be able to chase that up.

Full Council was something and nothing at the end of March. It was agreed, after my motion, that the Borough Council would

reserve its position on the 'County Deal' until after the elections, and officers would be asked to determine more details about its potential impact on West-Norfolk. I will have to be convinced that it will be good for those of us who live here and will certainly cause no detrimental impact.

Amendments to the draft Local plan were agreed after a lengthy debate. This might all change again after May.

Changes to the Code of Conduct for councillors were agreed. It is now modelled on the Local Government Association's recommendations.

It was the last Council before the elections and a number of councillors are stepping down so there will be some, perhaps many, new faces at the next Full Council which is not until June.

Roadside litter. Several months ago, I noticed extensive littering along the A149. Members of the public also complained about littering on other roads too. I found out that this was due to health and safety concerns raised by officers. This issue has now been, at least, partly resolved, the A149 was cleared first and I understand that the situation is improving.

Litter on the Dunes between Heacham South Beach and Snettisham Beach. This was cleared at the end of March prior to the nesting of the Ringed Plovers. I collected litter kits from the Clean Up team in King's Lynn and Wynona Legg of the RSPB got the volunteers. About 30 turned up and worked for several hours on a brilliant, sunny day. Many thanks to them, the Clean Up staff and the RSPB. And thanks also to the voluntary Heacham litter picking man who took the beach in his stride. I have a useful device for you Bernard, please get in touch. Best Wishes.

'Save our QEH' Campaign Group

BROKEN PROMISES

Just over two weeks ago, we had an anniversary, though not one which was a cause for celebration. On the 15th April 2021, the 'Save our QEH' campaign was launched, in order to highlight the need for a new hospital. The month before, the critical care unit at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital had to be shut down at short notice due to concerns over the state of the roof.

And here we are, two years on, still waiting for news on funding for a new hospital. This is a building, the roof of which is currently being held up by around 3500 props. The QEH, which was opened in 1980 with a projected life-span of thirty years, has now been in operation for 43 years. It offers services to an estimated 331,000 people across Norfolk, Cambridgeshire and South Lincolnshire.

Last year, the hospital trust said that time was running out, and that a decision needed to be made as soon as possible. The current building will not be able to be used beyond 2030 for the current services it currently offers, as surveyors have said that it cannot function after this time. If a new one is not in place by then, people will have to travel to other hospitals, such as the Norfolk and Norwich or Peterborough, for treatment and care.

And yet, our government has not made a decision on a new hospital, despite telling us that it is, in their words, 'high priority.' Repeatedly, they have made promises about when an announcement is going to be made, and on every occasion, have failed to keep that promise. Local MPs James Wild, Liz Truss and Steve Barclay have made numerous media statements, and posed for endless photo opportunities. And still, nothing has actually happened.

The QEH is in a desperate state, further delays by this government is unacceptable.



The Magic of Indian Art

On Monday 8th May 2023, The Arts Society North West Norfolk will host guest speaker, Dr. Helen Rufus-Ward, published art historian, in Sedgeford Village Hall at 2pm.

"Bringing India to Britain: Queen Victoria's Portraits and the Durbar Hall." She will focus on Victorian encounters with India. How Britons fell in love with India's cultural influences, food, fashions, jewellery, architecture and how the prompt came from the very top. Queen Victoria couldn't travel to India, so India had to come to her – at the house she and her beloved Prince Albert created, Osborne House, on the Isle of Wight. There she could relax, unhampered by the pressures of her royal duties and decorate the corridors with authentic portraits, representing many of the various types and nationalities of her Indian subjects. The Queen commissioned the works from the Austrian artist Rudolf Swoboda (1859-1914) and referred to them as her 'Beautiful Things'.

From the dawn of civilisation there has been a rich heritage of Indian arts and culture. The few remaining examples of the artistic tradition of the Bronze Age Indus Valley Civilisation (3300 BCE – 1300 BCE) - sculptures and carvings in bronze and stone - reveal the distinctive, sophisticated and long held beliefs and customs that have been passed on from generation to generation. The holistic approach of integrating space (architecture), colour (painting) and the display of form (sculpture), would have been a significant influence on the shape of the environment. Just look at the great stone fortresses of Rajasthan, Mandu and Hampi, or the many breath-taking temples and palaces carved from rock.

Early influences from Greece, Central Asia, Persia and Turkey can be seen, but it is believed that the true, profound influences have been Hinduism, Buddhism and Jainism, India's three great religions. The focus in the art would be idealism, the spirit and essence of the creation. Artists would reveal their mastery of space, form and colour but remain anonymous. The true skills of Indian painters came to the fore in the 11th and 12th centuries with illustrated manuscripts from the schools of miniature paintings. Their fusion of Hindu and Islamic influences developed a unique Indian art form – the Raga Mala Paintings – a series of paintings depicting a range of musical melodies, known as ragas, classified according to such characteristics as mood, season and time.

India has a rich and unique artistic heritage in the traditions of handicraft and folk art. Madhubani paintings are one of the most famous crafts of India, usually painted with fingers, twigs or matchsticks. Travellers to India wonder at the visual arts, inlay work using precious and semi-precious stones on display at the Taj Mahal, the colourful Jaipur pottery, the intricate and complicated motifs on Indian textiles, not just silk. The ancient Romans called India's finest cottons 'Woven Winds' because of their airy lightness.

Both Colonialism and Independence have resulted in significant influences on Indian Art. You can explore how Victorian paintings communicated 'the hopes and desires of a mighty England redefining itself in shifting tides' with our accredited lecturer, Dr. Helen Rufus-Ward, Sedgeford Village Hall, on Monday, 8th May 2023 at 2pm. The worlds of stage and screen came together in one musical extravaganza when Smithdon High School held its first Easter concert.



Joining the Walk is free of charge, but donations will be welcomed on the day. If you already have an MND T-shirt please bring it with you to save cost and planet!



BUSINESS RATING – A NEW MINEFIELD FOR FURNISHED HOLIDAY LETS

For some time, there has been an advantage for owners of Furnished Holiday Letting (FHL) accommodation (as defined for tax purposes) to register their properties for Non-Domestic Business Rates (BR) rather than Council Tax (CT). Indeed, in the past some councils have gone to considerable lengths to identify holiday cottages and insist on re-rating. More recently, switching to BR has generally led to a lower charge and, where small business rating relief is available, no charge at all, along with the generous Covid Grant Support provided to the hospitality sector.

In the face of perceived abuse by owners of properties which were substantially used for personal occupation, it was announced at the Autumn Budget that more rigorous eligibility tests would be applied. However, now that the full detail has been revealed, it is clear the new rules will not only catch those at whom they were aimed, but also bring a considerable degree of complexity to many genuine FHL businesses. The new rules for BR are, inexplicably, different to those applying for Income Tax purposes so it is entirely possible that some qualifying FHLs will not be eligible for business rating or vice versa.

- The BR/CT definitions of occupation are based on nights rather than days, (so for example a property let out from Friday evening to Sunday morning would have been let for two nights for the purposes of meeting the business rates definition but three days for income tax purposes) and the relevant period is based on the year to 31 March rather than 5 April. Since Easter often falls within that period, this could be highly relevant.
- The "availability" period for BR/CT is 140 nights and the "actual occupation" period is 70 nights for both the current and previous years, compared to the equivalent periods of 210 days and 105 days respectively for FHLs for tax purposes which is looked at on a single tax year basis (except in year of commencement/cessation).
- FHL rules sensibly recognise that there can be fluctuations in occupation for many genuine reasons such as weather, timing of Easter, repairs and building up lettings in the early years of the business, and various mitigating elections such as averaging, and "periods of grace" reflect this. No such elections are available for BR/CT.

Data to enable the transition to take place will be gathered by "requests for information" during the 2023/24 operating year "to check that the eligibility rules for self-catering properties are met". Failure to return the form or completing it incorrectly can lead to a financial penalty or even prosecution.

The new rules are likely to be a real problem for owners of FHLs who will have to check that they comply with two significantly different sets of criteria on an annual basis. Given that some aspects of the BR/CT are <u>less</u> stringent than the existing FHL rules, it is a mystery why these were not simply replicated. In fact, it almost feels as if there is a deliberate policy to make compliance as difficult as possible with the intention of discouraging owners from claiming the treatment to which they should be entitled.


