HEACHAM GROUP PRACTICE PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP (HGP:PPG)

There is a statutory requirement for all GP Practices in England to have a patient participation group (PPG) established from the local patient population. The Heacham Group Practice has such a body in place known as the HGP:PPG and which is managed by a committee of some 14 registered patients.

The role of the HGP:PPG is to enhance communications between the practice staff and the patient population served by the GP practice. A further role is to look at the services the GP practice offers, patients' experiences and how improvements can be made for the benefit of practice staff and the patients living in the Heacham, Snettisham, Ringstead, Fring and Sedgeford communities.

Notice is given that the HGP:PPG will be holding an Annual General Meeting at the Snettisham Memorial Hall, Old Church Road, Snettisham, on Tuesday 3rd October 2023, commencing at 7pm and to which all registered patients of the Heacham Group Practice population are invited.

The agenda for the AGM will be published in due course.

Meanwhile, patients are invited to submit any, "non-patient specific", general comments / criticism / good suggestions they may have, headed for the attention of the PPG committee, at heacham.surgerypp@nhs.net

Where possible, these will be reviewed and responded to at the above meeting as part of the AGM agenda.



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

Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

It's been many years since I made a Thai Green Curry but my guests were delighted when I decided to make one during their stay. I added Green Beans and roasted

Sweet Potato wedges. I had enough ingredients left to make:

Sweet Potato, Green Bean & Coriander Soup

Makes approx. 800ml

Ingredients:

Approx. 250g Sweet Potato Approx. 150g Green Beans 1 medium size Onion or Shallot 1 Stick Celery 10g. Fresh Coriander Chicken or vegetable stock cube A knob of butter Salt and Pepper

Method:

Dissolve stock cube in 450ml hot water. Peel Sweet Potato and cut into small pieces. Wash Coriander and chop fairly finely. Peel onion and slice thinly. Clean celery and cut into small pieces.

In a medium size saucepan and over a low heat, soften butter then add Onion stir well and cook for a minute stirring constantly.

Carefully add sweet Potato, Beans, Celery, Coriander and stock to saucepan, bring to the boil, reduce heat, cover and leave simmering gently, stirring occasionally, for 15-20 minutes or until Sweet Potato and Beans are soft.

Strain off most of the liquid into a jug; leave this to one side while you either put vegetables into a liquidiser or use a hand blender and whizz until pureed.

Return pureed vegetables to saucepan, gently stir in stock, mix well, reheat, serve and enjoy.



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


Feature of the Month

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

MORE HEACHAM MEMORIES

Following some very interesting insights into Heacham history at the Heacham Heritage Day (Oh to have our own Heritage Centre!) I thought readers might be interested in a series of articles discovered in a series of 1930 editions of 'The Lynn Advertiser; Wisbech Constitutional Gazette, and Norfolk and Cambridgeshire Herald' under the heading above. They were submitted by George William Alcock who, although living in London, was born (in 1860) and raised in the village and covers a range of topics, stretching the memories of readers at that time. Ninety plus years later, they really are the stuff of history. They are quite lengthy and so I will select abbreviated extracts for the Newsletter over the next months, as space permits.

School Days

I am sure my friend Mr Frederick Suter, Heacham's exschoolmaster, would not like me to omit some reference to our school-days. In his last letter he had said that he had lived in our pretty little village forty years, and had grown to love the people, the place, and its surroundings. I don't wonder at that because we are a homely folk.

One day, when merely a lotus-eater, I surveyed the scholars who were there when I entered our school¹, and those still undergoing tuition when I left. I counted sixty, and all but three had left Heacham and gone to various parts of the world.

At school we went by numbers, the girls taking the first half-century, and the boys the second. Only at one time did we number over a hundred; there were no pegs in the cloakroom for those beyond the century!

My educational foundation was laid in the lower schoolroom under the tuition of Nancy Burrell. She was a member of the Primitive Methodists. One day when I was preaching there, whilst on holiday, I reminded her of her scholastic efforts in teaching me. She replied: "Much good it has done you, my dear." Her husband used to be the farmers' guardian to the stacks in our gleaning-fields², and each mother paid him a small sum. So, when, at the age of four, I went to the upper schoolroom, I missed the very low classes.

I left school at seven years of age to go to work. My employers were Fowle Rix, occupiers of Mr Bray's present farm³, who paid me 1s. 6d. per week to scare birds; and Mrs Davies, of The Lodge, whose peacocks would overrun the fields, which were bounded on three sides by a wood directly behind Mr. Bray's orchard.

It is curious that before I left at the age of seven⁴ I was at times the head boy of the first class. At times I slipped down to second, third or fourth place in that class, but never lower. The one who was normally head-boy was George Shaw, a member of the family, swept by tuberculosis, the wooden crosses of whose graves stand in our churchyard. George was my best friend at school. He used to bring me apples.

Until nearly the time of my going to the upper school I used to wear frocks⁵. Where does George Shaw come in here? Thus. One day I was struggling to do up my braces behind, and not making a good job of it. George then made the useful suggestion that I should button them behind first, and do up the front later.

The struggle for the second place in the class was between Obadiah Minns, Harry Willis, Matthew Haversham, Harry Bunting, and myself. Obadiah's father, a wheelwright, kept the 'Greyhound'6, and one day when a miller, a soldier and a sailor entered, his father said to his sister, "Emily, three chairs for the red, white and blue!"

I used to take my dinner to school because mother went to work, and one day a woman named Rachel Young said to me, "Would you like some rabbit?" The flavour of that dinner is with me to this day!

The see-saw of changing places next to George Shaw went on and on until I left school to earn that 1s. 6d. No money I ever took since seemed so much as that! We lived then where Captain Bentinck's residence now is⁷, so I had not far to go, ran home, put the money in mother's lap, and said, "Mother, you will not need to work any more!" On many Mondays I did not go to school because my mother had not the twopence for the first and a penny each for the rest of us⁸ and she had a sense that we should not be shamed.

- The school then would be 'under the arch' behind the Green, opposite the church.
- ² Once a field had been harvested and the wheat stacked ready for threshing or other crops gathered, women and children would be allowed to 'glean' the field and take whatever was left for their own use.
- The Rix family (Fowle was a middle name) had farmed 'Malthouse Farm' but Charles Bray farmed College Farm. (It was not uncommon for tenant farmers to move farms on an estate).
- ⁴ It was not until 1893 that children were expected to remain in school until the age of 11.
- With little money to spare and often with large families, it was common for farm labourers' children to wear 'hand-me-downs' even for a boy to wear his older sister's clothes! George had no older brother but an older sister Anna and 4 younger siblings in 1871.
- ⁶ The 'Greyhound' was on the High Street opposite where 'Spice Garden' is now.
- ⁷ Captain Bentinck lived at 'Orange House', Malthouse Crescent.
- ⁸ Education was not free until 1891 and parents were expected to find 'School Pence' to help pay for the running costs of the school.





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
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Further Sculptural Adventures

Summer is winding down and I have had a good one. My piece *Beginning – Ending – Beginning* for Wighton 23 Cycle did get finished on time — but just barely.

It was important to do the cement work as close to setting up as possible, so that the embedded plants were as fresh as possible. Set up was Sunday 2 July with the private view on Wednesday and the exhibition opening on Thursday. Cement takes 24 hours to cure so I had my work cut out for me.

On Thursday 29 June, I foraged in the churchyard and conservation area of All Saint's Church in Wighton. The foliage had changed considerably since my April visit. The grass was high, wild flowers abounded and the cow parsley on its way out. Still, there was plenty to choose from. When I got back to the studio it occurred to me that I now had to sort and document everything. I ended up with 36 different plants to put on my eleven elements. Next was planning what would go where. I had a lot of fun spending the rest of the evening doing that.

Friday and Saturday were very long days in the studio! The working time for the cement was longer than I expected so I was able to go into more detail. The three smallest elements would have to finish curing on site.

The set up went smoothly and I was pleased with the site and the placement. The feedback was that it was indeed magical. Over the month there was a good amount of decay in the piece. It is now on a field in Norfolk decaying further until its next appearance at the Artspace on the Prom in Cromer (https://cromer-artspace.uk).

I can't exactly remember how I heard about the Cromer Artspace but when I did, I just had to go see it. I love Cromer with its wild, windswept sea, so there was no holding me back. Although I've been to Cromer countless times, I was surprised at discovering this gorgeous Art Deco building fused into the cliff at the end of Cromer's West Prom.



The space is both beautiful and unique. Facing north, it meets the ideal prerequisites for an artist's studio. The sun reflecting off the sea gives a rare light to the work exhibited within. Looking out from inside is the pure wide sea.

Artists can apply to exhibit in the space. I did and my exhibition will run from 14 to 25 September from 11 - 4. It is called *Black and White: From the Ethereal to the Concrete*.

Ether (shown at Cley 21) is an installation consisting of eleven large scale seemingly floating objects which are viewed from below. Made of white tissue paper and acrylic medium they become translucent 'skins' reminiscent of alabaster or ice.

At Cromer Art Space these objects will hover above the ground allowing visitors to walk through and around the them. Beginning – Ending – Beginning will emerge from the ground to form a dialogue with both Ether and the visitors. Interactive sound will be incorporated to enhance the installation.

The exhibition will be enhanced by other works fitting the theme.

Following my working holiday by the sea in Cromer, I will return to my much loved studio by the sea at Heacham. It will be back to work and back to school. Classes in clay modelling, making sculpture with an armature, soapstone carving and lino cutting will resume.

Above: Beginning - Ending - Beginning on 2 July 2023








September, the autumn equinox, rocks from space and schools start again. Meteorological autumn starts on September 1st.


At 6.50 am on the 23rd, night and day are once again of equal length. After then, as my mother used to say, the nights draw in, they get longer until the 21st December. This is part of the pattern of existence which the world has followed for thousands of years. Over millennia the actual dates might change a little but the pattern does not.

I saw some rocks from space last night, 12th August, when the Perseids meteor shower peaked. It was very cloudy but patches of it were thin and I saw flickers of light above them. Many ghostly trails first towards the SE but high up and then in the NE. I counted over 60 in less than 30 minutes so there would have been quite a spectacular show in a clear sky. I did see 2, perhaps 3, short, bright streaks and then, looking west over Heacham and right across The Plough, a long, bright, line of light, a brilliant meteor track. Clouds then moved in again, so nowhere near a good year's sightings but better than some. Seeing a Perseid every year is a goal I have and its free.


Observations on any dark, clear, night can be rewarded with a meteorite not associated with a shower and you might be the only one who sees it so, like Jiminy Cricket and Perry Como, make a wish. The number of these sporadic meteors is highest in September. There are also two minor showers, the Alpha Aurigids on the 1st, the Southern Taurids on the 10th. So, possibly plenty of chances for a wish.



Osiris Rex. Can you spot my name? Internet

On the 24th there are more rocks from space, only these will arrive by parcel delivered by Osiris Rex the spacecraft that went to asteroid Bennu and pinched a bit of it. The mission was launched in September 2016 - look through your back copies and find my article about it. It arrived in orbit at Bennu in December 2018 and, two years later, landed and scooped some rocks up.

Bennu was formed at the birth of the solar system and is carbonaceous, a material from which organic materials can form. I recently watched an old Sci-Fi film when rocks were returned from space, they grew and ate everyone. Look out for news stories from the Utah desert where the sample is due to land by parachute. (My name is on Osiris Rex; I hope the rocks don't have my address too).

Planets follow a pattern too, rising and setting as the year proceeds and always following that path called the ecliptic which appears as an arc across our sky from the SE horizon to the SW horizon. It is the path the Sun takes across the sky so the ecliptic is lower in our sky in the winter, higher in the summer.

Saturn and Jupiter are back in our night sky. The ringed world shines with a magnitude of 0.5 so easily visible but faint whilst Jove is a brilliant -2.7.

Saturn rises first and you should catch it early in the month in the ESE from 8pm. It will get higher as the night and month progresses. Look SSE from about the 12th. It is easy to spot Saturn once you have found it. A yellowish dot which doesn't look like a star. Phone apps will let you find it even if you are sat in the house but eyes, even mine, will seek it out with a bit of patience. Once found, turn steady binoculars on it, a brighter, bigger, yellowish spot will be seen. A small telescope will show the rings.

Jupiter appears in the ENE from 10pm at the beginning of the month. It shows earlier as the month progresses and follows Saturn which is ESE in the middle of the month. Jupiter is low but bright and you won't have trouble finding the gas giant. Good, steady binoculars will show some of the four Galilean moons. See earlier articles about those or just Google them.

Those with mounted telescopes can make this a Neptune finding month. The most distant planet is in opposition on the 19th which means it is directly opposite the Sun and the closest to us it will be this year. A bright, greenish blue, orb in the sky then? Not quite, its distance (4324 million km) means it will 'shine' with a magnitude of 7.8, much much fainter than the faintest star you can see unaided. Looks nice in a telescope though.



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

Neptune trails some distance behind Saturn but is about at the same elevation. Its ice giant peer, Uranus, is in the sky trailing Jupiter and quite close to the gas giant. However, it is long past its opposition and is a faint magnitude 5.7 which makes viewing possible in good binoculars.

If the sky is clear on the 4th look east at 11pm and Jupiter will be the bright object just to the right of the Moon. Uranus, binoculars needed, will be just to the left of the Moon. Jupiter and Uranus will be similarly close on the 5th whilst the Moon



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


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will now be immediately below the Pleiades star cluster and not far above the Hyades cluster. Both groups of stars worth examining through steady binoculars.

If the 27th is clear then stay up late because Saturn will be immediately above the Moon after midnight in the SW.

If you get up and out early then Venus will make a fine sight before dawn, say 5am. On the 11th and 12th see it as companion to a crescent Moon. On the 18th the Morning Star is at is brightest, and has a glorious magnitude of -4.5. Mercury is just rising at about the same time but will be too low and soon lost in the brightening sky.

I hesitate to talk about observations of stars and other objects as clouds seem to blight most nights. As changing weather patterns brought on by the impact of global warming seem set to stay, these may be the last years when this country enjoys a few decent clear nights. And they have to be dark too, without the Moon in the way. So, make the most of what we get. Look out for stars coming out earlier in the evening and familiar constellations being overhead. I will point out some features in the forthcoming dark months.

Having walked the tour (fittingly named Visitour) myself, I realised that there is a plethora of history that often escapes notice, even from the keenest eyes. It's a chance for everyone, whether you're a lifelong resident or just visiting, to journey through the years and see how our village has evolved. The tour is filled with carefully picked stories and photos that paint a vivid picture of Heacham's past.

When asked about the tour, the author said "I became more and more interested in Heacham's past over the last ten years or so, and having walked the streets of Heacham for almost half a century, I was surprised to find out that there was so much I didn't know about its history. I started to see things that I hadn't noticed before and I now look at things around the village in a different way. 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Ringing in a New Coronation Bell

There have been serious concerns since 2014 regarding the condition of the cupola (or bellcote), which houses the church bell, with the likelihood increasing of it eventually collapsing.


When the bell was last inspected in 2021 it was confirmed to be the oldest church bell in Norfolk c.1150 by bell specialists Mathew Higby & Co. and, in collaboration with Revd. Paul Cubbit, the Diocesan Bell adviser, a report was compiled suggesting that, in the circumstances, as it is the oldest church bell in Norfolk it should be removed and displayed in the church as it should not be rung in its present state.

Therefore, a replacement bell was the obvious option. It was suggested we could possibly commission a "Coronation Bell" to commemorate the King's Coronation – BUT – we needed to first obtain a Royal Warrant from Buckingham Palace to pursue this idea. Contact was made with the Lord Chamberlain and following many phone calls and emails to the Palace, we finally heard in July that the Warrant had been granted.

The Coronation bell will be cast by Emanuel Allenconi in Turin, experts in this work, hopefully early next year. But before the new bell can be installed the renovation work on the bellcote will need to be completed. This will involve removing the existing structure and replacing it, not an easy task! The work is due to begin in the Autumn and will take around twelve months to complete.

Eventually, the Coronation bell will be consecrated by the Bishop. At that service the oldest church bell in Norfolk will be brought down and placed alongside the new Coronation bell so both can be seen together before the new bell is installed. The new bell will have an electronic striking system which will allow bells to be rung once again in Heacham announcing the presence of the church.





An invitation to this service will be sent to the Palace ...and, as the bell is one of only a select few in the country that will be cast... who knows who may accept the invitation!







Hunstanton's Historic Town Hall gets a new Lift

Hunstanton Town Council has finally been able to replace the lift in the Grade II-listed building after having been awarded a grant of £23,500 from King's Lynn & West Norfolk Borough Council (BCKLWN) under their CIL funding scheme.

The Mayor of Hunstanton Cllr Michael Ruston said: "The old lift was installed in 2006 and over recent years, a series of problems occurred including a number of breakdowns.

"The building is used for functions and events, and a new, reliable lift was urgently needed to allow the Town Hall to be more accessible to disabled and those who struggle with stairs.

"Following a report from specialist lift engineers G L Lifts based in Norwich, it became clear that the lift should be replaced, as the current platform was deemed as being at the end of its serviceable life and replacement parts were no longer available. The lift was so unreliable that people didn't want to risk using it.

"Hunstanton Town Council are very grateful to the Borough Council for their support. Without the new lift, the town hall would not have been able to continue to offer the other areas of the venue to the public for hire, the Community Hub on the lower floor and the Council Chamber on the higher floor.

"Venues like Hunstanton Town Hall are vital community hubs and it's important that everyone can access its rooms and events in comfort".

The historic building has served the community since its completion in 1896 and now, with the new lift, it will continue to provide various facilities for Hunstanton for many more years to come.

Hunstanton Town Council would like to thank Graham & Matthew Loudoun of GL Lifts for their diligence and expertise in completing the project on time, on budget and to an extremely high standard of finish.

TAI CHI and CHI KUNG TAI CHI



Have you ever thought about trying an exercise system that, although can be challenging, offers a treasure chest of potential health benefits without leaving you feeling like you have just run a marathon?

Tai Chi will do just that! It will open your horizons to a multitude of new beginnings; it does not just work on your physical body it also works on a mental, emotional and spiritual level too.

Tai Chi is as simple or as complicated as you wish to make it (I prefer simple). The journey of Tai Chi will take you through many levels of self discovery and, if you allow it to, it will be a friend for life.

It has been described as a moving meditation with the practitioner seeming to be in an almost hypnotic state, although this is not the case. In fact, the practitioner is acutely aware of their surroundings and the way their body is responding to the movements. There is a feeling of ebbing and flowing energetically as one moves through the Tai Chi form. After completing the form there is always a feeling of tranquil oneness. Although the practitioner is always striving to improve, there should never be feelings of urgency to find perfection within the form - after all it is the journey that makes it so appealing!

Learning Tai Chi can and does help with many emotional issues. It helps you to understand yourself much better and "go with the flow" of life without holding on to things that are beyond your control. I tend to think of it also as a stress release valve because, when I am feeling a bit stressed, I try to find somewhere to do my Tai Chi and soon I am feeling much better and able to cope again. I say "my Tai Chi" because after learning the basic principles it becomes a very individual and personal art which is interpreted differently according to one's physical capabilities. Providing that the principles are followed, then the results are the same. In other words, physical limitations should not prove a barrier to learning Tai Chi.

All that is needed is commitment, the results will follow!

CHI KUNG

Chi Kung is a system of breathing exercises that are designed to help promote and harness internal energy (chi) in the body for health and martial applications. The practice of Chi Kung goes back thousands of years and there are many different types of exercises related to Chi Kung.

Initially, it was devised to build internal energy for martial applications, but nowadays it is used primarily for its health benefits. It is still practised in some Chinese hospitals to help patients build up their immune systems prior to having an operation.

Chi Kung and Tai Chi go hand in hand, without using the Chi Kung principles; Tai Chi is an exercise system that is only using about 25% of its full potential.

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An analogy of this could be of buying a powerful sports car but not having any fuel to drive it. Therefore, Chi Kung is a time-tested way of building up the powerful fuel that we need to allow our bodies to work for maximum health and efficiency.

Chi Kung may be practised on its own or within the Tai Chi form. It is very simple to learn and all that is required is regular practice and guidance from a teacher.

Tai Chi and Chi Kung will help you lead a long, happy and healthy life. All it asks of you is to give it commitment in the early days; is that too much to ask for all the potential benefits that it can afford you?

SEATED TAI CHI and CHI KUNG

Tai Chi and Chi Kung may also be adapted for seated practice which will allow students with limited mobility the opportunity to experience the benefits of the art in a safe and supportive environment.

This is achieved through adapting the main principles to a seated environment which creates a subtle variation to that of the standing version.

There should never be a sense of urgency to master the art. The magic happens when you embrace the journey of Tai Chi and simply enjoy the ride!

Seated Tai Chi and Chi Kung classes are available at Heacham Public Hall on the first and third Wednesday of the month from 10.30am to 11.30am. This is a very friendly and informal class and is suitable for all. (Wheelchair access).

TAI CHI in THE WATER

The secret to the flowing motion that encapsulates Tai Chi is visualising a subtle resistance within each movement as well as



developing continuity, coordination and the correct breathing within each expression of movement. By using the medium of water, it is an excellent way of learning all the above.


The main benefits of practising Tai Chi in the water is that it offers support and a subtle resistance for each of the movements making it a safe environment to relearn balance and to strengthen muscles, particularly in a rehabilitation situation. It is also a natural way of relieving pain because while practising Tai Chi, neurotransmitters called endorphins are released in the body helping to relieve chronic pain. Sometimes referred to as "The runners high."

The ideal environment for practising water Tai Chi is in a hydrotherapy pool where the water temperature is around 34 to 35 degrees centigrade, (thermoneutral) where the body's core temperature neither increases or decreases.

This makes it a perfect environment for practising water based Tai Chi.

RISING INTEREST RATES DON'T JUST AFFECT THOSE WITH A MORTGAGE

There has been a great deal of discussion in the press recently concerning the rise in interest rates and the impact on those who are seeing their mortgage payments increasing. The position is actually far more complex than the headlines would suggest. The largest borrower is, of course, the government, so the rise in the underlying cost of borrowing money will feed through into government spending, reducing the options for tax cuts and pressurizing spending budgets. On the other hand, many borrowers on fixed rate mortgages may have seen no difference at all in their monthly mortgage payments and, for the time being, at least, may wonder why there is a problem.

However, there is another side to the coin. In order to provide mortgages, banks and building societies need to hold money from depositors. There is clearly a linkage between mortgage rates and deposit interest, and although the lenders are generally much quicker to raise their mortgage rate than to raise the amount they pay out to their depositors, there is no doubt that just as some people are being squeezed by rising mortgage rates, others are seeing some comfort as their savings earn more every month. Given that savings rates have been around 1% for some years now, many might see their interest income at least doubling in 2023.

This, of course, has a tax consequence. Bank and building society interest is now paid out without any tax deduction, but it is still taxable. There are two special allowances which have, in the past, largely eliminated the liability. For those with total income of under £17,570 there is a "Starting Rate" band which can sometimes reduce the amount of investment income chargeable. The exact amount of the starting band will depend on the level of total income, so for example someone with wages of £15,570 would have a "starting band" of £2,000. The calculation is quite complicated and where earnings are variable because of perhaps part time or seasonal employment or volatile business income, the calculation will only be accurate after the end of the tax year.

The second and probably more widely relevant relief is the "Personal Savings Allowance" (PSA). This is available to basic and higher rate taxpayers but not to additional rate taxpayers and stands at £1,000 for a basic rate taxpayer (with total income up to £50,270) or £500 for those between £50,270 and £150,000. A 0% rate of Income Tax applies to savings covered by the PSA.

In recent years the availability of these reliefs coupled with low interest rates has meant than many investors have not needed to think about tax on their savings, but this will soon change. In addition to the interest position, there is a further development for those with share dividends. In the past there has been a special relief to set against these, originally £5,000pa, reduced to £2,000 in 2018. This has now been reduced to £1,000 for 2023/24 and will be £500 after April 2024. Again, many relatively small investors will find they have an unexpected liability.

For example, someone with pension income of £18,000, £60,000 on deposit and £2,000 dividends would have probably earned around £700 in 2022/23, well within the PSA and dividend allowance. The same deposit account, even on "instant access" will probably earn nearer £2,000 in 2023/24 and if the investor shops around it could be over £3,000. Also, £1,000 of the dividends will be taxable rising to £1,500 in 2024/25. Clearly there will now be a tax liability of about £5-600 and this will need to be reported and paid.

The compliance position is complicated. Current HMRC guidance is that you must advise HMRC if your untaxed income is over £10,000 or your dividend income is over £2,000 but this doesn't seem to reflect the recent change in dividend allowance. It also suggests 'phoning them, which may prove problematic since much of the telephone support network is currently withdrawn.

At best, failure to take action and accurately report the untaxed income will lead to estimated tax codings and in due course an unexpected (and probably incorrectly calculated) tax liability.

For peace of mind and to ensure that the right amount of tax is paid at the right time, professional advice should be taken sooner rather than later.

Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

The Ward is connected by the River Heacham running through it. A small stream really but it is important as it is a chalk stream with all the environmental implications of that. It is also important to the aesthetic environment of Fring and Sedgeford, the large fish pond in Heacham, The Saltings nature reserve and South Beach. It is our little river and needs taking care of.

The river rises in Fring from chalk aquifers and is added to by springs in Sedgeford. The river between Fring and Sedgeford has been vanishing in the summer for years and is now doing so in the winter. Drought has contributed but additional extraction by Anglian Water is the main cause. The fact that most is abstracted from boreholes during the dry summer visitor season does not help.

I have raised the matter of water use reduction at a planning level. This is contained in principle within the Borough's Local Plan but nothing has ever been done about it. It can be as little as fitting water saving technology in homes to a better solution of grey, rainwater, use – flushing toilets with stored rainwater. It comes at a cost to a developer but it is something that will need doing in the near future. The population is not going to reduce anytime soon and visitor numbers continue to increase.

At the end of the river, South Beach, there is still a problem with sea water quality. At a meeting with Anglian Water in June I was told that additional funding had been secured for additional testing including DNA testing. This will be used in the forthcoming months. Testing of the River Heacham will also proceed. Little progress had been made in determining if sewage disposal at beach front properties met modern standards. I asked for this work to be done. Deterioration in sea water quality all along the West Norfolk coast and beyond appears to be the current position and the solution remains unclear.

Turning to planning matters, building and heritage conservation issues seem perverse. Changes to a building in Sedgeford got approval despite what appears to be unsuitable cladding and the objections of the Parish Council, whilst a fibre communications hub proposed on the car park at St Mary's in Heacham was contested by an officer which resulted in the application being withdrawn. This despite it having the backing of the Parish Council, the support of the Church and being the result of positive negotiations with the cable company. I will ask about both.

The camp site at South Beach was the topic of a news story taking up a full page of the EDP. It makes interesting reading and I recommend that you search for it. I cannot comment further as a court case is imminent.

Also in the legal pipeline are appeals and a traffic commissioners' decision about vehicular access onto Fenway. The residents at the end of it are getting badly affected by many large vehicles passing their properties and the road surface at the entrance is just potholes next to large holes. If this situation persisted at any other point in the village there would be a public outcry. I will await the various legal decisions, continue to monitor the situation and, in the meantime have written to Anglian Water whose use of Fenway is not challenged but has become, seemingly, more intensive.

Lidl has a planning application in for a larger car park as their current one 'fills up with caravans'. Can't say I've noticed as I have never been to Lidl. What I have seen and reported is the failure of Lidls to replace dead trees which were part of their conditioned landscaping. I do not wish to see that part of the approach to Heacham degenerate into a large area of asphalt. There is a new planning rule about biodiversity net gain and anything built needs to improve the environment, not ruin it.

THE BOROUGH

Contrary to the fairy tales told by some, the Independent Partnership is working well. Leading the Council has been a challenge to me and my Cabinet, why wouldn't it be? We are new to the job. However, we are meeting the challenge through dealing with the problems we have found and beginning the process of witing a new four-year corporate plan.

Several issues have raised their heads: The Night Shelter, a small but prominent provider of accommodation for the homeless. I hope that it will soon have a sustainable future but that will depend as much on that body as anyone else.

The Parkway development in King's Lynn; I have signed it off with the caveat that, as it evolves, more properties are rented and all properties are designated for local people.

The revision of the Local Plan which many would like to see ditched; I was minded to do just that but circumstances are such that it would more likely cause more harm to all of West Norfolk than persisting with it. Further changes to the Local Plan will be worked up in parallel with current revisions so that they can be considered as soon as possible, likely the end of next year.


West Winch is a keystone of the current Local Plan and I have regular emails about the proposed relief road for the several thousand houses due to be built over the next decade or so. The ramifications of it will be further considered in August with a possible planning application for the Hopkins site in September.

The budget exercises minds too. The 'funded budget and financial plan for the next three years (left to the new administration)' as quoted in the press, leads to significant future problems if they are not addressed now. We are doing that.

I have been meeting many people and groups, around the Borough, new to me. The furthest south, so far, has been Downham Market where I met the Town Council leader. I will meet the rest of that Council in the autumn. I also met organisers of the Swan Youth Project in Downham Market. If anyone wants to see an excellent exemplar of a 'community action group' (my words) then this project is it.

The furthest north I have visited is Holme-next-the-Sea who hosted a session of 'The Saxon Shore', Parish Council representatives from Old Hunstanton to Titchwell. An informative meeting which, if invited, I will try to attend again.



17 year old Kitty from Docking is Rotary National Young Writer 2023

Each year Rotary Great Britain and Northern Ireland run a national competition for school children in three age groups; 7-11, 11-14, 15-17 and for the last two years the Rotary Club of Hunstanton and District have run a local round, with a Junior, an Intermediate and a Senior winner progressing to an East Anglia round.

This year the theme was Peace and entries were invited either as prose (up to 550 words) or poetry (up to 40 lines). In total 57 entries were received from 7 schools.

This picture is my father Victor Albert Croucher. He looks a fine young man. The second one up one on the left, with his mates. He was a gunner. They are aboard a minesweeper that sailed from Swansea keeping shipping safe around our coasts and later round Singapore as the war ended. He joined the Merchant Navy to serve his country. I don't know why that branch of the services because they all sailed in dangerous waters.

Like many he never talked about the war after it finished, but it had a profound effect on him. I realise now he needed counselling like the many who came back did. That sort of thing didn't exist then, they just got on with it. I do know he shot down a German plane and killed its pilot. He never forgave himself for killing that man even though he was his enemy. Another one of, what I considered his oddities was he would never eat bottom feeding fish. I suppose if you were a sailor and knew about mates dying and lying on the bottom of the sea it made sense. He was a strange man, hard working and unemotional, born as Victoria died, he was a great one for duty, but he had a sense of fun as well



He was one of many men and women who served this country. You now know what he looked like but what do your relations who served their country look like? What was their story. There have been lots of conflicts since the Last Great War. Many have served, not just in the armed forces. Doctors, nurses, scientists, lands people, manufacturers, coalminers, munitions workers. The list is endless. Its no small thing to take a country to war. The general population is as important in its support role as the

Generals who run the battles. Then there are those left afterwards the bereaved and the single parent families.

Hunstanton Town Council would like to celebrate the service people but also the other less well recognised faces and stories. Would you be willing to let us use your family members' pictures and memories to make this year's Remembrance Day an inclusive one. That gives us time to think about all those whose lives have been affected by having our country enter into the field of war.
