

Dear Newsletter,

Help for elderly people who have a fall?

When someone you know and love has had a fall, the consequences can be wide ranging and traumatic.

For the person who has had the fall, pain and injury are often the outcome and for those situations the obvious recourse is to dial 999 and get the person dealt with by health professionals. This will usually involve a considerable wait for the overstretched ambulance service to respond and deal with the injuries or remove the person to hospital.

But what if there are no injuries? If the person has simply stumbled and is unable to get up on their own or with help?

Currently there are two options in this situation. The first is to call the ambulance service for them to come and use their specialist lifting seats to get the individual off the floor. Alternatively, you can contact the SWIFT response service. This is a free service operated by Norfolk County Council. However, SWIFT cannot respond if the response time is going to be over 2 hours. In that situation an ambulance has to be called. Again, this will generally involve a lengthy wait, causing more anxiety and discomfort to the fallen person.

What if we could do something about it?

If someone suffers a heart attack, most people know where the nearest defibrillator is, to allow a timely start to the treatment.

What is proposed is that the same service be available for falls victims.

A manufacturer of lifting equipment has offered to supply a number of lifting chairs to be distributed around West Norfolk, allowing local access to the lifting equipment to facilitate speedy resolution of the problem.

These plans are only at the preliminary stage, but we need to find people in the local community interested in giving help and suggestions to implement this.


Scam Phone Calls

• Hot Drinks available in staffed hours: Tea, Coffee, Mug shots, Hot chocolate and milk. Recycled cups available.



<u>Revd. Veronica Wilson – Sabbatical</u>

I will be taking a period of sabbatical from mid-November until April, though I will be back to cover Christmas services and events, and then Holy Week and Easter.

In this Diocese, clergy are able to have a sabbatical every 7 years. I have been vicaring for 24 years, this will be my first one! Sabbaticals are for 'setting time aside for rest, relaxation and renewal' and to enrich and safeguard the spiritual, emotional and physical health of church ministers without the burden of parish or work commitments.

Church ministry is a not a 9-5 job, so it is difficult to switch off and rest on days off and holidays. A Sabbatical is a gift of time to enable me to rest and be renewed for continued ministry here in Heacham. I love living in Heacham and have loved being your vicar for the last 9 years but, as with any battery, there comes a time when it runs low and needs to be re-charged and that time is now.

Church life will carry on with services and activities as usual, covered by our ministry team and visiting ministers. Funerals, baptisms and weddings will still be offered. The team here will respond and be available. I do ask you to please respect my time of sabbatical. In order to fully rest and recharge, I will not be reading emails, texts, messages or responding to phone calls. I will still be in the village, so you will see me out and about, but I would ask that if we chat can we talk about the weather, or similar!

I will miss you, and miss being active and involved, but I am ready for this sabbatical. I look forward to popping up at Christmas for services and events, and then returning for Holy Week and Easter, when I hope to be refreshed in body, mind and spirit.

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

Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

This nice easy recipe can be found in my book "Less Waste more Soup" 45 easy, budget friendly recipes. Some people have told me they add some crumbled stilton to this just before serving.

Broccoli & Celery Soup

Ingredients:

A knob of Butter

Chicken or Vegetable Stock cube dissolved in 500ml hot water 1 medium size Potato

2 large or 3 smaller sticks of Celery

Approx. 200g/7oz Broccoli 1 med. Shallot or small Onion

Salt and pepper as required



Method:

Cut florets from broccoli and leave to soak in lightly salted cold water. Trim off and discard discoloured part at base of broccoli stalk. Peel stalk and cut into small pieces. Peel shallot/onion and slice fairly thinly. Peel potato and cut into small pieces.

Put butter into a saucepan over a low to med heat, add shallot/onion, stir well, and cook for a minute stirring constantly. Add potato and broccoli stalks, stir well. Add stock, increase heat until boiling then reduce heat, cover saucepan with lid and simmer gently for 10 mins stirring occasionally.

Clean celery, trim off and discard base and top of stalk and slice fairly thinly. Rinse broccoli florets in cold water and add with celery slices to stock. Simmer for a further 10-15 minutes (you may need to increase heat for a few seconds) or until all vegetables are cooked.

Strain off most of the liquid into a jug; leave this to one side while you either put vegetables into a liquidiser or use a hand blender and whizz until pureed. Return pureed vegetables to saucepan, gently stir in stock and mix well. Season to taste. Reheat, serve and enjoy.



As usual at this time of year, we are also bringing to your attention a range of Christmas-themed books which you can find on our special display section.



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
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But, whatever type of book or author you enjoy reading, we are sure you will be able to find something on our shelves to keep you company this winter, so please come and have a browse.




Christmas beckons and the star of wonder this year will be the planet Jupiter which is closest to the Moon on the 24th. If you want a blue bauble then Uranus is close to the bottom right of the Gibbous Moon on the 23rd. And a bit of tinsel is to the right of the Moon on the 23rd, to the left of it on the Moon 22nd. The glitter (in binoculars) is our old friend The Pleiades, without binoculars they will look more like a whisp of Santa's beard.

Below the Moon on these nights and generally low in the East other nights, is Rudoph's nose. Not Mars which is out of sight this month, but the star Aldebaran. More of an orange red than Rudolph would like but he will be busy.

All the above can be seen from 5pm as the nights are now dark. In fact, the shortest day, longest night, the Winter Solstice, is on the 22nd. You should be dragging in the Yule log and sacrificing mince pies to make the Sun return. It will, though day length won't noticeably increase until the end of January.





Heralding the season are a couple of meteor showers, though the ones I have forecast in recent months have been blotted out by cloud. Let's hope we get some clear, sparkly, skies. On the night of the 2nd/3rd there is a return of the Andromedids, a name which conjures up images of Dr Who's adversaries. This meteor shower produced some good displays in the 18th and 19th centuries but was then thought to have been lost. The Earth passing through debris from the tail of Comet Biela every 5 years caused the displays. Then, in around 1846, the comet broke up, likely from passing too close to Jupiter. The debris field changed and few meteors were seen in subsequent years. However, the Earth is once again on track to pass through the remains of the old comet and this year is forecast to be a bumper show.

On the 13th/14th the Geminids are in the sky. This is a consistently good shower caused by Earth passing through the debris of an asteroid – Phaeton. The Moon is out of the way, so a clear sky is all that is needed for Christmas glitter.

On the 9th, Halley's comet, perhaps the most famous one amongst astronomers, is at its furthest distance from the Sun, 5,257 million km. It will then fall back towards Earth and be in our skies in July 2061. I won't see it but some of you or your children or grandchildren, will. The comet takes about 76 years between visitations so is deemed a short period comet. I saw it in 1986 from a seat in my garden in Wolverhampton. It was pretty faint but it was possible to track it by eye. In fact, it was fainter than it had been in 2000 years, just my luck.

In 2061 it will be closer and brighter. Edmund Halley was an English astronomer who first realised, in 1705, that records, over more than 1000 years, of a regular apparition in the sky were referring to the same body. He predicted its next appearance but died well before he saw his calculations were correct. Fellow scientists named the comet after him.

Early December is a good time to look for Mercury as it will have a magnitude of -0.4 (similar to a fairly bright star) and is furthest from the Sun on the 4th (greatest eastern elongation). It will be low in the SW after sunset. Heacham North Beach is a good spot but anywhere without light pollution with a clear view of the sunset will do, Binoculars are really needed but do not use them until the Sun has vanished over Lincolnshire.

Saturn is in the SW setting about 10pm. It is a yellowish dot to the naked eye. A 'phone app will let you find it. Stellarium is still good, not sure if it is still free but it will be cheap. The rings are the best things to see in a telescope. See them at least once


Jupiter has been the brightest 'starry' object in the sky for several months. Use the dark nights to glimpse the Galilean Moons (see earlier copies of the Newsletter).

Uranus is up until 5am. See above for a guide to locating it on the 23rd.

Get up at 4am to see a really brilliant Venus (at magnitude -4.1 it is far, far brighter than Jupiter). Look through a telescope and you will see the gibbous phase it displays. On the 8th/9th a Crescent Moon will make a nice companion to the Morning Star. A real star, Spica, will be close above and to the right.

Already, in November, the odd clear sky for an hour or two, enables me to have my back to The Plough in the NW whilst facing Orion rising in the SSE. They will rise earlier as this month proceeds.

Both the asterism of The Plough and the constellation of Orion seem to be known to everyone. An asterism is a pattern of stars smaller than a constellation. The Plough is part of thr constellation of Ursa Major, the Great Bear. A prominent W in the sky can also be seen which people identify as the constellation of Cassiopeia. In fact, the constellation is very much larger than the W which is an asterism within it. Such patterns are picked out by bright stars which are all that we see most nights. In the distant past, skies were unimaginably darker and the patterns picked out far more complex. Even the pattern we recognise as Orion is not all of him. He has an extended arm from his right shoulder holding a bow whilst, from his left shoulder, his arm extends upwards and is sometimes depicted as holding a hunt trophy. Arms and bow are fainter stars which can be picked out on a clear night.

Top left star is Betelgeuse, an enormous red star which is variable in brightness. The story a couple of years ago was that it would go nova, explode, and be visible in daylight. Never happened and the story has receded. Much photographed is the fuzzy patch below the left side of the belt stars. This is the Orion nebulae, stellar birthplace.





The Plough provides a test of eyesight. The second star along the handle is named Mizar but close to it is Alcor. Eyes like mine see just Mizar (magnitude 2.2). Good eyes see the companion (magnitude 3.9) and can separate the two easily. A child asked to count the stars in the tail will wonder what the problem is. The story is more complicated as Mizar is

a 4-star system and Alcor a binary system, both in their own right. The systems are gravitationally linked so one star to many is a six-star complex. Knowledge of this has evolved over time,



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
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from three stars in the 17thC to five by 1908 and 6 in 2009. The latest addition was following a search for exoplanets which were not found.

Recent 'discoveries' closer to home are that the Moon is a bit older than previously thought, and the remains of the Earth impactor, Theia, which created the Moon may have been discovered within the Earth. Perhaps that's where the Silurians originated (for the baffled reader, another Dr Who reference – it is the 60th anniversary).

If I haven't written about January in the double edition of The Heacham Newsletter it's because I've timed out. They should appear in the January Town and Around.

Meanwhile have a Christmas tree:



The James Webb Telescope Christmas Tree. A cluster of galaxies whose light set towards us around 4.7 billion years ago when our Solar System was forming. Christened the Christmas Tree as there are flashing lights within it.



Journey through Advent with Art

On Monday 11th December 2023 in Sedgeford Village Hall at 2:00pm, Peter Medhurst, an accredited Art Society lecturer, will be giving an illustrated talk on **Robed in Dreadful Majesty: Music, poetry, and traditions of the Advent Season.** Peter is returning to us for another of his very informative and enjoyable lectures, this time to sample the ever-evolving traditions of Advent and to present a range of inspired poetry and music. Do come as our guest to one of our meetings for £5 and see how much you enjoy it. The season of Advent in the Christian calendar anticipates the coming of Christ, with four themes - hope, faith, joy, peace, and the lighting of candles. The Renaissance artists painted gloriously elaborate nativity scenes, from Botticelli's Mystic Nativity (1500), Raphael's Sistine Madonna (1513-14) to Rubens' magnificent Adoration of the Magi (1628-29), paintings rich in imagery to capture the wonder of the Christmas story. Later depictions by artists such as the American master Gari Melchers reveal a more naturalistic approach. In his 19th century contemporary perspective, The Nativity, Joseph and Mary are depicted in all their human authenticity, exhausted, totally overwhelmed, as they gaze at the Christ Child. The Annunciation by Henry Ossawa Tanner (1859-1937) was painted by the artist soon after a trip to Egypt and Palestine in 1897. Influenced by what he had seen in the Holy Land, his stunning and unconventional painting captured the apprehension and bewilderment of the almost adolescent Virgin Mary as she receives the message from Angel Gabriel (shown as a shaft of light) that she will bear the Son of God. The young girl, dressed in peasant clothes, the messy bedclothes and the strange, disturbed carpet, create the sense of uncertainty and confusion.

The world of modern art has a different take on Christmas, away from the elaborate nativity scenes of the Grand Masters to something entirely different, but equally glorious. *Nuit de Noel* (Christmas Eve) by the French painter, Matisse, was originally a design for a stainedglass window that never got made, 'an explosion of colour and stars'. He was very much a visual artist but also a draughtsman, printmaker and sculptor. Above all he was a humanist who wanted people to find 'rest and peace in my paintings'.

Modern artists have turned their interpretative skills to the Christmas card. Salvador Dali, the Spanish surrealist painter and printmaker, known for depicting limp, melting watches (*The Persistence of Memory* (1931) created nineteen Christmas cards.



They were not well received. Out went the traditional Mediterranean Catholic Christmas imagery and in came American and Central European elements, such as the Christmas tree. Before he turned to soup, Andy Warhol in the 1950s designed some never-to-be-repeated cards, but Jeff Koons was more successful, creating a paddle ball game depicting the icon, Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer. Works attributed to Banksy often make a political comment, none more so than his Christmas card, 'Joseph and Mary Can't Make it to Bethlehem....' It appeared some years ago following his trip to the Middle East and circulates in the media from time to time.

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MORE HEACHAM MEMORIES

Church and Chapels

G.W. Alcock was about seventy years old when he wrote the articles published in the *Lynn Advertiser* in 1929/30. He clearly had a very good memory (one has to assume it was accurate) and was also a prolific writer. I have edited 'highlights' from different articles here. The notes are a well-intentioned attempt by an amateur 'foreigner' to compare certain points with today's village and to illuminate some aspects of local history.

In my early days the church services were limited to Sunday morning and evening, and so left us children free to roam; and we occasionally attended services of all three of the local sects – Independents, Wesleyans, and Primitive Methodists. When freedom of conscience

was allowed me, the "Ranters"¹ were my first favourites, though why they should have been given that name I know not, because in the days when the Heacham Wesleyans worshipped at what is now called "The Drift" they were the most noisy. I remember standing at the top

of Cage Lane, where now is the Home and Colonial Stores², one still summer evening, and hearing their prayers even at that considerable distance; it was as if God's ear was heavy and could not hear!

But the Primitive Methodists were my glory. Though I went into the labour market at seven years of age, it was not until I was eleven that I was free to "go as I would" and then to them I turned – first to their Sunday School, and later I learned to lisp in their pulpit.

I have always loved to note the foibles of preachers, their texts, methods and mannerisms . . .

Alcock himself began preaching as a teenager and recalls a wide range of visiting layman preachers in some detail . . .

Heacham never lacked good preachers and when some were feeble the overshadowing talent of the others blotted out their defeats. How far these men walked at that time, when bicycles were not! Even in my boyhood's days it used to be a marvel to me that these men, who bore the burden of toil, could preach on a Sunday as if the preparation of the sermon had engaged them all week...

In that chapel (Wesleyan) was a low pulpit, and one night a preacher surprised his congregation by jumping over the barrier among his audience! That preacher was a character...

They had a preacher – a very capable one – a brickmaker named Parker³... Another good preacher they had, named Walker, was sergeant of the "Riflemen," as we then called the local Volunteers⁴... One of our preachers (at the Primitive chapel) used to preach clad in a long slop⁵ with a beautifully pleated front. His name was Hudson. I knew even his father, who had the farm⁶– later cultivated by a Mr Desborough – near Wilderspin's Gatehouse⁷... For an uneducated man, John Briggs had a remarkable knowledge of the scripture, and he could clothe his ideas with attractive garments. His fervency and fiery eloquence made him an excellent preacher.

.... even we love the rubrics of the Church of England and every stone of her architecture, especially where, as at Heacham, the mellowness of age rests upon it. When I enter Heacham Parish Church, and see its worn threshold and paving, I seem to hear the footsteps of the distant generations and centuries; seen as in a dream the bridal processions of those who entered with hopes, some realised, some shattered; see the parents and sponsors standing at the font; breathe in the air vibrant with music, expressive of vocal art and religious emotion.

.... local character was a man named Bowden. He had entrusted to him the duty of keeping order in the parish church. As beadle⁸ of the church he had one defect: being cross-eyed. In churchtime his long white stick often came down on the cranium of somebody who was not the person engaged in misbehaviour! I will point out as a sign of improvement that no beadle is required at church these days. At the date of which I am writing it used to be the Good Friday custom in the village for the farm-hands to attend in the morning and afternoon just to feed the stock, the rest of the day being ours on condition that we went to church in the morning. At that time the church had a gallery and pews, and between those pews was an aisle, with forms, where we boys used to sit. On Good Friday Mike Bunting, who was sitting just behind me, pressed a pin into the fleshy part of my anatomy. I naturally jumped! That particular incident was overlooked; but I suppose that behind me some boy had been indulging in misconduct. At any rate Bowden walked down the aisle and brought his long stick upon my head with a thwack that rang through the church.

As if it were yesterday, I can see the Rev. G. T. Thomson⁹ looking reproachfully in my direction!

I always thought it an act of vandalism to have that beautiful gallery removed. In that we boys and girls used to sit during the service, and read many and many a time that marble tablet over the church-door telling of the unfortunate victim of drowning in the Wash on a Sunday in 1799. In the centre of that gallery was an old barrel-organ, used twice during my school-days owing to a defect of the keyed organ.

We boys used to sit and admire that stained glass, also now gone, which faced us in the gallery. There were two pulpits then, from the left-hand one the Rev, Charlesworth¹⁰ used to preach; the then curate, Oakley, used the one at the other side. In those young days of mine Charlesworth while preaching would stop to take a pinch of snuff, use a yellow handkerchief, and then go on with his sermon.

Notes:

¹ Originally a dissenting sectarian group at the time of Cromwell, the term was used by some in the nineteenth century for the Primitive Methodists. Enthusiastic lay preachers were encouraged.

² As noted in an earlier article, Cage Lane was the name by which Pound Lane was once named. What is presently Exclusive Fitness has had a wide range of reincarnations. The Home and Colonial Stores were an early grocery 'chain'. There are those who will remember the corner shop being the International Stores, a similar predecessor of today's supermarket 'big boys'.



³ The Heacham brickworks (at Mount Pleasant, Lamsey Lane) had been brought back to life by Holcombe Ingleby and provided work for a number of villagers at this time.

⁴ The Volunteer Force was a forerunner of the Territorials and to be found throughout the country. In Heacham, members would have been part of 3 Battalion, Norfolk Regiment. There were once rifle butts/shooting ranges close to the extremes of both North and South Beaches. John Walker was described as a sergeant instructor; the 1881 census shows the birthplace of a son as Aldershot which gives a clue to a military background. Sgt Instructor Frederick Jelley filled the post in later years. Although 69 when he died in 1915, his name appears on the village war memorial in recognition of his part in training and encouraging young men to 'serve the colours' – some of whom are named with him.

⁵ Photographs of Victorian farm labourers often show them wearing a loose smock (without a 'beautifully pleated front'). That is probably what is meant here - not a clerical surplice but working garb of a different sort!

⁶ John Desborough moved from Snettisham to take over Beach Farm after Edmund Hudson. A 'window' on farming in the 19th century: when the stock of his comparatively small farm was auctioned in 1881 it included '5 active cart mares and geldings, a promising yearling cart filly, grey pony quiet to ride and drive, with foal at foot'. No John Deere then!

⁷ Thomas Wilderspin lived in the railway level crossing keeper's cottage (one of three, still existing, in the village) - now opposite the Pioneer Caravan Park on South Beach Road. In addition to manually operating the gate across the road, he was employed as a platelayer, responsible for inspecting and maintaining the track. (Heacham station opened in 1862).

⁸ A title probably best known from the workhouse in 'Oliver Twist', a beadle's job in church was to usher, assist the churchwardens and, clearly, keep order!

⁹ Rev. Thompson was the vicar of St Mary's for 58 years from 1873 until 1931; he died in the village in 1940. When at Trinity College, Cambridge a fellow undergraduate was Eustace Neville Rolfe who would become Heacham 'squire'. Amongst other 'posts' he was chairman of the Bridge Committee before the Jubilee Bridge and approach road were officially opened in July 1887.

¹⁰ Rev. Joseph Charlesworth was the vicar from 1853 until his death at 70 in 1873.

P.S. The Corner Stone and 'London House' referred to in last month's article were at the High Street/Station Road corner; it was once the site of Herbert Wright's shop and now 'Cannon House'.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS & PARTIES FOR YOUR STAFF – ARE THEY TAXABLE?

Whilst not every employer will wish to follow the lead of a certain Dickensian character in buying a turkey as big as a boy for his/her clerk, as we move into the Season of Goodwill many businesses will wish to recognise the contribution and loyalty of their staff after what may have been a difficult and challenging year.

Sadly, when it comes to staff entertainment or reward, whether Christmas parties or Christmas gifts, for staff, there are employment tax, business tax and VAT consequences.

A Party?

A staff party (or other staff entertainment event such as a meal) will qualify as a tax-free benefit only if it meets all of the following conditions for exemption:

• The event must be open to all employees generally, or to all those at a particular location (and not just the directors!) and cost no more than $\pounds 150$ (inc VAT) per head.

• If there are separate locations, the relief will still apply, so long as all employees have the option to attend at least one event.

• The event must be an annual event, on a recurring basis, but doesn't necessarily have to be held at the same time each year (so the 2023 event might be a Christmas party, and the 2024 event could be a summer ball.)

• There is a limit of £150 (inc VAT) or less per attendee. This is a threshold not an allowance, so if the cost of an event exceeds £150 per head, there is no exemption on the first £150 and the whole cost (and not just the excess over £150) will be subject to Income Tax & NIC.

• The £150 limit applies to the number of guests, rather than the employees, so spouses and partners can be included.

• The limit can cover more than one event provided the total does not exceed $\pounds 150$ (inc VAT) per attendee in any tax year, and all other conditions are met.

• The event must not be provided under an optional remuneration plan.

What about Christmas Gifts?

Making gifts, such as non-cash retail vouchers or hampers, to employees still appears to be a popular alternative (or addition to Christmas parties) for many employers.

Such gifts could either be covered by the trivial Benefit-in-Kind exemption, or the annual events exemption if given at the event (as long as the total of all costs at the event do not exceed the $\pounds 150$ per head).

The trivial benefit exemption will apply when all the following conditions are met:

• The cost of providing the benefit does not exceed £50 (inc VAT and delivery) per employee.

• The benefit is not cash, or a cash voucher. <u>N.B.</u> A cash gift, such as a Christmas Bonus does not qualify.

• The employee is not entitled to the benefit as part of any contractual obligation.

• The gift is not provided in recognition of particular services performed by the employee as part of their duties.

Where all of the conditions above are met for a seasonal gift, there are no tax or NIC liabilities for either employer or employee. Where one or all of the conditions are not met, the gift will be taxable and subject to NIC. Additionally, where an employee buys their own gift, and is reimbursed, this relief will not apply.

So, on the basis that a Christmas Turkey can easily cost in excess of $\pounds 50$ nowadays, careful planning of an office party might ensure that a little bit of Christmas goodwill could be passed on, in a tax-efficient manner for all.

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Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

THE WARD

It is sometimes difficult to separate Ward issues from Borough as, obviously, the Ward sits in it. Consequently, there is an overlap in the following, Borough, report.

Heacham: there was a meeting between the developer of the Cheney Hill site and the Parish Council. I could not attend but several councillors did and asked pertinent questions. I will pursue those when the reserved matters application comes to planning committee.

Sedgeford: I have arranged a meeting between Sedgeford councillors, planning officers and housing officers to discuss the old school site which is being developed by NCC. I hope some resolution is found which suits the village.

Fring: I kept an eye on potential local flooding as Fring suffered several winters ago. Local maintenance of ditches etc seems, I hope, to have mitigated that, although water extraction rates by Anglian water could have something to do with it. There are concerns that a very neglected pond poses a potential risk to future flooding and I have asked officers to determine how to proceed.

THE BOROUGH

An unusual month or so as we had the Local Government Association (LGA) peer review immediately before last Council and some LGA training / consultation for Cabinet and group leaders between then and now. Perhaps the most significant benefits of both is a chance to compare and contrast approaches to council functions and the people which provide them, including councillors, as the review providers were, or are, councillors from elsewhere. More will emerge about outcomes of the review when the report is published and the action plan written.

Continuing the theme of talking to people I have continued regular meetings with Independent Leaders which enables discussions with people across the country. Increasing difficulties with homelessness was a fairly common thread though it was linked to rehousing asylum seekers rather than the emerging issues of mortgage defaulting. The former is causing major problems along the south coast. River flooding, after heavy rain, challenged areas to the north and west of us though part of Somerset, susceptible to such flooding, apparently escaped due to investment after previous floods

That brings me to several environmental matters I am involved in both as Ward member and as Leader. The Heacham River is one of the chalk streams which has suffered in recent years and I hope to be working with local landowners, councils, and the Norfolk Rivers Trust (possibly with Anglian Water joining in) to improve matters. The river reaches The Wash at Heacham South Beach and sea water quality there remains poor (over the rolling average) which is of Borough as well as local concern and I have continued meetings with the Environment Agency and Anglian Water about that. The river enters the sea under the shingle ridge which was debated at last Council and I did write to The Secretary of State and the Environment Agency reiterating this Council's concerns about flood defence funding and await an answer.

Sea water quality, lack of, particularly off Heacham beaches was the subject of an Environment Agency /Anglian



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Water/RSPB and Creh Analytical Ltd, meeting. It boiled down to, 'there is no smoking gun', 'further investigative work will continue', and how to move forward. I will await further developments before commenting further. A meeting with AW at Heacham Waste Water Treatment Works, also attended by the EA, Heacham Parish Cllrs, and James Wild MP, convinced attendees that sewage did not escape from that infrastructure. However, concerns were still raised about operations at pumping stations which serve HWWTW and I have received complaints about leakage from local pipes, one anecdotal, one acknowledged by AW as due to overloading of a local pump in heavy rainfall.

I can't avoid the sea and was on the stage for the Port Evo (wash barrier) meeting at the Princess Theatre, Hunstanton. Every seat was taken and I was told over 60 people were turned away at the door. The promoter of the scheme was scheduled to speak last (his demand) and it proved to be an error of sorts. He did say a sentence to open the talks, 'We are not building a barrier'. His full presentation at the end effectively contradicted this. I spoke for the Borough and stated that we had no position as we did not have sufficient information. I did give a list of questions we needed the answers to. Other speakers, on fishing, ports, biodiversity, oceanography, did have sufficient knowledge to criticise it. There is likely to be 5+ years of investigations to see if it can be done without causing problems, then 3 to 5 years building the port connected to Lincolnshire. Phase 2 follows, consideration of joining to Norfolk – the full barrier.

Changing tack, though it could be related to matters above, I attended and made a (very small) contribution to a Business Continuity Exercise which placed key officers in modelling conditions which could curtail Council activities. They revolved around escalating weather conditions both in the winter and summer. It was pleasing to find that, as things got worse, officer responses got better.

A meeting of the West Norfolk Transport and Infrastructure Steering Group proved informative. It discussed progress, or rather lack of it, on the A17/A47 Pullover junction at King's Lynn. A fall out from HS2 cancellation is awaited and a further technical study will be done.

Wracking her brains, a word popped up she'd seen once in a book.

When she told the page, he looked surprised and gave her a funny look.

But, ever cool, he cleared his throat and shouted to the throng "Miss Cindy Salmonella" (thought he **must** have got that wrong.)
