Dear Newsletter,

Second Home Council Tax charge- an alternative view

As static owners for some years we fell in love with Heacham and last year took the opportunity to purchase a bungalow (current second home) in the area as our first step to retirement in the village.

Having read of the council plans to charge us double the standard council tax, I feel it is only fair that we point out some salient points as a counter argument.

Having paid a second home tax as part of our purchase of our property we currently pay full council tax to the borough. In return for this, despite being in the area nearly every weekend the only service we call upon is refuse collection. We do not utilise any form of doctor, dentist or social care services and as such represent a low cost to the council. We readily contribute to local business both in relation to refurbishing the property we purchased (which when bought attracted no interest from local residents) utilising local suppliers and generally day to day in terms of purchases from outlets such as Jennings store other local shops and restaurants/pubs and hope to continue this when we move to the area on a permanent basis on full retirement.

We fully appreciate that the council are seeking to raise additional funds but feel strongly that there could be a more scientific approach here which deals with the holiday let landlords who are clearly prolific in the area, often owning multiple locations, rather than alienate people who have worked all their lives to set up their retirement roots.

Appreciate that this is likely to fall on deaf ears given the council's mind appears set but we would hope that they could reconsider rather than take what they clearly see as an easy option.

This charitable trust based in Heacham is available to help provide financial support for the following purposes:



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CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM



From daffodils to fluffy chicks, this month is full of symbolic images.

On 1st March, we start with St David's Day. He is the patron saint of Wales which uses leeks and daffodils as

national symbols. The wild daffodil which occurs widely across Europe is also known as the Lenten Lily. This has been used to produce the myriad types of daffodils we are enjoying in our gardens today thus giving us an ongoing reminder of the season of Lent. The 40 days of Lent commemorate the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness, fasting and being tempted by Satan in preparation for his earthly ministry. Similarly, we use the season to prepare ourselves for Passiontide and the looming cross of crucifixion on Good Friday.

That cross is our next symbol. Through Passiontide we remember the 'kangaroo court' hatched up between Pilate and the Jews to legalise the death sentence for a trumped-up charge of 'claiming to be King of the Jews.' The only crown this king would wear was one of thorns as he endured the mocking and taunting, the shame and humiliation of the brutality frequently meted out by the Roman Empire. Death by crucifixion was widely practised across the Empire, even here. Recently archaeologists have discovered irrefutable evidence of a crucifixion at Fenstanton in Cambridgeshire. The nail was still in position through the heel bone. That cross disappears into the blackness of Good Friday and a stranger's tomb.

The despair, shock and blankness of the original Easter Saturday has no symbol. With the benefit of hindsight, it is a time of preparation for us when traditionally eggs have been painted and Simnel cakes baked.

It was not until sunrise on that first Sunday that there was a hint and then confirmed promise of new life. That is why our next symbol is the egg. It promises new life but until the chick breaks the shell and struggles out, its potential has not been realised. When Jesus rose from the dead on that first Easter morning God's promise of life for all who will put their faith in Jesus was fulfilled. Fluffy Easter chicks represent that new life. Do join one of our congregations to celebrate this fulfilment of God's promise in the life of Jesus. If you are planning to attend the 'Son-rise Service' don't forget! the clocks go forward on that day at the start of a new season.




it was to say thank you for putting up with the noise and the cars on a Tuesday evening. We would have loved to have given everyone one, but we are grateful to you all.



Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

This soup is nice as a starter or in a mug with a sandwicch as it is not too filling.

Sweet Potato Soup

Ingredients:

1 medium shallot A knob of Butter Sweet Potato approx. 230g/8oz Carrots approx. 130g/5oz

2 sticks of celery

Chicken or vegetable stock cube dissolved in 500ml hot water Salt and Pepper to taste.

Method:

Peel sweet potato and carrots and cut them up into small pieces.

Peel shallot and slice thinly.

Trim and clean celery and cut into medium size pieces. Place butter in a saucepan over a low to medium heat, add shallot slices, stir well and cook for 1 minute stirring continuously. Add

other vegetables stir and mix well.

Carefully add stock, increase heat and bring to boiling point. Reduce heat and leave, covered, simmering gently, stirring occasionally, until vegetables are fairly soft, approximately 15 minutes.

Strain off most of the liquid into a jug, put aside while you either put vegetables into a liquidiser or use a hand blender and whizz until vegetables are pureed.

Carefully return liquid to pureed vegetables in a saucepan, stirring gently to mix well.

Season to taste. Reheat, serve and enjoy.



Spring is here, twice in fact. The 1st is the start of meteorological spring as the weather people just chop the year into four seasons of 3 months each. Astronomical spring, the real spring, is on March 20th. This will be the Spring Equinox when day and night are equal, 12 hours each. After that, we head to summer and the longest day on 21st June. The timings of these events are, as far as we are concerned, immutable, depending as they do on the tilt of the Earth and the consistency of its rotation. Come back in several hundred million years and the dates will be different as Earth's rotation is slowing. Half a billion years ago the day was 22 hours long. No need to amend your diaries yet.



Having mentioned summer, British Summer Time begins on 31st March so put the clocks forward and lose an hour's sleep.

February is proving to be another damp squib with Jupiter remaining as the bright spot between the night time clouds. A few frosts did clear the sky a little and Orion stood proud. Jupiter remains with us in March setting around 10.30pm. Use small telescopes including birding scopes to watch the Galilean moons appear and disappear over several nights. The gas giant is the brightest object in the night sky barring the Moon and I don't think you will get them confused. On the 13th, the Crescent Moon passes Jove so you can study them both. If you only have binoculars, brace them and take a good look. Note the Earthshine, Sun light reflected from the Earth, which reveals the dark portion of the Moon. The illumination is weak so needs optical aids or a camera to pick it up. The bright crescent, of course, is sunlight striking the Moon directly.




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From the 13th to the end of the month, whilst looking at Jupiter, find the fuzzy blob well above and a little to the left of it. This is the Pleiades, 7 Sisters, star cluster which is still discernible to my eyes though I can't resolve individual stars within it. I have written about this before and you can look back in the online archives. However, this month, scan with good binoculars between Jupiter and the Pleiades and look for a very faint blue green spot. It is the planet Uranus. An enigma as it was discovered by Herschel in 1781 when he was using a telescope to scan for comets. Unlike the 5 wanderers in the sky (Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn), it was never recorded by ancient astronomers. Surprising as skies were much darker then and good eyes, in a very dark sky, can see it now.

The planet to really look out for this month is Mercury. It is your best chance to see this elusive planet. Elusive because the relative positions of it, the Earth and the Sun, place it close to the latter; you have to look towards the Sun and Mercury appears low in the sky which means a lot of murky atmosphere to peer through. This month it will be below and to the right of Jupiter and, as the month progresses, it moves further from the Sun, reaching its greatest separation on 24th March at 7.30pm. It will be low, and the best viewpoint is likely from Heacham Beaches or the promenade from them to Hunstanton. There is another option which I have not used and that is from the platform erected at the highest point of Heacham Millennium Woods, the Chalk Pit. Wherever you choose, there has to be a clear sky down to almost the horizon or, at worst, scattered clouds.

If you can't sleep, go outside at 5am on the 25th and watch the Moon dim a little as it enters the edge, penumbra, of the shadow cast by the Earth as it passes between the Sun and the Moon.

Stars to look out for: Aldebaran is to the left of the Pleiades. A fattening crescent Moon is just below the star cluster on the 14th, look out about 8.30pm. Aldebaran is a red giant with a companion. It is 65 light years away and has an apparent magnitude of 0.86.


Algieba and Regulus are either side of a gibbous Moon around 8pm on the 20th and 21st. Algieba is a bright binary. One star is orange red, the other green-yellow. Both are giants and lie at a distance of 130 light years. Apparent magnitude is 2.04. Regulus is a four-star system though only 3 have been visually observed.

The brightest is a blue-white subgiant, The system is 75 light years away with an apparent magnitude of 1.4.

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Spica is almost touching the Moon at around 9.30 pm on the 26th. Spica is a binary system where the two stars are so close together, they cannot be separated by telescope. They orbit each other in four days and gravitational effects make each egg shaped. Both are much larger and more massive than the Sun. They lie at 250 light years distance and have an apparent magnitude of around 1.0 (variable).

Note: Apparent magnitude is a measure of how bright objects, including stars, appear to our eyes and the lower the number, the brighter they appear. Their true brightness, absolute magnitude, is a measure of how bright they would appear if they all lay at the same distance, (32.6 light years or 10 parsecs). If you compare Regulus with Spica, you will see their apparent magnitudes are not too different but Spica is over 3 times further away so its absolute magnitude should be much higher, and it is. Absolute magnitude of Regulus is minus 0.57 whilst Spica is minus 3.55. Magnitude sales are logarithmic, a small change in number is an increasingly large change in actual observation.

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
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


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The orbit of Comet Pons Brookes



Borough Council News Heacham, Sedgeford and Fring

THE WARD

Not a lot has moved during the wet month of February though, at the time of writing, we are not halfway through yet. In Heacham, the multiple concerns, appeals and planning applications surrounding the Fenway seem about to culminate in a public enquiry. 'About' being a flexible word as civilisations can rise and fall whilst such matters are pondered. The Cheney Hill reserved matters application edges closer to a planning committee. I suggest that all people with an interest get involved with this. At the other end of the village a small, proposed development opposite the old gatehouse to the park is causing local concern.

Beach recharging became a news article. I don't know why as it occurs every year. Investigations of the shingle ridge are, I think, about to start and it is recognised that work will have to be done to improve the secondary sea defences, the raised bund that has a footpath along it, inland from the ridge. The EA told me a while ago that that was their likely plan.

Complaints were received about the state of the A149 and Snettisham roundabout due to the build-up of sludgy Carrstone mud on the road surface. This falls off vehicle wheels leaving the quarry. Regular use of a road scrubber seemed to have controlled this in the recent past. Anyway, County were told, and heavy rain seems to have done the rest. Wheel washing is really needed.

Currently, the flooding people should be concerned about is that caused by excessive rain. Heacham seems to have avoided major problems with the work that was carried on Station Road apparently coping.

Sedgeford hasn't had flooding either and, likely, the river Heacham has had a better flow. Conversations continue with the Environment Agency and Anglian Water about what happens in the summer when the river is often in a bad way. The Village Hall continues to put on an excellent selection of plays and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding has enabled the hall to be an exceptional, green, venue. There has been a meeting to discuss the old school site between the Borough planning officers and the Parish Council. However, the site is in County control and a movement towards more or all affordable housing is, I believe, no further forward. It will be disappointing if the Parish Council's wish is not met. The site was a school and replacing it with homes that have a chance of being bought by local people seems fair to me. Sedgeford Neighbourhood Plan ensures that they can't be sold off as second homes or holiday lets.

Fring has had a flooding problem again. I have failed to visit so far but now have it in my diary for the middle of February. The defibrillator I mentioned in a previous issue is about to be fitted in the red 'phone box at the crossroads. Paid for by CIL and maintenance provided by the Fring Estate.

THE BOROUGH COUNCIL

It was National Apprenticeship week in February, and a gathering was held to celebrate our apprentices. An edited version of my official 'speech' below gives some details though the highlight was a 'video' of apprentices telling us how good the experience is. This was produced by an apprentice and will be used for promotional purposes at secondary schools and the college.

'110 people have taken Apprenticeships since we started the current scheme. We have 35 Apprentices at the moment; they work across our organisation including planning, accountancy, democratic services, Lily, tourism, communications and many more.

Not only do our Apprentices benefit from learning new skills while on the job, the Borough, too, benefit from the knowledge and enthusiasm brought into the organisation.

Agreeing to be an apprentice takes commitment and I thank them for taking it on alongside the day work they do. Additionally, it takes commitment from our managers to give our Apprentices the time and support they need to undertake this additional learning.

As a Council we encourage lifelong learning, and an apprenticeship is an excellent way of achieving career progression and motivation for individuals. We're proud of what they have achieved and what they bring to our organisation.'

I visited two health related sites, the NHS King's Lynn Health Hub at South Lynn and Birch Tree House outside Downham Market run by Mind. The former is a new build and is currently at the fitting out and cladding stage. It has taken a few months as it is a smart modular construction. Very impressive and it will reduce pressure on the hospital services. I asked about building a hospital. This company could have a 500 bed hospital functioning in under 4 years and that includes a lead in time of 2 years (when they could start). Food for thought.

The Mind property is a large, new, open market house. No modifications have been needed and it should prove an excellent facility. They have three such properties and they are hoping for a fourth. This is the first one in West Norfolk and it will provide respite and support for up to four people for 5 nights.

The Budget has occupied much time. Criticism in newspapers began at the beginning of February and will no doubt continue until you read this. It may not have even happened as planned because it had to be passed at Council on 22nd Feb. There was an opportunity at a full joint panel meeting and, later, at Cabinet

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for any individual councillor or party to comment, criticise or offer changes to the proposed budget. Nothing of note was said though thanks were given for the clarity of the presentation by the appropriate officer.

The Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk has published its draft budget for the financial years up to 2027/28, which sets out its spending plans for the next four years in order to deliver its new corporate strategy.

Due to challenging financial conditions, the budget includes a number of measures to increase revenue income, such as a 10% rise in fees and charges. The proposed council tax increase is £5.

The reality is that the amount of money that the Council needs to spend on services is more than the amount of money it gets in.

Councils have been underfunded in relation to the job they have been asked to do for a number of years. This Council has managed using financial reserves that were set aside for this purpose. However, due to a combination of high inflation and increased demand for our services, these reserves will not last as long as had been forecast.

We are now looking at how we can increase our income and manage our spending to reach a balanced budget that delivers the priorities set out in our corporate strategy.

Where spending reductions could have implications for service provision, there will be a public consultation in the summer to ensure that any decisions are informed by the priorities of local people.

However, while these are challenging times, we also want to make sure that the people affected by increases in the cost of living are supported, which is why we proposed a rise in relief through the council tax support scheme to 100%. We also

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proposed widening the criteria to include more working people. These proposals have been accepted by Council.

While financial pressures are common to many councils around the country, in West Norfolk and around 30 other councils nationally, there is an additional issue caused by the funding of the Internal Drainage Board (IDB), which comes out of the West Norfolk portion of council tax. The Council is a founding member of a lobbying group that is asking the Government to address this. Around 29 councils were represented at a meeting in the Houses of Parliament hosted by MP Liz Truss. We await the results. And, if you watch Countryfile, you may see me walking along a muddy footpath in half a gale trying to answer questions about these charges. In the meantime, the Council is planning its current and future financial position and has taken actions to generate income while also reducing costs.

We have brought forward council tax on empty homes *(2024/25) and doubled council tax on second homes **(2025/26) – which it is also hoped will encourage people to live locally. These are some of the measures that form part of the Council's cost management/income generation plan, which is being developed to support closing the budget gap.

The Council will also continue to deliver its programme to address local housing need with ongoing delivery of new homes. These will be funded through a mixture of Government funds and self-funding loans.

*From this April we will be collecting additional council tax on properties which have been empty for 1 year rather than 2. This will raise £780K though the Borough will only get £50K and Parishes £30K. The bulk, £590K will go to NCC. Please lobby your County Cllrs and ask for a fairer distribution of money so it can be spent within West Norfolk.

**From April 2025, Council has agreed to double council tax on second homes. This will raise around £6.5M though the Borough will only get £0.44M and the Parishes £0.23M. Lobby your County Cllrs about that unreasonable allocation too.

What's Gone is Gone!

Unlike modelling where clay is added and removed until you are happy with the work, it isn't possible to put bits back onto a carved stone. What's gone is gone!


This seems like something that is daunting but it needn't be. Stone carving is a lot like life. Each stone is a challenge. It has its own character and leads to a new aesthetic statement. Through an intensive dialogue with the stone while working with it, it's possible to bring out what is hidden within.

While studying sculpture, I worked mainly figuratively in clay. In 1998, I attended an extensive 2 week marble carving course in Carrara, Italy. It was the end of August and very hot. It was inspiring because the group was made up of artists and because the course was held in the mountains a 20 minute walk outside the town. Then there was the stone. There was marble everywhere. What better way to begin this part of my journey than in the very mountains Michelangelo walked over 400 years ago to find the right stone. (Well, it could be that his actual mountain is gone. Through the marble trade, mountains were systematically taken down. At one point, the Italian government decided that the panorama could no longer be destroyed. Now, the mountains are literally hollowed out.)

So, these conditions made the perfect working environment. Where to start?!

Visions in Stone

So, how is it possible to bring a form out of a raw stone? That is perhaps the most fundamental question when starting a stone carving. The simple answer is that you have to find your way. With my first stone in Carrara, I tried to envisage what was contained within the stone very much like the Canadian Inuit. There are plenty





of clues if you have a rough piece rather than a block.

We used the same traditional tools as Michelangelo did, refining as we went along. Many people I have encountered have remarked that I



must have incredible patience — not true. Rather, it is exciting to watch the form emerge and refine while bringing out what becomes the final sculpture.

Dinah Andersen, an Inuit artist and now friend I met in Carrara says, "We, the Inuit are known for having a vision when working with stone. For instance, I can look at a piece of raw material and 'see' something in it. True or False?? Most Inuit will agree. I look at pieces, see 'possibilities,' but sometimes; it does not want to be what I envisioned. The end result speaks for itself."

Everything is open!

For beginners, soapstone is a wonderful material. It's softer than marble and comes in a variety of colours.

Norfolk) guest speaker will be Stuart Harvey, coming from his home in Rome to tell us about *The Treasures of the Borghese Gallery*. Their knowledge and influence can decide whether that artist and artwork will have a place in the market. The collector's support and influence have a role in determining the artist's future. They may decide the value of an artwork, and they can operate in a similar way to art critics in deciding whether the artist will gain interest and recognition.

".... the true collector's only home is his own museum." (Orhan Pamuk.) Great collectors can be very secretive about their artworks, but many have a desire to share, like Francois Pinault, the French billionaire, who is quoted as saying, "The desire to possess – born at the moment I first came into contact with art – has been transformed into a profound need to share." Museums have been major beneficiaries of some of the world's prestigious art collections and some of the most modest. Many collections in American museums have been gifts from private donors. Recently, contemporary artworks have been bought in such large quantities by the super-rich that new private museums are being built. Rather than just leave their extensive collections in storage they are choosing to share them with the public in these new 'ego-seums'.

Future generations are often the perfect beneficiaries of all the time and hard work collectors have spent in building collections and the financial rewards may be substantial. They may go on to develop their own collection and become even more famous than the originator.

MORE HEACHAM MEMORIES

In previous issues I have arranged the memories of G.W. Alcock in some sort of thematic order, but this month's final offering is a mixed bag taken from the articles written by a man in 1930 but born in 1860. He was an interesting character and next month – editors permitting - there will be my attempt at a biography of this one-time Heacham resident.

In those days a few ancients of Heacham still wore top-hats. It was part of the policeman's uniform. My grandfather – nicknamed "Laddywax" – used to thatch, feed the threshing machine, and drill while wearing a top-hat, in which he carried his gloves and handkerchief. Two other wearers of top-hats were tailors: Heugh, my wife's grandfather, and Bradfield, who lived up "Drapers' Hole."

It was the practice of Mr Lewis to give a "wet" at the beginning of harvest. In this case he gave a pound, which we spent at Matthew Bussey's, The West Norfolk Hotel.²

In those days doctors established themselves in practice in the village, but speedily left again, presumably because they were not able to make a living. Dr Flockton, of Snettisham was our maternity agent and parish doctor, and Jane Lake was the local midwife. Finally a Dr Shaw came to the parish, and with him three sisters.

There was one dear old soul, "Granny Metcalfe," who lived in the Malthouses. Her hair was silvery, her knowledge of childish ailments and their remedies profound. Mothers, instead of calling in the doctor, were wont to go to "Granny." She would come, diagnose the complaint, prescribe a remedy, and sometimes supply a lotion and other things of her own providing.

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Literature at that time being so scanty, how welcome was the work of Mrs Mallet, Grainger's mother³. Every Sunday afternoon of the year, year in and year out, she used to go round the village with stiff-covered booklets bound in brown paper; looking back I appreciate that as a great and useful work. She was kindness itself.

"Taffey" Skoyles was a village character. He was our unofficial railway carrier, charging us the modest sum of twopence per package for luggage fetched or delivered. He was the boon companion of "Laddy." One night they travelled in a cart of his, like a London costermonger's barrow, and the youth of the village played a prank upon them. They undid the donkey's harness, and so when "Laddy" and "Taffy" got into the cart and said "Gee up," the donkey walked out of the shafts and the cart tilted out its passengers.

At cottages such as the Malthouses, which had a hawthorn hedge opposite, we would silently tie a rope to a door-handle, and step across the road: one of our number would knock on the door, which could not be opened by the folks inside because we were pulling on the rope.

At one time you might have gone through the village and not found a garden-gate whose hinges were not nailed up, the reason being that we lads had a pretty habit of taking those gates off their hinges... Down by the "Great Gate" – what we now call Spencer's-row⁴, where is my country estate – we piled gardengates on a heap in front of the old pump, which is still standing.

In those days, when villagers with whom we were intimate married, we boys would arm ourselves with old kettles and other tins filled with shingle, and have other such apparatus such as old frying-pans beaten with a stick, and a hand-made pistol called a "cannon" which we fired: the din!



One day I had to go to Thornham lime-kiln for lime with which to whitewash the Lighthouse, that lime being whiter than the product of the two kilns nearer home⁵. When passing through Holme, I asked an old man the way. He knew the pony, and said, "Yew let that old pony go: he'll take you there." "Billy" did, stopping in due course at the kiln-steps . . . If I went to Heacham for bricks or tiles⁶, I could safely lie in the cart and sleep. If "Billy" heard a cart coming up behind, or saw one coming towards him, he would turn to the left, resuming of his own accord the centre of the road when the other vehicle had passed . . . Thinking of those old days I am a boy again, sampling Hart's "rock" and prunes at Heacham Fair!

The opening of the Lynn-Hunstanton railway is my first real recollection of life.⁸. I remember going down with my mother and grandmother to see the first train come in. We stood on a piece of vacant land where the down platform now is, and on which was what we railwaymen call a "Tommy Dodd." I can see that train in the station now . . . Curiously enough, of the making of the Wells line I have no recollection; but I do remember when the cutting between Heacham and Sedgeford was level with the adjoining lands. ¹⁰

Another outstanding event in the life of Heacham was when Mr le Strange, one of the most considerate of employers and landowners, gave to the villagers the privilege of new allotments on some fields at one time owned by a Mr Grainger, whose initials are to be seen on some cottages near by the Post-office¹¹; at least he had one little field which opened into the Commondrove¹² . . . Father tenanted another . . . between Elvin's gatehouse¹³ and the mill by the side of that sluggish stream that runs by a short breadth from the more distinguished river.

When I visit my "country estate" at Heacham on holiday, I always go to have a look at the old school.¹⁴ But the village seems to be peopled with strangers. Perhaps fewer than a dozen of old-timers now live there . . .

Notes

- 1 The photograph shows what the early censuses would describe as 'ag labs' agricultural labourers. Draper's Hole was at the bottom of Cheney Hill.
- 2 Licensing laws were clearly more lax. In fact it wasn't until 1886 that the sale of alcohol was banned to those under 13. George was of course, like the majority of his peers, a labourer working with older men, at this time.
- **3** Grainger Mallett and his father before him were blacksmiths in the village.



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- **4** What is now New Row was known as Spencer's Row.* Spencer was presumably the farmer at Caley Farm.
- **5** Lime was used by builders and on the land by farmers and also for painting of farm buildings. There was a lime kiln on the site of the Millennium Wood and another at the top of Redgate Hill.
- **6** The Heacham brickworks by Mount Pleasant on Lamsey Lane was revived by Holcombe Ingleby and provided employment for local men as well as materials for local builders.
- 7 Heacham Fair was traditionally held for decades certainly up to World War 1 to mark mid-summer.
- **8** The Lynn- Hunstanton Railway opened for traffic in October 1862. George Alcock would have been about two and a half. There would seem to be no faulting his memory!
- **9** Alcock became a signalman and would become familiar with railway slang. A 'Tommy Dodd' was a short, track-side signal. The name originates from the music halls possibly to a short and stubby performer.
- **10** The West Norfolk Junction Railway to Wells opened in 1866 and there were stations at Sedgeford, Docking, Stanhoe, Burnham and Holkham.
- 11 The initials 'A.F.G.' can be seen on 'Mocha', the café and gift shop. (By the time of Alcock's 1930 articles the post office was in its present position). In those days before supermarkets, many more people were self-sufficient; even small cottages had comparatively large gardens and the village had a number of allotments. A map of 1886 shows allotments to the north of what is now Broadway, behind the terraced cottages on the High Street and off Church Lane adjacent to Queen's Cottages.
- **12** Common-drove * is now known as School Road.



13 Elvin's gatehouse was one of Heacham's three railway crossing keeper's cottages. It is to be found at the beginning of the Ringstead Road.

14 Alcock moved to London but kept a cottage on New Row. (I have attempted to trace his life and produce a biography' for next month). The first of his Heacham Memories published in the Newsletter refers to George's school days at the school 'through the arch' behind the Green.


Following the success of last year, we shall be running a 4 week introductory course to Golf Croquet for U3A members in April, so watch out for details of that. If any other groups

Hunstanton Town Council agrees to freeze Precept for second year

At Hunstanton Town Council's Full Council meeting held 24th January 2024, members voted unanimously to approve the recommendation by the Finance and Property Management Committee to keep the amount households pay to the local authority through council tax the same as the previous 2 years at £195,000.

Councillor Mark Williamson, Chair of the Finance and Property Management Committee, said: "It is the second year in a row the town council has opted not to raise its precept. We know that many of our residents are in a cost-of-living crisis and that is about to get worse.

"In representing our residents, we have a special responsibility to mitigate that as much as possible, and that is why we are recommending no increase in council tax precept for 2024/25."

Hunstanton Town Council also offers cost of living advice to its residents via their Helping Hands Café. This is a registered warm space, open to anyone, where warm drinks and snacks are offered on a pay what you can afford basis. Open Mondays and Wednesdays $10 \, \mathrm{am} - 12$ noon.

The Mayor of Hunstanton Cllr Michael Ruston stated: "If you're finding the additional strain on your household finances untenable, don't suffer on in silence. Advice is on hand on the different ways people can get assistance with buying food, staying warm, getting help with the rise in costs of bills and crisis support.

"At such a worrying time, mental health and wellbeing can also suffer. If you are struggling to cope, there are a variety of organisations who can support you. Please come along to the Helping Hands Café or call the Town Clerk on 01485 532402 for more information."

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TAX TIPS FOR 2023/24: USE IT BEFORE YOU LOSE IT!

Now that the 2023 Tax Returns have been filed and the end of the current tax year is nearly upon us, it is well worth setting some time aside to look at what needs to be considered in the next few weeks to see if it possible to use the available tax reliefs as fully as possible by 5 April. Please note that the suggestions below only refer to the TAX consequences of various courses of action. Advice from a qualified Independent Financial Adviser will be needed regarding the investment aspects of any decision.

Some of the key areas are:

Personal Allowances

Make full use of your personal allowance, savings allowance, starting and basic rate bands. Equalisation of income between spouses/civil partners with children where possible may also ensure that your income remains under the £50,000 threshold for the High Income Child Benefit Charge.

Dividend Income

The tax-free dividend allowance (originally £5,000, then £2,000 and currently £1,000) will be reduced to £500 in 2024/25. Wherever possible, assuming your family company has sufficient distributable reserves, consider bringing forward the payment of dividends to ensure that as many shareholders as possible benefit from this relief whilst it is still available.

Capital Gains

The Capital Gains Tax Annual Exemption will drop from £6,000 to £3,000 on 6 April. Those with latent Capital Gains should certainly consider realising up to £6,000 before April. The Annual Exemption cannot be carried forward or transferred so it is lost if not used during the tax year.

Individual Savings Accounts

Individual Savings Accounts (ISAs) are probably the most straightforward way of investing tax efficiently and shouldn't be overlooked. Every taxpayer can make use of an Individual Savings Account (ISA) within which no CGT or dividend tax applies. The maximum annual contribution is a generous £20,000, (or £9,000 into a junior ISA.)

Inheritance Tax Exemptions

Inheritance Tax (IHT) is a particularly vexed topic, with opinions split between those who think it should be increased and those who think this should be abolished. Although the annual reliefs have not been increased for many years, they can still be valuable, particularly where they are used regularly. Individuals can each make capital gifts of £3,000 annually, and the allowance can be carried forward for one year, so if nothing was given in 2022/23 the exemption available up to 5 April this year will be £6,000 or £12,000 for a married couple. In addition, £250 can be given to anyone who has not received part of the larger amount.

Pension Contributions

Pensions are a very tax efficient tool, which, subject to taking advice from an Independent Financial Adviser, can be used as part of a wider wealth and tax planning strategy. Pension contributions are particularly attractive to taxpayers who suffer the progressive tapering of their personal allowance as income in this band suffers a marginal rate of 60%.

Remain aware, however, that there are special rules where the total of all contributions, whether employee or employer contributions, exceed the Annual Allowance of £60,000 and unused relief brought forward. Hence, professional advice should always be sought before proceeding.

Charitable Giving

Contributions to charity under the Gift Aid scheme by a taxpayer will extend the normal tax bands. At the basic rate level, the charity receiving the money will be able to recover 25% on the amount gifted. For those with income between £100,000 and £150,000 the effects can be quite startling.

Capital Allowances

Businesses will normally be able to claim relief for qualifying capital expenditure within their accounting year (which will not always be the fiscal year) so those with a 5 April or 31 March year end may wish to review capital expenditure plans in the light of expected income, with a view to accelerating or deferring it for best tax effect.

Business Taxes

There is a particular complication in 2023/24 for those with non-fiscal year ends – as part of the "Making Tax Digital" regime all unincorporated businesses will be taxed on a fiscal year basis for 2023/24 and subsequent years, and 2023/24 will be a transitional year which can potentially include almost two years accounting profits. There are special provisions enabling the one-off-tax uplift to be spread but those in this position need to be aware of the new rules and to budget for the additional liabilities in forthcoming years.

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Hunstanton Town Council opens Community Centre Redevelopment Task & Finish Group

Hunstanton Town Council's Chair of Finance & Property Management Committee, Cllr Mark Williamson, explains the reasonings brought forward by the Town Council to open a Community Centre Redevelopment Task & Finish Group.

"Hunstanton Town Councillors had, at a meeting, discussed the need to look into the possibility of RAAC (reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete) at the Community Centre, Avenue Road and agreed a survey of the building would be needed as the safety of venue is their main priority.

"A company has now been instructed to carry out the survey and report back their findings as soon as possible. Whilst this is in progress, Council members have decided to look at the overall purpose/ usage of the site with a vision of making the venue a building that is fully versatile for the people of Hunstanton. In essence, a community hub".

HTC appreciate this will be a long term ongoing project. All members of the community and venue hirers will be involved in discussions and suggestions as the project gets underway. Our priority is to ensure we see a green, eco-friendly, sustainable venue, however we proceed to redevelop.

The Task & Finish Group will be investigating opportunities to include so much more viability to the building; sports for all, offices, meeting places, better services for less abled with consideration being given to installing a 'disabled changing room' plus so much more that could support the people of Hunstanton.

Hunstanton Community Centre is a registered 'Fields in Trust' site and as such will be retained and used as as a green space for community use and enjoyment, a public park, playing field or recreation ground in perpetuity for future generations.
