All proceeds will be going towards the hall restoration.


 $\pounds 25$ (a deposit of $\pounds 10$ to secure your place) balance paid on the day.


Monthly Feature





Another Recipe from The Prudent Pensioner

This easy to make pudding goes well with stewed rhubarb and makes a nice alternative to crumble. Recently I had a really ripe small banana, I mashed this up and stirred it into custard and served with this pudding, it was very well received.

Ginger Pudding

Makes 4 generous portions

Ingredients:

1 large egg beaten 60g/2oz butter (softened) 60g/2oz sugar 60g/2oz S.R. flour 30g chrystalised ginger cut into small pieces I dessertspoon of ginger preserve

You will need an ovenproof dish approx. ³/₄ litre lightly buttered.

Method:

Pre heat oven to 200C/400F.

Put sugar and butter into a warmed mixing bowl. Beat together until well mixed and no lumps.

Add 2/3rds beaten egg to butter and sugar and beat well together.

Add rest of egg with a spoonful of flour, mix well.

Add remainder of flour and fold in.

Add chrystalised ginger and mix in.

Add ginger preserve and mix in.

Place mixture evenly in ovenproof dish.

Place dish on a baking tray in pre heated oven and bake for 30mins or until fairly firm when pressed lightly in the centre.



The team battled hard in the final of The John Savage Cup (Norfolk FA County Cup) v Fakenham Town F.C. U16 EJA, at the FDC Centre in Norwich, but eventually lost by 3 goals to 1. Their cause was not helped by a serious injury to goalkeeper George Scott, who we wish a speedy recovery. With the score 0-0 at half-time, the young Magpies took an early lead in the second half but were unable to protect that lead and eventually let in 2 late goals. CHARLES EDWARD STRACHAN A Biography

Part 1

Heacham has long been considered home for people from outside the county of Norfolk. The village sign draws attention to the popular belief that it was briefly home to one such exotic resident. Nowadays it is probably preferable to dwell on the romantic idea of a seventeenth century Native American living at Heacham Hall than her husband's interest in profiting from the use of tobacco!

Today, residents and visitors alike may well have sought a bargain at a car boot sale, played in or supported a match or followed the Carnival parade to the sports field; they may have been part of an audience at a production, meeting or exhibition or exercised at the Public Hall or enjoyed a game of bowls on the village's remaining green. Watching a sporting event between the 'big boys' on T.V. in the company of others whilst having a pint in the Social Club might be the choice but maybe villagers ought to be raising a cup of tea in thanks for the facilities.

The village owes the existence of the Public Hall, Social Club and sportsfield to owners of Heacham Hall centuries after John Rolfe – particularly Charles Strachan. The surname and the way it is pronounced 'Strawn' are typically Scottish but in fact Charles Strachan was born in 1851 in Colombo, Sri Lanka, then known as Ceylon. Unlike Rolfe in Virginia, British residents in Ceylon were not uncommon as the country was a Crown Colony. James Innes Strachan, originally of Aberdeen, was one such colonial resident and in common with many of his peers was the owner of coffee plantations on the island. It was not unnatural for son Charles to follow in his father's footsteps and become involved in the firm of Carey, Strachan & Co of Colombo. Alice, one of Charles's sisters, was married to a Carey. By the end of the 1860s a disease had wiped out most of the coffee plantations and many planters faced financial ruin. James had engineering interests which saved him that fate and he was able to purchase land for the cultivation of tea, a crop which had only been successfully trialled on the island in that decade. The young Carey of the company name actually died in 1875 and in 1887 the name was changed to Charles Strachan & Co. Charles would become a very successful – and wealthy - owner of a number of tea plantations and a tea factory, as well as then extending his interests to rubber and spices. His brother William was also involved in the industry.

The Strachans' also maintained homes in Britain and undoubtedly would have clocked up a good many sea miles and weeks travelling to and from Ceylon. In fact, his mother died on board ship whilst travelling to Britain from Ceylon in 1879; her husband had pre-deceased her in 1860. Not long before this Charles had met Beatrice Forster in London and he married his 18 year old bride in 1878. The marriage did not survive and the widely reported divorce proceedings where Charles was the plaintiff and where two co-respondents were named seem to have been initiated so that Charles could marry again. His second wife was Edith Matilda Gillatt, the daughter of a wine merchant and their quiet wedding was held in 1892 once his divorce was finalised. The married couple had a home in Mayfair when their daughter Agneta was born in March 1894. She would be their only child.

It is not clear whether Charles and Edith set up home in Ceylon or whether the business was left to managers with an oversight from London. There is evidence of him travelling to Ceylon and he certainly did not retire from business. As managing director of his companies he would address company meetings in London and in 1905, as manager, opened a subscription list for shares in the Rubber Estates of Ceylon company. Certainly, he maintained interest in the Galaha and Ragalla tea estates up to the time of his death.



Whilst maintaining a home in London, a decision must have been made to find 'a place in the country' and it was in 1905 that Charles Strachan came to buy the Heacham Hall estate. (He may actually have rented the Hall a year or two earlier). The previous tenant was one-time solicitor Holcombe Ingleby who eventually moved to live in Sedgeford Hall; the two men became good friends. The Hall was in need of repair and was enlarged by the new owner during his time there.

As the new squire, he soon became involved in the life of the village. Some of the first reported events involved Heacham School with the awarding of prizes, sports in the Hall grounds and hosting "a capital meat tea" and entertainment in the form of a conjuror. St Mary's church would benefit from a near neighbour; he was appointed vicar's warden in 1908. In 1907 he became a magistrate and would be appointed High Sheriff of Norfolk in 1915.

Heacham Artist's Exhibition at West Acre Gallery


The Easter break was a roaring success for Heacham based artist Michelle Louise Carter, while exhibiting at West Acre Gallery.

Snettisham Beach Sailing Club

A Potted History

In the 1920s the land around Snettisham Beach belonged to the Etna Stone & Shingle Co, extracting shingle for the building industry. In the 1930s a number of holiday bungalows started to be built on the land owned by Etna SSC along the foreshore. In 1938 a group of the bungalow owners, interested in racing their boats, came up with the idea of forming a sailing club. Initially there was an odd assortment of boats, no clubhouse and events being organised on the beach or run from a member's property. The Snettisham Beach Sailing Club was officially formed a year later in 1939 with Mr. F. G. Kirkland as the Club's first elected Commodore. He remained in office for the next 21 years and on his retirement in 1959, he was made Hon. Life President.

World War II brought an abrupt end to the newly formed club. To wind up the club all the funds were spent on a "knees up" at Harrison's Holiday Camp nearby and SBSC was put on hold. The entire Snettisham Beach area was requisitioned by the Military, used initially as a USAAF gunnery training camp and later, towards the end of the war, as a prisoner of war camp. The prisoners were employed as part of the war effort to excavate the shingle to build concrete runways for new airfields. Twenty years normal supply of shingle was taken out in just three years, leading to the formation of the lakes. After the war, in 1946, the area was cleared of mines and munitions and returned to civilian use. That year Snettisham Beach Sailing Club was reformed, becoming affiliated to the R.Y.A. and sailing resumed with an assortment of boats including National 12 dinghies.



The members, assisted by two member builders, put up a very basic clubhouse which sufficed as such until 1953 when it was washed away in The Great Flood that devastated lives and property. Peter Beckerton, a club member, died trying to save others. Peter's mother, brothers and sisters survived by boarding a boat moored to their bungalow. Snettisham Beach Sailing Club annually sails a memorial race in recognition of Peter Beckerton and his selfless action. Following the tragic loss of Peter, the Beckerton family left the beach, but sold their bungalow to the Club in 1955 which, with some alterations, became the new clubhouse.

Throughout the following years the club flourished with fleets of Fireflies, National 12s, Enterprises, and Mirrors. Then in 1962/63, a member obtained a set of plans for a Fireball. Throughout the freezing winter of that year he built the new "planing" hull boat in the veranda of his beach bungalow and once launched, this revolutionary dinghy changed attitudes, quickly becoming the preferred boat for the racing fleet. Over the winter of the following year eleven members built their own Fireballs and a new fleet was born. The next two decades saw the fleet grow to over forty boats with SBSC boasting one of the largest Fireball fleets nationwide. By the late 1970s and early 1980s the club had grown in stature and proudly hosted Fireball European and World Championship Qualifier events which consistently attracted over eighty competitors, including some of the top sailors of the day.

The increased popularity of the club meant that by 1966 it had outgrown the bungalow clubhouse and needed to move to larger premises. Around this time Etna SSC was stopped from taking any more shingle for fear of weakening an already fragile beach defence bank and the beach was bought by Snettisham Beach Holding Co. (SBHC), a group of local beach bungalow owners. The sailing club rented a plot of land for the new sailing clubhouse from SBHC on the site of the former prisoner of war camp. Using funds from the sale of the old clubhouse and loans from a number of members, the current clubhouse was built and officially opened in 1967 by the then Commodore, John Whitmore. Since then it has been in constant use, with a continuous programme of improvements and alterations on the way. The freehold of the clubhouse was purchased a few years later.

In the early 2000s the importance of training was recognised, and a Training Centre was formed which gained RYA recognition. The centre developed rapidly, continuing to train a squad of instructors who help with teaching the ever increasing numbers of children and adults. The centre now boasts a permanent RYA Chief Instructor and has continued to develop as a major part of the club, with a comprehensive range of courses and activities catering for adults, schools, community



and youth groups. The club's Cadet Week (now two weeks due to demand!) began in the late 1990s and attracts over a hundred children each year, aged 6yrs to 16yrs, providing programmes from 'learning to sail' for novices to specialist race training on the sea for the most experienced sailors.

The Club continues to go from from strength to strength, surviving the low point of losing the clubhouse roof in a storm in the 1980s, when it was blown off, damaging the club bungalow behind. Following this a generator was installed to bring electricity into the clubhouse, the kitchen and bar areas were upgraded, new safety boats acquired, and permanent planning permission obtained to install storage containers for club gear, safety boats, a tractor and the generator. Development of the club continued in 2015 with the purchase of additional land from the RSPB to increase the number of the boat parking spaces. In 2016 a Sport England "Inspired Facility" grant was received to extend the clubhouse by building a new veranda and conservatory, modernise the changing rooms and add central heating. The conservatory has created additional space for social events and doubles as a teaching area for training. The club bungalow was fully refurbished in 2019 and is now a fully self contained holiday let.

Currently the Club is enjoying a very buoyant period with a broad range of sailing and social members. We have not increased our membership fees since 2019 as we believe the sport should be available to all - a family membership costs a little over £5 per week.

A wide variety of boats, including catamarans, mono-hulls, single and double handed boats are sailed plus windsurfers, kitesurfers and kayakers. Most recently we have started a RC Model Yachting section. The club's season extends from March to the end of October, although members can access the changing facilities and sea in the winter months. Racing is scheduled every weekend and Bank

PROPERTY TAX MATTERS: BEWARE 60-DAY REPORTING DUTIES!

The rented property sector has had its ups and downs over the past few decades. Prior to 1988 the sector was virtually moribund. Most tenants had controlled rents and security of tenure, and as a result whenever a property became vacant it was almost always sold rather than being relet.

The abolition of secured tenure in 1988, coupled with a number of other factors, such as an increase in personal wealth (partly helped by inheritances from the first generation of post war owner occupiers), the demise of local authority housing and the introduction of buy to let mortgages has led to a significant growth in the private rented sector, rising from 2 million properties in 2000 to about 4.6 million in 2023. This represents about 20% of the housing sector.

A similar set of circumstances has led to the rise of second home ownership and, following the introduction of special tax rules in 1984, the Furnished Holiday Letting sector. It is now thought that there are about 500,000 second homes in the UK of which about a quarter are used for the holiday letting market.

The current perceived political impact of all these developments appears to be that reducing the attraction of private letting and second home ownership will in some way bring down the cost of rents and bring more homes onto the rental market, presumably also bringing down the price of housing. It is not entirely clear whether both (or indeed either) of these changes will be accomplished but fiscal legislation in recent years has removed full tax deduction on residential interest costs, increased Stamp Duty on acquisitions and, in the 2024 Budget, removed the tax advantages of holiday lets.



Council Tax is also being used in the process such that second home owners may pay a higher level of Council Tax (contrasting with the position in the 1990s when second homes had a Council Tax discount). The regulatory framework is also changing with Budget 2024 bringing in a register of holiday lets and a new planning class, and the Renters' Reform Bill introducing a register of landlords, minimum quality standards and, most contentious of all, the effective reintroduction of security of tenure. With the removal of the Section 21 eviction process, a landlord will no longer be able to remove a tenant at the end of a shorthold tenancy. Even where the property is required for family occupation or sale, the process will need to go to court.

The consequence of all these changes may be that an owner considers selling up and investing elsewhere. However, since most properties will have increased in value in recent years, there is likely to be some Capital Gains Tax (CGT) at stake. Here the position becomes complicated. The reduction in personal allowances over the last two years means that far more of the gain will be taxed - for example, a couple making a gain of £50,000 might only have paid tax on a little more than half that gain in 2022/3. In 2024/5 the chargeable amount would be nearly 90%. Moreover, because the effective rate of CGT depends on the level of income, inflation and the freezing of rate bands, the result is that at least some of that gain will probably now be payable at the higher rate. To some extent this was recognised in the 2024 Budget, with the rate of CGT on residential property gains being reduced from 28% to 24% but nonetheless the liability will still be substantial. Using the example above and assuming the couple had personal income of about £35,000 each, in 2022/23, the tax payable might have been about £4,500. In 2024/5, assuming the personal income had risen by £10,000 the CGT bill would be closer to £10,000. At this level it is by no means clear that the fiscal disincentives alone will be sufficient to drive the structural change which the government seem to be pursuing.

There is, however, evidence that property sales are now being accelerated to some extent by the changing attitudes towards the sector. Where one does decide on a sale it is important not to overlook the major change in the reporting of a residential property CGT event which was introduced in 2021. It is now necessary to report a Capital Gain on residential property and pay the relevant tax within 60 days of completion. The rules apply to all individuals, trustees, executors, and partners, and cover residential property gains unless relieved by personal exemptions (including main residence relief) or brought forward losses. "Residential property" includes not only houses used as dwellings and their gardens, grounds, and outbuildings, but also properties "suitable" for dwelling, properties under construction and rights to properties bought "off plan." The submission of a CGT Return in this way does not always remove the requirement to complete a Self-Assessment Tax Return at the end of the tax year, and any over or underpayment of tax can be picked up at that point.

The gains must in most cases be reported digitally and ideally tax paid electronically at that point. Failure to comply will result in an initial <u>late filing penalty</u> of £100. If the Return is three months plus late, further material penalties will be due. In addition, there is a <u>further penalty due on tax paid late</u>, starting at 5% of the tax due, and then repeating after 6 and 12 months.

The reporting and computation of property Capital Gains is a fairly complex process particularly if there have been changes of ownership or enhancement expenditure over the period of ownership or if it has been used for different purposes over the years. For example, a property which was part purchased and subsequently partly acquired by inheritance, extended, used as a main residence, then as second home and then let is by no means unusual and will require some fairly complex calculations. Information may need to be retrieved from storage or from third parties and in some cases independent valuations might be required, all within 60 days of completion. Where such complexities exist, it is highly recommended that you take advice at an early stage, ideally

as soon as, or even before, the property goes onto the market. It should then be possible to arrive at an estimated tax liability based on the asking price. It is usually best for us to start finalising the computations as soon as a sale is agreed, in order that everything can be completed within what can be a fairly demanding timescale.

It remains to be seen whether or to what extent the current measures will succeed in changing the face of the letting market. It is entirely possible that a shrinkage of the sector will simply push residential rents to even higher levels, but that might then lead to stronger regulation and rent controls. For those who decide to bank their profits and invest elsewhere, there will probably be a tax cost, but timely advice should enable that cost to be quantified at an early stage and should help to avoid the unforeseen penalties that we are seeing a number of people suffer from.

'Ships and the Sea' The Arts Society North West Norfolk

On Monday 13th May 2024 at Sedgeford Village Hall at 2:00pm, The Arts Society (North West

Norfolk) guest speaker will be Howard Smith, telling us about 'Creating the Golden Era of Transatlantic Liners.' We will find out the truth behind their breath-taking first-class interiors, cramped lower deck quarters and the tragedies of the legendary liners around the time of WW1. Howard Smith, an historian and author, has been an Arts Society accredited lecturer since 2017. He trained as a graphic designer and in the 1960s worked for UK and international advertising agencies. His lectures are renowned for stunning graphics of these wonderful ships. And this one will be no exception.

10,000/11,000 years ago, the early depiction of maritime art was found as a carving of a ship on a rock face in northern Norway, done by one of the nomadic tribes. Maritime carvings and wall paintings have been found in Egyptian tombs, circa 1500 BCE. Ship maps and illuminated watercolour manuscripts would begin to emerge in twelfth-century medieval Europe, but not until the seventeenth century would maritime art, as we know it today, begin to be developed, mainly by Dutch artists. The popularity of this genre then developed in the rest of Europe and then spread to the United States. Printing became the major medium of nautical imagery, as the nineteenth century allowed large quantities of engravings to be produced and distributed. Maritime art was seen to be a popular means of conveying imperial power, and the first painters were commissioned solely to paint portraits of mercantile ships, naval scenes (particularly battles), and voyages of exploration. Many of the artists who travelled on naval voyages were officially appointed and they favoured watercolours or pen and ink. Captain Cook appointed William Hodges (1744-1797) to all three of his voyages. Some of the first views of the South Pacific for those in Britain were sketches made by Hodges. They also enabled an understanding of the wider political issues that would become evident.

We are all connected through oceans and lands. History has been significantly portrayed through maritime art up until the twentieth century, although not so much since the 1990s. Books written by scholars such as David Cordingly and Georges Keyes in the late twentieth century, give an understanding of the history of maritime art, particularly in a European post-colonial world and in the Dutch painters. The most prolific maritime painters are directly linked to commissions from imperial powers. Seascapes, portraits of mercantile shipping and busy harbour scenes became hugely popular when the seventeenth-century European countries such as France, Britain, and Holland established the East India companies to trade with eastern nations.

The history of maritime art is as immense as the sea, a constant throughout history. The popular origins of maritime art reflected the culture in an imperial context. Nowadays it is viewed in an historical and educational context, often as a point of activism to reflect the culture it was created in, but now to be seen as a point of activism in a post-colonial world.
