

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM



Have you have tried out the adult training equipment in the park yet? As I write, it still only remains a good intention for me! I have passed by and seen people having a go and it seems like a really good idea; working out in the fresh air

for free, only a short walk away from where I live. What could be better? And yet somehow, I still haven't got there! Yes, I can blame a busy life with work and studies plus various commitments to family, friends and church life etc., but deep down I know that these are just excuses.

I am no athlete, but I do know the value of keeping fit and active as I grow older, a little bit of exercise may be exactly what I need to keep the joints moving well and the muscles from weakening, to say nothing of the prospect of losing one or two pounds. But somehow that still hasn't been enough motivation – what I need is the encouragement of others, and so I hope by the time this is published I may have finally had a go and set up a regular visit with some friends or even my other half!

We all need a bit of encouragement at times, especially when the going gets tough. One of my favourite verses that I take great encouragement from in the Bible is found in the book of Hebrews chapter 12 and verse 1:

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us."

Sometimes the business of day-to-day life is hard work taking us away from what we want to focus on in our lives. Yes, even people who are involved in Church life get caught up in things that are less edifying at times. The word sin isn't one we use very much these days and may seem an oldfashioned idea. In fact, it is a word that describes the way an arrow fired at a target may fall short of the perfect score. The good news is that as a Christian, whilst I believe I will never be 'good enough' to reach the standard God sets, I don't need to, because that is what Jesus has done for us already. My job is to 'run the race' He has called me to, and to be encouraged by the 'cloud of witnesses' cheering me on from the heavenly sidelines. Yes, I stuff up from time to time, but I am not disqualified. Yes, my lack of training and preparation may make the going hard at times, but I am not left alone. I may get distracted along the way, or sidetracked by even worthy causes, but God still calls me on and leads me through this race that is life.

Perhaps one of these summer evenings I may bump into you as we work out on the equipment, let's give each other the encouragement to keep on keeping on!

Bereavement is a distressing and common experience, that sooner or later will be suffered by most of us following the loss of a loved one. Yet in our everyday life we think and talk about death extraordinarily little, which means that when it does happen to us it is even more difficult to deal with. Perhaps because we encounter it less often than our grandparents did. For them, the death of a brother or sister, friend or relative, was a common experience in childhood or teenage years. For us, these losses usually happen later in life, due to better health care and advances in modern medicine. As a result of this, we no longer have much opportunity to either learn about grieving, how it feels, or what are the 'right' things to do or feel. The death of someone close to you can be overwhelming, and you may feel a mixture of emotions. It is important to know that there is no right or wrong way of experiencing loss, and no 'right' way to grieve. We are all different and every person's experience of grief is unique. Our feelings will also be influenced by many different things, including the relationship we had had with the person we've lost, our personality, our cultural background, religious beliefs and our circumstances. It is important to accept that grieving and these feelings are normal, and part of a healthy process endured by us all following the loss of a loved one.

You may have lost a husband, wife, partner, grandparent, friends. They may have died recently or in the past it doesn't matter, we would love to see you. It does help to talk about the person you are grieving for with other people who are grieving.

We do talk about other things, such as trying to put the world to rights, at the same time there is a lot of laughter mingled in with some tears. If you feel that you would like to join us, then please do, we are very friendly, and a warm welcome is waiting for you. 

Residents from across the local area are being invited to see first look designs and hear about plans to bring a new state-of-the-art hospital to King's Lynn at a series of public events being held in June and July.

Hosted by the dedicated New QEH team, these events will include a first look at visuals of what the new building will look like.

Designed by architects BDP, who are specialists in healthcare design and development, the new building is being developed using Government guidance Hospital 2.0. This is a standardised blueprint design for all new hospitals, developed in consultation with hundreds of clinicians, healthcare staff and patients across the country.



Winter is coming. Well, the longest day, shortest night occurs on the 21st. After that it is getting darker, not that it matters much if clouds blot out the stars and planets. Mind you, clouds might mean rain and on this day of writing, 10th May, we need some.

The Summer Solstice is an important event in the ancient calendar but perhaps not so much as the Winter Solstice 6 months later when the days of increasing darkness end and the world is renewed.



The northern hemisphere receives its maximum exposure to the Sun's light at the Summer Solstice. Internet


The Summer Solstice occurs at around 3.42am if you want to celebrate it. The Sun will be at its most northerly point in the sky before the orbital path and inclination of the Earth starts bringing it lower. Astronomical summer begins on this date and ends on 22nd September. If you want to get your summer shorts out earlier, then meteorological summer begins on the 1st June and ends on the 31st August.

In the antipodes, Australia and New Zealand, they will be dancing around their Coolabah /Matal trees to see off winter as the 21st will be their Winter Solstice.

What to see at night? Not a lot as the sky doesn't get very dark. Mars is still there and, on the 1st at about 10.30pm, find it to the right of the fat crescent Moon. On the left, the bright star is Regulus whilst the star above this trio is Algieba.



On the 16th at around 11pm, Mars appears to almost touch Regulus – they are in conjunction. Use binoculars to contrast the red of Mars and the blue-white of the 21st brightest star in the night sky. On the 29th, Mars is to the left of the crescent Moon and Regulus to its right.



700 times the size of the Sun this supergiant is 550 light years distant and has a small, hot, companion.

I mentioned Antares last month. Ares was the Greek God of War which the Romans named Mars. Ant is anti, and Antares is translated as 'rival of Mars'. A long way around to say it is reddish and can be confused with Mars when the latter is dim. Anyway, on the 9th or 10th, look to the Moon and find this rival to the left and then to the right of it.

You have another chance to spot Mercury from the middle of the month but you need a good NW horizon as it will be very low in the sky. With a magnitude of minus 0.5 it will appear as a bright spark and doesn't set until around 11pm. Once seen never forgotten but finding it, that is the rub. On the 27th, the thin crescent Moon

will help as Mercury will be just below and to the right of it. Use binoculars to view it but make sure the Sun has set first.

If you want to catch the sky at its darkest than be up and around from 2am. Saturn and Neptune rise then and will be in conjunction, close together, at the end of the month. However, though Saturn with magnitude of +1 will be visible to the naked eye and an easy sight in binoculars, Neptune much dimmer at +7.8, will need a good telescope. Look ESE and further east as time and date advances. They will be low down and a good horizon is needed. On the 19th, the Moon is close to the pair.

If you are up for these two planets then stay awake to see Venus rise at 3am. It will be a beacon of light with a magnitude of minus 4.1. We saw it lighting up the western sky on February evenings, now it will do the same to the eastern sky in the morning. Beware that the Sun will rise quickly after it so binoculars or other optical instruments should not be used to observe Venus this time.

Noctilucent – luminous at night – clouds. This is a phenomenon to look out for either side of the solstice. After the Sun has set, as far as Earth bound mortals are concerned, its light still shines on objects at high altitudes. There aren't any mountains in Norfolk so high-altitude objects means clouds. Thin, wispy, ones that glow in an otherwise 'dark' sky. Look out for them.

The Full Moon in June is always very low in the sky because it is opposite the Sun and the Sun is at its highest point. If you are up before sunrise for Venus then, on the 11th you can see the Full Moon rise in the east at about 2am. Easier is to watch it set in the west around 4.45pm just before teatime. Hunstanton will likely be a good site.

Remember to start summer on the 21st if want it to finish later. Look for high clouds after sunset and enjoy the Moon in June.


Hunstanton Bridge Club

THE TORREY FAMILY

In March 1967, relying on a sketchy geographical knowledge of the U.K. road network, a college scarf and blind faith, I was hitchhiking from Devon towards my home in the Midlands and saw, at intervals, lorries bearing the letters 'T C' on their cabs heading the other way towards the south-west. I discovered they were carrying detergent which was being used in an attempt to deal with the massive oil spill following the 'Torrey Canyon' striking rocks. The ecological effects of its use as well as the oil was to prove to be a learning experience.

Some fifteen years or so later I was in Heacham and slowly learning a little about my new home and its inhabitants. My chief focus was with its younger inhabitants and their parents but it was some of the older villagers who provided information on village history, and so it was that I accepted the story that the lady I often saw sharing her car with dogs was connected to both the Rolfes and that oil tanker disaster of my student days. Sometime later the sight of a ship's bell in the grounds of a nursing home next to that lady's home seemed adequate confirmation of part of her background at least.

A lot of water has passed under the village's Waterloo Bridge and over the rocks off the Cornish coast since then and in recent years I have found time to look at aspects of village history again. Firstly, the 'Torrey Canyon' belonged to the American Union Oil Company of California which was formed after a merger of three companies — one of which was called the Torrey Canyon Oil Company. Torrey Canyon is actually on the map of California not too far from Hollywood and, presumably, hence the name of the company and ship. It is coincidental that the Heacham Torreys share the name; they do however have links with America and with shipping - including maritime disasters.

Miss Torrey's great grandfather Franklin was American, born in Scituate, Plymouth County, Massachusetts in 1830. There were Torreys amongst the first settlers there in the seventeenth century. Franklin was a sculptor who not only worked in marble but went on to be a partner in a firm that owned one of the best of the famous Carrara marble quarries in Italy. He and his wife Sarah lived in Italy and he died and is buried in Florence. Their son, Charles Franklin Torrey was born in Leghorn, Tuscany in 1858 but he attended Trinity College, Cambridge and graduated in law. A fellow undergraduate and friend was Alfred Neville-Rolfe, a brother of Eustace Neville-Rolfe and Charles Torrey would stay with his friend at Sedgeford Hall.

Eustace Fawcett Neville-Rolfe had inherited the Heacham estate from his father Charles Fawcett Neville-Rolfe in 1869 and was struggling with his finances. Nine children may have been accustomed to silver spoons but were clearly not going to have their futures handed to them on one and were distinctly unimpressed with their father's second wife and, it seems, she did not relish the stepmother role.

Eustace had spent his early years with the rest of the family in Italy and Martha, his mother, Charles's first wife, was buried

there. Returning to Italy with his new wife and attempting to manage the estate from there appealed as an attractive option. Apart from the very youngest, those unmarried siblings and those who had not established careers had always stayed closer to Eustace than their stepmother and his sister Margaret was quite content to move to Italy. Perhaps the fact that Charles Torrey lived there aided her decision.

Charles Torrey married Margaret Neville-Rolfe in 1882, the wedding conducted in Essex by the bride's uncle assisted by her brother Arthur. At this time Charles Torrey was not involved in shipping but it was not long before the couple were on board ship bound for quite a lengthy voyage to Australia. Margaret's older brother Charles had secured a junior partnership with the proprietor of a remote Queensland cattle station, having done some training on a Warwickshire farm in livestock management, butchery and blacksmithing. He married a month before Charles Torrey and Margaret and took his new wife out to the Alpha station; his brother Arthur was there too. Charles Torrey and his wife joined them and they lived and worked there for five years; Margaret's sister (Harriet) Jane who had trained at a Paris art school paid an extended visit and created a portfolio of watercolour scenes of everyday life of a Victorian family 'of standing' in comparatively primitive accommodation in a landscape far removed from Norfolk or Italy. Two sons: Gerald Franklin and Eustace were born in Queensland.

In 1887 the Torreys left Australia. It is unclear exactly what prompted the move and the involvement with shipping but it seems most likely that it is closely related to the marriage of Charles' sister Sarah at that time. Her husband was Edward Berwind, who became the man considered to be the world's largest individual owner of coal mining properties; supplier to the American Navy of coal and also a director of the shipping company which owned the White Star Line. Charles began a career in the shipping industry which, over time, took in a number of positions — often as the British face of American companies. He is particularly remembered as chairman of the Atlantic Transport and Leyland Lines, a director of the White Star Line and also involvement with the Port of London Authority.

As part of the firm of Williams, Torrey and Field, the British managers of the Atlantic Line, Charles Torrey was connected with a shipping disaster off the coast of Cornwall when in 1898 the 'Mohegan' on only its second voyage hit the rocks of The Manacles and sank with the loss of 106 lives, including all of the crew. A stained glass window in the church of St Keverne, where many victims are buried in a mass grave, was donated by the company.

Charles and Margaret had a family home in Victoria Street, London but around 1889 became early second homeowners in Heacham when they acquired 'Mill House', an old farmhouse with eighteenth century roots. The village seemed to attract back the extended family of the Neville-Rolfes and there would be large family gatherings at 'Mill House', 'Church House', 'The Cottage' and 'The Windmill' built by Charles Neville-Rolfe after



his departure from drought-ridden Queensland. Heachamites would become accustomed to the comparatively rare sight of their motor cars on the rough village roads. In an album, Gerald pasted an indignant letter to the 'Telegraph' concerning a collision between a motor car and a cyclist in 1903. The driver was clearly Gerald and handwritten next to it is '£17'—compensation to the cyclist!



Cecil Eric Torrey (known always as Eric) was born in Heacham in 1889 and, sadly, his brother Eustace died here on Christmas Eve 1895 aged just nine. The wooden altar cross in the church bears a brass commemorative plaque to the boy and his distinctive memorial (in Carrara marble) stands close to the 'back' of the church. Like his older brother, Eric would also join the world of shipping after public school and Trinity College and, of course, the

First World War. He spent most of his life based in Liverpool working as a manager for the White Star Line before retiring, unmarried, serving as a J.P., and running an asparagus farm. His brother Gerald was due to take up a role for White Star in Italy when war broke out. The company was of course famous for owning the ill-fated 'Titanic' and Charles was actually with the 'bigwigs' on the launching platform of this ill-fated ship in Belfast in 1911.

When war broke out, Gerald and Eric 'joined up' and in 1915, the uniformed Gerald married Violet Lindsay, the daughter of a Major-General (who would be buried in the Rolfe Corner at Heacham). At the end of the conflict Eric was a captain, having been wounded twice serving with a Liverpool 'Pals' Regiment and mentioned in dispatches for attempts to rescue a comrade from No-Man's Land. Gerald was, by that time a staff major with a Military Cross—an unusual gallantry decoration for a staff officer.

Next month I hope to bring the Torrey story closer to home and to include Miss Susan Torrey who was involved in so many aspects of village life. There are many who knew the lady and it would be interesting to hear of their recollections if space allows ...



Borough Council News Heacham Ward which includes Sedgeford and Fring

A new (council) year begins and allocations of roles and responsibilities will have been published. You won't find me as chair of planning or even as a committee member which, after around 12 years (minus 1 when I was Leader), removes me from the fray. The reason, briefly, is that following a car accident at the end of last October, the resulting injuries prevented me doing my job the following week. Unwisely attempting to do something, I sent emails to the vice chair with my opinions, up to that point in time, on planning applications. I also implied some criticism of officers. Neither are allowed and escalation occurred when someone decided to alert the press. Hence my removal from committee.

There are some advantages of this outcome as I am now free to comment on and criticise major planning applications anywhere. In my Ward I can take a fuller stance either for or against applications within it, just like old times.

I will now bore you, again, with Cheney Hill, Heacham. Those of you present at the Annual Parish Meeting will have heard me say that the reserved matter applications will be in June. 'What year?', was the response. Well, today, 9th May, I have been told that they have been moved from 2nd June until 30th June (two meetings this month as the Council goes to sleep in August).

I will be speaking, from the floor, as Borough Councillor, about some broad principles. This will likely include section 106 funding for libraries. As it stands, such money will go to Hunstanton. The Parish Council will likely send someone too, to speak about local matters. A resident who backs onto the



Cheney Hill site would be a useful third speaker. The development cannot be stopped as outline permission was granted albeit 10 and 8 years ago though, some say, including me, that they should be scrubbed and reapplied for. The reserved matters applications show details of the site layout. Some of you are adversely affected and there are also the matters of construction times; moving materials on and off site; wheel washing, and the road route of construction lorries etc. etc.

The Fenway debacle seems to have escalated again with residents enduring a poor situation. Officers have been made well aware of what is going on. As of noon, 9th May I am still awaiting an update promised to residents.

You will have received consultation about the proposed traffic lights at the junction of Lamsey Lane and the A149. Improvements to this junction have been asked for, for years, and it has taken Government grant funding for bus route improvements to get the job done. They will also help all village traffic including that generated by the Cheney Hill developments and increases due to visitors to Wild Ken Hill. They may chop up visitor traffic streaming to Hunstanton but stationary at traffic lights is no different to just stationary.

Sedgeford have gleaned, from Anglian Water, some fascinating information about water extraction which affects the River Heacham. Congratulations for their perspicacity on this matter. I will ask if it can be more widely shared. The Parish Council have also pursued matters relating to the proposed County housing development on the old school site. This application has now been submitted and I look forward to comments on it before I make any response.

The application for a swimming pool within the holiday complex at Fring has received no public comments to date. The Assistant Conservation officer has some interesting notes and recommendations which I encourage interested parties to read. I have asked if they are going to be taken further or incorporated into conditions.

The County has been pushing its solution to local government reorganisation, a one nation state for Norfolk with little to credit it as far as representation of the people is concerned. The three unitary model supported by District Councils will be far better for you and information will be forthcoming. There has been a press statement explaining this stance and a copy of that to all Parish Councils.

The Council Leader and Chief Executive are continuing their visits to Wards around the Borough and the new date for Heacham is at the end of August. I will confirm date and venue next month

MAKING TAX SIMPLER IS NOT ALL THAT IT SEEMS...

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) are constantly trying to make tax "simpler", or what might be termed "more inclusive" (in that they would like taxpayers to report income or gains which might have been overlooked.) We saw this a couple of months ago when they published a friendly little document entitled "Take the hassle out of your side hustle" which initially suggested that those earning under £3,000 as second income would no longer need to file a Tax Return – drilling into the detail, this was clarified: "... the government has just announced that a new online reporting tool is on the way soon. When it's live, you'll be able to use it to tell HMRC if you earn between £1,000 and £3,000 from trading – instead of having to send a Self-Assessment Return." The new tool should apparently be available by the end of this parliament, so until then the rules remain exactly as they always have been.

There is a similar and more generally applicable mismatch of expectations for those receiving Bank and Building Society interest outside an ISA. Over the last few years, and despite recent reductions, the rates paid on deposit accounts have risen sharply. Although there is a 0% Personal Savings Allowance of £1,000 (in total, NOT for each source) for those paying Basic Rate Tax, reducing to £500 for higher rate payers and Nil for those in additional rate, it is estimated that there are upwards of 2m taxpayers who will have a liability. As part of the drive to reduce administration, HMRC have taken many of these individuals out of the Self-Assessment regime – for those who are not self-employed or renting out property a Return is now only required if:

- \cdot you have savings income of £10,000 or more (excluding savings income in an ISA)
- · you have income from dividends of £10,000 or more (excluding dividend income in an ISA)
- · you have any other untaxed income of £2,500 or more
- · you have total taxable income of £150,000 or more before tax.

Clearly this leaves a gap where savings income falls between £1,000 and £10,000. HMRC had hoped to fill this by picking up interest figures direct from the banks and building societies and collecting it via PAYE Codings or direct "Simple" assessments, but it seems this is neither comprehensive nor necessarily accurate with about 20% of interest returns being unmatched – additionally it is not clear how the system is functioning for Dividends which will also need declaring; and of course private interest arrangements will not be within the matching system.

However, the responsibility for reporting taxable income remains with the taxpayer, so even if HMRC fail to raise an assessment the taxpayer should notify HMRC of the liability by 5 October following the tax year end in which the income arose. This can be tricky, since HMRC did not complete the 2023/24 assessments until 31 March 2025!

The theory sounds fine, but in practice the system still isn't running properly. Failing to declare untaxed income will lead to interest and penalties on top of the tax due and whilst it is hard not to lay the blame at the door of HMRC for removing so many people from self-assessment, ignorance of the law is still seen as "carelessness" where penalties are concerned. Anyone who thinks they may have a liability should take advice as soon as possible as Voluntary Disclosure ahead of time is always preferable to having to react to correspondence from the Revenue and make a Prompted Disclosure.

The Arts Society North West Norfolk Flawed perfection in Art

Since the beginning of time, cultures have been expressing themselves through art. All the human

emotions are found in art, from cave paintings to modern abstract pieces. The great masterpieces like the Venus de Milo or the Sistine Chapel exemplify our worship of their excellence, but polished 'perfection' is not the only key to creating great art. Perfection is an illusion and one that artists often become obsessed with, the goal. A belief that any flaws would render the work less beautiful, less meaningful. Artists are imperfect flawed human beings, as we all are, who create work from nothing, with their emotions, their experiences, their vulnerabilities, none of which are perfect, most of which are chaotic. The 'mistake' that an artist will see in their work can often be the very thing that makes it relatable, gives it meaning, reveals its heart and soul. Imperfection is what makes art meaningful and beautiful.

The truth in a work lies in its authenticity, not so much its technicality. Of course, the tools and techniques used to bring the work to life are important; how the paint is mixed, the mastery of language, knowing the shutter speed for a photograph. But it is intention and emotion that are the real power in an artist's work, and they tell the story about the subject created and the artist. The Scream by Edvard Munch and The Mona Lisa by Leonardo da Vinci are both considered among the greatest artworks in the world, but neither are considered perfect by conventional standards. The amputated arms or blunted noses of Greek and Roman sculpture are the imperfections that make them so moving to study and reveal to us that what is absent is as powerful as what is present. Art is telling stories, and the most interesting works are often where the story twists and turns, where we are challenged and surprised, where everything does not flow perfectly. The colours may not have blended in a perfect way, the image does not have a crisp line, the grammar is not quite right. The flaws can often encourage the viewer to be more active in their scrutiny of the work, to think why the artist made the composition look different. The imperfections make the art powerful and unforgettable.

Imperfections are a crucial part of the creation of art. On the one hand an artist wants the work to be accepted, validated, but the constant pressure for perfection to be accepted by the artworld can stifle creativity, emotions and result in the artist, who is often his own worst critic, becoming discouraged. The artist ends up producing pieces for a society that is conditioned to believe that perfection is the only way to be successful. Perfect beauty

everywhere with flawless models and airbrushed celebrities. Many cultures embrace breaks and imperfections in art. They believe it gives the work beauty and meaning in damage. 'Consider the Japanese philosophy of wabi-sabi, which honours the ruined, transient and incomplete. Cracked ceramics weathered surfaces, and the marks and lines of time are valued as reminders to accept flaws and the individuality of change.'




