




**MARY SHELDRICK**







# **Heacham at Night**by Terry Parish

A brief encounter with the night sky this month as there is not much night. The axial tilt of the Earth means nights will slowly start getting dark earlier, as it progresses along its orbit, but you won't notice it yet. That orbit brings Earth to aphelion, its furthest point from the Sun, at 9pm on the 3rd.

The Earth's orbit is almost circular so its furthest distance from the Sun (94.5 million miles) and its closest approach (91.4 million miles), perihelion, are little different. It just seems perverse that we are furthest in our northern summer.

Mars is the only planet visible in the evening and it will be hard to spot in the glowing western sky (magnitude 1.5), setting about 11pm. A magnitude of 1.5 means eyes can see it and, once found, steady binoculars will enhance your view. The red planet will be lost as the faster Earth pulls ahead of its, slower orbiting, neighbour.

Whilst Mars recedes, Saturn comes into view (magnitude 0.9). The ringed planet rises in the east just after midnight for much of the month but a little earlier by the end. It will be low in the sky but the middle of the month will see it high enough to clear most obstacles from around 2.45am. It will then be directly SE. On the 15th / 16th the Moon will be close, a little above and to the right of the gas giant.

Neptune, only visible through a telescope (magnitude 7.7), is in conjunction with Saturn all month. This means it appears to be adjacent though it is really far beyond it (Father Ted and cows might help). Visual closeness, in this case, means 1 degree of separation which is a finger tip's width at arm's length. The very closest conjunction occurs on the 6th July but both planets are then very low in the sky. If you want to have a go at finding greeny blue Neptune, then wait to the end of the month when the pair of planets will be high enough in the ESE from about midnight.

Blue Uranus, also a telescope object (magnitude 5.8), rises in the NE about 1.30 am but you will need to stay up later or get up earlier to allow it to rise high enough in the sky at 3am when it will be ENE. The planet, which also has rings you can't see, is just below the Pleiades star cluster. This should be obvious and well worth a look through binoculars.

Brilliant Venus (magnitude minus 4.1) will be in the sky whilst you are trying to find Neptune and Uranus, The Morning Star rises around 2am and a Crescent Moon will share the sky with it between the 21st and 23rd, at about 3.45am.

At the same time and dates, look for Jupiter (magnitude 1.9) low in the NE. Our orbit position allows it be seen again following Jove's recent disappearance behind the Sun.

On the 4th, Mercury is as far east of the Sun as it will get (greatest eastern elongation of 26 degrees – rather more than a spread hand's width at arm's length) but the remaining glow in the sky will likely blot it out most of the month. However, we have a good western horizon and I think the Messenger of the Gods will be visible from about the 20th. Go to Heacham's beaches or Hunstanton's cliffs to observe from 7.45pm. Mercury will be due west, low to the horizon but not too low. You will need binoculars to find the spark so ensure

that the Sun has set before you start looking.

I gave a talk on 'Inside Mercury' in June which looked briefly at the internal structure of the planet and then why it is thought there are no other planets closer to the Sun. Here are some facts about the planet:


Distance from Sun:  $46\ 001\ 200-69\ 816\ 900\ km$  (A very elliptical orbit).

Solar irradiance: 6272 – 14 448 Watts/square metre (Earth: 1366 W/m²), so more glare than Norfolk receives.

Day: 58 Earth days to turn once on its axis (Mercury rotation period); 176 days for the Sun to return to the same spot in the sky, as seen from a fixed point on the surface (Mercury solar day).

Year: 88 Earth days to orbit the Sun (Mercury orbital period).

Obliquity to orbit (axial tilt): 0.01° (i.e. the equator of Mercury nearly coincides with the orbital plane of the planet so no seasons).



Surface temperature:  $-180^{\circ}$ C (night) to  $450^{\circ}$ C (day). Almost no atmosphere retains no heat.

Mercury has 'thermal seasons.' Due to its very elliptical orbit, Mercury gets hotter when it's closer to the Sun, and colder when it is further away. In the polar regions the Sun never rises above some crater bottoms, meaning they are in permanent darkness and there is water ice!

A Mercury year being not too dissimilar to the length of its day causes some oddities. For example, at certain points on Mercury's surface an observer would be able to see the Sun rise about halfway, then set slightly, and then rise again before setting again, all in one Mercury Day.

This month, there are two meteor showers which run into each other. The Capricornids peak on the 30th and the Aquarrids on the 31st. The latter shower is more abundant and there is no Moon. The Perseids, peaking in August, also start arriving in July so the end of the month is a good time to start looking up when the sky is dark and clear. Remember to turn off unnecessary lights and to let your eyes acclimatise to the dark. Get yourselves a red-light torch and red goggles if you can, so you can avoid destroying your night vision.



So, some opportunities for stopping up late or rising early, a meteor or two, and another chance to chase down the mercurial spark.

#### Borough Council News Heacham Ward which includes Sedgeford and Fring

For those still bothered, the Cheney Hill development in Heacham did not go to planning committee at the end of June. The latest prediction is 28th July. Same comments remain as last month – a local speaker would be useful.

The Norfolk County Council planning application to build homes on the old primary school site in Sedgeford is now live. Despite plans being discussed with the Parish Council over several years, it was a surprise to see only the 'market houses' box ticked – i.e. no affordable homes.

There is a Borough Council requirement for 20% 'affordables' on developments of more than 10 homes. Some developers try and squeeze this requirement as they make less profit on affordable homes (they can't sell them for so much).

Whilst it is expected of developers with a track record of little social conscience, it is not expected of a County Council particularly when they surely have no land costs – they own the school site. I have called in the application which means, if things stand as they are, the application will eventually end up at planning committee where their behaviour, and any justification for it, can be made public. (Since an earlier draft was written, the planning portal now contains a viability statement. Apparently, the development is predicted to lose just short of £500,000 if built without 2 affordable flats and lose £158K more if they are included. Make of that what you will).

This lack of concern for the wishes of the Parish Council who want some opportunities for younger local people to get a house in Sedgeford, does not bode well for what might happen if the County succeeds in driving through a single unitary model under local government reorganisation.

The gloves are coming off about that reorganisation. The Leader of the County Council took to social media to embark on a tirade of political abuse about the three unitary model, particularly about the growing support for the western component which, of course, includes West Norfolk. I assume she is getting worried because a county wide, single unitary is seen as a bad deal for people.

I hope government puts people before maximising profit when it makes its decision.

Whether the sale of the new flats in Hunstanton, on Southend Road, will be thrown open to all and sundry may be decided by the time you read this. I called the decision in and a committee will decide how to progress matters. In Nov 2023, an article in the EDP stated. 'More than 30 homes for local people are set to go on sale ......West Norfolk Council is building 32, one, two and three bed flats in Southend Road'. Did you know? Are you interested?

I have visited Cambridge twice recently (once by accident as I listened to my satnav). Verges in part of that city are a delight, a mass of wild flowers. Here, people seemingly insist on anything green alongside roads being mown down. Bring Springwatch to your garden and street!

I haven't seen many swifts or house martins this year. Both need places to nest which are lost when old buildings are tidied too much. If you renovate or rebuild, please make sure you take advice on how nesting places can be created. The Borough is installing swift bricks in its new properties (including at those flats in Hunstanton). This has become a national political issue with Labour removing a rule to ensure all new developments use them and every other party, including Reform, demanding that the rule stays in. Power to the Swifts!

My new job is Chair of the Regeneration and Development Panel which has consideration of current and emerging projects in its remit. One is the Guildhall in King's Lynn and there will be several meetings, including a special full Council, discussing this during July. Watch out for news.

I am an advocate of double council tax on second homes and that all new homes should be for principal residence only. Houses use a lot of resources (including water), have a negative impact on the environment, and their occupants utilise ever reducing services. Nationally there is also, apparently, a housing crisis and the government would have us build twice as many in West Norfolk as plans have allowed for. Consequently, having a spare house or two is not really on anymore. Having said all that, the Borough has rules on how the second home tax is applied and I recently enabled an assessment to be reversed. So, I am not all bad and will help genuine cases. (PS the doubling of house building is delayed for at least 5 years as we got our Local Plan in in time).

Sandringham have 4 days of pop concerts, 14-17 August. Their last foray into such events was 2 years ago, on a Bank Holiday, when traffic was brought to a standstill. I hope, this year, lessons have indeed been learnt and locals will be permitted to carry out their normal lives. Please communicate any problems to the Borough Council.

Hunstanton Town Council looks forward to a productive and engaging year ahead under the leadership of Cllr Bishopp and Cllr Williamson.



#### Children of Far East Prisoners of War cement Bond of Friendship

Rhonda O'Donnell from Melbourne, Australia, has travelled back to Norfolk, the home county of her late Grandad, Horace Fredrick Mann, formerly of the 4th Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment, who sadly died whilst subjected to forced labour on the Thai/Burma 'Death Railway' in 1943. He died of diphtheria, brought on by the lack of medical help and starvation ration food provided by the Imperial Japanese Army as well as their disregard for the general well being of the Allied Prisoners of War forced to build a railway through torturous terrain.

Rhonda, whilst visiting relations near Fakenham, had heard about the recent exhibition at the King's Lynn Story at the Town Hall, 'Surviving the Railway' and expressed an interest in the possibility of meeting up with any local family members of Far East Prisoners of War (FEPOW) that were happy to meet with her. Duke Sell (whose Dad, Colour Sergeant Johnnie Sell was a former 4th Battalion member), heard of Rhonda's request through the Children of Far East Prisoners of War (COFEPOW) and set about organising a welcome committee for Rhonda. So when Rhonda arrived at the exhibition Friday 6th June along with Duke and his daughter Cassie, the following were there to greet her. Jim Race and wife Janet (Jim's Dad, Captain Jack Race 6th Battalion Royal Norfolks) Colin Grimes and his sister Heather Marsh (their Dad, Bert Grimes 5th Battalion Royal Norfolks) and Jennifer Wightwick (her Grandfather, Captain John Wightwick seconded from Suffolk Regiment to 2nd Battalion Cambridgeshire Regiment).

After deep discussion as they viewed the exhibits, they finished off with a further two hours chat whilst enjoying a light lunch. Rhonda left, thanking all for their warm welcome. It is hoped all will remain in contact as VJ80 Day on 15th August approaches.





#### MISS SUSAN TORREY 1915 - 2001

In August 1916, members of the families in Heacham gathered for a christening at which the father was not present, being 'somewhere in France' at that time in



World War I. The baby, whose birth was registered in the district of the family's London home, was named Geraldine Herminie Susan and she was the daughter of Gerald and Violet Torrey. When old enough to have the choice, she chose to be known as Susan. Her uncle (Cecil) Eric was present, having been receiving treatment at the Royal Free Hospital for a 'gsw', gunshot wound: a bullet that passed through his thigh - one of two such injuries he received in different battles.

The christening cake was cut at 'The Mill House' where Susan's grandparents Charles and Margaret Torrey entertained some of the guests to tea. Clearly this was not just a rural bolt hole but considered as home for the family and in the village where a number of Margaret's family lived. Captions to photographs in family albums that it was 'Mill House sometimes known as Loo Water.' Certainly, today, the alternative name might merit a giggle and it is slightly unusual as the use of the word 'loo' with its current meaning was not completely unknown at the time. An interesting suggestion in a 'Country Life' article is that it relates to the river running through the grounds and the Norfolk pronunciation of 'low water.' The article details the renovation, modernisation and extensive extensions to the

ancient farmhouse carried out shortly after the war, it seems. The transformation would have made the house more comparable to the luxury of the ocean liners that were so much a part of the lives of Charles Torrey and his sons. The architect who designed the extensions was also responsible for the village war memorials. His name was Louis de Soissons and, amongst other works, he is noted for the design of Welwyn Garden City and war grave cemeteries in Europe. It is not a coincidence that he received a commission in a Norfolk village. His sister Jeanne was a Neville-Rolfe, having married Arthur, Ada's son, in the year before Susan's birth.

When the war was finally over, Susan's father Gerald was the face of the White Star Line in Italy and then in Antwerp. It is unclear whether they lived as a family in these places for any length of time. Certainly, Susan and Violet her mother were passengers on an Antwerp-bound ship in the summer of 1929, the same year that Violet smashed the bottle over the bows of a ship at its launch in Glasgow. Susan's father would have been used to his father being away from home for lengthy periods of time on shipping business and was himself away at Westminster school as a young man. Susan was born at a time when many village families were coping with their menfolk away in uniform but was born into a family 'of substance.' A children's nurse stands attentively next to her pram in a photograph taken on the 'Loo Water' lawn and, undoubtedly, in the house, there would have been staff to care for the adults. Before Susan's birth, the 1911 census shows her grandmother Margaret (but not grandfather) in the Torrey's London flat with Eugenie, a lady's maid from France and two other servants from Heacham and Dersingham. It was a fact that some of her staff were extremely loyal to her and remained with her for 40 years.

Susan, as a girl and as an only child would have been accustomed not only to the attention of domestic staff but to an upbringing believed to be consistent with a young lady of her family's social



standing – and wealth. She would mix with generations of the extended Neville-Rolfe family, many of whom lived in the larger Heacham houses at a time when there was still a distinct class divide. Her grandmother apparently loved entertaining in a grand style but Susan may well also have absorbed something of her grandmother's degree of independence and spirit of adventure that had taken her to Australia as a young bride. The family all had links beyond Heacham, in Europe and across the Atlantic; her mother and grandmother had received an education that enabled Margaret to write letters in French to Gerald as a schoolboy son; Violet, her mother, had 'done her bit' by working as an interpreter at a Liverpool military hospital at the start of the war before her marriage.

As a young girl Susan attended an independent school in Kensington which today states that it has 'a rich history of empowering tomorrow's brightest girls.' When in Heacham she could pursue a love of riding and took part in gymkhanas organised by Horace Callaby and was accustomed to being with a variety of dogs owned by family members. They were often included and named in informal and formal family group photographs. It was during her school years that Charles, her grandfather died and that her father became chairman of the Elder Dempster Line – a shipping company dealing mainly with the route to West Africa. After school in London, Susan's education continued in Paris where, in common with other young ladies of a certain social status she attended 'finishing school' to ensure that she could continue to live in the style of her mother and grandmother before her.

In 1934, when 'coming out' had a totally different meaning to today, correctly attired in long white dress, long white gloves and probably a tiara and attended by her mother, she was presented at Court as a debutante. She did merit a mention in national newspapers as, in her full deb's attire, she visited her grandmother in hospital on her way to Buckingham Palace. Margaret had slipped on her way to see her daughter and granddaughter and broken her leg. Three months earlier, aged 82, she had taken her first flight – to South Africa to see the sights! Whilst in Paris, Susan had started to attend a studio to study sculpture and she spent a further two years at the Studio Jean Camus. At the 1935 Paris Salon, a work exhibited by her under the name G. Susan-Torrey received sufficient votes for a bronze medal, Sadly, the medal was not awarded when the judges realised the sculptor was not a man but a young woman!

Around this time Gerald spent months away visiting West Africa in connection with the Elder Dempster Line. Although he would not have known it, war was on the horizon and shipping would be very much at risk. The bells of three ships of lines connected to his father and lost in the First World War were hung in the grounds of 'Loo Water' – one remains there today. His mother's journey to South Africa was by air and not by sea, a sign that times were changing. When war came, the 1939 Register of civilians shows Susan in Heacham as an A.R.P., warden but she was also involved with her cousin Queenie in volunteer ambulance work and then in 1942 went for two years to Liverpool to work as a Red Cross nurse in a hospital. (Violet, her mother, would chair the Heacham Nursing Association and Clinic for many years after the war and was responsible for the District Nurses Home.)


In 1944, Gerald retired from the shipping line and took on a very different rôle taking on the 'Grade A Dairy Farm' in Heacham — with some echoes but a massive contrast to the life of his parents at the time of his birth in Australia. Susan would first become secretary and, after the death of her father, managing director but very much 'hands on' including the delivery of milk to villagers. At the start of the war she had become the young Joint Master of the Heacham Harriers, continuing her love of riding and dogs. In later life she enabled teenage girls to pursue their love of ponies and riding at her stables and with her ponies. Many in the village will associate her with her support for the Guide Dogs for the Blind, whether in

collecting milk bottle tops and foil, 'feeding' the canine collecting box outside the Post Office or attending car boot sales. dog shows and fêtes on her land – a venue for such events over the generations. Thanks to her efforts, it is thought one hundred dogs were trained.

When Gerald died in 1949 'Loo Water' was sold and became a nursing home and it has remained so although now known as 'Millbridge.' Violet and Susan moved to 'Little Loo'/'Little Mill House,' once home to the gardener and chauffeur, described by Queen Mary in a 'thank-you' note after a visit to Violet, as 'your charming little house.' She also referred to Susan's 'beautiful herd' and wished it every success. Queen Mary had often visited Margaret in the past.

Susan Torrey did not content herself with animals, fund-raising and memories of times past. She was a member of the parish council, chairing it between 1953-1955 and later a member of Docking Rural District Council (before King's Lynn Borough Council had responsibility for Heacham.) She was a trustee for Queen's Cottages and manager/governor for Hunstanton Secondary and Heacham Primary Schools as well as being on the Youth Club management committee. The local Conservative Association also had her support as did the British Legion, Scouts and Guides. In 1992, after receiving the British Empire Medal for 'services to the community of Heacham' she expressed astonishment but did say that over the years she had been involved in helping to run "everything going except the football club."

In 1960 planning permission was given for building plots along the north side of Broadway with the land owner's stipulation that purchasers were to be Heacham residents. By the end of the 1970s development of the remaining farmland had begun and would include one small part of it bearing the Torrey name. The land between 'Little Mill House' as it became known and the nursing home was maintained by Miss Torrey and remained the venue for annual dog shows and other activities including car boot sales.



The last village link with the Rolfe family of Heacham passed away in 'Loo Water Nursing Home' – once her family home – in March 2001.

One of the world's most famous double bass players, Leon Bosch, showed us that the bass is not just for the back row of the orchestra. The Beethoven horn sonata sounded as good on the bass as it does on the horn and as for the glorious 18 Negro Spirituals, Paul Robeson could not have done better.

So how do we keep up these standards? Perhaps by another unusual combination. Professor Benedict Holland is part of the permanent music team at Music in the Burnhams and on Saturday July 5th at 3pm at St Mary's Church Westgate he will be joined by the organist for Edinburgh Canongate Kirk, Simon Leach, to play Handel, Widor, Bach and Lloyd Webber.

At 7.30pm on July 12th at St Mary's Church, Brancaster, British Saxophonist Rob Burton, who won the Woodwind Category Final of BBC Young Musician 2018 and went on to secure a place in the Grand Final, will be joined by Texan pianist Mark Rogers who won First prize in the Royal Philharmonic's Society Young Writers Awards in 2021.

Rob and Mark will play Schumann, Debussy and Ravel.

#### LANDLORDS: DON'T FORGET THE 60-DAY RETURN WHEN YOU SELL!

A new report from HMRC published on 20 May seems to confirm the circumstantial evidence that recent legislative and fiscal changes are steadily shrinking the private rented sector.

The report finds that 55% of private landlords only have a single rental property, that the average number of properties owned is three and that almost 2/3rds of landlords have less than £20k of gross rental income, with net income of less than half this figure.

60% of landlords have purchased the property as an investment, the remainder having acquired it through inheritance or as a former main residence. Most owners saw property as being a good long-term investment, but there is evidence that this is starting to change: almost a quarter of those surveyed intend to reduce the number of properties that they own within the next twelve months, and a third will look to do so over the next five years. Landlords are being driven to look elsewhere for returns.

The report does not attempt to ascertain why landlords are starting to disinvest in the sector, but the findings seem to tie in with a mood within the sector which identifies tax policies, new landlord and tenant legislation and aggressive action by local authorities as key factors in discouraging new investment and pushing existing investors to withdraw. The report does note that 63% of landlords use professional help in arranging property lettings, and almost half find that they are unable to handle the tax compliance without using an accountant. Taken together it is easy to see why the combination of added costs, lower profits and increased administration, coupled with the disappearance of the fixed term tenancy is steadily encouraging exit from the sector.

The irony of all this, of course is that by encouraging landlords to leave the sector, the number of properties available reduces. According to another Government survey, between 2022 and 2023 the sector shrunk by 6,000 properties despite the fact that over 200,000 new properties were added to the national housing stock. This has led to increased rents, but if one factors in the landlord intentions identified above it seems that, despite higher rents, a significant proportion of landlords will leave the market in the next few years, creating a vicious circle where tenants compete for a shrinking pool of affordable property.

Whilst there are still some attractions in rental property, the market is changing, and it seems to be that some smaller

landlords see themselves as gradually being pushed out by the increasing administration. Leaving the sector carries its own challenges with Capital Gains Tax, particularly since the tax now needs to be declared and paid within 60 days of completion of any sale. Since such calculations are not always straightforward, the 60-day timescale can be difficult to achieve if the computation and resultant liability has not been considered before the sale completes. There are also penalties for late filed returns, so this requirement must not be overlooked.

# The Arts Society North West Norfolk The Tea Service

'Let's have a nice cuppa.' How many times have we heard that said? We seem to have an almost genetic love of tea, downing approximately 100 million cups each day. It has become an integral part of British everyday life. It has fuelled centuries of imperial expansion, industrialisation and exploitation. Art and advertisements have depicted tea such that it has become part of our identity and history. Hard to imagine that at one time it was a luxury, exotic, expensive product that only the rich could afford.

Tea was first cultivated in China (first millennium BC) and became popular as a beverage during the Tang dynasty (618-907.) As global trade expanded it soon became a 'taxable matter.' Commercial trading by the East India Company began and caused devastating social and economic effects in China. This huge, controlling company also started its aggressive commercial and military controlling activities in India. Their trade in tea accounted at one time for 60% of company trade, and tea duties for 10% of the British government's revenue, as well as the company's huge influence on economic and political policy. Their tea taxation policy resulted in the Boston Tea Party (1773) and the start of the American War of Independence.

It would take several hundred years to be established as the British national drink with health enhancing properties. And who was the unlikely early 1660s tea 'influencer'? None other than Catherine de Braganza, the Portuguese Queen-Consort of Charles II. Part of her dowry were the seven islands of Bombay (Mumbai.) Our love for tea parties originated from the genteel social occasions in the 17th century organised by the wives of wealthier households. The cups were tiny, beautifully decorated and very fragile. It is believed that the addition at a later stage of milk first was to cool the liquid and stop these delicate cups cracking. By the 18th century there was a large demand for tea drinking, but a relatively small number who could afford it. And that demand was to be met by the smugglers, probably more than tea imported legally. The smugglers' market almost disappeared overnight by 1785 when the government seriously reduced the import duty on tea and the working classes became introduced to the beverage. Many enjoyed free tea from their employers during the working day. The beginning of tea breaks?

Tea has been a very important part of British life, so much so that during the first and second World Wars the government stepped in with a variety of measures to protect stocks and prices. Rationing was introduced and remained until 1945. It is true to say that tea has kept its place for centuries at the heart of British social life.

'Tea amuses the evenings, solaces the midnights and welcomes the mornings.' Dr. Johnson.
