Heacham in Bloom





God is working His purpose out

At various times throughout the year we do experience some very high tides along the Norfolk coast. We don't have flood warning sirens any more to wail their

warning. Social media and local radio are the main agencies which warn us when the waters of the sea are close to the top of our defences.

We had all seen on our televisions and in our newspapers the power of flood waters earlier in July when heavy rains caused flash floods and devastated areas. Many homes are still uninhabitable with families still trying to reorganise their lives, while parents of the children from the stricken summer camp in U.S. mourn their lost offspring. Most are looking for someone to blame. Their apparently secure existence had been suddenly revealed to be highly precarious. Excess rain had washed away roads and reduced organised comfortable lives to soggy, smelling chaos with no water and no electricity supply. Material possessions had proved unreliable.

Insurance companies call this an "Act of God." Would God really do such a thing to stir people from their complacency and remind them of His total power over the whole world? Not in a vindictive sense, no, but he did allow these events to occur.

East Anglia is curiously blessed with little or no high ground from which heavy rainfall can drain and cause flooding. To add to the irony the Fens don't flood because they are designed for that purpose! The crops growing in the fields around us were not destroyed and a hot dry spell in early August allowed for the harvest to be safely gathered.

When we celebrate Harvest Festival this year, as generations have done before us, we thank God for His generous provision for our food. Yes, He created those plants that are essential to our food chain. We can certainly genetically engineer them for bigger and better yields or disease resistance but we cannot create a single leaf. God created every aspect of our lives and He created mankind for a purpose. Our role is to provide companionship for God and to worship Him. Hardly surprising then that if we ignore God and deny His very existence sometimes, he allows events to make us think.

competitive, or just a relaxed way to enjoy the outdoors, pétanque might just be your new favourite pastime.

Also known as French boules, pétanque is booming across the UK – and with good reason. In France and most of Europe you'll find a pitch in every village and town square, and games break out wherever there's a sunny patch of gravel. As they say across the Channel, "It's a way of life, not just a game" – and we've embraced that same spirit here in Heacham.

The rules are simple: toss your boule and try to land it closest to the cochonnet (also called the jack). But don't be fooled – while it's easy to pick up, it's surprisingly tricky to master. The gravel terrain adds just enough unpredictability to level the playing field, giving newcomers a real chance and keeping things interesting for everyone.

"The terrain is the great equaliser – on gravel, everyone gets a chance."

We play all year round — even through the winter — and the social side is every bit as important as the competition. We've just wrapped up a lively summer league and are heading into a popular winter season, with regular matches and plenty of casual games too...

But it's not all about scores and standings – it's just as much about having fun, keeping active, and enjoying friendly time together.

And the terrain itself? It's one of the largest in Norfolk. With a new fence soon being installed around the adjacent 3G pitch (and extended to enclose the pétanque area), the space will be even better protected – keeping it clean, safe, and ready for year-round play.

To help players connect and stay informed, we're also launching a dedicated Facebook page. Just search Heacham Pétanque. It's a private group, so register as a member and you'll be able to have games and matches, find playing times, and join in our events with ease.

We often meet for a casual throw on Sunday mornings around 10am, but this will be confirmed on the Facebook group. The pitch is open for use at any time. It's spacious enough that even when matches are on, there's still room to play, and we've got spare boules available behind the bar if you'd like to try before investing in your own set.

As they say in France: "You don't stop playing pétanque because you get old. You get old because you stop playing pétanque."

It's a game for all ages and all abilities – relaxed, rewarding, and a great way to spend time with others. Whether you've played on holiday, watched a game in a European village square, or just fancy a new thing that's easy to join and hard to leave – this is your chance.

The terrain is free to use for members of the Heacham Club Charity and, as word spreads, this once-hidden gem is becoming a true hub of activity.

So, if you're looking for something new this season – a game that brings people together and offers year-round enjoyment – come and discover Heacham Pétanque.

No booking. No fuss. Just great company and a brilliant game.



The nights are drawing in but, too often, so are the clouds. The 22nd, at 7.20pm, is the Autumn Equinox when night is about the same length as day. Nights then get longer until 21st December. The equinox is when the Earth's axis of rotation neither points away from the Sun (winter) or towards the Sun (summer). This position repeats itself 6 months later and half way around the Earth's orbit, at the Spring Equinox.

Diminishing day length is due to earlier sunsets. Sunset is defined as the moment the top limb of the Sun dips below the horizon. Due to refraction this is after the Sun has physically done so, just as sunrise occurs before the Sun is actually above the horizon. An experiment you can do which vaguely illustrates this phenomenon requires a coin, a cup and some water. Place the coin in the cup. Move your head so that the lip of the cup prevent you from seeing the coin. Without moving your head, pour water into the cup, an assistant might be useful. Magically the coin appears. refraction has bent the light reflected from the coin.



Three twilights follow sunset and after each twilight is a dusk. Ordinary twilight lasts until the centre of the Sun is 6° below the horizon, nautical twilight then begins until the Sun has sunk another 6° . Then Astronomical twilight follows for another 6° , followed by Astronomical dusk and, at last, night. In case you are confused, it's all a matter of degrees of darkness. People are content with dark; sailors prefer darker and astronomers want darkest.

So, what can we see at night? Saturn will be at its brightest this year with a magnitude of 0.6. This is because on the 21st it is in opposition, at its closest to the Earth with just 1,279 million km between us. Swing a small telescope or powerful binoculars on it to see the rings, though they will be almost edge on so, this year, a line really.

Saturn is visible all night long, starting in the ESE from about 10pm. On the 8th, the Moon is just above and to the left of it.

The furthest planet, Neptune, also reaches opposition on the 23rd and is only 4,321 million km away from us. At magnitude 7.7 it will not be seen by naked eyes but a telescope will find the



dim blue-green planet. On the 8th, when you have found Saturn, swing good binoculars to a point between it and the Moon, there lies Neptune.


Back in 1989, Voyager 2 shot past Neptune and sent back extraordinary pictures. It discovered that the methane rich planet had dusty rings and that a moon, Triton, had ice volcanoes. Neptune's planetary core is very hot, more than 5000 °C, which drives storms and winds of up to 2,100Km/hr.

To see Jupiter and Venus, early morning calls. Jupiter rises in the SE at half past midnight. At 2am it will be high enough to easily see and shining brightly at a magnitude of minus 2, you won't miss it. On the 16th the Crescent Moon is above Jove and, the next night, below it. The box like pattern of stars sharing the sky with Jupiter is Gemini, the twins. The two stars at the corners of the left-hand side are Castor and Pollux.

Venus is far brighter with a magnitude of minus 3.9. It rises about 4am so, having caught Jupiter you may as well stay up and look for meteors.

Though September has no major meteor showers it does have the most incidents of sporadic ones – those that appear without being forecast. There is also a minor shower, the Southern Taurids which starts on the 10th and goes on until the 20th November. The Taurids produce infrequent meteors but some bright ones are possible.

Patterns of stars to look out for include Cepheus near the zenith. It looks like a house and contains Herschel's Garnet Star which, unsurprisingly, is red. If you got close you would find it was also big, a 1000 times wider than the Sun.



Herschel's Garnet Star is just above the middle of the upside down floor of the house, so to the left of Zeta. Internet

Another star in the Cepheus house is Delta Cephei, the original cepheid variable. These are stars which regularly dim and then

brighten again. How rapidly they do this is related to how bright they really are (absolute magnitude). Knowing that and how bright they appear to be from Earth (apparent magnitude) means their distance from Earth can be calculated. Delta Cephei fluctuates over 5 days and 9 hours and is 887.1 light years distant.

Such variables enabled the galaxy to be better mapped and distances to other galaxies determined. Space born telescopes like Gaia have since taken over.

Find the Summer Triangle asterism (pattern) in the SW. The bright stars Vega, Altair and Deneb are at its corners. Vega is 25 light years distant and a blue white star. Altair is 16.7 light years distant and a larger, hotter, version of our Sun. Deneb's distance from us is somewhere between 1,400 and 2,600 light years distant. It is a blue supergiant and head of the Northern cross.

I am writing this early in August before I go to Wales where, I hope, I will see some Perseid meteors despite the full Moon. Perhaps a mountain will block it out. Not many of those in Norfolk though we do have Cheney Hill.

Local matters first. The two Cheney Hill reserved matters applications were passed so 122 houses will be built on the fields between Cheney Hill and Marea Meadows. A significant loss of green space rich in butterflies and feeding birds. It was inevitable since the granting of outline permissions up to 9 years ago. One concession was won, a condition to ensure that no motorised vehicles will be able to use the 3m wide pedestrian and cycle pathway which connects the new development to Marea Meadows.

An emergency access off Malthouse Crescent vanished between inception and final approval, so the 122 houses are in an effective cul-de sac with one entrance onto Cheney Hill. Officers ignored the case that traffic has increased since highways approved the access 9 years ago or that more cars will use Cheney Hill / Lamsey Lane when the new traffic lights appear at the junction with the A149 in the autumn.

Purchasers of the new houses will, besides their mortgages, have an additional financial cost as they will have to pay an annual fee to a management company. This company will maintain the green spaces and the unadopted shared 'roadways.' Though the central spine road will be adopted by highways, the routes leading to most houses won't be and will be for both cars and pedestrians. Removing footpaths is common on new estates, it reduces costs and frees up some land.

I hope that is the last I have to say on these developments which have been hanging around for over a decade. There is a construction management plan to minimise nuisance and disruption to existing communities. Please tell me if problems occur and also report issues to planning enforcement at the Borough.

Sedgeford School is another developing saga and it is questionable if it will go ahead, at least in the manner proposed. Amongst the objectors for this development of 8 flats and 12 houses, is Anglian Water. They are objecting to all proposed new developments in the catchment area of Heacham Waste Water Treatment Works which, with developments already in the pipeline, has reached capacity. Any additional loading may result in environmental damage, i.e. untreated sewage in The Wash.

Readers should monitor new planning proposals in their area. For example, it is now no secret that a new, 104 room, hotel is proposed for Hunstanton. So, 104 toilets flushing into Heacham (treatment works). If 20 at Sedgeford will potentially cause problems then 104 certainly will and Anglian Water should object. The hotel site is on a Borough Council owned car park and the Borough will make a lot of money from its sale. Hunstanton Town Council, I am told, is overjoyed at the thought of a new hotel. I think I am right in stating that Heacham will not be overjoyed at any new contamination of the sea off its beaches. The outlet from the treatment works joins the Heacham River by the South Beach car park, The combined flow enters the sea below the concrete 'pier' with the beacon on it. A separate sewage overload relief pipe enters the sea between North Beach and the beginning of Hunstanton.

The rolling average of sea water quality at Heacham has been poor for the last few years. This year shows improvement which questions the oft made assertion that seabirds cause much of the pollution. They are not wearing nappies and are still there in the same numbers. And though water quality is said to have improved, bacterial loading on Heacham cockle beds is very high and they have been closed. The public have also been advised not to collect and consume cockles.

Consequently, the cleanliness of Heacham's sea is not something to dabble with and if proposed new developments are going to cause significant risk of contamination, then there should be none until treatment capacity improves. Anglian Water's business plan is to upgrade the sewage works between 2030 and 2035. Development needs to be put on hold and I think that Hunstanton, a town, should have its own sewage treatment works which would take about half the burden from the Heacham facility.

Interested parties should also note that removing Heacham Beaches from the list of designated bathing waters is under consideration. If it happens, then monitoring of water quality will cease and any risk of bathing passes to the public. Contamination will likely go unnoticed.

Other waters are of significant concern, swimming pool provision in West Norfolk, in particular St James in King's Lynn and the Oasis Centre in Hunstanton. Following consultation, it has been decided to investigate replacing St James's pool with a new one at Lynnsport. Council agreed to spend £1.5 million on further consultancy to determine indicative designs and a business case. The overall cost of the Lynnsport project is estimated at £46million. Proposals for the Oasis Centre redevelopment are on hold until after repair work on Hunstanton Promenade has been determined and Hunstanton Masterplan completed. Essential repair and maintenance will continue at Oasis.

There have been press articles about house prices falling after the introduction of the doubling of council tax for second homes.

No-one seems to have applauded that result, I do. House prices in second home hotspots are grossly inflated which may benefit estate agents, currently whingeing, but makes it all but impossible for locals to purchase properties to actually live in and work from. Second homes are hardly a necessity, having a home is, so, whatever can be done to help people get a proper home should be accepted.

In addition, there is a financial gain to councils, County, BCKLWN and Parishes. Based on 2,806 second homes, in this tax year County will receive an extra £4.9 million, the Borough

at least £429,000, Parish Councils £225,000, and the police £925,000. (Numbers may differ if County is fairer to the Borough in the distribution of this income). The Borough's share is ringfenced to support housing need.

Government does not fund local services adequately and councils have to garner money from wherever they can. That's why government allowed a second home levy to be made and why I started that ball rolling in 2023. Council agreed this July to continue the levy on second homes and empty homes.

Note the number, 2806 second homes. If all those were available as first homes, then nearly 3000 new homes would not have to be built with all the loss of land and resources such building requires. It is not possible or even reasonable to imagine all such second homes becoming available. Many are not suitable in any case. However, it is possible to prevent new build homes from becoming second homes and many Parish Councils have done this through policies in their Neighbourhood Plans. (For example, Sedgeford, Heacham.)

Why should acres of fields be ripped up if a significant proportion of houses built on them become second homes or holiday lets? The housing crisis used to justify government demands to build ever more houses. It is supposed to be about supplying homes for those who need them to live in, not play in. The same applies to all the infill housing which takes away gaps between properties and removes smaller green spaces.

It is unfortunate that such policies are not retrospective and apply only to new applications not yet awarded outline permission. Heacham has fallen foul of this with the Cheney Hill development. These houses can be sold as second or holiday homes. Hopefully the extra management costs (see above) and the inconvenient single access will persuade such purchasers to spend their money elsewhere.



Heacham Artists at Wighton25

There have been so many changes and challenges in my life over the past few months. My new studio is up and running. Yay! Our 'Save the Old Dairy' Coffee Morning was a great success. We also had a fabulous time at the Heacham Carnival.

On the artistic side, Michelle Louise Carter and I exhibited at Wighton25 Site/Sight organised by the North Norfolk Exhibition Project. The NNEP was established in 2000 by a group of Norfolk artists.

The yearly exhibitions are an opportunity for artists to step out of their comfort zone and create new work in this environment. This year's brief was "for a response to Site/Sight. The work considers the significance of the interior and exterior site of All Saints Church, Wighton. A medieval church that sits in a rural setting close to the North Norfolk coast." A total of 45 artists were selected to exhibit.

Michelle and I took very different approaches:

My sculpture, The Passage – was inspired by a door into the church, a portal or threshold into a space of belief. I questioned the meaning of belief. For me it is a personal journey – one that enhances my own perception of truth. Not only the here and now but something beyond that – something that is greater than ourselves. Inside a church, we celebrate this. My sculpture echoes the shape of the doorway. The branch like elements symbolise the cycle of birth, death and rebirth. I have added elements that explore my journey. Some I have collected on my way around the world.

My personal favourites are the round cameos – photocopies of my artwork over time. During the course of the month, the natural elements intervened and subsequently something new evolved.

This sculpture became a journey in itself. It was built in the heat, wind and rain in my friend Annie's garden. I was without a studio and still facing the challenge of new materials. In spite of moving the sculpture to Wighton at 20-25 miles an hour, significant damage resulted. Somehow, the context of the artwork within the historic churchyard worked. Even the natural tilt of the sculpture seemed right.

At the end of the exhibition, I decided to remove the sculpture myself (as opposed to the 4 people required to place it). The setting up trauma was over so I embraced this. In spite of having to cause further damage, new ideas emerged. The process was surprisingly liberating. Full circle.

Michelle says, "When we were given the project brief for Wighton25, I immediately envisaged a large tepee created in a way to promote peace. The "Meditation Tepee" took five months to build. I hand spun 20kg of Faroe Island sheep fleeces that were formed into dense waterproof panels to cover the wooden framework, using weaving, knitting and crochet. To finish I made a simple lining with natural linen in a way that as the wind blew through the tepee, the softness fluttered around the body and shoulders of whom was seated inside. During the time of the exhibition visitors added feathers and pieces from herbal plants to enhance the protection process while using the tepee.

I have been astounded with the positive feedback from both other artists and visitors to Wighton25. The experience has definitely been a confidence boost and has directed my next work project towards healing methods and mental health."

"I do Like to be Beside the Seaside"

It must be a sign of advancing years but a trip to the fish counter of a Lynn supermarket brought back more recollections of times gone by! In last month's article on farming I reminisced about childhood days in Wales. Needless to say, being Wales, there was a castle; there was also access to the end of an extensive sandy beach where land speed records were broken in the 1920s. A notable resident and pub 'regular' was writer Dylan Thomas who included a reference to 'the web-footed cockle-women' in 'Under Milk Wood' and conveniently ties up my mention of fish counter, castle and beach. As a boy a great delight, when not on the farm, was walking barefoot along the wet sand and gathering cockles and huge amounts are still gathered in that area. It was a jar of pickled cockles on the fish counter that woke my memories of sand between my toes and between my teeth! The trademark on the lid is the castle of my birthplace as this was close to the old mill which was the original factory. (If this was the BBC I would have to declare that other brands are available but in fact there are no other British producers). Whilst strolling down a personal Memory Lane, a side turning could take me to old Birmingham pubs in the sixties waiting for the cockle man to come in with his wicker basket!


A walk along Heacham beach may have had you crunching small cockle shells underfoot and not so very long ago when the low tide took the sea to shake hands with Skegness it was common to see the silhouette of someone armed with rake and bucket out on the mud. Today the high content of bacteria that has led to the unofficial brown flag award is not an enticing accompaniment whether courtesy of the local water company or to seabirds changing to a high fibre diet! The Eastern Inshore Fisheries and Conversation Authority is confident however that the water quality of The Wash beyond Heacham is generally much better and although in recent years there has been a decline in the quantity and quality of mussels and cockles, there has been some increase in stock this year and members have agreed in principle to open a harvestable mussel fishery.

Today's commercial shellfish fishermen in The Wash are bound by rules and regulations with various 'lays' mapped. The area along this coastline is shown as 'out of bounds' as this is a private fishery belonging to the le Strange estate and beyond IFCA sampling and control. By pure coincidence, as I was trawling (should that be 'dredging' or 'raking'?) through random seaside information in July, the Borough Council issued advice that cockles gathered from the Stubborn Sands INNER bed may pose a risk to human health and should not be gathered. It should be remembered that the polluted waters with high bacterial levels that cause health problems for humans provide food for cockles and mussels.

Heacham shellfish have caused more than stomach problems over the centuries. The Old Hunstanton village sign relates to the right of the Lord of the Manor to the ownership of the foreshore as far as a man on horseback can throw a spear. This stretches from Wolferton to Thornham and to save any concern over the brandishing of sharp weapons has tended to mean the area between high and low tides. But ... tides vary at different times of year and the coastline changes; sandbanks that were once isolated by the sea become part of the foreshore. Over the centuries - and the le Strange's have been around since the Conquest – there have been disputes and 'actions' involving the owners or its lessees and gatherers ranging from Petty Sessions to the Supreme Court. The lawyers had their work cut out investigating land rights dating back to the Conquest, tidal and sand movement and bivalves! In the nineteenth century it seems that mussels were not taken just to feed the family but to use as manure on the land. One can imagine 'the smell of the sea' would have been quite evident in the village!

Recently, there has been concern over 'nurdles' – what a wonderful new word – washing up on the beach and particularly the congealed lumps resulting from the fire following a collision of a tanker and container ship. A fragile connection between shellfish and new additions to the tideline came to Heacham in 1929 when Mercedes Gleitze came ashore on Heacham beach having swum across The Wash from Lincolnshire. 'Open water swimming' is a term used by some these days but swimming in The Wash for thirteen and a half hours plastered in porpoise oil and lard may not seem inviting! And the shellfish link? Miss Gleitze had become the first woman to swim the English Channel two years previously with a Rolex watch in a pouch worn round



her neck and became the 'face' behind the promotion of their waterproof 'Oyster' case.

About one hundred years before Mercedes, 'Peggie' from Whitby came ashore here and over the years was followed by 'Biddock', 'St Johannes', 'Mayflower', 'Jane Higgins' and 'Alert'. These were some of the victims of storms and sandbanks and there were also cargoes that never arrived at their intended destination. In 1835 a Heacham beach auction of a 'large quantity of excellent SHIPWRECK' - mainly a cargo of timber plus the masts — was advertised; five years earlier similar auction lots from a ship wrecked off Heacham were auctioned in Lynn.

There would have been some local bidders on the beach who could recall a disaster commemorated by a plaque over the door in the church. It provides a cautionary note as well as a memorial to nine unfortunate people from the village whose pleasure trip turned to tragedy. They drowned when a squall overturned their boat being rowed out to the 'Nile', a ship moored offshore. There was another victim from Snettisham and the two crew members with just two survivors. Clearly, the ship was no fishing boat or small coastal vessel and may well have been involved in the old established Hanseatic League trade.

The Domesday Book of 1086 records a fishery at Heacham and it would seem natural for some villagers over the centuries to earn a living from the sea rather than the land. Unlike the small coastal villages in Cornwall, for example, Heacham could never boast of a protected deep-water harbour but, with a sound knowledge of the sandbanks and the tides, a fishing boat could be beached here. Although it is now difficult to visualise, Heacham did have a harbour – a protected place - where the river had direct access to the sea and small boats had access along the river to a more sheltered mooring and landing place (a 'staithe').

Small coastal vessels brought in coal and building supplies and nineteenth century censuses recorded two or three fishing vessels (normally from Lincolnshire) moored there on the evening of the census.

Somewhat surprisingly, those census records do not list many local fishermen although of course they might have been fishing or moored in Lincolnshire when the records were made. The 'Alert' mentioned above was damaged in a storm and beached here for repairs. Sadly, it rolled on to its side and crushed Captain Fox who was a Heacham man. William Wilton who was 'a tender husband and sincere friend' was also a 'mariner' and clearly of some note as, when he died in 1771, he and then members of his family have their memorials inside the church on the floor of the main aisle. In 1851 John Burchum, a searcher of landing

customs' lived in the village. He is still working here ten years later and clearly liked the place as, even when he retired' he remained a resident and his home in 1871 is named as 'The Old Custom House' (possibly the original part of what is now 'King's Gardens'). A pair of coastguard cottages known in 1861 as 'Preventive Cottages' housed officers who kept an eye on cargoes and any shipping possibly in danger.

But ... time and tide wait for no man. Heacham's beaches became a destination and a backdrop for holidaymakers but that's for another time! I for one would be interested to hear of people's memories of our local seaside in those post-war years. Of course, the disastrous floods deserve to be dealt with separately – out of the holiday season would seem best.

Tickets for both concerts are £25 each. Under 18s come free.



IHT CHANGES – THE GIFT TO JOURNALISTS THAT KEEPS ON GIVING!

Even now, nearly a year after Rachel Reeves' Autumn Budget, Inheritance Tax remains in the news, with new angles emerging on a regular basis. In late July a report from the Office for National Statistics hit the headlines, telling us that farms were closing at record rates with a net reduction of over 3,000 such businesses in the year to March 2025. The report attributed the reduction in numbers to the impact of the Autumn Budget and has led to renewed calls for a rethink. Without wishing to reduce the gravity of the situation, it seems unlikely that a sector with less than 100,000 businesses can actually have shrunk by 3% in a single quarter without the impact being felt in the market for agricultural land (which is little changed) or a visible increase in farm "dispersal" sales. It is also unclear why the IHT changes, which affect all family businesses, should only have led to a reduction in the number of farms. It is, however, possible that the ONS statistics, which are largely derived from VAT and PAYE registrations and deregistrations, may have picked up a period of rapid reorganisation ahead of and after the Budget as family businesses consolidate multiple registrations under common ownership or pass on businesses to the next generation in response to the Budget announcements. The next quarterly figures may tell a different story, but of course the damage to the Governments reputation lies on the headlines which are, indeed, derived from government produced statistics.

A few days previously HMRC released a series of papers summarising the points raised in the post Budget consultation and outlining the draft legislative changes. Again, these will affect ALL businesses, not just farms, a point which has largely escaped public awareness so far.

These show virtually no movement in the position outlined in the Budget, other than that the £1m allowance will be index linked, but only after 2030 (at which point index linking theoretically should resume for other IHT bands). It is also confirmed that effectively the £1m nil rate band will "refresh" after seven years.

The paper reiterates the logic behind the changes-"to raise revenue to ensure the sustainability of the public finances and to fund public services, whilst continuing to support farms and businesses by targeting the reliefs to make them fairer."

It also goes on to justify the changes by stating "In 2021 to 2022 (the most recent data available), 40% of the total Exchequer cost of agricultural property relief went to the top 7% of claims. This means just 117 estates benefited from £219 million in tax foregone." However, it misses the point that there is very little difference in size between a farm in the top 7% and one in the next 20% - smallholdings and "hobby farms" under 100 acres will generally escape the tax but family farms (and by extension family businesses in other sectors), will bear the brunt of the liability.

Putting all this together, the widely publicised criticisms of these changes remain entirely valid. This legislation will catch the family farm and the larger privately owned business but not the "lifestyle" farmer; although 73% of claims by number will escape tax that only represents about 20% of the acreage passing. It is also worth mentioning that the figures given and used above relate only to business reliefs. For many, pension pots will also need to be included in the IHT calculations and the effect of this, whilst not quantified, will be significant.

It is disappointing that the Treasury continue to produce figures which are selectively quoted to give a deeply misleading impression. These IHT changes will have a huge impact on those wishing to pass on family farms & businesses and anyone with a substantial pension pot. It therefore has to be wise to take advice from a qualified professional as soon as possible.
