
This charitable trust based in Heacham is available to help provide financial support for the following purposes:

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN HEACHAM



The thing about this time of year is the gradually darkening evenings and darker mornings. Even when the clocks go back on the 26th October, the benefits - if any-seem to only last a few weeks before nature catches up.

Most of us, if given a choice, would much rather carry out our daily routines in the daylight. For example, my early morning walk on the beach becomes riskier and more challenging when navigating the route in the pre-dawn darkness. Similarly, driving home in the evening darkness, never feels quite as comfortable as travelling in sunlight. I understand totally those people who choose not to drive at night. But as the days shorten, it's hard to avoid the darkness altogether.

Thankfully, navigating in the dark at least is now made easier by using route guides on our phones or other devices. These provide a visual map we can read in the dark, and a helpful voice giving us step-by-step directions. That very same device may even come with a built-in torch to help us see the way ahead when walking. I have in the past used this when walking along the unlit path at the beach, a great help to avoid unwanted surprises and enabling me to stick to the safer route.

As I reflect on this, a Bible verse springs to mind 'Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light on my path' from Psalm 119 verse 105. Sometimes, the world can seem like a dark place. I don't mean that just in terms of evil or wrongdoing, although sadly this is true at times. I mean in the sense that we can't always see the way ahead; decisions we need to make, choices that must be taken, the route ahead isn't always clear or obvious. This verse and others like it, remind me that in reading, knowing and understanding the Word of God (the Bible) we can be equipped with the tools we need to navigate life's uncertain journey. Just as I use my phone or a torch to see the way ahead in the darkness, developing an understanding of God's Word can help me to grasp the values and principles for living a God-centred life.

The Bible isn't a lucky charm or a 'fortune cookie' to randomly dip in to for instant answers. Instead, it serves as a guide or a tool that can equip us for our life's journey. Like any tool, there are more effective ways to use it. Personally, I have found daily reading and prayer to be a valuable start to my day. This practice helps to centre me and provides wisdom, peace and hope to support me in whatever challenges might come my way. Using study guides, following a daily reading plan or even studying more deeply into the Bible with other people, can all be helpful approaches.

So, this autumn, don't walk in the dark. Instead, find a source of light and life, that will protect, support, and guide you as you navigate your way ahead in life.



Borough Council News Heacham Ward which includes Sedgeford and Fring

I am writing this in the first half of September so my apologies if significant things have happened by the time you read the article.

Hot news at the moment is the proposed sale of Borough land at North Beach, Heacham, which is leased to beach hut owners. The Borough's case was that the rent received (105 x £730) /year Inc. VAT, was offset by site maintenance costs (owners wonder what maintenance) and the charges involved in negotiating new 10-year leases next Spring. The officer estimate of this was in excess of £100K which appeared nonsensical to some. Effectively, the business wasn't making a cent and was about to cost more. Coupled to this was the Borough's assertion that retaining the site would subject the Council to 'further high-profile criticism' – hut owners made the press earlier in the year complaining about the large increase in annual rent.

My take on all this was mixed. As a Borough Cllr I had not been formally consulted but, in an informal chat, had been told the proposed sale was coming forward. I advised Heacham Parish Council to invite a Borough representative to a Parish Council meeting to discuss the matter. An offer was made for a meeting after a significant Borough panel meeting would make recommendations to Cabinet about the sale.

In the meantime, I received various communications from concerned hut owners and also had further information about the proposed sale. It was evident that insufficient consultation was taking place, the sale of the land was hardly credible given the bad face put on the business by the Borough, and, if sold, rents would certainly escalate to enable the investor to claw back the investment. Overall, selling the land under tenants who had an expectation of continuing leasing from the Council and leaving them in the thrall of a private investor seemed a bad idea and worthy of a dodgy landlord.



Come the Regeneration and Development Panel (R&D) of the 9th September, which I chair. The item about the beach huts was scheduled to be 'exempt', that is held in secret without public or press. The day before I negotiated a change to that position so, except for one or two financial details, it could be public and appear on YouTube. This was important as the debate would reveal public and councillor concerns and those concerns could not, whatever the final decision, be minimised.

At the meeting there was a lively discussion which led to two proposals, both of which rejected the sale of the land. The one which recommended a new 10-year lease was supported unanimously. By now, it will be known if Cabinet accepts the recommendation. News reports on this Heacham farrago currently abound but will settle unless earlier errors of judgement are compounded.

If you have a view, make it known to me, the BC and or the CEO.

CIL is an acronym which likely means little to many of you. It is the Community Infrastructure Levy; a tariff placed on housing developers of £60, £40 or £0 / square metre depending upon where in the Borough the development is. Supermarket development costs rather more. CIL came into being by government dictat about 9 years ago and brings a continual flow of money into the Borough. A proportion of the CIL generated goes to the Parish Councils where the development is, 15% if no Neighbourhood Plan, 25% if there is one. The remainder goes into a pot held by the Borough Council. Up until now, the pot was split 60% for strategic projects, essentially under the control of the BC and 40% for local projects for Parish Councils and others to bid for. I was chair of the small committee which created these governance arrangements and some millions of pounds have gone into projects over the years. Our governance model ensured as much as possible went locally.

New arrangements are about to come into force and the distribution will be 80% to strategic projects and 20% to local,

so Parish Councils etc will be able to bid into a reserve half the size as previously existed. Their projects also have to cost between £10K and £100K which means the number of projects able to be supported will be significantly reduced. Coupled with the need to find some match funding, perhaps a half or more, councils with limited budgets will find bidding difficult.

Changes have come about due to advice and direction from government sources as CIL was always intended to support infrastructure related to development and the procedures have to be put in place to ensure it is. Parish Councils have had a good run for their money and some have done very well (for example, outdoor gyms have been funded by CIL at Heacham and Sedgeford and the latter has a well heated, energy sufficient hall, containing an adjustable stage too).

The 80% strategic funding pot concerns me and others as Cabinet can effectively decide where some of it can go, e.g. to the Council's Corporate Project Programme. We considered the new CIL arrangements at the R&D panel and the Leader of the Opposition, there under a standing order which gives right to speak, made salient points about the need for scrutiny of such allocations. I agreed and the panel added such a recommendation. I will be surprised if Cabinet accepts it.

The King's Lynn Transport Strategy (draft) was a long document and presented by NCC officers at the R&D meeting. It was essentially a list of intentions as funds allow and will be ready for the new local government model. What it lacked was no mention of transport hubs - park and ride – and reference to public transport was muted. The panel wanted better consideration given to bus services and new proposals for rail.

The proposal for e-scooter provision in Lyn provided some slight amusement as two present, I was one, thought it a little daft given the problems such devices are causing around the country including, apparently, Norwich.

I also commented on improvements to islands and roads by the hospital would not have been needed if they had decided to build the new hospital south of Lynn where new housing growth will be. An argument, unfortunately, lost almost 2 years ago because those in control would not even discuss the matter. Their principal argument being the new hospital had to be built by 2030. Well, almost 2026 and not a shovel, I believe, has been put in the ground.

Tongue in cheek I also asked if any consideration had been given to catering for Sandringham's nuisances, sorry music festivals, which all but closed down Lynn a few weeks ago and caused major inconvenience to many.

Anyone for Padel Tennis? A member of cabinet appears enthused by the idea of establishing it across West Norfolk. A planning application has, serendipitously, been received for courts in Heacham. Not having a clue about it I used Google and found many references to nuisance caused by the game. It is, apparently, very noisy and is causing complaints to councils up and down the country. The best solution proposed is to place courts in a large, well-insulated shed far from anyone who is not deaf (a little exaggerated but feel free to Google (other search engines are available yourselves).

Heacham car parking charges escalated in spring and the winter season of no charges ended too. Residents complained, it made the papers. A small concession was, apparently, won but has not happened. At the time of writing, repeated calls for the Cabinet Member for parking to meet with Heacham Parish Council have been ignored. Emails from the resident leading on the concession have not been answered. Anyone with an interest and energy please message the Borough with your displeasure.










Fall back (but not immediately). The 26th at 2am precisely is the end of British Summer Time. So, when your body clock wakes you up at 7am, it is 6am. Mornings will appear a tad darker, early evening, lighter. All very English which is why the Scots don't like it.



The historical zero degree longitude through Greenwich, Internet

From the 26th the time standard is Greenwich Mean Time which is the same as Universal Time. Greenwich was the chosen meridian, 0 degrees longitude. Navigators could calculate their actual longitude by comparing local noon with noon at Greenwich as displayed by accurate clocks on board ship. Every 15 degrees of longitude is equivalent to an hour change in time. So, if your personal noon occurs one hour after noon at Greenwich you are 15 degrees west of Greenwich.



Long distance travellers will know that clock time is different at your destination, Internet.

These time zones, delineated by every 15 degrees of movement, led to Universal Time. Both Greenwich Mean Time and a Universal Day of 24 hours beginning at Greenwich midnight were advocated by a Scottish Canadian Engineer, Sandford Fleming (1827-1915) who seems to have built Canada or, at least, its stamps, significant railways, and maps. GMT and the Universal Day were accepted by the International Meridian Conference of 1884. His notion of time zones took longer and it was 1929 before most major countries accepted them.



In the Second World War, British Double Summer Time was introduced to increase productivity and save energy. Perhaps today's government could be told though it would mean Scotland gets dawn around 10am.

What to see at night?

Saturn is up all night, setting at 5am. It has a small positive magnitude, 0.7, so is dim and telescopes will reveal almost edge on rings, so no classic image. Look ESE from 7pm, SE at 8pm and due S at 11pm. It is in the lower half of the sky, rising along an arc as it gets later. On the 5th, the Moon is close, just below and to the right of the ringed planet. The next night, the Moon will be above and to the left.

Neptune, the most distant planet, is just a couple of finger widths (at arm's length) to the left of Saturn and a little lower. It is very dim, magnitude +7.7, and you will need a telescope to see it as a greenish hazy, dot swimming in space.

Uranus is just bright enough for binoculars to pick it out. It is just below and to the right of the Pleiades, a star cluster relatively easy to see and find in the E to SE as the night gets later.

All the planets above are visible all night and, more importantly certainly visible by 10pm.

Giant Jupiter is not quite so amenable and, though it rises in the E at 11pm, midnight until about 4am will give the best views. At magnitude minus 2.2, you won't mistake it. Look due E at midnight. On the 14th, at 2am, the Moon is just to the left and a little above.

Venus, magnitude minus 3.9, outshines Jupiter when it rises at 5.30am. Look due E but don't use optical instruments as the Sun will be rising too.





Find the Great Square above Saturn. Andromeda, M25, is the fuzzy grey ellipse in the middle of the blue V. Internet.

It should be dark earlier enough to admire stars. Look above Saturn and find the Square of Pegasus, an asterism (pattern) which forms part of that constellation, The four stars starting at top left and going clockwise are Alpheratz, Scheat, Markab and Algenib. Arabic names because Arabs were the great early astronomers. All of them have apparent magnitudes between 2.06 and 2.84.

Apparent magnitude is how bright they look to us. However, the brightest, Alpheratz, is just 97 light years away whilst the dimmest, Algenib, is 470 light years distant so it is very much the brighter star in reality. True brightness is called Absolute Magnitude.

Both Alpheratz and Algenib are binaries; Scheat is a giant variable and Markab has an atmosphere with unusually high proportions of mercury and manganese and rotates very rapidly. Four stars which do not look unusual but which demonstrate the variability stellar objects have.



The Andromeda Galaxy, 2.5 million light years away, is the furthest object discernible by good eyes in a dark sky. It is well placed to observe through big binoculars. Go left and up from the top left corner of the Square of Pegasus. The bright star you come to is Mirach, go up and right a tad, look for a fuzzy patch. Twice as many stars as the Milky Way but having the same mass. Theorists say that's because the Milky Way has more dark energy which I think is a myth that earns research grants. Fast forward 4 billion years and the two galaxies will merge.



Another way of locating Andromeda. Alpheratz is the top left corner of the Gret Square of Pegasus. Mirach is the bright star to its left, Shedir is a star in the easily identified W of Cassiopeia. Internet

Meteors! 8th October, just before dawn, look for fireballs from the Draconid meteor shower. The night of 21st / 22nd the Orionids appear in a night without any moonlight. These are particles of dust from Halley's comet burning up in the upper atmosphere.

Darker skies despite BST ending, a few planets not too late at night and some stars to contemplate. Meteors will be a bonus.

Heacham Commemorates VJ80 Weekend

Victory over Japan Day fell on Friday 15th August, marking 80 years since the Empire of Japan's unconditional surrender and cessation of hostilities with the Western Allies. Heacham commemorated this with the lighting of the Beacon at the top of Millennium Wood at 9.30pm coinciding with Beacons across the country being lit.

Prayers were given by Reverend Dr Richman NCube, followed by the Last Post, played by Jef Hatton, then a two minute silence before Jef played Reveille to signify the end of the silence.

Janice Curtis (nee Race) lit the Beacon, Jim Race gave a brief talk about the involvement of local men who, as part of the Royal Norfolk Regiment's Territorial Battalions, were part of the Far East Campaign against Japan and subsequently endured over 3½ years of captivity, subjected to forced manual labour on starvation rations, little or no medication for a myriad of tropical diseases and under the constant threat of beatings and torture from their Japanese captors.

The evening concluded with Lauren Matthews, Izzy Parr, Rachel Fletcher and Ryan Chilvers from the Pocahontas Players giving a haunting acapella rendition of 'Blood in the Earth', a song penned by a member of the Scottish Far East Prisoners of War group, dedicated to those who were forced to build the Thai/Burma Railway, dubbed the infamous 'Death Railway.'

Saturday the 16th August saw two performances of 'At the Going Down of the Sun', a documentary/play/musical written by Jim Race, depicting the life of his Dad, Captain Jack Race M.B.E of the 6th Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment, along with those of fellow serving men, Captain Hugh Pilkington and Private Richard Wing also of the 6th Battalion, Lance Corporal Cyril Bix and Private Bert Grimes of the 5th Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment and Private Horace Chilvers of the 4th Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment.

The storyline follows Jack from the time he transferred from the 1st Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment, on his return from 11 years overseas mainly in India, to the 5th Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment, based around Weybourne, North Norfolk and the time training the new recruits.

Woven into the story are the respective partners of the men, who were left at home with no idea if their loved ones were still alive at the fall of Singapore on 15th February 1942, being May, Phyllis, Joice, Daisy, Rotha and Ruby respectively.

The men captured at Singapore then had to endure over 3½ years of harsh captivity at the hands of the Imperial Japanese Army (IJA), finding themselves forced to work on the infamous Thai/Burma Railway, on starvation rations making them

vulnerable to many tropical diseases as they laboured up to 18 hours a day doing heavy manual work, whilst under the constant threat of beatings and torture meted out by their sadistic captors. Saved by the use of the two atomic bombs dropped on Japan, those Far East Prisoners of War (FEPOW), who survived captivity, returned to their loved ones back in England but they were seriously under-weight, Jack himself weighing only 7 stone, and many continued to suffer from the tropical diseases contracted as well as recurring nightmares of the treatment they had suffered.

The play, narrated by Jim, was greatly received, with standing ovations to both performances, many of the audience brought to tears by the emotional portrayals of the real life characters by the following actors, Gary Pearce as Jack, Becca Whybrow as May, Peter Everingham as Hugh, Amanda Buckingham as Phyllis, Mark Collins as Richard, Izzy Parr as Joice, Kevin Partyka as Cyril, Jemma Greef as Daisy, Levvis Dallison as Bert, Rachel Fletcher as Rotha, Ryan Chilvers as his actual Great Grandad, Horace and Lauren Matthews as Ruby. A very convincing performance was given by Archie King as the Japanese soldier and also guard. Also, special mention to young Prim for her excellent portrayal of Jack and May's first born child, Joan, aged $3\frac{1}{2}$ years old, at Jack's return in October 1945.

Thank you also to Barry Shaw, Stage Manager, Sandra Lester, Prompt and the Front of House team, led by Janet Race, of Janet Kendal, Val Minns and Michael Minns, along with Programme sellers Janice Curtis and Jeannie Tooley.

A big thank you to Dave Curtis up in the sound and light box, ensuring everything ran smoothly, assisted by Martyn Fuller.

As the following day's exhibition needed the hall floor to be completely cleared of all the tiered seating etc, Jim would like his thanks passed on to all those who stayed after the last performance to help this come about.

The 'Royal Norfolk Regiment at War 1939-1945' exhibition on Sunday 17th August ran from 10am to 4pm and had over 200 people through the door. They were able to read about all the Battalions of the Royal Norfolk Regiment that saw action between 1939 and 1945, as well as meet with relatives of actual men who served, discussing the items and facts they had personally provided.

Thank you to Janice Curtis, whose cakes baked specially for the day made £400. Many enjoyed these along with a tea or coffee, giving them the opportunity to reflect on what they had just read or heard first hand.

Jim owes a big thank you to wife Janet, along with daughters Joanne and Julia, son-in-laws Stephen and Mark and Granddaughters Sophia and Freya for their unstinting help throughout the day. Also thank you to Janet Kendal who ran the raffle. Thank you to Dave Curtis, who printed out all the display information sheets, also a big thank you to Linda Nudds for the loan of her professional display boards (which Linda is currently offering for sale).

'At the Going Down of the Sun' and the 'Royal Norfolk's at War 1939-45' events were both fundraising events and a total of £4,000 was made which has been allocated as follows: To Children of Far East Prisoners of War (COFEPOW) based at the National Memorial Arboretum in Burton on Trent the sum of £2,000; to the FEPOW Family, a charity dedicated to keeping the memory of former prisoners alive and based in Oulton Broad, the sum of £1,500 and the final £500 sent to the Royal Norfolk Regimental Museum in Norwich.

A final very big thank you is owed to Heacham Youth and Community Trust for their very generous donation ensuring these events were able to take place.

"I do Like to be Beside the Seaside" Part 2

To most Britons the words 'beach' or 'seaside' conjures up the idea of leisure or holidays and on this island no one is further than about 70 miles from the sea. By Victorian times, despite supposed concerns about modesty, sea bathing was popular with 'ordinary' families and, with the rapid growth of a railway system, families could escape from industrial towns and cities for a comparatively cheap day at the seaside. In modern parlance Henry le Strange was certainly 'on trend' or, in fact, 'ahead of the game' when he envisaged and began to establish the brand new seaside town of Hunstanton St Edmunds.


Heacham as a long-established village neighbour would never compete although the le Strange family claimed control of the foreshore and owned large areas of land. Certainly, it would never boast of a pier as its neighbour could in 1870. When in 1862 the railway brought increasing numbers of day trippers and holidaymakers to Hunstanton they passed through large tracts of empty – if rather marshy – land within sight of the sea at Heacham. Some passengers may well have considered the appeal of a quieter spot for a seaside break. There would be those villagers who held Queen Victoria indirectly responsible for putting Heacham on the visitors' map. In common with towns and villages across the country, across the Empire, Heacham in 1887 wished to mark her fifty years on the throne with something concrete. In fact, not just concrete but iron made by Savage's of King's Lynn was decided upon, not a carousel for which the company was famous but a bridge to be named the Jubilee Bridge. (The original has since been replaced). Once the river was no longer an obstacle and attention given to the state of the road leading to it, the village's north beach was more readily accessible to visitors and 'the season' became a feature.





About the time that Henry le Strange's hotel was being built, the Heacham beach area regularly hosted a colourful Romany gipsy encampment. These visitors were accepted to the extent that a couple of the Neville-Rolfe girls would eagerly anticipate their arrival to spend time with them, encourage them to attend the church for their babies to be christened and choose rather fanciful names for them. Perhaps it was their example that stimulated others to imitate their lifestyle in a modified short-term way. It is not possible to discover when the first 'holiday homes' were established close to the Heacham beaches. Over the decades a real miscellany of accommodation types grew. By the time a century had passed since the pitching of Romany tents there were camps consisting of tents, caravans ranging from old traditional gipsy caravans and 'modern' varieties to retired buses, ambulances and railway carriages plus purpose-built chalets. Owners of land close to the beach could see the potential of letting it out to holidaymakers and so not only campsites for tents but holiday camps were born! There will be those in the village who remember Jennings, Raines, Plumb's, Beecham's/Brown's at a time before the tidy ranks of large sleek static caravans/holiday homes. (It would be interesting to read of their memories...)

On the top of the steep shingle bank itself beach day huts were built. When they first appeared is not clear, although the erection of the Jubilee Bridge would certainly have been a factor. At the very beginning of the twentieth century the parish council had leased the beach from the le Strange estate and clearly had attempted to lay down some rules about these huts and there were debates about them and, particularly whether 'sleeping huts' should be allowed. In addition to worries that the right of way to the beach could be at risk, the chief concern was the lack of adequate sanitary arrangements. The Sanitary Inspector stated that he had more problems with the huts than with some villages



- and that's saying something at this time! Docking Rural District Council were discussing a similar problem relating to South Beach decades later in 1949.

The parish council employed a Beach Officer to keep an eye on what was happening on the beach including and, importantly, to collect rents. The post still existed in the 1930s; initially he was issued with a cap to identify his role but it was decided in 1933 that if his hat was stolen he would lose that authority and he should wear a uniform! The early days of villagers like William Woodbine hiring out 'bathing machines' thus allowing those brave enough to venture into the water to maintain some modesty had developed to include lines of beach huts and then a variety of bungalows. There were also two beach shelters and a public bathing shed open in 'the season' to encourage visitors to the beach even in the erratic weather conditions of East Anglia. It seems Mr Woodbine was also one of the earliest beach café proprietors with Mrs Garwood, his daughter taking over the refreshment business.

A scan of the census record of 1901 lists four 'lodging/boarding housekeepers' in Heacham and 47 in its more famous neighbour. Heacham could boast of one form of accommodation not shared or surpassed by Hunstanton. When Joseph Drew retired from coastal trade based in Lynn, he also retired his boat 'Leader' and moored it on the river by the Heacham harbour he knew so well. As a retirement bolthole he added a superstructure to it and converted it to be a houseboat. Captain' Drew's idea caught on and by 1924, an article about sewage pollution of the river pointed the finger at the 13 houseboats, many of which were rented out in 'the season.' Another article in 1949 mentions 'more than a score.' By that time access to the harbour from the sea and vice versa was impossible. In August 1931 the North Norfolk Rivers Catchment Board invited tenders to build a culvert and the river was then blocked by a dam with a sluice controlling water flow. In January



1933 the stretch of water briefly became a popular venue for ice-skaters from the village and further afield.

Summer visitors to the beach could, over the years, find other attractions in addition to tea and ice-cream from the cafés. Agreement was reached for The Heacham Band to give concerts on the beach in the 30s and the vicar led Sunday services on South Beach in the summer months of 1933. !n 1929 consent was given to Mr Grief to provide donkey rides on the beach and again in 1976, donkey and deckchair concessions were invited. In addition to sharing with me his memories of the beach and Beecham's Holiday Camp, Malcolm Diggins also shared a photograph of himself in the 50s astride a pony belonging to Mr Saunders of Hunstanton. His collection of beach and camp postcards and photographs at www.heachamheritage.co.uk is well worth an armchair seaside visit. There must be others in the village who could share their memories of long days spent on the beach, in the sea and on the river with a basic picnic or possibly cooking cockles and winkles on a Primus in the family beach hut.

During the last war, in common with the rest of the coastline, access to the beach was strictly limited and there were local unauthorised beachgoers who were fined. The threat of invasion led to the introduction of a variety of defences and it wasn't until

May 1946 that it was announced that barbed wire was being removed by German prisoners of war. The 'pill boxes' were rather more permanent and remain.

At the risk of overstretching patience and space and intentionally omitting reference to sea defences and floods until another time, perhaps a few more words...

The le Strange ownership of the beach and some of the conflicts between users and owners has been mentioned. Heacham parish council leased the beach but the Old Hunstanton estate did not renew the lease and took back control in 1935. The owners recognised a revenue source with the rising popularity of motor transport to the beach and introduced a parking charge of 6d. The parish council had not charged but were concerned with the loss of rents which had provided for street lighting, the fire brigade and other services; household rates would have to be increased. In 1945, the bungalow owners were faced with demands on them to sign over their property leased originally from the parish council to the Estate or remove them – resulting in a High Court action. In 1947, beach hut rents were raised to 10/- per annum.

In 1953 – just before the flood – it was announced that a private buyer had purchased the beach and with it the sites of 302 beach huts and four cafés. Nearly all of these were cleared from the site in one fell swoop by the sea, providing the owner a blank canvas. The owners of any surviving houseboats, now aground, were faced with a threefold rise in ground rent. A little while later, there was a rumour amongst the owners of newly built beach huts that their rents were to rise from £3 to £5 but the owner declared the fear was groundless.

In 1966, Docking Rural District Council considered buying the freehold but the site with 400 day huts, 2 car parks, 2 cafés and a licensed club was purchased by another private buyer. It was in 1974 that West Norfolk Council spent £39,500 to purchase the beach site. Now, in 2025, the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk attempted to iron out 'anomalies' in its car parking charges by making significant rise in charges for Heacham residents and a month later beach hut owners learned of a £200 rise in annual rent since 2022.

The sea - and whatever it contains - will presumably continue to lap or storm against the shoreline somewhere near Heacham for the foreseeable future. Families' ideas of what constitutes a day or holiday by the sea have certainly changed since the Jubilee Bridge was built. What the future for Heacham beaches is for residents and visitors remains to be seen.

The Arts Society North West Norfolk The Passion of the Art Collector

Staring at great art can stimulate the brain to the levels of when we fall in love. We may just buy

for decorative purposes; we may be invested in a visual story, essentially a part of the artist's life and experience that inspired the creation of the work. We buy art that reflects our own heritage from artists that may have similar backgrounds to our own. When we collect a limited edition of a well-known artist, we may be claiming a right to some of the artist's history.

Art collecting can be used to communicate identity, status and cultural sophistication. Passionate art collectors often have general personality traits, often people very open to experience, with a range of interests, curiosity and a real concern and appreciation for beauty. They may be driven to the desire to explore and understand. They tend to be conscientious individuals who research, curate and maintain their collections methodically.

Collections often depend on whether the individual is an extrovert or an introvert. Some like the community with other dedicated collectors, attending openings and art auctions. Getting together with fellow enthusiasts to discuss the artists, artistic styles and what's new can play a major role in how collections are developed. They are often skilled researchers - they know who owns what, and to find something previously undiscovered can be an incomparable thrill. Not all collectors are just out to maximise profits or avoid paying taxes. An introvert collector may get their satisfaction through a more private relationship with art, just to own, to gaze and to appreciate.

Collectors and dealers play important roles in the art market. They pay close attention to all market changes and, if they are a major collector/dealer, they will be aware of all the new things needed to stay a leader and not to be overtaken by another. Their knowledge and influence can decide whether an artist will have a place in the market and the value of the art. The collector's support and influence have a role in determining the artist's future.

".... the true collector's only home is his own museum." (Orhan Pamuk.) Great collectors can be very secretive about their artworks, but some are very collaborative and have a desire to share their collections through public exhibitions and loans to museums. François Pinault, the French billionaire, who is quoted saying, "The desire to possess – born at the moment I first came into contact with art – has been transformed into a profound need to share." Museums have been major beneficiaries of some of the world's prestigious art collections and some of the most modest. Many collections in American museums have been gifts from private donors. Recently, contemporary artworks have been bought in such large quantities by the super-rich that new private museums are being built. Rather than just leave their extensive collections in storage they are choosing to share them with the public in these new 'ego-seums'. They may have narcissistic traits for recognition and admiration through their collections. Art collections can become a status symbol and a means of social differentiation, a demonstration of power, privilege and cultural sophistication. A collector's personality will shape their approach to collecting and each approach will be as unique as their personality.

DUCKS


