Safety Concerns at Zebra Crossing on the approach to Boots Chemist (Station Road)

I am writing with grave concern about the safety of the zebra crossing between the junctions of Poplar Avenue/Neville Road and the small shop units including Boots the Chemist on Station Road.

The Zebra crossing can't be very visible to many drivers because drivers time and time again fail to stop coming either way.

It is an extremely dangerous crossing point for as long as I can remember. A simple observance of the area or attempt to cross will highlight this issue to anyone. It's almost every single car! They just want to zoom through, many going over 30mph. Additionally, drivers appear distracted by the opposing junction (which is also a dangerous point) or so focused on getting a parking space outside the shops? Either way drivers seem to treat this crossing as purely optional at danger to life of all ages.

Whilst pedestrians must wait and give time for drivers to see them, this doesn't work at this junction if the drivers are going too fast and don't even look at you, pedestrians seem to be invisible to drivers at this point

I have resolved to taking down numberplates each time and reporting to police, have reported the problem to the Norfolk Council Highways and have emailed Heacham Parish Council and James Wild MP, but I wonder what else can be done to increase awareness and safety of pedestrians at this point in the village? Does the road need to reduce speed as well?

Drivers can be reminded of the rules of zebra crossings (look in the Highway Code). They are there to assist people to cross in high traffic areas where crossing would otherwise be impossible/dangerous.

The Heacham Hyphen

I read Eric Rhodes' The Heacham Hyphen article (THN Nov 2025) with much interest as I too am researching along a certain path regarding these particular Rolfes, namely Edmund(iv) and his wife Catherine Frances, nee Biscoe, who in July/August 1819 went on a round route of England to Oxford, Painswick and Tunstall (Lancs), calling upon family, friends and acquaintances. This following a devastating thunderstorm that had taken place on Monday evening of 5th July when lightning struck the tower of Sedgeford Church, blowing a metre square hole in the vestry wall where a bible reading class was being held. In the subsequent panic and aftermath, the body of 14 year old Susan Nobes was found behind the vestry door, killed, supposedly by the 'liquid electricity' or falling masonry depending on the story told. Catherine Rolfe was a witness to all that occurred, the story of which was subsequently the subject of a religious tract published by The Religious Tract Society a couple of months later. That, as they say, is another story, but the point is, that I too have become quite familiar with the Rolfe family of this period, but not wishing to tread on any toes I would like to take the opportunity to refine one or two points for clarity:

There was indeed a string of 4 consecutive Edmund Rolfes from 1649 to 1836 and understandably at times, it can get confusing as to which Edmund one is dealing with. In this instance it is Edmund(iii) (1738-1817) we are primarily dealing with; he was the son of Edmund(ii) (1700-1774) and the father of Edmund(iv) (1766-1836). It was Edmund(ii) who despatched Edmund(iii) off on his Grand Tour in April 1759 who then, not soon after, fell in with one Julia de Martino of Lausanne, Switzerland and thereby had a son who was born in December 1760 at Villa Nuova, 50 miles south of Turin, Italy. He was named Charles Nevill, after New Villa, the anglicisation of the place where he was born. Edmund(iii) continued alone on his Grand Tour and returned to Norfolk, England, in the spring of 1762. Two years later he married Dorothy Ffolkes of Hillington and they had 2 children: Dorothy (Dolly) in 1765 and Edmund(iv) in 1766.

In 1764/5, aged 5, Charles Nevill's mother Julia, now Madame F. Six, accepted £900 to give up custody of the child and brought Charles to England where he would, in time, join the family in Heacham to be brought up with his half-siblings. Charles married Anne Colden Williamson and they had two children, Anne and Strickland Charles Edward Neville (the 'e' got added later). Dolly and Edmund(iv) married young, but neither would go on to have issue. Dolly died in 1807, and with Charles being the illegitimate older son, who could not inherit the estates, that would fall to Edmund(iv). Edmund(iii) in a letter to his son wrote: 'My Dear Charles - I have always told you that I had it not in my power to be of any essential service to you in pecuniary concerns. My poor deceased daughter was most truly attached to you and I believe Edmund to be the same. Should he die without children, he knows that it was his sister's wish as well as mine that you should inherit the Estate, taking the Name and Arms of our Family.' It was an amende honorable for Charles' illegitimacy. And so it came to pass that Edmund(iv) inherited the Estates in 1817; Charles suffered a paralytic stroke in 1828. Edmund(iv) died in 1836

with his wife Catherine and brother Charles passing the following year. Thus, the Estates then came to Charles' son, Strickland who, by Royal Licence, took the Name and Arms of the Rolfe family and thus became Strickland Charles Edward Neville-Rolfe.

My apologies if I have repeated some of what had already been put forward. Much of the above information was gleaned (some of it verbatim) from the Rolfe Family Record Vol II (R.T & A. Gunther 1914) and Vols I & III (A.E.Gunther 1962); and The Rolfe Papers: A Chronicle of a Norfolk Family (Veronica Berry 1979). As regards the family legend of Pocohontas, I am minded of Gunther's written word in 1962: 'But between the issue of the romantic marriage of John Rolfe with Pocohontas and with the Rolfes' of Heacham of the present day there is no connection.'

Heacham in Bloom


The team held a busy meeting in November to discuss and agree a colour scheme and plants for Summer 2026. We also planned to add a few festive touches


WHAT'S HAPPENING IN DECEMBER AND JANUARY







The Heacham Hyphen

For those who had sleepless nights in November wondering what happened to the Reverend Neville-Rolfe, here is the final paragraph that went adrift:-

Although most of the Heacham Rolfes were buried in the church, Strickland had a family vault prepared on the north side of the building and was buried there after his unexpected death in bed on Christmas Eve/morning 1852. His curate conducted the funeral (and appears to have officiated at all baptisms, marriages and funerals.) Strickland's son and heir Charles Fawcett Neville-Rolfe also had a large family and it was his son Eustace who gave to the church the Rolfe Acre, in a corner of which are buried many of Strickland's Neville-Rolfe descendants. Eustace however, was buried in Naples.

Borough Council News Heacham Ward which includes Sedgeford and Fring

Merry Christmas to you all. The month ended with news that an offer has been made for resident parking at Heacham Beach car parks. There will be one hour's free parking. This meets the concession negotiated by a resident and well done to her. There is a caveat; a no return window of three hours. It will also take another 3-4 months to take effect as the Borough Council continues to insist that software has to be changed (the concession was 'made' last July).

The facts that parking charges are too high overall and that the winter season of free parking remains cancelled, still seem to have been forgotten. A meeting to discuss these matters has still to be convened though the cabinet member originally asked to attend has resigned his position. I will continue to pursue the matter.

Sedgeford's Parish Council perseverance, over several years, of issues relating to the Heacham River is paying off. Anglian Water has confirmed that improvements to the river within the Sedgeford boundary will be made from 2025-2030 funding, with investigatory work commencing soon. A report on that will be coming in around 6 months. The intention is to improve river flow and mitigate against it drying out in the summer. The big issue of why there is less water flowing from the aquifer is still an open question.

Back to Heacham. At the time of writing, a new traffic diversion or roadworks seems to pop up several times each week. I don't get any advance notice of these and neither I nor the Parish Council are asked about diversion routes or notices. We have to put up with them too, but please tell me /us if particular difficulties arise.

Several planning applications are dragging on. Delays are due to inadequate, sometimes incorrect, information provided on the application forms or lack of appropriate consultations for criteria associated with the application. Planning officers pick up on some of these errors and I pick up on any local matters they miss. I recommend that any planning applicants ensure that their agent complete the application form completely and correctly and, if your application is not simple, seek pre-application advice from the Borough. It will have to be paid for but will speed up the process. If your application has the potential to annoy people, then meet with the Parish Council to discuss your intentions. You may find that the contentious issues, after discussion, can be mitigated.

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The Borough Council's housing development, Florence Fields in Lynn, has a mixed tenure of market sales, rent, and affordable homes. It is now recommended that the proportions in the mix will change and more rented accommodation and affordable housing will be provided. This is good news as it should encourage more locals to take up residence in these excellent, efficient, houses and ensure that they are used rather than lying dormant racking up costs to the council.

There has been more interest shown in Styleman Court flats so it remains to be seen whether this expensive development breaks even for the Council. It will an outrage if a high proportion end up as holiday flats.

At an interesting meeting of Norfolk Rivers Internal Drainage Board (IDB), environmental matters were raised and the importance of IDBs in controlling invasive species like Floating Pennywort underlined. There was also concern raised at the pressure to licence the release of beavers and the need to ensure proper, local, consultation.

Future funding of IDBs, following local government reorganisation, was a worry with unconfirmed reports that the government might make radical changes. On a personal note, though a large proportion of Council Tax goes to pay the IDB bill, that they do very good, essential, work I do not doubt. Councils adversely affected by the costs want it to be met by central government funds.

At a joint panel set up to debate recommendations for a change in the way Council scrutiny is managed, it was unanimously decided to leave things as they are; the current three scrutiny panels that handle different aspects of the Council's work. Reasons for doing so included forthcoming local government reorganisation - why meddle with a system that functions now when it will be all change come the unitary council.

The meeting of my scrutiny panel, Regeneration and Development, had two substantial items on its agenda, the King's Lynn Masterplan, and a presentation by Anglian Water.

The Masterplan is a coming together of old and new initiatives which have been in and out of the pipeline for some years. Consultants have so far cost between £200,000 and £300,000 which is small beer compared to some projects. However, what is intended to be done is good and the strategy to ensure all plans pass the planning stage is commendable. As funding allows, for example from any share of the devolution pot, work should actually be done rather than talked about for another few years. Meanwhile, public consultation continues.



A small point, my recommendation that the term 'wayfinding infrastructure' should be replaced by 'signposts' was agreed.

The Anglian Water presentation was informative as it was revealed that there was now closer cooperation between them and planning officers. The latter had been miffed when AW announced, earlier this year, that they would be objecting to all proposed new developments in areas where sewage infrastructure was or would be at capacity (for example, Heacham Waste Water Treatment Works).

This stance conflicts with government driven necessity to build ever more houses. Co-operation between officers and AW will seek to mitigate the impact where possible and ensure the development of the next Local Plan is linked to AW's asset management. Officers could ignore AW's current problems as the water company is a non-statutory consultee, that is, their recommendations can be ignored. In law, water companies must connect developments to sewage pipes and water supply pipes whether their infrastructure can cope or not. Officers are most unlikely to go down that daft line and I will monitor the situation in my patch. Whilst there can be too much sewage, the opposite is true for drinking water. This is a dry region and last summer made it drier, reducing levels in aquifers and rivers from which water is extracted. Anglian Water has to prioritise domestic supply and has no obligation to provide water to businesses and farms. This area doubles its population in the summer when rain water is minimal

and crops are growing. New water supplies are needed now and new development should, logically, await new pipe lines and reservoirs. And all new development should have rain water storage and 'grey water' use for flushing toilets etc.

A pipeline and reservoir are in hand but if and when they are completed, they will likely benefit the area towards Cambridge more than us. They will also have to provide for an ever-increasing population and rely on rainfall elsewhere which cannot be guaranteed. Water rationing in England? If you still have one, keep your cold water storage tank whatever heating system you adopt.

Having said all that, it's a long time since I built a snowman. Perhaps this winter? Happy New Year.

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


Merry Christmas to you all. The season has come around again; it always will as the Earth orbits the Sun. On the 21st, at 3.03pm, the Sun is as far south in our sky as it will get this year. It is the Winter Solstice, the shortest day and longest night and the time of magic and mystery for millennia as people encouraged the Sun's warmth to come back and life to renew in the land. Both the Greeks and Romans added feasting and fun. Sounds like Christmas.



Why we are in the dark

I didn't see much of the night sky last month. When clear enough, Jupiter was shining brightly in the NE and, this month, it will do so earlier in the evening. The gas giant rises around 6pm and is a bright magnitude minus 2.6. Start looking from around 7pm. It's the



If you have powerful binoculars, a birding 'scope, or a telescope, point them at Jupiter and find the four Galilean moons. Ganymede, Callisto, Io and Europa. The Europa Clipper is on its way to that icy moon to seek the possibility of life, but not as we know it. The Clipper was launched in 2024 and will arrive in 2030.

I only saw last month's supermoon through thin cloud, and that was on the 6th Nov, the night after the 'event.' On the 4th December there is another supermoon, the third and last this year. It's a tad less super than its November apparition being 239km further away at 357,219km. So, a very miniscule tad. The time of minimum distance is around 11pm but catch it as it rises because an optical illusion will make it seem bigger the closer it is to the horizon.

Sticking with the Moon. On the 6th, Jupiter is below it and the stars Castor and Pollux to the left. On the 7th, Jupiter is just to the right of the Moon and Pollux and Castor are above it.

On the 9th, the star Regulus is left of the Moon.

On the 13th, before the Moon rises, the Geminid Meteor shower should light up the sky. Bits falling off the chariot of Phaethon are responsible or, at least from an asteroid, lump of rock, named after the son of Helios, the sun god. A typical teenager, Phaethon ignored advice and flew too close to and too far from the Earth



both burning and freezing it. This, apparently, caused deserts and the frozen lands. This annoyed the stars and Zeus zapped Phaethon with a lightning bolt.

Anyway, wrap up, get your eyes accustomed to the dark, and take a look as late as you can. It would be seasonal to have a hot mince pie and mulled wine after your astronomical effort.


On the 17th get up before dawn, 6.45am, and look SE. A crescent Moon will be to the right and equidistant to the left Mercury will be a shining spark close to the horizon so a difficult location for most of us. Do not use optical instruments as the Sun will pop up. More on Mercury below.

Boxing Day. Hope for a clear sky and take yourself outside, see the crescent Moon, go left of it and find the ringed planet Saturn, a wonder in a birding or small telescope. The ringed planet has 274 moons and a small telescope on a clear night might see the spark of reflected light from one of them, Titan. This moon is bigger than the planet Mercury and was discovered in 1655 by Huygens using a telescope with a lens just over 2 inches wide. A few years later Cassini discovered four more, Tethys, Dione, Rhea and Iapetus. Cassini also discovered the division in the ring system which is named after him and NASA's major exploration of Saturn was the Cassini mission of 2004.

William Herschel, discoverer of the planet Uranus, found the moons named Mimas and Enceladus. The latter is a prime contender in the search for extra-terrestrial life so, one day, Herschel may have a microbe named after him. The names of the moons were suggested in 1847 by John Herschel, son of William, so, maybe, two different microbes will be needed. (Ephemera, John did many things scientific and he invented the blueprint.)

I have mentioned Mercury twice already and there is a good opportunity for you to view the planet in the first half of December. It rises low in the SE at 6am and is shining with a

magnitude of minus 0.6. It will appear as a bright spark. On the 7th it is at its most distant western elongation from the Sun. In other words, it's quite far to the left of the Sun's rising disc so will stand out more against the darker sky.

Three spacecraft have been sent to Mercury: Mariner 10 in 1973 which made three flybys over two years; Messenger in 2008 which made three flybys and then orbited until 2015; and Bepi Columbo launched in 2018 which flew by Mercury 6 times and will arrive in orbit in one year. It is a European Space agency mission in co-operation with the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency. It consists of two probes which will orbit Mercury separately.

The stars Castor and Pollux were mentioned earlier. They are the heads of the twins in the constellation of Gemini; Castor is higher in the sky and lies at a distance of 51 light years whilst Pollux is 34 ly distant. One way of locating them is via Orion; draw a line from Rigel, bottom right of the hunter, through Betelgeuse, top left. Carry on until you find two bright stars close together and voila!



Castor is yellowish and Pollux orangish, technical terms which need good eyes even with a telescope. What will be revealed is that Castor is not a single star. A telescope will easily reveal two, possibly three, though the third is faint. Sophisticated analysis shows that each of the three is two, so Castor is a multiple system of 6 stars. They are a mixture of several bigger and brighter than the Sun and several smaller and much dimmer.

Pollux is a single star, 9 times bigger and twice as massive as the Sun. It has a very large gas giant planet orbiting it. Pollux is 7.6 billion years old, 3 billion years older than our Sun so it has had time to expand and cool into a red giant. Perhaps a civilisation existed around it once.

The New Year, 2026!

The Moon starts with another super one on the 3rd with Jupiter shining just below it too. And that date is also when Earth is at perihelion, its closest point to the Sun, 147 million kilometres away. New readers may need reminding that no astronomical body orbits anything in a circle, all follow ellipses and the Earth is no different. Fortunately, its ellipse is nearly circular, otherwise our climate would alter dramatically. The Earth's aphelion, furthest, distance from the Sun is 152 million kilometres which occurs on 21st June. Yes, that's right, in the northern hemisphere we are closest to the Sun in the winter and furthest in the summer.



A little exaggerated.

Jupiter is the planet of the month as its orbit and Earth's brings the planet as close as it will get on the 9th. It will be just 633 million km away and shining at a magnitude of a bright minus 2.7 (negative magnitudes are bright, positive ones dim). On the 10th, Jupiter will be exactly opposite to the Sun in the sky so all its surface will be reflecting light back towards us, the same way a Full Moon does.



On the right of Jupiter, Io, Europa and Ganymede. Near the left edge, Callisto. These dots are what you might see through good binoculars. On the dates given below, Callisto will be to the right of Ganymede.





This is a good time to turn binoculars and telescopes towards the gas giant to spot the four Galilean moons. They orbit Jupiter at different speeds which can be noticed over several hours. Sometimes, from our perspective, one or more moons will be behind Jupiter. However, on the 15th at 6pm and on the 29th at 9pm, the four moons will be strung out in order. From Jupiter, Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. Our Moon is once again just over Jupiter on the 30th/31st.

In the SW you can find much dimmer Saturn. Its magnitude is +1 and the ringed planet will set at 10pm. On the 22nd, Saturn is just to the left and above the Crescent Moon, whilst, on the 23rd it is just below it.

There is another meteor shower on the night of the 3rd/4th, the Quadrantids. However, light from the bright supermoon will drown out all but the brightest meteors.

With more than 30 raffle prizes generously donated by stallholders and local businesses, the event proved to be a great success for both shoppers and traders alike.


All proceeds from the market were donated to The Firefighters Charity, recognising and supporting their invaluable work within the local community.



CHRISTMAS SELECTION BOX

As a boy, I was lucky enough for Christmas to mean a pillowcase rather than a stocking to accommodate a couple of gifts I would later learn came from more affluent relatives rather than Santa, a new coin and, in the days before supermarkets invented 'easy peelers', a tangerine. A regular addition would be a selection box with its variety of bars and tubes. The adults might be treated to a Christmas box of chocolates, which was normally a standard box of chocolates with a decorative slip cover with a 'chocolate box picture' of a country garden and thatched cottage or an equally quaint or festive scene. My grandmother was partially sighted and could not read the key to fillings that was provided but I knew the ones with the depression from a thumb were to be avoided. Like her, I was not a fan of the soft-centred orange or strawberry cremes! In researching topics for articles printed over the months I have amassed a collection of oddments that were not included or were pruned and so, for this issue, a selection box - with hard and soft centres:

A long, narrow box of dates was an exotic Christmas treat. One date of significance in Heacham was June 20th when the annual Heacham Fair used to be held. There are references to it throughout the 19th century and at the beginning of the twentieth with any changes or restrictions detailed by the Lord of the Manor (not the Rolfe's but the Styleman/le Strange's) or vicar and churchwardens.

After submission of a variety of designs, the village sign was unveiled in 1958. It was designed by Robert Platten who enjoyed a variety of talents and challenges, including crossing the English Channel in a variety of ways including in a barrel, on an iron bedstead and on a giant gin bottle! The sign was paid for by public subscription following the opening in 1956 of the A149 by-pass which some traders blamed at the time for a decline in trade.



The village name tended to be written as Hitcham in the 18th century. This may have been 'official' or merely reflect pronunciation; it was also referred to as a town. At the time of land enclosure when village roads and tracks were defined there is reference to 'China Hill.' With an absence of village hills, was this Cheney Hill or merely a misspelling? 'Staithe' was a new word for me until I came to Norfolk (and before I visited Staithes in Yorkshire.) Another delightful addition to my vocabulary was 'pightle' when I came across it as a Ringstead address. I rather regretted that there wasn't one in Heacham but recently discovered that a description of Martin Davy's land holdings around Heacham Lodge included several! (A pightle was a small piece of enclosed land.)

Whilst on the subject of place names, the Leech Pits and Leech Pit cottages are referred to in early records. It seems as though they were where the Recreation Ground is now or possibly between there and the station to the left of Station Road. Leeches were probably considered of nuisance value for drinking livestock rather than being used for medicinal use, although the 'bleeding' of patients was still a practice in the 18th and 19th centuries. A rather surprising reference is made in the overseers' records for 1768 for payment for an inoculation. It would be another decade before Edward Jenner's discovery made vaccination against smallpox a somewhat safer option. Smallpox, typhoid, scarlet fever and diphtheria were amongst quite common dangerous diseases. From 1893 patients could be removed to the Isolation Hospital built on Redgate Hill.

I do wonder though whether the spelling of the pits should read 'leach' as it does sometimes appear in records. This could refer to drainage in this low-lying area; there once were a dozen cottages with Leech/Leach Pits as their address. The origin of the name Pound Lane is more certain, deriving from the site where stray live farm stock could be secured until the owner claimed them back for a fee. However, it seems to have been known as Cage Lane at one time and I had assumed this was a reference to securing the animals. It was a surprise to discover that in 1831 'it was resolved that a cage should be erected', the purpose of which seems to have been for a village 'lock-up' for two-legged parishioners and was also used as a mortuary.

Not everyone would merit a memorial stone or plaque inside the church or, indeed, a headstone outside. The accounts of the overseers responsible for the parish poor show the final costs of caring for them. A 1712 entry: 'Wido Seeker Burd. To grave making and bell ringin 2 shill, ye bearers pd. Them 2 shill, ye nurse for keeping her 3 shill, ye winder and laying her out 1 shill, ye Minister for bearing (burying) her 1 shill.' Two years later there is the first mention of a 'coorfen' used for burial of the poor and also an affidavitt' for 'Wid. Large, charge offe hare funrill.'

Records were produced by those who were Norfolk born and bred and spelling tends to reflect the accent! Until 1815, it was still law that only wool should be used for a burial shroud and the 'affidavit' was a document signed, often with just a cross, by the person who might not have been able to write their name but would prepare the deceased for burial.

Within the church, the lantern now in the small side chapel was designed by Eustace Neville-Rolfe and features a catch modelled on



his daughter's pet rat she called St Dovey; he also brought from Italy the brass lamps hanging from the arches. His father Strickland had had a balcony built to the left of the main door across the large west window. In the Sheepscombe church he had built, parishioners could have their own seat on its balcony for five shillings a year. On the Heacham balcony there was a barrel organ with a repertoire of just twenty-four tunes to which all hymns and psalms were sung. In 1801 the vicar received a letter from Horatio Nelson with a positive response to his request to use his influence to obtain commissions for his sons – one in the Navy and one, the Marines.

The village once had more ale houses than now and these were often known by the names of the proprietors rather than a 'pub' name. Some were regularly used for auctions, inquests and 'official' meetings. The cost of drinks at meetings held at 'Marlon Whisker's' appears regularly in the accounts as expenses. When pub names appear in records, it is clear that, in addition to those we know – or remember - there was once a 'Ship' and an 'Engineers' Arms.' The original 'Wheatsheaf' on the site of its replacement (now Tesco Express) may of course have owed its name to its rural address or may have been chosen as a wheatsheaf was a crest on the 'coat of arms' of the Rolfes. Strickland was peeved that he was not permitted to use it on the arms of the Neville-Rolfes. The 'Bushel and Strike' (close to where it is now) was adjacent to a malthouse and a bushel was a regular measure of grain such as barley. In 1871 the 'Fox and Hounds' appears in the census record as the 'Harp and Crown.'

Not all villagers remained in Heacham. The 'Penelope' sailed in 1836 from Lynn to Quebec with 23 Heacham residents on board and in 1841 three Heacham brothers left these shores on the 'Duncan' and sailed on a four month voyage to Van Diemen's Land as Tasmania was then known. In 1906 the passenger list of the 'Dominion' included a one-time resident of Heacham. The Heacham parish overseers responsible for support of the parish poor in 1836 had decided it was a financially sound proposition to pay the fares of £5 15sh 0d per adult and £2 17sh 6d per child and send a number of families to Canada. The 'Duncan' was a convict ship and the Newton brothers had been sentenced to 15 years' transportation for sheep stealing. (The death penalty for that crime was abolished less than a decade earlier.) Victor Menghetti was one of thousands of 'British Home Children' sent out to begin a new life in Canada having, in his case, been born in London a 'pauper child', and 'boarded out' in Heacham. He left his sister here, sailed away and, when war broke out, joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force and returned to Europe to be killed on the Somme.

Now, I must write a note to Santa.



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Learn Art - Focus on Play

A while back I got to thinking about quotes that I read while studying fine art at uni, mostly by Pablo Picasso and Paul Klee, all to do with art and play. Unfortunately, all my art history books are in storage so I had to ask Google. The closest Picasso quote I found was, "Every child is an artist. The problem is how to remain an artist once he grows up." That sort of fits if we think that children play, but it wasn't quite what I was looking for.

Then, a couple of weeks ago I visited the Grayson Perry exhibition at the Wallace Collection. There it was, "Playfulness is at the heart of being an artist. There is no right way to make art, you just have to play around and see what comes out." Sir Grayson Perry.

It's exactly this idea that I wanted to explore. By not trying too hard to get everything right, you open the door to exploring your own creativity.

For me, being an artist means to try new things all the time; I don't want to sit still and do the same thing over and over again. With every new sculpture – every new material there is so much to learn. Things don't always go right the first time. I remember working on my first marble commission. I made a model for the sculpture that my clients had as reference - it was an abstract bird. Because there wasn't a lot of time to carve the sculpture, I bought an air chisel to speed up the process. I'd never used one before. Everything was going along nicely and the bird was starting to emerge but when I was refining the tail at the back, it broke. I was mortified. What was I going to do now? After calming down a bit, I took another look and found a solution for the tail which was much better for the sculpture as a whole and my clients found that the sculpture was exactly what they envisaged.

Smithdon High School students in Lifesaving First Aid Training

Hunstanton Town Council has unanimously agreed to support a grant application from Smithdon High School to help fund First Aid and AED (defibrillator) training for students, continuing a long-running initiative that has already trained hundreds of young people in vital lifesaving skills.

At the Full Council meeting held on Wednesday, 22nd October 2025, councillors voted in favour of granting £1,203.20 to support the training of 114 students, who will each gain a nationally recognised Emergency First Aid at Work Certificate with AED training, valid for three years.

This project has been running for several years, originally inspired by a group of students who raised funds to install an AED in the community when none was available nearby. Since then, Smithdon students have continued to show an incredible commitment to helping others, learning essential skills that benefit both themselves and the wider Hunstanton community.

Over the past seven years, the school has successfully trained hundreds of students — including those from low-income families and students with special educational needs — providing them with a qualification that supports their GCSE studies, Duke of Edinburgh Awards, and future career prospects. Many former students have since written back to thank the school, sharing how their training has helped them in real-life emergencies, boosted their confidence, and even helped them secure college places or employment.

Training numbers over the years include:

- · 68 students in 2018/19
- \cdot 140 students in 2020/21 (including those who missed out during COVID)
- · 130 students in 2022/23
- · 120 students in 2023/24
- · 48 students in 2024/25

A spokesperson from Smithdon expressed their gratitude following the Council's decision:

"This is amazing news to end the half term! We're so grateful to Hunstanton Town Council for supporting this initiative once again. I'll be booking in the training dates very soon, and it would be wonderful to welcome the Mayor and Deputy Mayor to join us when the sessions take place."

Hunstanton Town Council is proud to support a project that not only provides young people with valuable life skills but also enhances the safety and resilience of the local community. With an ageing population and increasing pressure on NHS services, having more residents trained in First Aid is a positive step for everyone.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS & PARTIES FOR YOUR STAFF – ARE THEY TAXABLE?

It seems unlikely that many businesses will be throwing a party to celebrate the largesse that has been spread around by the 2025 Budget. Indeed, in the era of working from home, political correctness and general doom and gloom, the office party may not be the afternoon bacchanalia which many of us fondly remember (although in some cases, if you can remember it, you probably weren't there.) However, where an employer does scrape together enough petty cash and goodwill to create some staff entertainment or reward, whether as Christmas parties or Christmas gifts for staff, there are employment tax, business tax and VAT consequences – of course!

A Party?

Surprisingly in some cases you might not have to report anything to HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) or pay tax and National Insurance. To be exempt, the party or similar social function must:

- · be open to all of your employees
- · be annual, such as a Christmas party or summer barbecue
- \cdot cost £150 or less per person (if it exceeds that, thewhole cost is taxable, not just the excess.)

This also applies to online or virtual parties. If your business has more than one location, an annual event that's open to all of your staff based at one location still counts as exempt. You can also put on separate parties for different departments, as long as all of your employees can attend one of them. If there are multiple parties over the year costing less than £150 per head, in aggregate they can all

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be included. The £150 limit applies to the number of guests, rather than the employees, so spouses and partners can be included.

Christmas Gifts?

Some employers, perhaps with a recollection of rowdy events in the past, make gifts, such as non-cash retail vouchers or hampers, to employees as an alternative (or addition) to Christmas parties.

Such gifts might be covered by the annual events exemption if given at the event (as long as the total of all costs for the event do not exceed the £150 per head) or may alternatively fall within the definition of a "trivial benefit in kind."

The trivial benefit exemption is less generous than the party exemption and will only apply to a gift which is not cash or a cash voucher and is less than £50. It will not be exempt from tax if the employee has a contractual right to the gift or it is given in recognition of particular services carried out as part of their duties.

If the employer manages to jump through all the tax hoops there are no tax or NIC liabilities for either employer or employee. Where one or all of the conditions are not met, the gift will be taxable and subject to NIC. Additionally, where an employee buys their own gift, and is reimbursed, this relief will not apply.

The information above was summarised prior to the 2025 Budget. It is, of course entirely possible that Rachel Reeves will stride up to the floor of the House of Commons wearing a party hat, and in the spirit of Christmas, announce a whole series of celebratory concessions. The smart money is backing the appearance of a sack of less palatable surprises.

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The Arts Society North West Norfolk Let's have a Laugh

There still exists an 'elitism' in art, the belief that only the wealthy, the educated, the privileged

understand art; the superior attitude that art is supposed to be a serious matter so that only the experts know what's going on. These myths need busting because art has always been part of our existence, regardless of race, culture, politics or religion, and humour in art can be traced back to the ancient Greeks. Humour can get your attention, but its definition can vary greatly person to person. An everyday object, boring and mundane, can become new and enjoyable, the weird behaviour of an individual can make us laugh out loud. The transgressions of social codes and preconceived ideas are often the basis of humour in art, particularly contemporary art.

The twentieth-century art movements, such as Dadaism, were some of the early turning points for the foundation of humour in contemporary art that emerged after WW1. "Dada" is a simple joke itself, as it has no meaning, but is believed to be a reaction to the absurdity and gravity of the war. Dadaism is all about being artistically free and spontaneously creative and exploring the roles of chance and randomness. One of the very early examples of Dada anti-art was Marcel Duchamp and his readymade artwork 'Fountain' (a porcelain urinal signed "R. Mutt" 1917) challenging what is art, criticising the art establishment and confounding preconceived notions about the relationship between the object, the artist's idea and the viewer's perception. The title 'Fountain' is a pun on the object's function and appearance. 'R. Mutt' is a further humorous provocation. Firstly, the art establishment said it is immoral and vulgar, and plagiarism of a commercial piece of plumbing. Duchamp defended his readymade sculpture as "everyday objects raised to the dignity of work of art by the artist's act of choice". It was certainly a major landmark in twentieth-century modern and contemporary art and in the 1950s and 1960s sixteen replicas were commissioned from Duchamp and made to his approval.

Not all humour in contemporary art is playful like the Dadaists. More artists have resorted to much darker black humour and irony to highlight social and political protests. Consumerism, waste, inequality, the military, authoritarianism and environmental issues are common themes in contemporary works of art. Some artists have become internationally famous by deliberately producing work that is both provocative and dark but also funny. Maurizzio Cattelan is an Italian visual artist known for his uncannily realistic sculptures and installations and famous for his 'banana on the wall'. It is his commentary on how art has become a luxury commodity, only accessible to the wealthy. His 'banana on the wall' challenges this notion by making art accessible to all. The famous Banksy is an artist who uses dark subversive humour as a weapon for political protest (Napalm, Banksy 1994). In others he plays with the codes of the establishment in a more lighthearted way (Devolved Parliament 1999).

Martin Parr, the documentary photographer, is the master of intimate, satirical and anthropological portraits of modern life in Britain and around the world in the 1980s and 1990s. His bold, flashy style captures so brilliantly the English social classes, their times at play and how they lived and laughed. Parr admits to the use of irony in his work to make serious subjects more accessible and to illustrate vulnerability and ambiguities. His often affectionate gaze on modern life, portraying the everyday in a critical and humorous light, and his commitment to preserving a growing collection of significant work, much of which is a humorous reflection on British and Irish culture, is an important part of contemporary art.

Humour can work as a defence mechanism in serious situations and in art it enables us to take a break from the usual reality of our daily life. Humour in art can give us distance from our fears, allowing reality and pleasure to coexist. Next time you laugh while looking at a picture or even in an art gallery, it's because you get it, or perhaps you don't. Either way, enjoy art.
