MEMORIES OF THE 1953 FLOOD

At the January meeting of the Heacham Recollections group in the Parish Library, we talked about the events of Saturday 31st January 1953 and, having recalled my direct experience, was encouraged to write down my memories:-

As a 15-year-old boy living at the extreme end of Jubilee Road at the time, I had finished my day's work as a butcher's boy delivering meat orders to Crisp's customers, finishing the day by washing down the slaughterhouse floor. I remember it being cold and very windy – blowing the tickets off the meat packages I had been delivering. In 1953, the earth bank between my home and the sea was much lower and between it and the sea there were no caravans but rough land, which often flooded naturally by the sea when spring tides were high. Also, there were dykes running either side of Jubilee Road as far as the railway crossing gates that would fill with water, affected by the spring tides.

It was about 7pm when I realised there was water around the bungalow and I alerted my family and then went to warn those living in nearby properties. In the house furthest from the road was a USAF airman, his wife and children. They joined my stepfather in a room that was high above the garage. This building was a 2 storey property and had been commandeered by the War Department for use as a signal station and observation post overlooking The Wash during the war years (1941-1945). My mother Marjorie and brother Roger left to go to safer ground at the 'West Norfolk' and from there they were taken to Heacham School. There were American civilians who worked at Sculthorpe living nearby and when I had warned them, they left. Mr and Mrs W. Brown and all of their children: Joan, Edward, Kenneth, Kathleen. Raymond, Christine and Gillian from Brown's Holiday Camp had to leave as did others staying there, including American families.

When I had first discovered the incoming water it was ankle deep. Unlike other parts along the seafront closer to the beach the sea was not crashing over the earth bank but it just kept on coming. By the time I had roused the neighbours the water was up to my waist and I was then picked up in a dinghy and taken to the 'West Norfolk' and I was able to join others hosted by Mr Sam Owen, the publican. The water had reached as far as the railway crossing gates. From there, those forced from their homes went to Heacham School where Service issue camp beds from RAF Bircham Newton and mattresses laid on the floor had been set up by various volunteer organisations such as the WVS. A Burco boiler was being used to fill teapots and the WVS provided refreshments and biscuits. My brother remembers Americans there, namely the wife of Sgt. Ball and his three daughters. Records show that Sgt. Ball of the USAF rescued an elderly lady from a bungalow named "Shingledean" which was close to my home. She was known to me and close neighbours as "Granny Smith".

The following day my mother and I returned home to 'The Gables' to begin the cleaning up operation and my brother went to stay with family friends in Poplar Avenue. Of course, after the water had subsided there was debris and mud everywhere and I remember seeing dead livestock. My home at that time was built on pillars that raised the base quite a way off the ground but the water had still flooded in about one foot above the floor. We later received 'relief' parcels of clothing from the Red Cross and food parcels from Cyprus, Canada and Greece that included tinned food, wine and dried fruit.

During that night, as a fifteen year old boy, I didn't feel frightened about possible danger but afterwards was shocked to learn of people I had known who were drowned. Derek Stubbins was a friend from school and we played football together. I had visited his home on Hunstanton South Beach Road on a number of occasions. He was drowned as was his sister and father in that house. It was a wooden building with asbestos on the outside and the inside, as were those of neighbours who also died; it would have been fine for a summer holiday break but not for a storm surge in January.

Present Day (2026)

My current home is the building that was commandeered by the War Department mentioned above where I live with my son, Justin and daughter, Claire. I have made extensive building changes to this property over the years. Many Heacham residents and pupils of Smithdon High School will remember my wife, Diana Newman.

Jesus, the way, the truth and the life is waiting to welcome all those who look to him. I pray that all residents of Heacham, young or old, will find peace, joy and grace from our ever-loving Lord who calls each and every one of us into his family here on earth and then into heavenly places.

Borough Council News Heacham Ward which includes Sedgeford and Fring

Happy New Year to all my readers and even to those not so discerning. The last time I wrote this article was in November. There should be plenty to write about but Christmas occurred.

A key happening in Sedgeford is the resolution of Norfolk County Council's, NCC's, planning application for the development of the school site. It went to planning committee on 12th January with a recommendation to approve. This follows inclusion of the minimum requirement of two affordable homes in the application. NCC backed down at the end of November when they were told refusal would be recommended if they didn't comply with rules about such provision. Whether other Parish Council requests were agreed I won't know until after this article has been sent to press.

There is another side to this development. It's the first new build application since Anglian Water, last year, advised the planning authority that the capacity of Heacham Waste Water Treatment Works, HWWTW, has been reached. That is, they would oppose any new development proposals within its very wide service area which includes Heacham, Sedgeford, Hunstanton, and places in between and around.

In the application agenda for the Sedgeford School it states, 'Anglian Water: OBJECTION The proposal connects to HWWTW which does not currently have capacity.' Planning officers said, 'Comments from Anglian Water are noted – given the Right to Connect and considering the existing drainage infrastructure in place – and it should be noted that Anglian Water are not a statutory consultee – the principle of foul drainage connection to mains sewer is acceptable.' (words correct, order changed to make sense as other detail omitted).

The Right to Connect is a rather stupid planning law applied across the country. Any developer has the right to connect to a sewer system whether that system can cope or not. The onus is on the water company to ensure the system is adequate. HWWTW has been under pressure for years to cope with increasing tourism (sewage throughout can double in the holiday season) and more housing development. Government dictates seek to increase development beyond that of existing and reasonable plans. HWWTW does need an upgrade but that will have to be substantial and it is currently planned for the early 2030s.

It is unlikely that the Sedgeford development will blow the system but the impact of new development will be incremental. This one has been ignored on the basis it is replacing a school; will the next will follow suit? There is no apparent appetite to heed the warnings. If the system eventually discharges untreated sewage, it will be into The Wash with the resulting impact on the tourist trade, fishing, and locals. Perhaps nothing will happen between now and the planned upgrade and the local planning authority will get away with taking risks. I don't think that is a gamble in the best interests of our corner of West Norfolk. I will be raising this matter at every opportunity.

Leaping to a significant Borough issue which commenced, formally, at the end of the first week of January: The first steps towards a Town Council for King's Lynn were recommended by the Electoral Arrangements Committee, to go to Full Council for ratification. If agreed, then consultation and communication will begin. It will be a complex but rapid process as the matter has to be sorted before the government stops any internal council changes prior to local government reorganisation, LGR.

I put King's Lynn Town Council within the corporate plan back in 2023. Feelings then were mixed and it was put on the back burner for action in another year or so. Since then, the Labour government has decided on LGR and a serious need for a town

council to be considered has been realised. It is the most effective way within a Unitary Council to ensure that the assets in King's Lynn are best retained for the use of residents and that residents will be better able to have influence over how the town is managed.

The Borough Council was created in 1974 and named West Norfolk. In 1981 it was changed to King's Lynn and West Norfolk. A (deliberate) error kept King's Lynn unparished – no Parish or Town Council to manage its local affairs. Similarly, Borough assets like car parks in Hunstanton were retained by the Borough and were not devolved to that town. Those of you living within a Parished area have a Parish Council. Part of your Council tax is the Parish precept. This money is spent, locally, by the Parish Councils. King's Lynn does not have such a precept and local services which would be paid for by a Parish are supplied by the Borough. Conversely, King's Lynn generates a lot of money and significant amounts of it help support services across the Borough. So, there are swings and roundabouts in the current democratic make up of KLWNBC. However, LGR will stir things up and, particularly, if a single unitary is formed, King's Lynn's assets will not be protected and a big reduction in councillors will lessen public representation.

All this will be explained in Borough communications and consultation. This will likely be just with residents of King's Lynn in the first instance. Public consultation on LGR ended on the 11th January. I hope sufficient numbers of you took part and I hope you strongly supported the three unitary model which is the best outcome for West Norfolk. If you are consulted about a Town Council for King's Lynn, I recommend you support that proposal too.

Other local matters. The Lamsey Lane traffic lights appear to be doing a good job. If you have a different opinion, please email me. The new post office in Heacham is enjoying some trade but could, no doubt, do with more. On planning matters; several have come

in as retrospective, i.e. the work is done and then an application made. Please do not say no to this as it can backfire and if the application eventually makes it to committee, retrospectives are not appreciated. It is always best to talk through your proposals with planning officers prior to making an application.

If you have concerns about an application which may affect you or your property, the correct procedure is to submit your concerns to the planning authority in writing. This may easily be done on the planning portal. You can also contact me and I will look at the proposal and the site so that I can form an opinion and raise questions with officers. It is unreasonable to verbally abuse neighbours or workmen.

Back to the Borough. Significant improvements at Lynnsport are moving closer as consultative and financial aspects move towards resolution. There are also advanced proposals for Padel tennis courts in Hunstanton. This is a sport which has, apparently, caused a 'mania' across the nation. If you want to know more, run a search for it on your devices. Include 'problems with padel' or 'padel noise' in your criteria. You will find that courts should be located well away from residential housing and, even then, have sound mitigation measures in place including full enclosure, and sound proofing. These, of course, are best thought through before complaints about noise occur.

Budget proposals for 2026-2027 are coming forward and councillors will have been briefed in January. The Full Council budget meeting is on 26th February. I will endeavour to find any aspects detrimental to residents of my Ward. I am particularly looking for positive changes to car parking charges at Heacham but am not holding my breath.

Heacham at Night

Time marches on, the planets follow their orbits and, this month, Mercury and Venus make an evening showing with Saturn looking on.

From the beginning of February look west after sunset to find a dim Saturn with magnitude +1. The ringed planet sets about 8pm. It is an ethereal, yellowish, dot easy to see once you have seen it. A phone app might help you do that, otherwise a slow scan of the WSW to western sky with binoculars should do the job.

Saturn moves gradually lower in the sky as the month progresses and is just two Moon widths to the left of Neptune on the 20th. Observe the ringed planet at about 6.30pm as it will quickly reach the horizon and set. At magnitude +7.8, around 1/500 of the brightness of dim Saturn, don't expect to see Neptune without very good binoculars or a small telescope. It is worth a little effort to see the green-blue dot of the most distant planet from Earth; currently 30.88 astronomical units or 4.62 billion km.

As the second week starts, after sunset, look out for Mercury to the right and somewhat below Saturn. It will be a bright spark with a magnitude of minus 1.1. You will need a good horizon and a visit to Heacham beaches or Hunstanton cliffs should serve well.

Over the next two weeks Mercury moves further from the Sun, reaching its greatest eastern elongation on 19th and setting at 7pm. However, it also dims to magnitude minus 0.4 and, by the end of the month to +1.8.

Venus appears bright in the west from the middle of the month (magnitude minus 3.9). On the 18th and 19th from 6pm look for a vertical arc of planets in the WSW, Venus at the bottom, Mercury higher and to the left, Saturn much higher and about 90 degrees to the left of Venus.

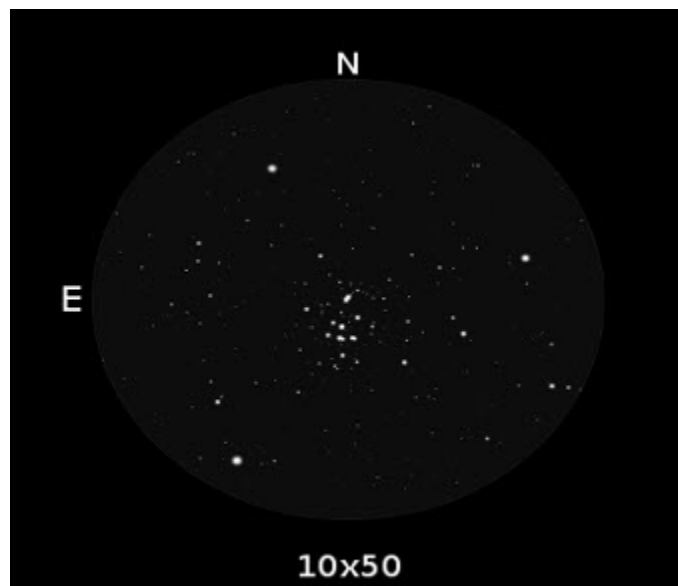
The Crescent Moon adds to the picture. It will be between Venus and Mercury on the 18th and to the right of Saturn on the 19th.

Jupiter is in the sky until the early hours, shining with a magnitude of minus 2.5. It will be easy to spot and the Galilean Moons, discussed in recent editions, will still be there.

On the last night of the month turn your binoculars to the Moon and look just below it. A host of stars, the Beehive Cluster, Praesepe, will be revealed. An open cluster of 1,000 stars some 577 light years away and just 600 million years old. It is a mixture of star types including red giants and white dwarfs.

The beehive has been observed for thousands of years as its glow is easily seen by the naked eye in dark skies. Galileo turned his telescope towards it and resolved 40 stars.

Orion stands out high in the SW. I have featured this constellation in previous issues but it is a true winter sight so use binoculars to scan it, particularly the hazy area below the belt stars. The hazy swirl you see is the Orion Nebulae, birthplace of stars.

The nebulae is 1,350 light years away and is 25 light years across. It is the closest 'star factory' to Earth and the forming of new stars and the protoplanetary discs which surround them have been observed.

The nebula glows because of 4 large young stars near its centre. They are arranged, from our perspective, in a trapezium shape and can be seen through a reasonable telescope.

A clear, Moon free, night, which is rare, will reveal the winter Milky Way; the faint glow of millions of stars starts due south and flows upwards a little tilted towards the west. Sirius, the dog star, will be the bright star low down. The Milky Way skirts Orion on its right, flows behind the legs of the Gemini twins and then Auriga, a house shaped pattern of stars, containing the bright star Capella.

Sirius, with a magnitude of minus 1.46, is the brightest star in the northern sky. It is very luminous and is only 8.6 light years away. Like many stars it is a binary; a white dwarf (Sirius B) orbits a main sequence, ordinary, star (Sirius A). It takes 50 years for Sirius B to orbit Sirius A with perihelion, its closest, approach at 8.2 astronomical units. This is a little closer than Saturn to our Sun. Aphelion, furthest point from Sirius A, is at 31.5 au, a bit further than Pluto from our Sun.

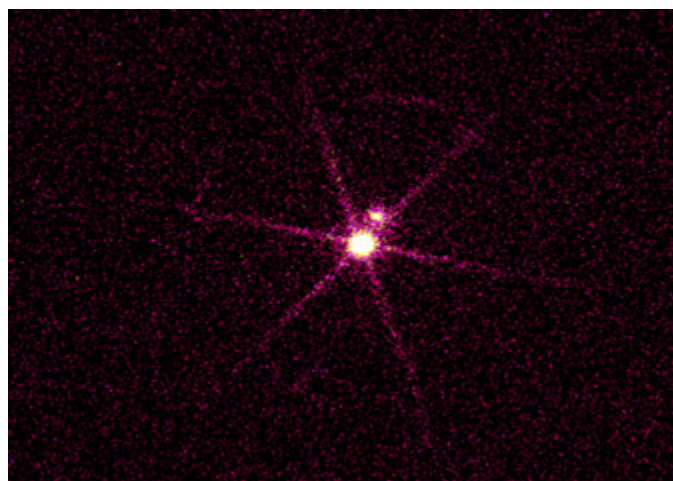

‘The Heacham Nine’

This is scheduled to appear at the beginning of February and, at the time of writing this at the end of 2025, I am assuming Heacham will be ticking over as ‘normal’ after the passing of the first month of the new year. Three years ago was the seventieth anniversary of an event that shook Heacham, the nation and further afield and the first week of February would have seen a village still reeling from the storm surge of Saturday 31st January 1953. Wreckage of properties on the sea front and personal possessions still littered land half a mile inland . . . and the funerals began.

At the time of that anniversary I collected what information I could and printed it out for the Parish Library. There were some gaps, unanswered questions and confusion which the recent search for information about the beaches has caused me to follow up and rewrite the ‘booklet’ for the Library. That does not mean that all the questions are answered and confusion cleared away! There are, however, far more details of the victims than space allows here. Without wishing to be intrusive, I have attempted to ‘research’ the lives of the victims and to see them as human beings and not just names on a list. In nearly every case there are no longer any immediate family members to care for graves or share their memories; space is restricted here but the Library booklet includes most of the details I have discovered.

Of course, any corrections or additional information would be of interest.

It seems that it was the newspapers of the time that, from the earliest, often confused reports of flooding, damage and death along the East Coast, told of nine Heacham victims without clearly defining what that meant. The names below I have attempted to ‘humanise’ all have some connection with Heacham.

Those listed on the memorial plaque in the Parish Council office and represented by the memorial at North Beach, are marked with an asterisk.

Nina Hammond* was a single lady, originally from Peterborough but she was not in Heacham as the owner of a second home beach bungalow as were a number of victims along this stretch of coast. She was what was described by the coroner as a ‘lady’s companion’ and had been for a number of years – certainly since the beginning of the war. The lady who employed her and is noted later was Mrs Snelson, an elderly lady who owned ‘Jeanholme’ a beach bungalow which is where both were when it was swamped by the rushing sea. Mrs Snelson had quite understandably thought that Nina would outlive her and had had made very generous provision for her in her Will. In the event, their funeral took place on the same day and they are buried together in the Rolfe Acre.

Samuel Charles Hurling was one of those victims who had a permanent address beyond Heacham. He was a Holbeach resident and had retired a year previously after forty years working as a Post Office engineer. In that same year he married for a second time, his first wife having died some years previously. He and Dorothy were staying in their new caravan by Hunstanton South Beach on that fateful day at the end of January. His wife’s body was recovered at Hunstanton but Samuel Hurling was initially one of the ‘missing’ until his death was confirmed when his body was found at Heacham. This was reported in the press and it is possible that he was considered one of ‘The Heacham Nine’; his name and that of his wife are recorded on the Hunstanton memorial.

Russell Owen Martin; Wayne John Martin* Inquests on these two boys were held at ‘The Fox and Hounds’ on the Monday after they and their parents were swept away from the sea front at Hunstanton and drowned. The two brothers aged just 4 and 10 months were found at Heacham and it may be that both were included in ‘The Heacham Nine.’ The body of their mother Dorothy was recovered at Hunstanton and that of Russell Martin Senior some time later. He was an airman from West Virginia serving with the U.S.A.F. at Sculthorpe but his wife was English and both boys had been born in her home county of Cheshire. Unlike many of the other American victims, he and his family were not living in a beach bungalow but were lodging in Avenue Road, Hunstanton. On that Saturday they and another American family, also named Martin, were attending an anniversary celebration at a restaurant near the beach when the sea defences were breached. The body of Russell Senior was repatriated for burial in West Virginia but those of the two boys and their mother rest in Widnes.

The names of all members of this family appear on the Hunstanton Memorial although Wayne is shown as J. Martin; he was actually named Wayne John Martin. At the time of preparing the Heacham memorial plaque it was thought his name had been omitted and should be recognised.

Christina Elizabeth Marsters* or Chrissie as she was called by those who knew her, would have been known by Heacham residents although she and her husband Arthur were from King’s Lynn. They had owned ‘Kingfisher’, a houseboat in the Heacham Harbour from the days when it would still bob with the incoming tide some twenty years previously. Arthur had adapted it and added ‘all mod cons’ over the years and the couple featured in an article on the Heacham houseboats back in 1939. They were on/in ‘Kingfisher’ when the storm surge struck and with them was Christina’s sister. Arthur had attempted to support both the ladies above the water level within their flooded home but they eventually succumbed although he survived. The sisters were buried together at St Mary’s.

Mary Smith* Angela Mary Smith* Mother and five-year-old daughter were living at the extreme end of Heacham North Beach where the parish boundary meets that of Hunstanton. There is now a gap where once 'Ardlui', a beach bungalow once stood. They were swept away along with the family dog and the bungalow on that Saturday. Mr Bill Smith was a taxi driver and was on a regular 'pick up' at Sculthorpe at the time and when news reached there he joined American airmen in a rescue effort which was thwarted when their amphibious 'Weasel' was hampered by fallen telephone cables on Hunstanton South Beach Road. Newspapers at the time reported their address as the adjacent Hunstanton South Beach Road and it may be that they were therefore not included as being two of the 'The Heacham Nine.' 'Gorse,' the family dog was discovered alive on the site of the bungalow the following day and when the little girl's body was discovered inland it had claw marks which led some to believe the family pet had attempted to save her. Mother and daughter are buried in the cemetery at Walsoken; Mary was born in Wisbech where her father was a well-known and successful businessman; her mother had been born at nearby Walsoken.

Tina Tod Snelson* was the 81-year-old lady who drowned at 'Jeanholme' with Nina Hammond. It is a little difficult to understand why she chose to go to her beach bungalow on a January day when 'bad' weather was threatening when she owned a substantial Station Road house: 'Fridhem.' She was a lady who had led quite a colourful life before coming to Heacham and more details are in the Library booklet. She was born in Scotland to a very successful East India merchant involved in many enterprises based in Ceylon (Sri Lanka). In Heacham she would have been known by some for her interest in music and drama. The church choir were pleased to practise in the warmth of 'Fridhem' rather than the church and the drama company The Heacham Players

held their inaugural meeting at her home where she was elected Treasurer. Others would possibly be overawed by her ownership of a Rolls Royce and a Buick. She died with Nina Hammond and they were buried together.

William Stubbins like Samuel Hurling, was swept away from Hunstanton where he was living and his body was recovered at Heacham and, again, this was reported in the early newspaper reports and may have led to him being considered one of the nine victims. His name is recorded on the Hunstanton memorial along with that of a daughter (a friend of Angela Smith) and son; his wife had died in 1947. They were living in a beach bungalow on Hunstanton South Beach. Beginning his working life in a Worksop coal mine, he had moved around the country and at the start of the war was engaged in the protection of civilians in his employment building public air raid shelters in Portsmouth. Ironically, he was employed in Hunstanton in a public protection rôle – as foreman of sea defence works. Another daughter Joyce survived because she was babysitting for an American airman. That airman was Freeman Kilpatrick, one of the two Americans awarded the George Medal for their heroic rescue missions. The victims were buried with William's wife Mary in Hunstanton Cemetery.

Gertrude Ann Towler* was the unmarried sister of Christina Marsters and, although born near Dereham, had lived in Heacham for most of her life. As a young teenager she lived with an unmarried aunt, Emma Hudson and helped with her work as a laundress just a few doors away from Heacham Station. When her aunt married John Herring she continued to live with them at one of the 'Coastguard Cottages'; she was housekeeper to John when her aunt died and was living in the cottage after John died and was there in 1953. However, on the night of 31st January she was with her sister and brother-in-law in the 'Kingfisher' with tragic consequences.

Ernest George Wright* was Heacham-born, the son of the stationmaster and from an early age worked as a railway clerk including time with his father and thirty years at King's Lynn. His son would become a stationmaster too. He thought of Heacham as home and returned to the village as a lodger after retirement in 1934. He realised the attraction of houseboats at Heacham Harbour as quirky accommodation for holidaymakers and entered into the rental business. It was on/in 'Shenandoah' that his body was discovered after the water and storm subsided. Amongst his effects, searchers discovered a brief typewritten résumé of his life he had prepared at some time previously for publication in the local paper in the event of his death. Perhaps this was evidence of his earlier organised, timetabled life as a railway clerk but it is unlikely that he could have foreseen the manner of his passing. He was buried close to the grave of his father and grandfather.

Did you know that the Queen's Cottage Almshouses have been providing accommodation for Heacham residents for over 125 years? These attractive carrstone cottages in Church Lane

were built in 1897 with money raised by the village on land donated by the Rolfe family. MAKING TAX DIGITAL – AM I INCLUDED?

It now seems an age ago that the concept Making Tax Digital was first floated. After an initial “roadmap” in 2015, the system has been debated, refined and changed but it will be going live from April 2026. From that date those with income from self-employment and rent, in excess of £50,000 annually (the limit reduces in future years), will be required to maintain digital records and submit quarterly summaries, followed by an annual declaration.

Back in November HMRC issued a useful guide, defining who will be caught by the new rules- in summary:

Your qualifying income is the gross income that you receive (i.e. before deducting any expenses) in a tax year from your self-employment/s and property. For example, someone with £25,000 from rental income and £27,000 from self-employment income would have qualifying income of £52,000; and a key point to remain aware of is that those with multiple sources of self-employed income will need to submit a quarterly return for each income source.

It does NOT include:

- employment (PAYE)
- dividends (including those from your own company)
- a State Pension
- private pensions
- Income from a partnership does not count towards your qualifying income.

The system is, unfortunately, far from perfect. Despite HMRC assurances that free software will be available there is very little choice, and some free packages will only deal with the simplest cases. HMRC have already started contacting taxpayers who they think will be affected (based on 2024/25 data), but this process may not be complete before the April implementation, and the onus is therefore on the taxpayer to register. Although the process is designed to be simple, it is clear from the information released that even the registration criteria are not straightforward.

Those who are not confident that they will be able to deal with MTD from April should definitely contact their accountant for advice as soon as possible.

The Arts Society North West Norfolk The Art of Church Stained Glass

Stained glass has a very long and interesting history, and this short article can only give the briefest of outlines. Stained glass is an ancient art which is still made the way our medieval glaziers would recognise. Firstly, a design was drawn. This was enlarged to the size of the window, pieces of coloured and plain glass were cut to the required shapes and any painting done in black. They were then fixed together with H-shaped strips of lead, which were soldered together and then sealed to the glass with a special cement to keep out the weather. In the early 13th century, the art of staining glass was discovered and this enabled more details to be added, particularly faces.

But why go to all this trouble? Medieval churches were full of colour, depicting scenes from the Bible and the light streaming through the windows brought the pictures to life. At that time we made only clear glass in England as coloured glass was expensive and had to be imported from the continent, mainly from Normandy, the Rhineland and Burgundy. Surprisingly, many panels of medieval glass survive all around Norfolk, often high up in the tracery windows, such as at South Acre (1200s), South Creak, Narborough and Heacham.

The style of architecture progressed from the round-headed Norman openings through to the pointed styles of the Decorated and Perpendicular periods and the shape of the windows had to change. As methods advanced, many national disasters happened to delay construction or destroy this fragile material, but all the time the wind, rain and sunshine were also doing their damage, and often sheer lack of money or inclination to repair the decaying windows completed the cycle of demise. Lead starts to decay, rarely lasting more than 100 years, and with this the windows begin to buckle. Now there is another hazard – the rotary lawn mower, causing many of the small holes seen in windows today!

After the upheaval of the established church in Tudor times very little stained glass was made for churches until the early 1800s, by which time the old art had been largely forgotten, and continental glass was being imported after the Napoleonic wars. It took several decades for English glass to be perfected again and some of the early attempts have faded badly. By the 1850s there were hundreds of glass makers all over the country and their work varies greatly, but the top 10 to 15 firms produced some excellent windows, as the local Church Records have found in Harpley, Ingoldisthorpe, Middleton, North Creak, Sculthorpe, Stanhoe and others. Some makers left their signatures or symbols and it's exciting to find them, usually in the bottom right corner, sometimes the left and occasionally elsewhere. So next time you visit a church take some binoculars and see what you can find! Occasionally we find more modern glass but it's quite rare in country churches.

We are lucky here in that the best place to visit to learn about this craft is the excellent Stained Glass Museum in Ely Cathedral. There are also hundreds of books to read, with the Pitkin or Shire guides being good places to start, and much information is available on-line.

The Arts Society North West Norfolk supports the King's Lynn Church Records, who have recorded 26 churches in this area.
